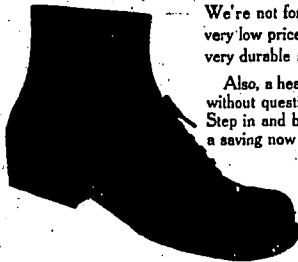

ENTERS PULPIT OVER PROTESTS

American Presbyterian Minister Delivers Sermon in Durham Cathedral

LONDON, (AP)—Despite strenuous opposition by several prominent Episcopal church leaders, the Rev. John Henry Jowett, D. D., who formerly was a minister of the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian church, New York, has delivered a sermon in Durham cathedral to a crowded congregation of 7,000 people.

Dr. Jowett preached by invitation of Bishop Weldon, the Anglican dean of Durham, who believes that intercommunion between the reformed churches will promote a greater diffusion of Christian influence in the world as the war has left it.

Lord Phillimore, president of the English Church union, has raised a protest against this invasion, as being contrary to the national church assembly act, and an Anglican vicar protested in the cathedral itself when Dr. Jowett ascended the pulpit. The interrupter was forcibly ejected. Bishop Weldon said afterward: "I have long felt that the Church of England must come into some sort of formal association with the non-conformist churches. I think all the churches are losing ground because they do not speak with one voice. In fact, they have expended a good deal of energy in opposing one another and the world at large does not listen to them for that reason."

DIAMOND CLAIM RACE GOAL

Two Thousand Men Participate in Rush for South African Deposits

JOHANNESBURG, (AP)—A rush of diamond seekers to stake claims is reported from the southern portion of the Free State district, where rich deposits are said to have been located.

Two thousand men, including lawyers, civil servants, business men, land owners, artisans and clerks took part and the whole ground was pegged out in a few minutes.

Some of the more corpulent employes of professional runners to seek the claims previously selected, says a news agency dispatch received here.

FORMER PRIVATE SOLDIER QUITS POST OF GOVERNOR

Frank W. Carpenter Retires from Office in Philippines After Long Government Service

MANILA, P. I. (AP)—Frank W. Carpenter, who has just retired as governor of the department of Mindanao and Sulu, has been in the service of the United States in the Philippines nearly 25 years.
Mr. Carpenter's retirement was due to the passage of a bill by the Philippine legislature abolishing the present political organization in Mindanao and Sulu, chiefly inhabited by Mohammedans under the religious sovereignty of the Sultan of Sulu. Under the terms of the bill, Mindanao and Sulu become regular provinces of the islands with constituted provincial boards headed by elective governors.
Thirty years ago Mr. Carpenter was private in the Eighth United States Infantry, but later became a civil service employ in the war department. In 1898 he came to the Philippines.
After serving successfully as secretary to the United States military governor of the Philippines, chief clerk in the executive bureau of the Philippine government, assistant executive secretary and until 1913, he was appointed governor of the departments of Mindanao and Sulu.

MONTANA FEARS SPRING FLOODS

Sudden Warm Weather Would Release Huge Volume of Snow in Hills

HELENA, Mont., (AP)—Because of deep snow in the hills, floods are feared by stockmen and other Montana people, if warm weather comes suddenly this spring. The latter end of this month probably will decide the question. Reports agree that an unprecedented depth of snow lies in the mountains in numerous parts of the state.
Sixty and 80-foot drifts are said to lie in the mountain passes of the upper reaches of the great divide of the Rocky mountains, and in eastern Montana, ten feet on the level is reported in various places.
If the snow goes off gradually there will be little trouble, it is believed, but if there are prolonged warm spells in the earlier weeks of spring, freshets may be expected.
Weather men unite in predicting a good crop year because of the moisture in the ground.

RECOGNITION IS DENIED BY TWO "KING" OF SYRIA

British and French Governments Withhold Approval of Damascus Congress Decision

LONDON, (AP)—The British and French governments have notified Prince Feisal, son of the king of the Hedjaz, that they cannot recognize the validity of the decision of the Damascus congress which proclaimed him king of Syria.

OPERA SCORES SUCCESS AFTER TWO CENTURIES

Revival of Purcell's "Pinky Queen" at New Theatre in Cambridge Pleases Playgoers

CAMBRIDGE, Eng., (AP)—Purcell's opera "The Fairy Queen" has been revived at the New theater here with great success, after a lapse of more than two centuries.
The first and only performance of this old English master's work was given in 1693. The score was afterwards lost, and in 1701 an advertisement appeared in the London Gazette, offering a reward for its discovery, but without result. Exactly 200 years later it was found in a dusty cupboard at the Royal Academy of Music among a bundle of manuscripts bequeathed to that institution.

GARMENTMAKERS GET RAISE

British Manufacturers Association Enters into Agreement with Employees

LONDON, (AP)—An agreement has been signed by the Wholesale Clothing Manufacturers federation of Great Britain and the trade union representatives by which minimum wages are increased by 125 per cent for men and 300 per cent for women operatives.
This agreement is the first of its kind in the clothing industry.

THREE HUNDRED MILES OF PHONE WIRE FOR FOREST

MISSOULA, Mont., (AP)—Three hundred miles of telephone wire will be installed in the forests of district No. 1 next summer, according to R. B. Adams, district telephone engineer of the local headquarters. Mr. Adams has just returned from Ogden, Utah, where he supervised telephone matters in the fourth service district.

DEMAND FOR FURNITURE OF HUGE PROPORTIONS

Manufacturers in Convention Declare Impossibility of Producing Adequate Supply

GREENSBORO, N. C., (AP)—Demand for furniture throughout the country is of immense proportions and it is impossible to make the supply keep up with the demand, according to manufacturers who attended the meetings of the national council of furniture associations held here. There is every reason to believe, these manufacturers say, that the demand will be increasingly great in the future. At the same time it was agreed that the lumber shortage was the most serious difficulty confronting furniture makers and no material relief is in sight at present.

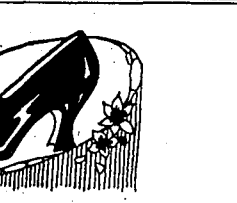

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BOTH SIDES THE SAME

If any one thing stands out more
clearly than another in connection with
a continuing hectic situation in Ger-
many it is that among those who rise
positions of authority in that land
there is little to choose.

It seems to make no difference at all
though the German government be over-
turned. Both sides are the same.

Very early last Saturday morning
President Ebert and members of his
government took hasty departure from
Berlin, but before they left they called
upon the radical element to institute a
general strike as a measure of protest
against their enforced departure. Yes-
terday Ebert and his crew returned to
Berlin, and one of the first statements
subsequently issued from Berlin was a
statement that his political opponents were
singing the disorders which his proclama-
tion had started to further their own
designs.

It is still a very serious question
whether Ebert, even with the assist-
ance of Noske, who has heretofore
brought near-miracles in the way of
discipline, is going to be able to stem
the tide which he himself set in motion.
Sooner or later he must come to a rea-
lization that it matters little from what
quarter the wind comes that "fias the
flames of discontent."

THE STATUS OF UNION LABOR
(Nampa Leader Herald)

Because there has been some objec-
tion to recent happenings in Nampa
with reference to labor, the agitators
have hastened to say that the business
streets are against union labor.
Nothing could be farther from the
truth. There is no town in Idaho where
the relations between employers and
employees have averaged better than
here. The employers have as a class
been wholly friendly to labor. They
have recognized the right of men to or-
ganize into unions. Nobody has dis-
criminated against a man because he
belonged to a union. On the contrary,
many employers have voluntarily orga-
nized their institutions. It is supposed
to have advantages for the employer.
It is presumed then when an employer
pays higher wages, that he is to get in-
creased efficiency. The unions of the
skilled labor require a given standard
of proficiency. Theoretically this is
why a union man in any line of skilled
labor is able to command higher wages
than men in the same line who do not
belong to a union. It is up to the em-
ployer to maintain this standard, if they
are to retain the good will of employ-
ees. For an unskilled man to get into
a union and to believe that merely join-
ing a union entitles him to draw high
wages, is not only an injustice to the
employer, but it is an injustice to the
competent skilled workers in the union.
It destroys incentive. Why should a
man spend time and money to make
himself a skilled and competent artisan,
if the man who makes no such effort
can draw equal wages? There is no
reason why employers and workers who
are competent and have their employ-
er's interests at heart, should not find
their interests mutual and work in the
utmost harmony. But if the worker has
neither skill nor energy and expects to
draw down high wages, merely because
he belongs to a union, it is certain that

he cannot do so for long. The employ-
er would soon be unable to pay good
wages, even if he had the desire, which
he would not. A reasonable and just
view of the matter from both sides will
result in advantage to both, but particu-
larly to the laborer, since his labor is
his capital.

Restores Health to Feathered Singers

DENVER, Colo., (AP)—H. R. Smith, specialist, conducts a hospi-
tal here for sick canaries. Mrs. Smith is his assistant, acting in the capacity as nurse.

In the canary hospital are downy singers, who have lost their voices, have caught cold, contracted asthma, have "rheumatism" or scurvy or other ailment.

According to Mr. Smith there are 10,000,000 canaries in cages and aviaries in America, and more than half are not given proper attention.

Reactionary Revolt Suits Deposed Ruler

GENEVA, (AP)—Former Emperor Charles, of Austria, who is now making his home at Prangins, is reported to have been evidently pleased when he first received word of the reactionary revolt in Berlin. He refused to express any opinion, however, but is closely following developments and is re-ceiving many telegrams and letters every day.

Former Empress Zita is also in constant communication with Vienna, and has received a large number of visitors during the last few days. She is reported to be in better spirits than she has been for some time.

COUNTY CONSIDERS BONDS FOR DROUTH VICTIM RELIEF

GLASGOW, Mont., (AP)—The voters of Valley county will vote on March 23 whether they shall authorize the issuance of bonds, not to exceed \$200,000 for the purchase by the county of seed grain, food and provisions for drouth victims.

This section was in last year's dry area and it is said many farmers will be unable to continue unless given assistance. The money would be loaned on the farms or other security.

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

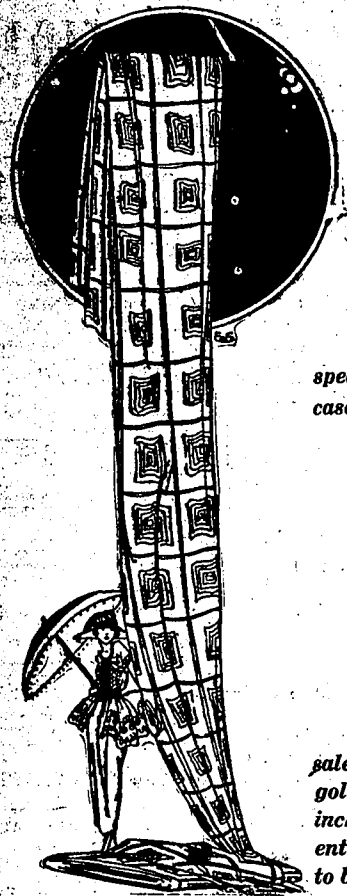
