

KANSAS MINERS VOTE TO RETURN

Howat's Promise Leads to the Adoption of Motion to Call Strikes Off

PITTSBURG, Kan., (AP)—A motion calling off all coal strikes now in effect in the Kansas district that had been called by the executive board of district number 14, United Mine Workers of America, was adopted by the miners at a late yesterday. All striking miners affected are ordered to return to work today.

The action affects 13 mines, including five operated by the Central Coal and Coke company. Approximately 1,500 men are employed in them.

The conference yesterday was held in conformity with the promise given Federal Judge Anderson of Indianapolis, by Alexander Howat, president of the district, that he would use his influence in having the strikes ended. It has been the understanding here that if Howat succeeded in having the mine strike called off content of court proceedings brought against him by the district probably would be continued indefinitely.

No action was taken on the strike in effect of the Bronson, Rogers and Hermal mine since December 18. This strike was called because of the refusal of the men to work with a former member of the union who had worked with the state militia during the general strike. Howat stated it would have to be settled by the miners affected and by the operators of the mine.

HAND CARVING PRINCIPLE OCCUPATION OF PRISONERS

JUAREZ, Mex., (AP)—Hand carving is one of the principal indoor sports of the prisoners in the city jail here. Monkey and other stapes are wrought from pens or pieces of stone. Little trinkets are offered to tourists, a number of whom are admitted to the jail every day.

One prisoner, a "long term" claimed the other day that the four other inmates who were offering their carvings were "pupils of his."

Tobacco and cigarettes are a luxury in the "carcel." When "smokes" are passed around, each prisoner exacts an equal share. Frequently one of them will trade a carving that has taken days to complete in exchange for a package of cigarettes.

ARMY MEDICAL DEPARTMENT GETS COMPATIBLE OPINION

HONOLULU, T. H., (AP)—Malcolm Franklin, collector of the port of Honolulu, shipped 104 pounds of opium valued at \$41,000, to the medical department at Washington, when the steamer Lurline left for San Francisco on her last trip.

The opinion represents the total seizure here since April of this year, with the exception of 66 lbs which were taken from the steamer Tezla Maru last July and which later disappeared from the seizure room in the customs house.

LOS ANGELES ORDINANCE DEALS WITH CATS AND DOGS

LOS ANGELES, Cal., (AP)—Los Angeles dogs and cats, sick or well, are restricted as to residence but safeguarded as to personal liberties by a city ordinance just passed.

The new law relegates all dog and cat hospitals or kennels to the industrial and outlying districts but provides that such hospitals or kennels "must not be conducted in such a way as to prevent the animals from being heard or mewing, particularly in the night time."

AMERICANS WIN—ENCOUNTERS ON THE OTHER SIDE

Pal Moore—Makos—Criquei Quit and Griffiths Scores Technical Knockout

LONDON, (AP)—Two American fighters, Pal Moore, middleweight, and Johnny Griffiths, featherweight, decisively defeated French opponents in the ring at Albert Hall last night.

In what was to have been a 20-round bout, Moore made Eugene Criquei quit in the 14th round, while Griffiths scored a technical knockout over Francis Charles in the third round. Both Criquei and Charles declared that they had been hit low.

Ted "Kid" Lewis administered a bad beating to Matt Wells in 12 rounds, cutting his face with ribbons and breaking his nose. Wells gave up the unequal struggle in the twelfth round.

Moore severely trounced Criquei. In the fourteenth round the American drove into the Frenchman and with a "right hook to the stomach" doubled him up. Criquei quit. He claimed that Moore had fainted him, but he made no formal protest.

It was also a right hook to the stomach that caused Charles to refuse to continue with Griffiths. He, likewise, claimed that the American drove into the Frenchman and requested another fight with the Frenchman.

During the evening, Georges Carpenter, the European heavyweight champion, boxed a three-round exhibition bout. Joe Beckett, who recently was knocked out by Carpenter, entered the ring and requested another fight with the Frenchman.

SYRIAN COMES NEAR TO BEING BULLET PROOF

Shot in Head, Hip and Stomach, Padro Jamit has Last Bullet Removed

NOGALES, Ariz., (AP)—One of the most remarkable cases handled by local surgeons in recent years is that of Padro Jamit, a Syrian merchant of Tuzig, Navarri, Mexico. A bullet that had been lodged in Jamit's back for several months was removed recently at a hospital here.

Jamit was held up and robbed of \$1,500 by bandits. He was shot through the head, in the hip and in the stomach. The first two bullets came out of their own accord, while the one that entered the stomach was removed by the surgeons.

After being wounded Jamit was taken into the mountains by the bandits. During the 16 days that he remained there, he received no medical treatment, his wounds being washed with cold water by an aged Mexican nurse. Through the aid of a Mexican woman, the Syrian escaped and made his way to the border.

Last year Jamit was robbed of \$5,000 by bandits.

New York Leads with 777, while Ten States Have Over 200 Organizations

INDIANAPOLIS, (AP)—American Legion posts in the United States and foreign countries now total 6,561, it was announced yesterday at national headquarters in France, England and Canada each have one post, Alaska has four, Hawaii five, Cuba one, Panama one, Mexico one and the Philippine islands one. Ten states have more than two hundred posts each. New York leads with 777 posts; Pennsylvania is second with 197; Minnesota is third with 364; Illinois fourth with 359 posts. Iowa has 345, Ohio 298, Massachusetts 238, New Jersey 224, Missouri 220 and Indiana 203. San Francisco Courts Will Try Character-Building Measures in Minor Cases

Upon the thesis that a thrifty man is a better citizen and "that many of our economic ills and much of our present day social unrest are due directly to thriftlessness," Police and Superior Judges of San Francisco are planning to give persons convicted of minor infractions of the law an alternative of investment in Government securities, such as War Savings Stamps and Treasury Savings Certificates instead of fining them. Judge T. I. Fitzpatrick, Presiding Judge of the Police Court here, said, "I shall be glad to assist in the movement in this direction, keeping in mind, however, at all times, the provisions of the charter of the city and county." The alternative of investment in Government securities will be offered whenever it is within the power of the judge to fine or set free the defendant in a misdemeanor case. "This attempt," said another judge, "will give such defendants a chance to help themselves and their Government and cultivate a habit of saving, lack of which we feel is often at the bottom of their transgressions."

LAND PROBLEM WORRIES PHILIPPINE LAW MAKERS

Legislature Manifests Concern Over Acquisition of Holdings by Japanese

MANILA, (AP)—Members of the Philippine legislature are becoming worried over the land problem particularly as it refers to the acquisition of desirable agricultural lands by the Japanese. The Japanese, official investigations recently disclosed, control the richest part of Davao province, the greatest hemp province in the islands, and a few days ago a great stir was caused by the Japanese purchase of a large sugar estate not many miles from Manila. As a result two bills have been introduced in the house of representatives which would give to the residents of a municipality in the jurisdiction of which an agricultural estate has preference in the right to purchase and compelling the owner to sell to such residents in the event that their offer is equal to that of the outsider.

OHIO STEEL MEN VOTE CONTINUANCE OF STRIKE

Unanimous Ballot Declares for Remaining Away from the Former Employment

CLEVELAND, O., (AP)—Fifteen hundred steel men voted unanimously last night to continue on strike and to remain away from their former employment until the strike is won, or officially declared off by the national officers.

The decision was reached after they had heard the report of two of their number who had been sent to Pittsburgh to confer with W. Foster, national secretary of the steel strikers. Mr. Foster said that it was his opinion that the men were making a winning fight and that the complaint of shortage of steel was evidence of it.

The strikers also voted from office John Kwiatkowski, vice president and Joseph Mrozek, corresponding secretary, who had recommended to the men that it end off the strike.

When the strike was called, 29,000 men quit work here. Many of these have found other employment and some are said to have returned to work in the steel mills.

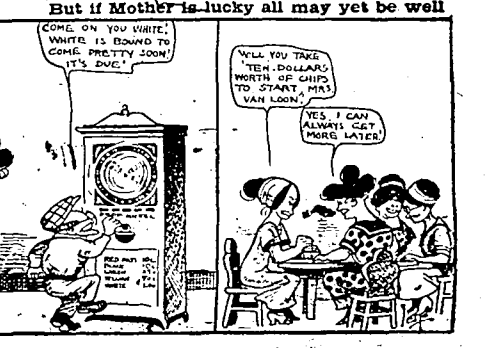
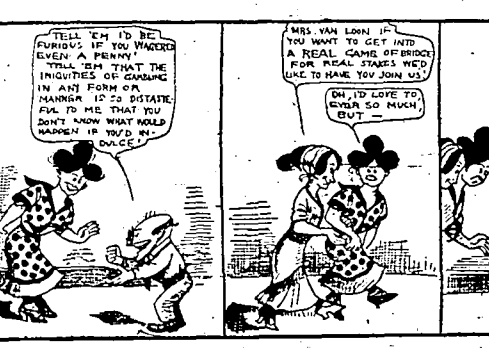
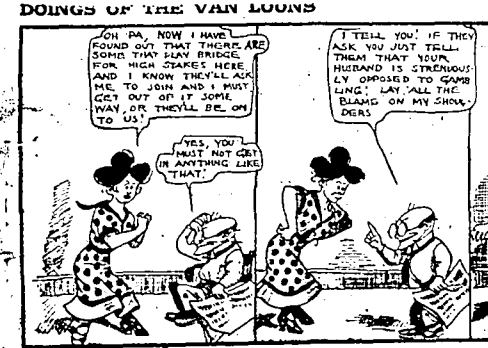
