NEW SIAMESE AMERICAN TRADE TREATY IS SIGNED
WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—A new treaty of commerce and navigation between the United States and Siam has been signed by Acting Secretary of State Davis and the Siamese minister. The treaty grants full fiscal autonomy to Siam and a protocol provides for the surrender by the United States of extra-territorial jurisdiction in that country. Titles to American missionary property have been settled through the exchange of notes.

ARGENTINE WHEAT CROP PROMISES HEAVY YIELD

Buenos Aires Newspapers Estimate the Harvest Now Beginning will Produce 5,000,000 Tons

BUENOS AIRES, (AP)—Argentina's wheat crop for 1920, now ready for the harvest, gives prospects of a heavy and profitable yield. Official figures place the area seeded this year at 6,740,000 hectares (of 2 1/2 acres), or about 23,000 hectares more than in the previous year. La Razon estimates that the crop for 1920-21 will reach 5,000,000 tons and La Epoca figures 5,000,000. The oats and linseed crops share the good prospects of the wheat.

WILSON'S LAST MESSAGE FINDS CRITICS IN JAPAN

Tokio Press Takes Exception to Failure to Mention the League of Nations

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—Criticism of President Wilson's last message to congress by the newspapers in Japan was made here today by the Japanese consulate.

According to the Japanese consulate advices, the Tokio Yoruichi of December 10 commented:
"President Wilson says Americans should espouse the cause of right and justice, but it is curious to note that America's attitude is becoming increasingly contrary to this principle of late. The presidential message makes no reference whatever to the league of nations nor to Japanese questions. It is deplorable, for the sake of Americans, that they should more and more be led to lose sight of justice and humanity. The Japanese question is capable of immediate solution if justice is respected."
The Tokio Nichi Nichi of December 10 commented:
"President Wilson does not say a single word regarding it (the league of nations) in his congressional message. If he really believed that right makes might, why should he fail to urge in his message the necessity of joining the league and trying to dispel the misunderstanding entertained by Americans and the world generally? The present attitude of President Wilson is strange to say the least."

ditions, the matter was left over for settlement today, if possible. The original report of the mandates commission was a sharp arraignment of the council, but the language used was considerably softened by the full com-

mission, following the debate on the floor of the assembly. The council declined to submit drafts of the mandates except on a promise by the commission that no reference to the provisions of the mandates would be made in the report to the assembly.

Nearing Session End.

Disposal of this question, action on

two more applications for membership and decision relative to the longue budget were all that remained today to be disposed of during this session of the assembly. Hope was expressed this morning that this work might be finished today so that tomorrow's final session might be devoted to the ceremonies of closing.

The application of Lichtenstein and Ukraine were before the assembly today.

The action of the committee in recommending the rejection of the applications of Baltic states and Georgia was due largely to American influence. The committee had before it a document containing the note sent on Aug-

ust 10 to the Italian ambassador by Bainbridge Colby, American secretary of state, who stated the United States policy was that decision should be held in abeyance concerning territories carved out of the former Russian empire.

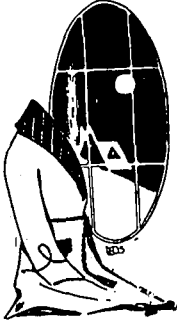

Boil the sugar, molasses and water until it forms a hard ball when tested in cold water. Add the butter and cook until it begins to sizzle. Pour over the popcorn and nuts and stir until well mixed. Turn out onto a buttered pan.

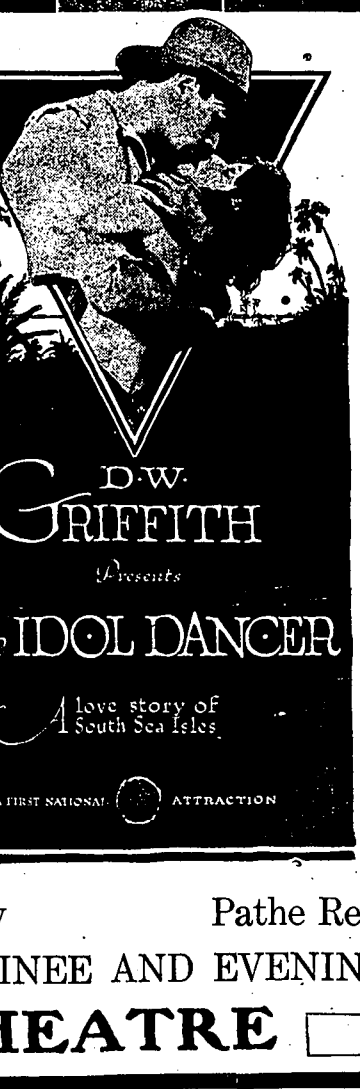

LIFE IN THE COUNTRY

Considerable discussion is heard these days as to the means that may be adopted to keep folks on the farm. The situation has become serious, for many experienced farmers are moving into the cities, either for the purpose of earning what they consider easier money, or to use their savings in giving their children and themselves the advantages of city life. Whatever the cause, the situation remains, and it constitutes a problem that may well engage the attention of national and state authorities. The fear is expressed that the production of food may become reduced to such an extent that the scarcity will not only greatly increase the prices, but threaten the welfare of the people.

While the reasoning is purely academic and subject to the views of each individual, it is probably true that the persons who make occasional trips from the rural districts to the larger towns enjoy these visits and the things they see much more than those who see them every day. It is a case where familiarity sometimes breeds contempt. In the matter of better school facilities in the towns, there is in most cases no place for argument, although some progress has been made in a number of the states to bring about a centralization of teaching that gives country pupils some of the advantages of the city in a course

bling and other vices carried on for profit. These violations could better be prevented by strict surveillance than by spasmodic efforts at reform. No body expects the authorities to prevent all violations or arrest all persons who do criminal acts. It should be possible for police to know their city so well that they need no crusade to drive out persons who are violators of the laws.

COSTA RICA ENGAGES IN DISPUTE WITH ENGLAND

Curt Notes are Exchanged Over Law Annulling Transactions of Previous Administration

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras, (AP)—Some curt and not very cordial notes have been exchanged between representatives of the British and Costa Rican governments over a law recently passed by Costa Rica annulling all international transactions by the previous administration of President Tinoco.

This law rescinds an oil concession given to British interests, affects certain arrangements between the Tinoco government and the Costa Rican branch of the Royal Bank of Canada, and affects some American interests, including the Sinclair syndicate which had obtained certain oil rights under the Tinoco administration.

The British government filed a strong protest with the government of Costa Rica, refusing to abide by the law. To this Costa Rica replied that it would not allow a foreign power to interfere with its internal legislation. Great Britain then sent its minister from Panama to Costa Rica, personally, to settle the dispute.

As a consequence, the Costa Rican press is bitter against the British claims and much anxiety exists there at the probable outcome.

THE HAGUE, (AP)—Dutch "dry" leaders have announced they will make a determined effort to secure adoption of a local option bill by the Netherlands parliament.

ARGENTINE TAX MEASURE SERVES PURPOSE OF DRYS

Liquor Dealers Threaten to Close Establishments Unless Legislation is Repealed

BUENOS AIRES, (AP)—Wholesale and retail dealers in liquor in the province of Cordoba threaten to close their places of business if a recent law passed by the provincial government imposing increased taxes on alcoholic drinks is not repealed.

The law passed by the Cordoba legislature was intended not alone as a source of revenue but as a move to restrict the liquor traffic. Furthermore, the provincial government has declared that if the new law is resisted by the dealers, it will present to the legislature a bill providing complete prohibition of consumption of alcohol in the province.

Weight and Height is Requirement of Women Voters List

BOSTON, (AP)—In order that the list of all voters may be sufficiently descriptive women in this city will be compelled to register again if they wish to vote next year. A statement issued by the election department today said that the new list would include the height and weight of all registrants.

Negro Population of Chicago Shows Increase of 65,491

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The negro population of Chicago increased 65,491 in the last decade and now is 109,594, the census bureau announced today. The percentage of increase was 148.5. The total white population is 3,580,104, an increase of 450,047, or 212 per cent, and all others numbered 3,007.

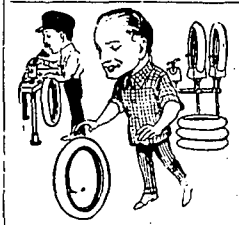
