OPPOSING GOVERNMENTS CONTEND FOR POWER IN GERMANY

NEW HOTELS DIVIDED UPON FOR THIS CITY

Local Men Secure Lots on East Main Street and Announce Plans for Erection of Modern Hostelry

BUILDING WILL BE FIVE STORIES HIGH

Excavation to Be Commenced with Advent of Spring and Structure Completed by Summer of Next Year

Definite announcement of plans for the erection of a six-story, fireproof hotel on East Main street, work upon the excavation for which will be commenced with the coming of spring, was made this morning by William G. Reed.

The men now associated in the project are Mr. Reed, Pete Bethune, Henry McCormick, T. J. Woods and J. E. White. Title to the four lots at the corner east of the Weaver room on Main street was secured at an outlay of \$45,000.

May Enlarge Later

The building when completed will contain 140 rooms and will be constructed in a manner to permit of an enlargement later. It will be of fireproof construction and will embody the latest and most up-to-date ideas in hotel construction in the matter of office, cafe, restaurant floor and all the necessary features of a modern hotel.

Reed Excavating Soon

Mr. Reed states that the excavation will be commenced in the near future and the foundations probably completed this year, work to commence on the building probably next spring. No effort will be made to rush the project at this time although the plans to date call for the immediate commencement of the project and its completion probably during the summer of next year.

Holland Strengthens Harbor Guard About Former Crown Prince

Close Scrutiny is Made of Traffic Coming Across German Frontier

THE HAGUE, (AP)—A Dutch torpedo boat has arrived in the harbor of Oesterland, Wieringen island, to guard the former German crown prince, according to the Nieuwrotterdamsche Courant. The Dutch government has slightly strengthened the guard at the German frontier, particularly close scrutiny is being made of automobiles. Passengers arriving on the frontier at Oldenzaal and Zevenaar report traffic within Germany considerably interrupted. Dutch laborers who were employed in Germany near the frontier have been sent home on account of the general strike.

EBERT TO BULG GERMANY FROM WUERTEMBERG CAPITAL

COPENHAGEN, (AP)—President Ebert in officially notifying Dr. Wolfgang Kapp and his associates in the new German government that no negotiations would be held between officials of the two regimes, declared he would direct the country's affairs with Wuerttemberg as the capital, according to a dispatch received from Berlin.

Reports of negotiations for a compromise between the Ebert government and the reactionary regime at Berlin were reported according to the phone dispatch from Hamburg to the Social Demokrat at midnight. It was said those rumors were spread by adherents of Dr. Wolfgang Kapp, the new chancellor in Berlin, to deceive the public.

COMMITTEE CUTS NAVAL PROGRAM

No New Warship Construction Authorized in Reported Appropriations Bill

WASHINGTON, (AP)—No new warship construction is authorized in the fiscal 1921 appropriations bill as ordered favorably reported today by the house naval committee.

The measure carries a total of \$424,450,000, or \$200,000,000 less than the last appropriation bill.

The only funds for construction approved by the committee was \$104,000,000 for continuing work on the unfinished 1910 program.

Although the permanent authorized strength of the navy is 145,000 men, the committee provided pay on a basis of an average force of 150,000 for next year.

For repairs on the vessels the committee provided approximately \$60,000,000; for provisions \$27,000,000; for fuel \$10,000,000.

American Army on Rhine Re-Equipped
