

DENIES CANADA TO BLAME FOR PAPER FAMINE

Dominion Pulp and Paper Association Representative Sets Forth Views in Talk to Forestry Conference

NEW LONDON, (P)—Edward Beck of Montreal, secretary of the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association, told a forestry conference here today that the question of removing restrictions upon the exportation of pulpwood from the crown lands of Canada to the United States was one for judicial determination rather than for political agitation.

The conference was held under the auspices of the Society for the Protection of the Canadian Forestry and was attended by forestry experts and paper makers from the United States and Canada. Mr. Beck was invited to present Canada's side of the paper shortage controversy brought to notice by the passage in congress of the Underwood resolution calling for an American commission to visit Canada with the view of obtaining the removal of restrictions on pulp wood exports.

Inquiry Not Avoided. Mr. Beck declared that Canada had no reason to avoid inquiry into the equity of its timber laws by any impartial tribunal. He said it was not true that the present shortage of pulpwood in the United States was chargeable to the Canadian timber regulations but that it was due to world-wide conditions, aggravated by the (unofficial) use of paper by both American and Canadian publishers.

Conservation Restrictions. Restrictions on the exports of pulpwood from the crown lands, he declared, were brought solely by the desire to conserve the pulpwood resources and utilize their products for the upbuilding of the pulp and paper industry in the Canadian provinces and with no intent to injure American industries.

Needs Reformation. Canada's great need today, said Mr. Beck, like that of the New England States, is for the inauguration of a re-forestation policy that will insure a permanent supply of timber for her wood consuming industries. Without it, he predicted the same fate for the Canadian pulp and paper industry that is now threatening the American.

Latonia Championship is Big Magnet in Kentucky's Fall Race Meet

LOUISVILLE, Ky., (Special)—Excitement on the part of those who follow the Kentucky racing circuit next autumn are coming in rapidly and indications point to a record number for the fall season.

Soon to Be Gone Home. In less than one month the Kentucky owners who are racing at Saratoga and elsewhere will be back on their horses to the big event, and, as they are shipping in this direction, they will bring one or more of their other stake horses to contest in some of the other rich races.

Training Outside Kentucky. With few exceptions, practically all of the Latonia championship eligibles are being trained and raced over in Kentucky, and those which are summering at one or the other of the Blue Grass tracks are considered as lesser risks in it. This will make this year an interesting and well watched one for the public as a better line on the horses which will race in it, as most of them will be sent to the post quite a few times at Saratoga and other eastern tracks before coming to Latonia.

MANY 2-YEAR-OLDS ELIGIBLE. There is hardly a good 2-year-old at Saratoga but what is eligible for the Kentucky Jockey club stakes, a new \$20,000 event to be run at Churchill Downs, and it is expected that this race will draw more juveniles from the east than any event of its kind ever run in Kentucky.
