

LOWDEN WINNING WITH WOOD FOR ILLINOIS VOTE

Republicans of State Expressing Preference for Presidential Nomination in Primary Elections

CHICAGO, (AP)—Those republicans of the state of Illinois who exercise a voter's prerogative at the presidential primary tomorrow will decide before midnight whether their governor, Frank O. Lowden, or General Leonard Wood shall be their choice for nominee of the republican party in the November election.

This will be the only contest of the primary that will be decided by a vote of the entire state. In seven of the 25 congressional districts, however, the contest for district delegates to the Chicago convention promises to be hard fought. In these seven districts, candidates for delegates who have indicated their intention of supporting Governor Lowden are opposed by delegates who are recorded as having no preference, while in one district, the first-named Lowden delegate is on the list. In the other seventeen districts, however, none but Lowden men appear on the ballot.

Contesting candidates for election as delegates are found in the second, third and fourth districts, all of which are located in the city of Chicago, and the tenth, fifteenth, sixteenth and twenty-second districts, located outside of Chicago.

There are no candidates entered for presidential endorsement honors on the Democratic side, Governor Edward J. Edwards of New Jersey having withdrawn his name after it had been properly presented.

The vote is expected to be larger than would ordinarily be the case inasmuch as the attorney general of the state has ruled that women will be permitted to vote in this primary.

The ballots upon which the women will mark their votes are separate from the regular ballots. This is being done in order to make it a simple matter to throw them out, in case adverse rulings to the voters' advantage are received after the primary.

WHEAT SURVIVES SEVERE WINTER

Reporting Service Tells of a Condition of 87 Per Cent of Normal Crop

The first condition report on the winter wheat crop since it was planted last fall indicates that it has survived the winter with a condition of 87 per cent of normal. According to the report issued by Julius H. Jacobson of the Idaho crop reporting service, this is 11 points below the condition a year ago and 9 points below the ten-year average April 1 condition. Unfavorable soil and moisture conditions at seeding time last fall caused by the prolonged drought, resulted in much late seeding, thus preventing necessary development before winter set in. The condition of the crop last December was only 84 per cent of normal or ten points below the ten-year average condition for that month. Unusually low temperature during January, very high precipitation in February and alternate freezing and thawing in March are contributing factors to the present low condition. A report on the acreage abandoned will be issued in May and therefore no estimate of production is made at this time.

In the principal producing counties of Latah, Lewis, Nez Perce and Idaho, the condition of the crop ranged from 75 to 83 per cent of normal April 1, compared with a range of 95 to 100 a year ago. Madison, Jefferson and Fremont counties have returned to winter wheat this year. Thousands of acres from Rexburg bench up the valley were mostly covered with snow the latter part of March. The condition ranges from 92 to 97 per cent of normal. The important counties of Blaine, Franklin, Owyhee and Power indicate good prospects. The upper country has had much precipitation and dry farmers are happy.

The United States crop is estimated at 483,617,000 bushels compared with 731,636,000 bushels last year. This is due to a greatly reduced acreage and the low condition of 72.6 per cent of

normal. A year ago the condition was 92.6 per cent. In the great central winter wheat states, condition figures range from 59 to 73 per cent of normal.

Bye—The rye crop has survived the winter about as well as it did in 1919, the April 1 condition being 96 per cent of normal compared with 96 per cent a year ago. In the heavy producing counties of northern, western and southeastern districts, the condition ranges from 90 to 96 per cent of normal.

Brooding Sows—The difference in the price of pork and the price of feed has made it unprofitable for the hog grower to expand his business. This is indicated by a 17 per cent reduction in the number of brooding sows the past year. Idaho counties, the heaviest producing county, shows a decrease of 23 per cent, Twin Falls 17 per cent. Can you 28 per cent and Bonnevile 20 per cent.

Farm Labor—An extensive survey made to determine the supply of farm labor indicates that the present supply is only 3 per cent less than a year ago. In several counties reporters indicate labor is being attracted to sawmills, factories and public and private construction by the shorter hours and better pay checks. While most counties report about the same supply of labor this year as last year, still when compared with the normal supply, nearly every county reports a big reduction. Farm labor requirements have declined 3 per cent from those of last year. Farmers are arranging their operations so as to handle the work themselves or exchange labor with their neighbors.

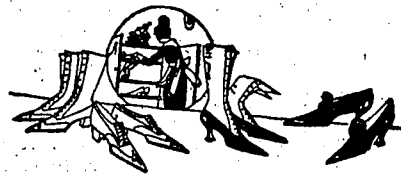

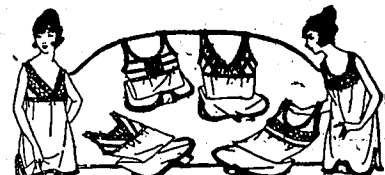

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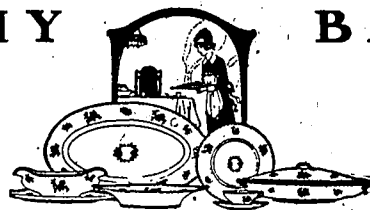

GOOD BEGINNING
Evidence of a spirit of fair play that commends itself to Americans generally seems to characterize the rulings of Acting Secretary Post of the department of labor in the case of one Thomas Truss, alleged communist...

It is held that bona fide membership in the communist party and guilty knowledge of the procepts of that organization on the part of the alleged undesirable citizen is grounds for deportation.

Appearance of the suspect's name in the membership list will not be accepted as proof of his connection with the party. It might be forged by a personal enemy.

Withdrawal from membership prior to the date of the ban against the organization will be taken, however, as indicating clean intent, and where the accused appears to be a person of good general character, fit for American citizenship except for the accusation in hand, and there is reasonable doubt of his membership, the warrant will be cancelled.

So far so good. American appreciation of justice endorses the ruling. Moreover, it welcomes the pronouncement of the basis on which deportations may be carried out.

Now let the deportations proceed.

GOODING WILL VOTE ON PARK BOND ISSUE

Question of Raising \$7,000 for Playgrounds Comes to People Tomorrow
GOODING (Special)—Tuesday, April 13, will be a special election day at Gooding to vote on the question of the issuance of \$7,000 bonds for city park and playgrounds.

"Tuesday next the bond issue to cover the portion which the city of Gooding will pay toward the new fair grounds in Gooding is to be voted on. The sum of \$7,000 is the portion to be met by the city. It is proposed that the city issue twenty-year bonds at the usual bond rate of interest not to exceed six per cent.

"Gooding county should have a fair grounds and by unanimous consent of the tax payers outside of the city of Gooding the county commissioners have agreed to contribute one-half of the necessary funds.

"A very reasonable price has been obtained for approximately 40 acres just north and west of the Gooding Milling & Elevator plant. Gooding county has purchased a portion of the pavilion to accommodate the recent demands of the agricultural interests of Gooding county.

"The landing field is in no sense of the word an investment for a select few. Aviation is fast becoming one of the big businesses of the country. Airplanes are now being considered for the establishment of an airplane factory in southern Idaho, and Gooding, by the action contemplated, places itself at the head of the list of eligible cities as the permanent home of such an enterprise.

"The purchase of stock interests of the county an entitles to such a plant property equipment for sale, auction and show purposes. With comparatively slight effort Gooding county made in the past year in exhibiting its grain, seed, fruit and vegetables at nearby county fairs and at the state fair at Boise.

"The land to be used are the most convenient and the only grounds large enough for the purposes intended that are near enough to the business district."

AMERICANS ESTABLISH CHINESE AIR SERVICE

Aviators and Mechanicians with Planes Leave to Open First Commercial Line in Orient
HONG KONG (AP)—Sixteen aviators and mechanicians, mostly Americans, have arrived here and 11 American airplanes are on their way from New York to the great Chinese colony of Manco. Later, it is stated, the company plans to extend its activities to Manila and Tokio, touching at centers on the Chinese coast.

The airplanes to be used in this service are understood to have been built originally for the United States navy and equipped with Liberty motors but have been remodeled and are said here to be capable of making continuous flights of 650 miles carrying 14 passengers. Water, a veteran of the United States naval flying corps, is to be general superintendent of the new company, which has been financed through the efforts of C. E. W. Ricau, a Macao capitalist.

TELEPHONES FACILITATE CONVENTION'S BUSINESS
Chicago Colloquium is to be Remodeled and Equipped for Convenience of Republican Delegates

CHICAGO (AP)—Delegates at the Republican national convention, opening here June 8, will be able to confer with representatives of other states without leaving their seats.

To eliminate a large part of this confusion incident to conference between delegates on the floor, C. E. Hall, superintendent of the Colloquium, has arranged for the installation of telephones connecting all state, district and territorial delegations.

It is said that this will be the first time that such a system has been installed at any national convention.

There will be 54 telephones in service reaching the 48 state groups and the representatives of the District of Columbia, Alaska, Hawaii, the Philippines and Porto Rico.

The convention architects have completed plans for the Colloquium, including an extra balcony that adds approximately 1,100 to the seating capacity. Work on the balcony and the convention offices, in the Colloquium annex, will start May 3. The Chicago convention committee is spending \$47,000 on changes to the building to accommodate the delegates and more than 10,000 spectators.
