

BRITISH RESORT TO SHARP DEALS IN TRADE BATTLE

Struggle Against the American Competition for Markets of South America Evolves Use of Telegrams of Criticism

Buenos Aires, (P)—Some British interests here have undertaken a publicity campaign which has been referred to as the "great struggle" between the United States and Great Britain for the markets of South America. "Special telegrams" from London purporting to show that the United States is losing her South American markets, or otherwise disparaging the United States, have been gradually distributed by a British advertising agency and have been widely published in Argentine news papers.

One of the telegrams was a criticism of Herbert Hoover for saying that the European countries had "worked more and ask less of the United States." The "telegram" made a comparison between the losses sustained by the European allies in the war, particularly the British dominions, as compared with those of the United States and pointed out that the losses of the European countries had reduced their productive capacity, whereas the United States had not suffered at all economically.

Another of these "special telegrams" quoted the president of the British Chamber of Commerce as saying: "I believe that the United States is gradually losing the markets gained when Germany was wiped off the map and while Britain was fighting in the war. Britain is not only regaining, but is enlarging her markets in South America and the Orient. We are replacing Germany in Latin America and supplying the United States with markets."

The truth of this statement as far as it concerned Argentina was immediately challenged by the River-Plate American, a weekly commercial magazine, which published an editorial view from Dr. Julius Klein, United States commercial attaché. "Frankly," said Dr. Klein, "I'd like to know in what lines that British are enlarging their South American trade at our expense. The latest available figures showed anything but a loss, so far as our business here is concerned. Perhaps the president of the board of trade is referring to prospects for 1920."

"Speaking in the light of the latest statistics that were in hand, statistics which showed that we were selling to Argentina approximately one-third of all the goods she buys abroad—and our personal absorption since then, there has been no indication of losses to American trade. I have no doubt that we are going to meet with good strong competition from the British, but the indication of the American export seems to be to say, 'come on; we're ready for it.'"

LIGHT VOTE EXPECTED IN MINNESOTA PRIMARY

Impassable Roads and Little Interest in Campaign in Outlying Sections Factors in Situation

ST. PAUL, Minn., (P)—Minnesota's special primary at which republican voters will express their choice for president, will be held tonight between 7:30 and 9:00 o'clock, except in some counties where county chairmen have designated the time from 7 p. m. to 9 p. m. Five candidates are on the ballots—Leonard Wood, Hiram W. Johnson, Frank O. Lowden, Miles Poindexter and Warren G. Harding. In Hennepin county (Minneapolis) Herbert Hoover's name also appears. Predictions of almost impassable country roads and little interest in the campaign in outlying sections were seen by politicians here as indicating a light rural vote.

BRASIL IS PREPARING FOR RECEPTION OF IMMIGRANTS

RIO DE JANEIRO, (P)—President Pessoa has signed a decree opening a credit of \$500,000 for expenses in connection with the transport, reception and settlement of immigrants who are expected to come from Europe during the present year. One local newspaper estimates that 4,000 German settlers will have arrived in Brazil by August.

FARMER-LABOR COMBINE BEARS FRUIT AT ASHTON

Activities of the Non-partisan League Organizer Yield Unexpected Results

BOISE, (Special)—Ray McCall, head of the Non-partisan League of this state, is still holding meetings in an effort to form a combination for political purposes between farmers and union labor. His effort is bearing fruit in some sections. Word comes from Ashton that it has taken the form of an effort to unionize farm laborers. The members of this union will refuse to work more than eight hours a day, commencing at 8 and quitting at 5, with an hour off for dinner. If any work is done on the farm outside of these hours it will have to be done by the owner, as even his sons will not be permitted to work on the farm unless they are members of the union. If the sons disagree, should have a load of grain to an elevator the men would not handle it at either end unless the sons belonged to their organization.

Wages comparable to those paid union men in cities will be demanded. Farmers all over the state are encouraged over this movement as they feel that conditions on the farm are very much different than in cities and that they could not afford to be held down to the same requirements as to labor.

BRADFORD HOLDS GRUDGE AGAINST CENTRAL EUROPE

British City Council Objects Proposal for Hospitality to Children of Late Enemies

BRADFORD, Eng., (P)—A proposal for a year's hospitality to a thousand children from central Europe was rejected by the Bradford city council after heated discussion. One councillor said the proposal was abominable. "Here in Bradford," he exclaimed, "are mothers and fatherless children whose husbands and fathers have been murdered by the fathers of the children it is proposed to bring here."

Another member said there were many wealthy Germans and Austrians living in Bradford today, who ought to provide for these children. A third member, with emphasis that they could not forget the Lusitania and the bombardment of English open towns. Alderman Conway, who spoke in support of the proposal, said: "It appears to me that the spirit of Christianity has departed from this meeting. A Britisher is always regarded as ready to agree and shake hands after a fight."

EXPERTS ADVISE TURNING LAND BACK INTO CLOVER

Decline in Legume's Culture Threatens to Seriously Affect Nation's Cereal Crops

WASHINGTON, (P)—Decline in the clover culture by American farmers seems to have gone so far as to threaten to be serious and for the good of the nation's cereal and wheat crops. It is time to get the land back into clover, the department of agriculture advises. Productiveness of land under corn and wheat decreases most rapidly. Rotation of crops is earnestly advocated by experts who say the most important is corn, wheat, clover, with oats in the place of wheat where corn occupies the land too long to permit seeding wheat in time.

Experiments show that in continuous culture for 20 years, the yield of wheat fell from 9.24 bushels as an average for the first ten years to 5.79 bushels for the second ten years, while in a 3 year corn-wheat-clover rotation the yield of wheat rose from 9.92 bushels in the first ten years to 12.78 bushels in the second decade.

HUGE BILL OF DAMAGES ASSESSED AGAINST WORM

Ravages of Teredo Results in Destruction of Two Big California Wharves

MARTINEZ, Cal., (P)—Ravages of the teredo, a worm which bores into and consumes submerged wood, has resulted in the destruction of two wharves here and thousands of dollars of damage to others, according to J. G. Metcalf, superintendent of the Union Oil company here, and James Butler, agent of the Southern Pacific company at Port Costa. Recently a 1000 foot wharf of the Union Oil company and a 230 foot wharf of the Southern Pacific company collapsed, and the remains of these structures had to be towed on the mud flats in order that they would not be a menace to navigation, the officials said. Investigations are being conducted as to the fitness of concrete and crescent piles to take the place of the present type of piles in all future wharves in this district, they said.

Big wharves of other industries are threatened, according to these officials, and the activity of the teredo extends for miles on either side of this place. According to Metcalf it will cost \$150,000 to repair the damage done the Union Oil company.

TEXAS TOWN IS WIPED OUT IN COSTLY BLAZE

One Thousand Persons Made Homeless as High Winds Sweep Flames Through Farming Village

GRAND VIEW, Texas, (P)—1,000 inhabitants virtually in ruins from a fire which burned here yesterday afternoon until early this morning, destroying seven of the town's eight business blocks, 200 residences and causing property damage estimated at between \$1,500,000 and \$2,000,000. About 1,000 persons were made homeless. As far as known there was no loss of life.

The fire, fanned by a high wind, originated in the southern part of town and cut a wide V-shaped swath. When it was seen the flames were beyond control fire fighting apparatus from nearby towns was brought in but late in the day the water supply failed and further efforts were useless.

NEW YORK ORCHESTRA IS INVITED TO TOUR EUROPE

LONDON, (P)—The New York Symphony orchestra will arrive here in April to make a tour of the principal cities of England, France, Italy, Belgium and Holland, it is announced. Concerts also will be given in Monte Carlo. George Engles of New York, manager of the orchestra, says this will be the first time that an American symphony orchestra has played in Europe and that the New York orchestra is coming over by official invitation of the governments.

NON-PARTISAN LEAGUE NORTH DAKOTA'S ISSUE

State Enters Presidential Preference Primary with Only One Candidate

BISMARCK, N. D., (P)—North Dakota faces the unique situation of a presidential preference primary March 16 with but one candidate, Senator Hiram W. Johnson, entered. Intraparty delegation contests, pivoting about the Non-partisan League, constitute the chief interest where engagements on the voter battlefield.

Major General Leonard Wood and Governor Frank O. Lowden, of Illinois, refrained from filing nominations after a second republican state convention had voted that delegates to the national convention should go un-instructed. William Jennings Bryan withdrew his name as democratic candidate leaving the California senator a challenger without opposition.

The primary is to elect for each party a national committee, five presidential electors and ten national convention delegates. Political observers declare the ranks of both republicans and democrats within the state have been divided on the issue of the Non-partisan League. There is considerable speculation as to whether republican delegates will be bound to vote for Senator Johnson at the Chicago convention. Under the state law the delegate takes an oath that he will faithfully carry out the wishes of his party, as expressed by the primary.

For the first time in this state, women will vote for presidential electors, but cannot vote for delegates to the national convention, although the state may be represented in those conventions by women delegates, two of whom have been nominated by the republican party.

SOUTH AMERICAN TRADE LURES COAST CANNERS

Action of Columbia in Reducing High Tackle Encourages American Food Preservers

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., (P)—News that Columbia has lowered its high tariff on American canned foods in an effort to meet the demand in the republic that the government take steps to reduce the cost of living has encouraged producers on the Pacific coast to believe that similar action might be brought about in other South American countries, where prohibitive tariffs have kept the American products out of the market.

FIGHT AGAINST TURNING WATER OUT OF STATE

Residents of Montana Endeavor to Prevent Diversion from Yellowstone Lake Through Continental Divide to Pacific

LIVINGSTON, Mont., (AP)—In order to retain, for purposes of irrigating between 1,000,000 and 2,000,000 acres of land in southeastern Montana, water from Yellowstone lake which now finds its way eventually to the Atlantic coast by way of the Mississippi river and the Gulf of Mexico, Montana residents are engaged in an effort to prevent its diversion through the continental divide to the Pacific.

Attempts to divert the waters of Yellowstone lake to the Snake river, taking them through the divide which determines the flow on the great watershed in the Yellowstone national park, was planned by Idaho interests after engineers had conceived a daring project to tunnel the divide and carry the Yellowstone water from its 3,000-foot elevation into Shoshone lake for irrigation purposes, and then permit it to flow the natural course through the Snake river and the Columbia to the Pacific.

MORE GOOD THINGS.

On a chilly night a dish of hot soup is one of the most appetizing of all foods with which to start the evening meal.

It is a substantial and filling meal the soup may be light and stimulating with but little nourishment, but if the food which is provided be light a cream soup, bisque or chowder should be the first dish.

Soup a la Clermont.—Take the upper part of a small French loaf, cut in small pieces, remove the crumbs and put into a bowl with two cupsful of well seasoned stock. Place in a moderate oven for half an hour. Slice four large onions, fry brown in butter, drain, and boil for twenty minutes in beef stock to cover. Add the onions and the bread to two quarts of hot beef stock; pour into a soup tureen on a separate plate.

Mushroom Soup.—Cut into dice one and one-half cupsful of fresh mushrooms. Stew until tender in a cupful of beef stock. To this add one quart of stock. Thicken with a tablespoonful of some rubbed smooth with a tablespoonful of butter. Season with salt and pepper and minced parsley.

Combination Soup.—Put into a soup kettle a hambone, a beefbone and a pod of red pepper and two cupsful of split peas. Cover with cold water and simmer until the peas are soft. Take out the bones and pepper; season to taste and serve.

Bean Soup.—Put into a soup kettle two cupsful of baked beans, two cupsful of canned tomatoes, an onion finely chopped, and six cupsful of cold water. Simmer until the beans are soft, rub through a sieve, reheat, season and serve.

Turkey Soup.—Cover the bones and trimmings of cold roast turkey with cold water. Add a stalk of celery, chopped fine, a pinch of powdered sweet herbs, simmer for several hours, strain, season to taste and thicken with a tablespoonful each of flour and butter blended with a little of the soup.

INVOKES STATE LAW TO ESTABLISH PARENTAGE

FARGO, N. D., (AP)—The first case under North Dakota's law enacted to establish the legitimacy of children born out of wedlock has been completed in Cass county courts and a child so born has received its father's name and been declared his legitimate heir. The law was passed by the legislature in March, 1917.

Under provisions of this act, which is said to be the first of its kind in the country, a child born out of wedlock is declared to be the child of natural parents, as such he is supported, sheltered and educated with other children born in wedlock and is entitled to share in the estate jointly with all other legal heirs.

Suits to establish the natural parentage of the child, the law provides, must be instituted a year after birth, the facts in the case to be proved as in any other legal action. This is construed as placing the burden of proof on the plaintiff.
