

A firmer, shopkeeper, or trademan must figure up his set income for 1919; and if the farm or business income plus his other income was sufficient to require an income tax return a cem-plete return must be filed with the col-

lecter of internal revenue by March 15.

A farmer should ascertain the gross income of his farm by computing all gains derived from the sale or ex-change of his products, whether pro-duced on the farm or purchased and

Farm Expenses,

From his gross income a farmer is allowed to charge off all of his neces-sary expenses in the conduct of the farm duting the year. These include costs of planting cultivating, harvest sts of planting, cultivating, harvest-g and, marketing. In addition te sie costs he may deduct money spent r ordinary farm tools of hort life ught during the year, such as shor-a, rakes, etc. Also, the cost of feed urchased for his live stock may be eated as an expense is so far as thall serted as an expense is so far as thall set represents actual optiay, but the line of his own products fed to asi-als is not a deductible frem.

As to hired help, all the productive labor is a deductible expense; but the wages of household servants, or help hired to improve the farm, as in tree planting, ditching, etc., cannot be claimed against earnings. A farmer is not allowed to claim a salary for himself or members of his family who work on the farm.

Wear and Tear.

Purchase of farm machinery, wagons, work animals, etc., also the cost of construction or extension of buildings, allos, fencing, etc., should be considered additional investments in the farm and are not proper deductions against income.

A reasonable allowance may be claimed for wear and tear on farm buildings (except the farmandus farmandus far except). As to hired help, all the productive
