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JUST WHAT DOES HE MEAN?

Confronted with a forlorn hope of success in his aspiration to the presidency and resorting to attempt to do all things to all men in vain endeavor to bolster up that sad hope, it looks like Governor Cox—newspaper publisher or though he is reputed to be—had forgotten altogether the scope and influence of the American press that is presenting every day throughout the length and breadth of the nation, the unbiased and uncolored facts regarding his campaign tour the same as it does any other matter of news.

In any other light it would be hard to explain his conflicting declarations and manifest lack of consistency.
For instance, speaking from the rear platform of his \$100,000 special train in Greeley, Colorado, on Saturday last he told a Colorado audience that he opposed a mandate for Armenia; that the democratic platform opposed such a mandate and that he stood on his platform.

But by the time he had reached Omaha on Monday, he seems to have forgotten this declaration altogether, and that through the medium of the press voters pretty generally were apprised of it, or it may have been that it did not take so well in Colorado as he had hoped and so he thought to try something different on a Nebraska audience with a view to reaping more generous measure of applause.

At any rate, when asked at Omaha whether he approved President Wilson's proposal for an American mandate for Armenia he replied with an explanation of the league provisions for mandates and said that the national platform committee had not seen fit to make any declaration on the subject.

So there you have it. If you don't want a mandate for Armenia, Candidate Cox, on the strength of his statement at Greeley, solicits your vote. If you do want a mandate for Armenia, why, Candidate Cox says that the

league of nations provides for such arrangement, and some time or other, it will be recalled, he has said that he favors "going in."
It must be apparent to every one that Candidate Cox is sincere about his purpose to "go in" at least to the White House, and it is becoming increasingly plain that he is not at all critically of the methods by which that may be accomplished.

TWIN FALLS EXHIBITS STAND HIGH AT FAIR

Junior Bureau Exhibitors Sweep Boards with Ducros at the State Exposition

Twin Falls district entries at the Idaho State Fair, Boise, are proving an important factor in establishing high grades of livestock, agriculture and domestic science, according to word reaching here concerning awards thus far made in the Junior Bureau section. The best showing, and by far the most important in all Junior Bureau departments, is in the Ducros-Jersey swine section where Twin Falls district youthful exhibitors won 17 out of 18 places. In addition these exhibitors took fifth, sixth and seventh prizes in the open class for Ducros against all exhibiting Idaho breeders. The clubs won in the sheep class for club offerings and firsts were won in club and open exhibits. In the domestic science, or home demonstration, and the agricultural department, Twin Falls club boys and girls carried off 51 ribbons.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF LEGION IN SESSION

Meets to Dispose of Matters Referred to it by Cleveland Convention

CLEVELAND, O., (AP)—The executive committee of the American Legion was in session here today to dispose of matters referred to it by the second annual convention which adjourned here yesterday. Many delegates remained over for the Donny Leonard-Jack Britton fight, which will be held here tonight.

The legion renewed its declaration of political independence; reaffirmed the cardinal principle that those who gave most should receive most from the nation; restated its position in favor of an adjusted compensation; reaffirmed its stand in favor of adequate national defense; voted to continue the campaign of the American Legion, and that "the slacker must take the consequence of his treason."

J. W. Galbraith, Jr., of Cincinnati, was unanimously elected national commander of the American Legion at the closing session of its second annual convention. Galbraith received the majority necessary for choice on the second ballot, his closest opponents being Hanford McNider, of Iowa, and J. F. J. Herbert of Massachusetts.
Upon motion of McNider, seconded by Herbert, the election of Galbraith was declared unanimous.

THREE FATALLY INJURED WHEN TRUCK AND CAB CRASH

DETROIT, Mich., (AP)—Three men were reported dying in a hospital at Dearborn early today and thirteen others were injured, some seriously, as a result of a collision of a motor truck and a Detroit United Railway interurban car. The accident occurred just outside the town of Dearborn. The truck was carrying Ford tractor plant workers to their homes. Only a few of them, it was said, escaped injury.

NORTH DAKOTA CONVICTS "SOVIET" STRIKE BREAKERS

BISMARCK, N. D., (AP)—Forty-eight of the 137 inmates of the North Dakota penitentiary here who refused to work or to go to their cells, have been placed on a bread and water diet and the "strike" has been broken. It was announced Wednesday. The strike, it was declared, came after unsuccessful attempts to form "soviets" among the prisoners.

THE COVENANT OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

IN view of the importance assumed by the league of nations issue in the continuing presidential campaign...

THE high contracting parties, in order to promote international peace and security...

ARTICLE 1. The original members of the League of Nations shall be those of the signatories...

Any fully self-governing state, dominion or colony not named in the annex...

ARTICLE 2. The action of the league under this covenant shall be effected through the instrumentality of a council...

ARTICLE 3. The assembly shall consist of representatives of the members of the league...

ARTICLE 4. The council shall consist of representatives of the principal allied and associated powers...

ARTICLE 5. With the approval of the majority of the assembly...

ARTICLE 6. The council shall meet from time to time as occasion may require...

ARTICLE 7. Except where otherwise expressly provided in this covenant...

ARTICLE 8. The permanent secretaries shall be established at the seat of the league...

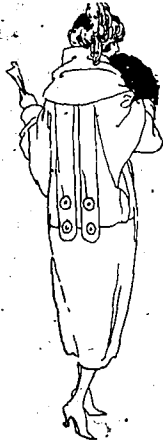

COOL PROSPECT IS HELD OUT ON SCENIC HIGHWAY

Motorists on National Park-to-Park Road will Wear Overcoats and Furs on Hottest Days in July

DENVER, Colo. (AP)—Motorists seeking the unusual in travel will find it this summer in western states and furs on the night of the hottest day in July, crossing the Continental Divide while making the 5300-mile circle swing of the National Park-to-Park highway, the longest scenic motor way in the world.

That's what members of the official party now dedicating the highway, which traverses nine western states and connects 12 major national parks, have experienced since they left Denver August 26. The party will return in time for a convention of the National Park-to-Park Highway association here November 11.

Like Scenic Noose.

The wonder highway is like a scenic running noose, and by following the hint, the motorist reaches the historic ruins of cliff dwellers in Mesa Verde park at the "Top of the World" in Rocky Mountain park, in Colorado. Starting from Denver, the highway touches Rocky Mountain park before entering Wyoming, where it passes through Yellowstone. In Montana, its course reaches to the extreme northern boundary, touching Glacier park, then crosses through Idaho to reach Mount Rainier park, in Washington. The highway continues through Oregon and California and completes the rough circle by winding through Arizona, northern Arizona and Colorado, getting back to Denver at the starting point.

In the course of the circle which the highway describes, the motorist visits the frozen ice fields in Glacier park; Mountaintop snow-capped Mount Rainier in Washington; an extinct volcano in Crater park, Ore., and an active volcano in Lassen park, California. Giant redwood forests in Yosemite and Sequoia parks, in California; the Grand Canyon in Arizona, also are included in this park-connecting highway.

Forms Connecting Link.

The National Park-to-Park Highway association was formed to secure the improvement of the dozen transcontinental highways and connecting roads forming the park-to-park highway, including the Yellowstone-Glacier trails, Rainbow and Yellowstone trails. The association hopes eventually to secure federal aid in the sum of \$100,000,000 for hard surfaced road, 1000 miles of the Pacific highway, extending from Seattle to San Francisco.

Just when the rails will reach Buhl cannot be foretold at present but it will be some time this winter.

H. L. Hollister and party are expected here from Chicago today. They are coming to inspect the work on the Shoshone Falls Power company's plant at the falls.

The Hotel Perrine. The company will occupy the lower floor facing on Main street and Shoshone avenue. Assistant General Manager has engaged a room on the west side of the court, while Chief Engineer Hickel has his office and draughting room on the third floor where the light is better.

Stuart Taylor is proving up on his farm, seven miles east of the city. It is half a mile from Jess Ball's ranch and they are said to be hanging close together as a protection against vandals. 2 Eggs, Yolks only
1 Pint of Mazola
1 teaspoon of Mustard
1 dash of Cayenne or White Pepper
4 tablespoons of Vinegar (any jar or 1/4 teaspoon Paprika
Several vinegars may be used)

1 teaspoon of Salt
2 tablespoons each of Lemon Juice and Vinegar of

Have all ingredients and mixing utensils cold. Mix dry ingredients. Add egg yolks and when well mixed, add 1/2 teaspoonful of vinegar. Add Mazola drop by drop until the mixture begins to thicken, beating slowly. As soon as the mixture thickens, add the remainder of the vinegar a little at a time. Now beat in the remainder of the Mazola gradually until all is used. The Mayonnaise should be thick enough to hold its shape. Put in a glass jar and cover close.
