

CIVIL SERVANTS SALARIES BURDEN UPON AUSTRIANS

One-Fifth of Population of Nation Supported by Taxpayers, Asserts Paper Disputing Finance Minister's Statement

VIENNA, (AP)—One-fifth of the population of Austria, 1,200,000 members of the families of central, provincial and municipal government employes, are supported by the taxpayers, according to the paper New Eight O'Clock, in an article questioning a statement by the finance minister, Dr. Helich.

In the negotiations recently concluded between the cabinet council and employes of the central government for a general increase in salaries and allowances the top heaviness of the Austrian governmental machine was revealed. Foreign observers and investigators having to do with the peace settlement have repeatedly commented on the extravagant number of civil servants employed in all departments.

Challenges Figures.

Dr. Helich admitted in the discussion that the civil list numbered 220,000 persons. The New Eight O'Clock, however, challenged that figure as too low and declared that if the various legislative commissions and other positions created under after war conditions were taken into consideration it would be shown that there are not far from 300,000 government employes. Austria has only 6,000,000 population and it is estimated that each government salary supports a family of four. The newspapers generally are uniting in a demand that the civil list be reduced by the immediate dismissal of 10 per centum.

The adjustment reached about March 15 adds a round 2,000,000,000 crowns to the already appalling deficit that confronts the government. It is to be met by another increase in the price of tobacco products and in public utility rates, such as railway freight and passenger tariffs and possibly postage and telegraphs.

Wins Single Concession.

About the only concession the government won was an increase in hours of work from six to seven days with the understanding that a possible extension to an eight-hour day would be the subject of further negotiation.

Employes of various states or provinces, apart from those of the central government, are also demanding a heavy increase in salaries and allowances. At first they made an effort to join forces with the latter but this became complicated and was defeated by the demand of the municipal employes of Vienna for 100 per centum, the combination favored by the new government scale. Government servants in Austria enjoy a special low railway rate but among the demands they made, which was refused, was free transportation.

Figures just compiled show that in 1918 an average family of four persons, living in the most modest manner and eliminating all luxuries, spent 2576 crowns a year, while now the same necessaries, if available, would cost 231,898 crowns.

Step in "Vicious Circle."

The more thoughtful and serious newspapers point out that the increased wage scale in civil employes is the "vicious circle" and that the uncontrolled merchandiser will put up prices correspondingly. On every hand the question is asked: "Who will buy and come! And what then?"

Meanwhile the government says it cannot decrease the civil list and dismiss so large a number of men, when there is no employment open to them, and emigration is practically prohibited. It would, they say, bring about "a crisis."

CHINESE CO-OPERATION IMPORTANT TO JAPANESE

Abolition of Military Agreement Center for Divergent Opinions Among Orientals

TOKIO, (AP)—A dispatch from Mukden to the Nichi Nichi says there exist divergent opinions as to the abolition of the China-Japan military agreement, while the Chinese government seems to attach little importance to it.

General Chang Tso-lin Tachew expressed to Lieutenant General Nara the desire that military co-operation with Japan be continued, the newspaper states, to meet the menace to the Chinese boundary by the Bolsheviks. On the other hand, the Japanese importance is attached to co-operation with China at least so long as Japanese troops are in Siberia. It is official will be sent shortly to Peking to consult with the government there regarding this agreement.

JAPAN BROOKS NO DELAY IN PLANS FOR CHINESE

Negotiators Give Notice of Purpose to Proceed Single-Handed in Railway Construction

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—Japanese negotiators who have been arranging for participation in the consortium to develop Chinese resources have notice, it was learned today, that unless plans can be perfected for the immediate construction of railroads in Manchuria by the consortium, Japan will proceed to undertake the task single-handed.

The lines would run southward through middle Manchuria to the Gulf of Petcheli and would link up roads now in operation. While the total mileage would not exceed 900, it was said that the lines would open a country rich in agriculture possibilities.

Have them repaired and renovated until every last ounce of wear has been gotten out of them, but don't assist in a movement which can cause increased prices for a commodity which is in daily use by thousands of people to whom the increased cost would come as a real hardship.

The overall movement was never more than a fad anywhere. It has passed the high point of its popularity already and will probably decline as rapidly as it developed. Its result has been economic waste, the spending of unnecessary dollars for something which was not a real need and the compulsory expenditure of more dollars on the part of those to whom overalls are a necessity.

BIG DEMAND FOR ELECTRIC METER INSTALLATION INDEX TO GROWTH

Manager Charles Neeley Points to Service Connections as Proof Positive of the Steadily Increasing Importance of Twin Falls as a Community—Business Continues to Improve

Respeaking a large and continued growth of Twin Falls as a community, records of the local office of the Idaho Power company show that during the year ending March, 1920, installations of meters amounted to 300 more than for the year ending March 1, 1919. "The statement is made officially by Charles Neeley, district manager of the Idaho Power company, who adds that there has been no decline in demand for meter service in the past month. "That Twin Falls is growing and will continue to grow is my confident belief. This belief is based upon the demand for power and illumination service," Mr. Neeley told a Newsman today. Asked for a statement with reference to installations of meters for the supply of electrical service during the week from April 22 to 27, Manager Neeley stated that there had been 11 disconnections during that period against 20 connections of service, making an increase of nine meters installed during the week. Amplifying Mr. Neeley declared that six of the disconnections were connected before the end of the week following discontinuance of service. Of those meters not re-connected two were taken from small shacks, the use of which had been dropped as dwelling, and another disconnection was in coal company office where electrical service is always abandoned in the spring of the year.

Rochdale Plan Institution Will Start Business May 17—Corbett Sells Out Yesterday a deal was consummated by the terms of which the Farmers' Rochdale Co-operative store will occupy the Corbett Furniture company's building. The latter company will retire from mercantile pursuits here, at least for the present. A closing out sale of furniture and furnishing stocks will be inaugurated immediately. By the terms of contract between the new and old companies the co-operative store will start operations as a mercantile institution on May 17.

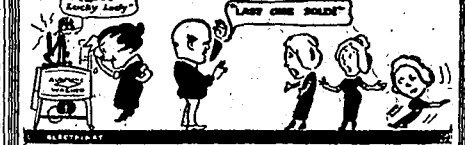
