

ANFU OPPONENTS CLAIM TO FIGHT TO UNITE CHINA

Restoration of Union Between Northern and Southern Governments given as Objectives of TsaoCkum and Wu-Pei-Fu

PEKING, (AP)—Restoration of the union between northern and southern China and the establishment of an administration on democratic principles, giving public opinion the fullest consideration were given as the objectives of General Tsao-Kum and General Wu-Pei-Fu in their operations against the Anfu forces, according to a statement made to The Associated Press Friday by General Tsao-Kum, who is military governor of Chi-Li province.

In concurrence with General Chang-Tao-Lin, governor of Fung-Tien, and General Wu-Pei-Fu, General Tsao-Kum said he favored summing a new parliament as soon as possible after reunion of the nation. He reiterated that the Chi-Li lists regarded the frontier defense force a national menace.

It was officially reported here today that 18,000 Anfu troops of General Heuh-Shu-Chung have disbanded. Passengers service on the Tien-Tsin railway has been resumed.

Great Britain's Youngest Premier



Ernest Granville Theodore, who has the distinction of being the youngest of the 20 odd premiers accredited to the British crown, is the premier of Queensland, and has just passed his thirty-fifth year. He is at present in London endeavoring to raise a loan of \$15,000,000 for the purpose of establishing steel mills in his dominion.

CHINA TO SHOW WEALTH IN INDUSTRIAL EXHIBIT

National Products to be Gathered Throughout Provinces for Display at Peking

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—An international industrial exposition will be held next year in Peking to present the annual wealth of China, according to the Far Eastern Republic, a journal here of the Chinese National Welfare Society of America. Native products will be gathered not only from China's 21 provinces, but also from Mongolia, Tibet and Turkestan.

While the silk, tea and porcelain industries will be exhibited as industries in which China leads the world, fine arts, decorative antiques, such as bronze, lacas and antimony wares, embroidery, rugs and lacquer wares and teakwood furniture will also be seen. The Temple of Heaven, a national shrine for 700 years, will be rebuilt to house the exhibition.

President Hse Shih Chang has ordered \$3,000,000 to be spent on the exhibition work.

This is the first international exposition China will undertake to carry out, and all friendly nations will be invited to participate.

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SEEKS TO CIRCUMVENT FILIPINO STOWAWAYS

Pacific Mail Company Adopts Plan of Stopping Boats on Course to Institute Search

MANILA, P. I., (AP)—Owing to the increasing numbers of Filipino stowaways on vessels leaving here for the United States, the Pacific Mail company has adopted the plan of stopping its departing ships several miles out in Manila bay while a thorough search is made for stowaways. If any are found they are put off in a launch.

The number of Filipino stowaways has grown so large that it has become a serious problem, steamship agents say. More Filipinos are going to the United States now, steamship agents assert, than at any time since American occupation. Most of them are students, who desire to work their way through school in America, while a few are impelled by a spirit of adventure to make the trip.

Reports reaching here say that many of the Filipinos in the Pacific coast cities are poorly fed and housed and are suffering hardships in a number of cases.

MARCUS DALY SCHOLARSHIP FOR MONTANA MINERS SONS

MISSOULA, Mont., (AP)—James Watson Gerard, former United States ambassador to Germany and son-in-law of the late Marcus Daly, recently announced from the Daly estate, at Hamilton, Mont., that the Marcus Daly scholarship, founded by Mrs. Gerard, will be awarded this year to John Norton of Butte.

The scholarship is open in competition to those who have worked in Montana mines or the descendants of Montana miners. The winner of this year's award will begin a course in the Columbia School of Mines, New York, in the fall of 1921.

ARCHBISHOP SAILS FOR ENGLAND DEFYING UKASE

A Remarkable Demonstration Precedes Departure of Churchman

NEW YORK, (AP)—Archbishop Daniel J. Mannix, of Australia, sailed today for Ireland Saturday on the steamship Baltic, although the premier of Great Britain had announced that Australian prelate would not be permitted to land on Irish soil because of his expressed view on the Irish question. Eamonn D'Valera, president of the Irish republic, "did not sail on the Baltic."

A remarkable demonstration preceded the departure of Archbishop Mannix who stood on the after-deck of the big Baltic holding two red roses in his hand while he invoked repeatedly a silent benediction upon hundreds of cheering well wishers who crowded the pier from end to end and waved Irish flags. Lying alongside the other side of the pier was the steamship Olympic whose after-deck was crowded with a ship's company, who staged a counter demonstration by waving English flags and cheering for Great Britain with an occasional note directed against Ireland. The Englishmen, however, were separated by several feet of water and this probably was the only thing that prevented a clash.

Mr. De Valera remained with the Australian dignitary until the last moment and then passed from the steamer just as the gangplank was lifted. As the Baltic moved out into the stream, the hundreds gave De Valera a demonstration. He was lifted to the shoulders of a couple of hunky catholics and cheered for several minutes on the pier.

GIANT PYTHON RULES BOAT

Serpent Takes Possession of Pilot House Deserted when it Appears

VICTORIA, B. C., (AP)—For a brief time following her departure from Singapore the bridge of the British steamship Bolton Castle was under the control of a gigantic python. In the early morning of the second day out from the Straights Settlements port the quartermaster, at the wheel, was startled by the massive snake's head appearing at the pilot house door.

The python had eaten and undisputed possession of the pilot house and the ship took a few turns without a guiding hand before the snake made its next move. The last of the officers saw of the monster as it disappeared from the overboard. It was one of three shipped at Singapore to a menagerie at New York.

JAPANESE SAVE RUSSIANS

Squadron of Destroyers Rescues Men from Wrecked Vessel

TOKIO, (AP)—The Ninth Japanese squadron of destroyers rescued 23 passengers and crew members who were rescued from the wreck of the Russian ship, Commodore Behring, according to a navy office communique. The other members of the Russian crew, which had numbered 31, are thought to have safely landed before the squadron had reached the ship and to be guarding the ship's cargo. The Russian ship was stranded off the southern extreme of Kamchatka, while bound from Vladivostok to Petro.

Business Interests of Washington State City to be Hosts at General Convention of the Tradesmen

SPOKANE, Wash. (P)—Spokane business interests will be hosts to merchants of the Inland empire, as the territory between the Rocky and the Cascade mountains in the south Oregon line is known, for three days this week, August 4 to 6. Business men of the section have been invited here for a general convention during those three days, and in addition a series of entertainment features and trips through industrial plants have been arranged.

The visitors are to be guests of local business men at luncheon on each of the three days, again being advertised by the Manufacturers' association of this city and others. Theater parties for the visiting women, smokers for the men and automobile rides will be other entertainment features.

ONE WORD IN STATUTE COSTS WORKERS PENSION

Last Minute Alteration in Bill Affects More Than 1,000 Government Employees

VALLEJO, Cal. (P)—Because of the insertion of the word "classified" in the civil service retirement bill, enacted in the closing days of the last session of congress, more than 1000 employees of the Marine land navy yard here who have put in over 30 years service for the government will be unable to get any pension, it is believed. Many of these men who are hardly able to get around and who have been given the lightest kind of work in order to allow them to hold on till such time as the retirement measure would be enacted.

The first intimation that this distinction had been made was when copies of the bill were received here specifying 70 years as the retirement age for clerks, draftsmen, etc., and 65 years for mechanics and helpers. There is only one way in which the manner can be rectified, it is said, and that is by an executive order, issued upon recommendation of the civil service commission.

CHECKS UP HOUSEWIVES

Montana State College Graduate Makes Interesting Inquiry

BOZEMAN, Mont. (P)—About 15.5 per cent of all city women order their domestic supplies over the telephone, and about 40.8 per cent of them pay cash for their groceries, according to an investigation recently conducted by Miss Vera Harris, a member of the graduating class of Montana State college, among women of southern Montana. Sixty-three per cent of farm women who replied to questionnaires sent out pay cash for their groceries they reported.

Miss Harris discovered that 18.6 per cent of city women have budgets, and that 14 per cent of farm women thus keep account of their expenditures. Seventy-one per cent of city women pay attention to brands and makes in buying supplies, it was ascertained, compared to 55.7 per cent of farm women.

PIGS PROVIDE VACATION

New Mexico Girl Earns Expenses of Outing Through Vocational Club

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M. (P)—Miss Frances Parker, 14, living at Randolph da Arisco, this county, is enjoying her vacation on the Pacific coast, on money she earned. This is the way it happened: Two years ago she joined the pig club, borrowing \$10.50 from a local bank to pay for the pig. In August, 1919, the first litter of pigs was born. In October, the litter won a cash prize of \$25 in the county boys' and girls' county contest. Last February the second litter of pigs was born. She sold some of them and others were butchered. She now has on hand one broad sow, one barrow and five little pigs, valued conservatively at \$100.

HAS WOOD PULP TO BURN

Canadian District Shows Interest in Proposal of Purchasers

REGINA, Sask. (P)—An offer for pulp wood at a price of \$12 1/2 c. per cord. Fort Frances, has been received by the bureau of labor and industries. An inquiry now will be instituted as to freight rates points of shipment and other features, with a view of finding a market if possible for the great quantities of this wood being cleared from the settlers' holdings in the northern part of the province.

At present this wood is being destroyed and a market would prove a source of revenue for settlers during the years the land is being cleared and before a crop can be secured.

CHICAGO BOXER THINKS DEFEAT DUE TO TACTICS

Charlie White Says Failure to Hit Leonard at Close Range His Undoing

(By RAY PEARSON) Sometimes we find a fighter who is willing to believe he was outclassed when knocked out by an opponent, but it isn't that with Charley White the Chicago lightweight who recently lost to World's Champion Benny Leonard.

There is no one who knows anything about pugilism who doesn't know that Leonard is fast, and that includes Charley White, but the Chicago boy declares his reason for believing his downfall at the champion's hands a bit out of the ordinary is perfectly logical. "White was another chance at Leonard and would battle him over any distance and at any time that the title holder may elect. He does not dwell at any particular length on the "lucky punch" talk, but White does mention it to show that the punch that started him on his way to the knockout sleep was delivered in a way different from the other whallops that Leonard landed.

White claims a handicap. When he fought Leonard White had considerable trouble in complying with the rules, as interpreted by the referee. He was inclined in the early rounds to step in close and punch while in a sort of half crouch. That sort of punching did Leonard no good, for White used both hands for straight punching and uppercutting. The champion complained to the referee at various times with the result the Chicago scrapper was cautioned to be careful how he hit.

White naturally did make an effort to please the referee and after being told to desist a few times he did so. In fact, after he had knocked Leonard through the ropes with a left hook in the fifth round and looked sure to be returned a winner by a knockout, he never knuckled the crowd from the floor, thereby made a lot of trouble for himself.

Right Cross Turns Tide. The trouble came later or in the ninth round, when Leonard, who had recovered from the knockdown and punching on the head and body, really beat Charley at his own game. Leonard's real punch, the one that sends an opponent to the canvas, is a short right cross. So when White came to him Benny left-handed to the nos, then they fell in close and as they did so Leonard hung over his right cross, the first of a series that knocked White to the floor.

White will tell you that there is a moral in his defeat and that is that the fighter who tries to please others in the ring, instead of himself is mighty liable to get himself in trouble. In this instance it was White's effort to fight as the referee would have him fight that helped in his defeat. We have seen in the past great fighters who butted to please the crowd finish on the sleeping end of a contest.

Perhaps White might have been helped

IRISH VOTE TO GO TO HARDING

Representative Mason Predicts Support of G. O. P. by the Friends of Erin

MARION, O., (P)—A prediction that Irish sympathizers will support Harding and Coolidge was made by Representative William E. Mason of Illinois, one of the leaders of the fight in congress for Irish recognition, in a statement made public from Harding headquarters today after he had conferred with the nominee.

"Friends of Ireland of course have to be for Harding," said the statement, "because they know what article 10 of the league covenant means—it would hitch Ireland to England forever and bind us to help keep it there; and Governor Cox has pledged himself to support the Wilson program."

Representative Mason predicted the republicans would carry Illinois by at least 200,000 and that the republican national ticket would be elected by a majority "the most overwhelming since Grant's."

Senator Harding began work today on his second front porch speech, which he will deliver Wednesday to a delegation of Ohio republicans. It will be one of two such speeches he will make during the week.

LABOR WILL PRESS PLEA

Amnesty for Political Prisoners to be Urged by A. F. of L. Leaders

WASHINGTON, D. C., (P)—Officials of the American Federation of Labor will press their plea for general amnesty for political prisoners next week, according to a federation announcement today. Attorney General Palmer has been asked to receive a delegation of labor leaders, headed by Samuel Gompers at which the general amnesty adopted by the Montreal labor convention will be presented.

UTAH SANITARIUM BURNS

Fire Destroys Buildings at Ogden Canyon Resort; Loss \$40,000

OGDEN, Utah, (P)—Fire originating in a dressing room of the Ogden Canyon sanitarium at midnight resulted in the destruction of the buildings. The loss is estimated at \$40,000. Firemen declare they were unable to verify the report that two bathers were caught in the collapse of the walls.

MANITOBA BEADUETS SCALE OF ROYALTIES ON ITS FURS

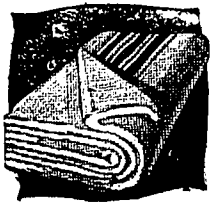

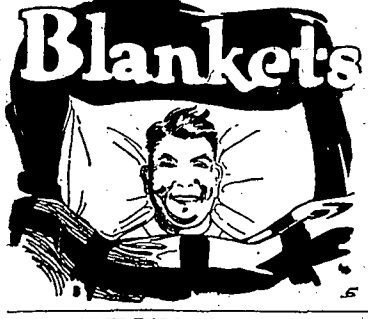

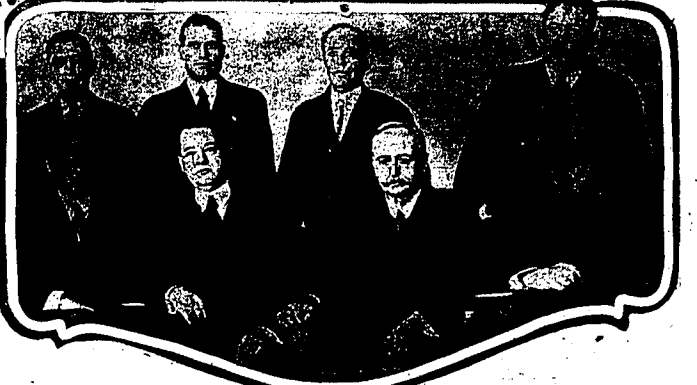

COTTON PROSPECT BETTER

Government Forecast Shows Big Increase Over Previous Estimate

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—A cotton crop of 12,519,000 bales this year was forecast today by the department of agriculture basing its estimate on the condition of the crop July 25 which was 74.1 per cent of a normal. This is an increase of more than a million bales in the prospective production of cotton over the indicated yield a month ago.

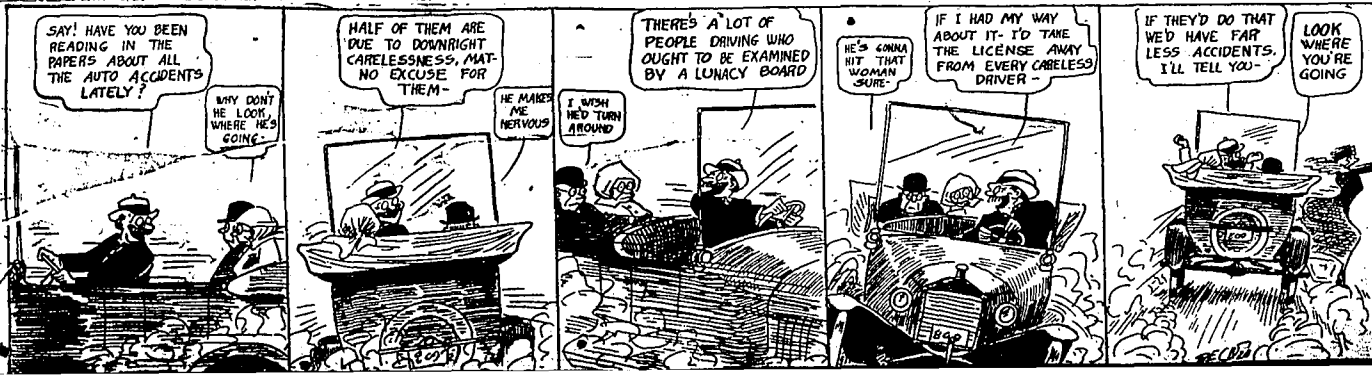

MAKE DRAFT ON STORED WATERS

Flow in Snake River at Low Ebb—Reservoir Tapped to Supply Farm Demands

Rapid reduction of the natural flow of Snake river water has caused a heavy draft on water stored for irrigation purposes in this district...

Following is a general statement issued by Mr. Wheelon with respect to the water conditions. The statement is addressed to water users and to the public.

"In view of the rapid decline of the natural flow of Snake river and the heavy draft on our storage water, the board of directors of the Twin Falls Canal company, at a special meeting last evening, ordered a reduction of the stream to 70 per cent beginning Thursday, August 5."

"Present draft on natural flow, 2030 second feet; draft on stored water, 1554 second feet; total, 3584 second feet."

"Average draft on stored water for the day, 1101 second feet; at Miller, 2448 acre feet per day at Jackson reservoir, with a loss of 10 per cent in transit."

"After August 5 the probable conditions will be: Draft on natural flow, 2050 second feet; draft on stored water, 994 second feet; total draft, 3000 second feet."

CAR SLIPS OVER CANYON WALL; C. L. GREEN INSTANTLY KILLED

Twin Falls Reactor Victim of Fatal Accident when His Machine Passes Control at Dangerous "Hairpin" Turn on Blue Lakes Grade after Sunday Excursion—Wife and Companions Spring to Safety

C. L. Green, a really man and former farmer of the Twin Falls district, was instantly killed when an automobile he was driving went over the Blue Lakes grade yesterday evening.

The fatal accident occurred at a point on the grade on the Twin Falls side of the canyon known as the "hairpin turn". Mr. Green, it is related, was attempting to make the grade by the switchback and was driving backward to obtain a sufficient swing to make the sharp turn in the road the car going over the rimrock and crashing to the floor of the canyon more than 200 feet. He was badly crushed about the upper portion of the body by the car, both shoulders being broken, his chest crushed in and a large hole driven in the back of the head at the base of the skull.

The party had spent the day on the north side, the excursion being made in a practically new car owned by Mr. Green. Reaching the top of the grade which is immediately opposite Catoos Falls, Mr. Green, in backing the car down the switchback apparently lost control of the gear, permitting the back wheels to go over the curb safety block. Momentarily he held the machine with the brakes and the other occupants sprang to safety. Mr. Green was carried over the cliff and was crushed under his machine.

Sought Office. The body is at De Witt's undertaking establishment awaiting completion of arrangements for the funeral, which will probably be held here either tomorrow or Wednesday.

C. L. Green was about 60 years of age and well known in Twin Falls and throughout the Twin Falls district. Formerly he was a farmer and in 1910 sought nomination for the office of sheriff of this county in the democratic primary convention. He was defeated by Frank Kendall. Recently Mr. Green has been identified with J. R. Diebolt in the realty business, maintaining an office on 114 Second avenue south.

IDAHO HAY BARRED BY OUTSIDE STATES

Presence of Weevil Causes Embargo Placement Against Alfalfa

Idaho alfalfa hay is barred from Arizona, British Columbia, California, Montana, Nevada, Oregon and Washington because Idaho alfalfa is infested with alfalfa weevil, according to a notice of state quarantine against Idaho received by H. A. Lyon, director of the bureau of agriculture of Idaho. Colorado has quarantined all alfalfa from Cassia, Bingham, Bear Lake, Oneida, Blannock, Franklin, Power and Payette counties, while alfalfa from all parts of Idaho is barred by the other states.

This action is regarded as a serious blow to the state's crop of alfalfa and shows that farmers have a serious menace in alfalfa weevil, according to Mr. Lyon. In 1919 Oregon and Arizona quar-

antined against all counties of the state. Washington's quarantine was against all counties south of Idaho county.

Other state quarantines were as follows: Colorado—Cassia, Blingham, Bear Lake, Oneida, Blannock, Franklin, Power and Payette counties; California—Cassia, Blingham, Bear Lake, Oneida, Blannock, Franklin, Power, Payette and Madison counties; Montana—Blingham, Cassia, Bear Lake, Oneida, Blannock, Franklin, Power, Payette and Madison counties.

Neighboring states, by the comparison of reports, judge that Idaho alfalfa is more of a menace this year than in 1919. Protection methods are adopted to prevent the spread of the alfalfa weevil, which is introduced by the shipping in of weevil infested hay.
