Shops and houses were destroyed. The dispatch states, some outlying farm houses burned and stock sold. Press dispatches report that inflammatory literature has been discovered in the mails addressed to the troops of the Hiroshima and Takata divisions, which recently returned from Siberia.

EMERGENCY TARIFF ADVOCATES WIN PRELIMINARY FIGHT TO GIVE MEASURE RIGHT OF WAY

LANDIS TAKES CUE FROM WILSON IN DEALING WITH SUGAR THEFT

CHICAGO, (AP)—Judge Kencaw M. Landis today refused to sentence six men charged with stealing 600 sacks of sugar from trains in interstate commerce, after learning that President Wilson had last week granted a pardon to James J. Dorsey, of Gilbert, Ill., known as the "millionaire cattle thief."

Dorsey was sentenced to eight years in Leavenworth prison by Judge Landis after conviction of selling several thousand head of tubercular cattle throughout the west under false papers representing them as government tested and healthy. He began serving his sentence June 4, 1919. Last July President Wilson cut the sentence to four years. At that time Judge Landis, in open court, declared he could not "understand the workings" of the president's mind.

"I can't sentence these men with the Dorsey thief fresh in my mind," Judge Landis declared in court today. "Dorsey's activities ran into the thousands of dollars while these men stole only a few hundred dollars' worth of merchandise. I will continue this case indefinitely."

TERRORS DO NOT ALTER PLANS OF NOTED EXPLORER

Dr. Alexander Hamilton Rice, Lately Returned from Wilds of South America, will Seek Rare Goat Species in Egypt

PHILADELPHIA, (AP)—Despite the terrors through which he passed while journeying through the wilds of South America, Dr. Alexander Hamilton Rice, explorer, plans soon to leave for Egypt in an endeavor to locate a certain species of goat which is invaluable in medical research work.

He expressed this intention in an address on South America before the Geographical Society here.

Dr. Rice said his trip through South America took him up the Rio Negro, the largest tributary of the Amazon, through a natural canal more than 200 miles long connecting it with the Orinoco, into hitherto unexplored portions of Brazil. It was here that he came in actual contact with Guaharibos, a virtually unknown tribe of cannibal Indians, who for 17 days pursued his party with an effort to cut off their return.

Indians Close In.

The attack occurred in a wild spot along the banks of the Orinoco, where Dr. Rice had his camp the night before. Two of his Indian guides had gone up the river in a canoe to test the depth of the water, when they saw something moving along the banks. They came closer and saw the forms of Indians closing in on the camp, and hastily turning about, hurried back to warn the remainder of the party.

A few moments after the guides' return, Dr. Rice said, "the entire bank was literally lined with wildly shrieking and postulating figures who reached down about seven feet high, with arrows six feet long. Just opposite me I saw one huge creature, evidently the chief or leader, who was shouting and foaming at the mouth and making motions that apparently meant to express anticipation of a hearty meal that night. He was neither negro Indian, and he had black hair on his upper lip—nothing I have never seen on an Indian.

"We tried talking to them in every language and dialect at our command. We laid hatchets, knives and fishes on the rocks in an attempt to conciliate them, but they apparently had no idea what they were for, and there was no doubting the fact they intended to fight.

Arrow Falls at Feet.

"Finally when one of their arrows landed just at my feet, I decided it was time to do something, and we fired the Winchester rifle and Parker shot gun, our only weapons, over their heads. That frightened them for the moment, and gave us time to get our things packed together and start down the river. Shortly afterward, darkness descended, and all night long we could hear their blood-curdling screams as they kept at our heels.

"When morning broke," he went on, "a thick mist covered the entire river, and it was this that gave us our chance to escape. When we finally reached deep water we knew that we were safe, for the Guaharibos do not use boats or canoes, and it was too deep for them to wade."

NEW YORK LAUNCHES BIG ROUNDUP OF UNDERWORLD

Police Use Drag Net in Effort to Stem Wave of Crime Starting Metropolis During Last Week

NEW YORK, (AP)—The most sweeping roundup of crooks and suspicious characters in the history of New York was under full swing Monday by the city's police force of 11,000 men, augmented by 4800 reserves, in an effort to stem the wave of crime that startled the metropolis last week. More than 150 persons were caught in the dragnet last night.

The federal building in Brooklyn at noon was put under heavy guard after receipt of a third threat within two weeks that the structure would be bombed. The latest threat, sent on a postcard to United States Attorney Ross, said the building would be blown up between 12 and 1 o'clock today.

The threat was not fulfilled but a heavy guard was maintained.

LONDON BANK ANNOUNCES SUSPENSION OF PAYMENT

Institution Doing Business Largely with Small Depositors Closes Its Doors Without Explanation

LONDON, (AP)—Two arrests have been made in connection with the suspension of Farrows bank, which was announced yesterday, says the Daily Mail. F. A. Harb, an auditor representing the shareholders, and Thomas Farrows, the founder of the bank, also was told to be taken from his home, were arrested.

LONDON, (AP)—Farrows bank, an institution doing business largely with small depositors in the suburbs of London, where it had numerous branches, posted a notice on Monday that payments had been suspended. The bank, which had a capital of 1,000,000 pounds and deposits unofficially estimated at possibly from two to three million pounds, gave no immediate explanation for its step.

Suspension of payments, it is believed, will not have any effect on the stock exchange. The announcement caused little surprise among financiers. The bank has 4,000 shareholders and 73 branches.

The board of trade states that the difficulties of the bank were due to losses in trading extending over several years.

HUNGARY LACKS ACCOMMODATION FOR HUNGARIANS

Government Faces a Unique Problem in Immigration as Result of Peace Conference Lopping Off of Territory

BUDAPEST, (AP)—So many thousands of Magyar families and former government officials are pouring into smaller Hungary from lost provinces of Hungary that the government is making every effort to stop it.

Count Paul Teleki, Hungarian premier, has sent a message to the people of those provinces now annexed to Jugoslavia, Rumania or Czechoslovakia, saying: "Stick to your post like the Roman sentry and if necessary take the oath of allegiance."

When these refugees first began to arrive in what is now Hungary they were received with all the warm sympathy and kindness which misfortune evokes. Soon, however, the unending stream of homeless, penniless refugees caused a serious housing and food crisis in Budapest, besides adding a heavy item to the already insupportable financial burden of the state.

No rooms were available and the refugees were accommodated in railway cars. Forty-five hundred cars already are occupied in this manner and a city of these cars has grown up near the railway station, with its own streets, clergyman, physicians and stores.

Now the government has been compelled to sacrifice both patriotism and charity and take the refugees to stay home even though their home is under a foreign flag.

AUTHORIZES COMBINE OF FOUR EXPRESS CONCERNS

Interstate Commerce Commission Grants Approval for Permanent Consolidation

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—Authority was granted Monday by the Interstate Commerce Commission for permanent consolidation of the transportation business and properties of the Adams, American, Wells Fargo and Company, and Southern Express companies into the American Railway Express company. The commission said that it was their belief that the public would best be served by one consolidated company serving all lines with equal rates.

RUMELY AND ASSOCIATES ARE SENTENCED TO PRISON

NEW YORK, (AP)—Dr. Edward A. Rumely, former publisher of the New York Evening Mail, and S. Walter Kaufman and Norvin Lindheim were sentenced to prison terms of one year and one day each in federal court here Monday on conviction for conspiring to withhold from the government knowledge of the alleged German ownership of the newspaper during part of the war.

Dr. Rumely and his co-defendants, who were both New York attorneys, were found guilty by jury on Saturday of having failed to report to the alien property custodian a debt of \$1,451,700 to the imperial German government. The charge that the German government actually owned shares of the newspaper's stock was not proved.

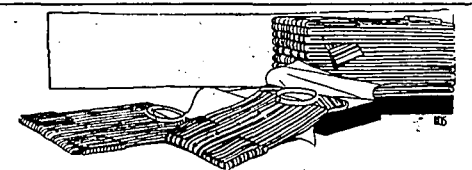

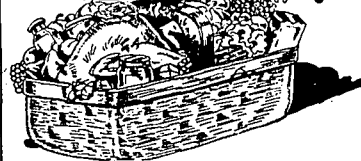

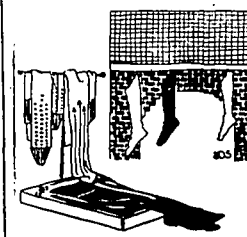

WATER METERS: Apparently, Saturday night's meeting of citizens called together to discuss municipal reforms, developed almost as many opinions as to the utilitarian value and general desirability of water meters in Twin Falls as there are water users.

When all is said and done the whole problem, summed up, presents but one point, namely as to whether or not it is better to charge the water meter and excessive use of water upon the same basis as the careful, conservative citizen, or collect from all upon the basis of the actual use of water of each.

Water meters will result in the equalization of water charges. Many a householder, today, is paying a minimum of \$1.25 per month for water who formerly paid \$3.00, before the installation of the meters, and vice versa.

There are garages, hotels, plants and similar establishments who are now paying much more for their water supply—all of which, in simple justice, is exactly as it should be. If the waterworks department shows a profit, the rate will be lowered to a point even smaller than the present rate.

The question as to whether or not the cost of the meter should be charged to the property of the waterworks department, or assessed against it as a tax at the end of the year should not make a great deal of difference. The waterworks system is not the property of the City Council, it belongs to the people of Twin Falls.

It would be interesting to compile a list of the "nays" and the "yays" on this question of water meters. Probably a very large majority of those who have the water meter installed and paid for would be found to be wholly in favor of water meters, while those with the step just ahead would be just as determinedly opposed.

It is to be regretted that the item of expense created by the meter installation should have come at a time when the people of Twin Falls are really unable to take on extra financial burdens than has been the case during any year for a long time past.

But the water meter constitutes the only fair basis for the distribution of water. To argue to the contrary is to waste time.

THE SUBSTITUTE PARENT

Austrians Write Popular Songs About Life-saving Food Drafts



When the first American Relief Administration food drafts were received in Vienna they had to be explained, as this official is explaining one here, but now the receipt of hundreds of them has proved they are not "too good to be true," and the Austrians write popular songs about them. Food drafts are more welcome than money in Austria as they bring the things money cannot buy, supplies of flour, beans, bacon, milk, lard, corned beef, cottonseed oil, and sugar and cocoa, standard-sized packages of staple foodstuffs that keep many a family from starvation. Austria cannot produce enough food for her population, and what food there is sells for fabulous sums. The cost of living has gone up 155 times the pre-war scale in Austria.

Friends and relatives of European families in need can buy American Relief Administration Food Drafts, payable in Austria, Hungary, Poland and Czechoslovakia, at 4438 banks in the United States. They are issued in \$10 and \$50 amounts. A draft should be mailed to the person in whose favor it is drawn. On receipt of it it presents it at the American Relief Administration warehouse where it is cashed for him in food. The Food Draft plan is Mr. Hoover's, instituted by him in an effort to help adults in the hunger countries of Europe with the greatest economy of money and food. The boys and girls of these nations he is looking after through the American Relief Administration European Children's Fund, of which he is chairman. Through the generosity of the American people the Fund hopes to save from starvation, the two and a half million children who depend on it for life.

That for the purpose of providing for the payment of the deficiency referred to in Section 1 of this ordinance which is to be applied to the payments of the cost and expense of the construction of the improvements heretofore ordered by said city, Local Improvement District No. 34, the Committee on Streets of said city, together with the City Engineer, shall make out an assessment roll re-assessing all property in said district liable for the payment of said deficiency of Sixty-five Thousand Seven Hundred Sixty-seven and 08/100 (\$65,767.08) Dollars as a part of the cost and expense of that part of said improvements on the streets and alleys on which said property is fronting, abutting, contiguous or tributary to said streets and alleys, which said re-assessment roll is to be made in accordance with the ordinance of said city and the laws of Idaho relating to the same and shall certify the same to the City Council of said City of Twin Falls.

The said Street Committee shall organize by the selection of a Chairman and their deliberations shall be governed by the rules governing the City Council. Their meetings shall be called by the Chairman and the City clerk shall act as clerk of said committee and shall keep a record of the proceedings.

SECTION 3. Said Street Committee shall ascertain the total amount of said deficiency referred to in Section 1 of this ordinance and shall make an examination of all the property within said district as aforesaid, and the re-assessment shall be in accordance with and in proportion to the front footage abutting, contiguous or tributary to the streets or parts of streets and alleys to be or which have been improved and included in said improvement district for said grading, paving, curbing and surface draining in proportion to the number of feet fronting thereon, and in proportion to the benefits that will accrue to said property so re-assessed by reason of the proposed grading, paving, curbing and surface draining.

All the property within said Local Improvement District No. 34 shall be re-assessed as aforesaid for the payment of the said deficiency in the cost of said improvements.

Where any work is done by virtue of this or any other ordinance of said city in said district, as on one side of the center line of any street, the property on that side only shall be re-assessed.

SECTION 4. The said re-assessment roll prepared by said Street Committee shall contain, among other things, the names of the property owners affected by the proposed improvements, the description of each piece, lot or parcel of land, and the amount re-assessed against the same. On receiving said re-assessment roll, the City Clerk shall give notice by three (3) successive publications in the official newspaper of said City of Twin Falls, Idaho, that re-assessment roll is on file in his office, the date of filing same, and said notice shall state the time at which the council will hear and consider objections to said re-assessment roll by parties aggrieved by such re-assessment. The owner or owners of any property which is re-assessed in such re-assessment roll, whether named or not in such roll, may, within ten (10) days from the last publication herein, file with the City Clerk his objections in writing to such re-assessment.

SECTION 5. That all re-assessments hereinafter specified shall be known as special assessments for improvements, and shall be levied and collected as separate taxes, in addition to the taxes for general revenue purposes, to be placed upon the tax roll for collection subject to the same penalties and other city taxes.

SECTION 6. That the Mayor and Council of the City of Twin Falls may, in their discretion, provide for the payment of the expense of making of the said improvements herein referred to, by installments by the issuance of special improvement bonds of said district, said installments being in equal payments of not to exceed seven per cent (7%) per annum interest, and to be payable on or before ten years.

The owner of any piece of property liable for any of said special re-assessment charges against his property, may redeem his property from such liability by paying the entire re-assessment chargeable against his property upon the City Clerk of said city mailing him written or printed notice thirty days before the issuance of the bonds or after the installment of the bonds, by paying all the installments of the bonds or payments which have been levied, and also the amount of unlevied installments, with interest on the latter at the rate of not to exceed seven per cent (7%) per annum from the date of the issuance of the said bonds to the time of the maturity of the last installment.

All such re-assessments shall be paid to the City Treasurer of the City of Twin Falls, Idaho.

The funds arising from all of said re-assessments levied for the redemption of the bonds, shall be applied solely towards the redemption of the said bonds.

SECTION 8. The bonds herein provided for shall have printed thereon (among other things) substantially the following:

"The holder of this Bond shall have no claim against the City of Twin Falls, Idaho, in any event, except the collection of the cost of special re-assessments made upon the improvement for which the same was issued, but his remedy in case of non-payment shall be confined to the enforcement of such re-assessment."

SECTION 9. The procedure for carrying out the provisions of this ordinance shall be governed by the provisions of the laws of the State of Idaho relating to the powers of cities and villages in the State of Idaho.

SECTION 10. This ordinance in no way affects the terms and conditions of Ordinance Nos. 311 and 317, passed and approved by the Council and Mayor, on the 27th day of September, 1920, and on the 22nd day of October, 1920, respectively, except to change the amount to be re-assessed against the property fronting and abutting upon, contiguous and tributary to the streets and alleys included in Local Improvement District No. 34, and to fully pay for the grading, paving, curbing and surface draining of the streets and alleys included in said Local Improvement District No. 34, and that this ordinance in no way repeals said Ordinance Nos. 311 and 317.

COOPERATION IN INDUSTRY URGED BY ENGLISHMAN

Leading British Cotton Spinner Says Employer and Workers Must Get Together to Stave Off World Disaster

LONDON, (AP)—Sir Charles Macara, former president of the International Cotton Federation and of the English Federation of Master Cotton Spinners, is of the opinion that the world is "fast with disaster" unless means be devised throughout the world to bring about more whole-hearted cooperation between employers and workers, with a view to reducing governmental and national extravagance and bringing down the cost of production by united effort.

Condition Critical

At present, Sir Charles sees no prospect of a real reduction in the cost of living and he thinks that the United Kingdom is today in an critical a position as at the outbreak of the war, largely due, he says, to the curtailment of credit by banks, at the bidding of the government.

"People are encouraged to believe that a slump in prices is due immediately," said Sir Charles to the correspondent, "but an artificially-created slump would be nothing less than a disaster. Low prices are an illusion as long as the world lacks goods and the cost of production remains on the present scale."

Government Profiteers

"Making the so-called war profiteer disgorge may be a popular cry, but it must not be overlooked that the government who has adopted the excessive profits duty are the real profiteers, and in a slump may be called upon to refund much of what they have collected. Then again, wages are very high, working hours are long, and the running expenses heavier than ever before, and the cost of machinery 400 per cent above pre-war prices."

"The excess profits duty, Sir Charles pointed out, has been a complete failure in its purpose. He continued: "If there is no change of policy, in regard to the cotton industry, we shall see again what happened in 1915: the growers turning to crops that will pay, with a consequent great advance in the price of cotton, which in that year fell to four pence per pound and in course of time rose as high as 45 pence, increasing the price of the cotton crop of the world by 1,000,000,000 pounds."

Sir Charles regretted the failure of the government to call for the assistance of the experts of the International Cotton Federation and the International Institute of Agriculture.

League on Wrong Track

"All nations are interdependent," he said, "and the world's most urgent work, the provision of food and clothing, cannot proceed except by international cooperation, and it were well if the United States would take the initiative with this object in view. The present crisis cannot be solved by the agency of professional politicians at Geneva, but by a gradual reduction in national expenditure and by cheapening the cost of production. If the league of nations had commenced by making use of the machinery of the organizations referred to whose very existence proves the practicability of the nations working in friendly cooperation, much precious time would have been saved. The situation is one of extreme urgency."

GERMANS DEMANDS FOR CONCESSIONS CLARIFIED

Allied Representatives at Brussels Conference Expect to Reach Substantial Agreement

BRUSSELS, (AP)—The demands of the Germans for concessions under the Versailles treaty now are sufficiently definite to make the allied delegates in the second financial conference to discuss German reparations feel it is necessary to continue the conference until a substantial agreement as to what Germany can pay and what help the allies are willing to give in order to get the reparations has been reached. The conference probably will adjourn Wednesday until after the new year holiday.

The German demands for relief now are fairly definite. They ask that they be enabled to obtain 3,000,000,000 gold marks for food purposes during the coming year in addition to the allowances under the Spa agreement. More than 3,000,000,000 marks additional are needed for raw materials, the Germans declare.

'Fair Price' Quotations for Meats to be Issued Again in Chicago

CHICAGO, (AP)—Reversion to war methods in fighting high food prices was adopted in Chicago Monday, when Russell J. Poole, secretary of the fair price committee of the city council, announced that "fair price" quotations for meats will be issued daily by the council committee. Wholesale prices quoted by packers at the stock yards will be made the basis of the "fair price" schedule, he said. To this will be added overhead charges and a fair profit.

HOME OF FRENCH KINGS INVOLVED IN LAWSUIT

Bourbon Princes who Won Distinction in Battle, Assert Claim to Domain of Chambord

BOURBON, France, (AP)—The ownership of the royal domain of Chambord, the home of former kings of France, will soon be decided before the local courts. Chambord, in 1914, was placed under sequestration as belonging to the Prince Helie de Bourbon-Farne, a brother of the former Empress Zita of Austria-Hungary, who was married to the daughter of the generalissimo of the Austrian army. It was to be sold along with other enemy property, but the Prince Xavier and Siste de Bourbon-Farne, both of whom fought with the allied armies and were decorated with the croix de guerre, opposed the sale, asking that the property revert to them as nearest of kin.

MACLEWEE URGES DEVELOPMENT OF FOREIGN TRADE

Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce Director Says Present Stagnation in Business Only Passing Phase

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The United States has been made the heart of the world's business by the westward trend of commercial affairs and has reached the stage in its industrial and commercial development where the maintenance of foreign outlets is necessary to continued domestic prosperity, Director R. S. MacLewee, of the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce of the department of commerce, announced Monday in his annual report.

Declaring that the present stagnation in the business world was only a passing phase in so far as this country was concerned, Director MacLewee urged that the development of foreign markets be taken up with renewed vigor.

"Our foreign trade in the fiscal year of 1920, with a total value of \$1,349,000,000, was larger than in any previous year," he said. "It exceeded by \$3,000,000,000 the former high record in 1919, and was more than three times the value of the combined imports and exports in 1911, the last year before the war."

Interest Growing

"Many people are more interested now than they were a year ago in foreign commerce. There were a few firms who had the foresight to take out life insurance while they were in bad health. Others now wish they had done so. The only real insurance that will spread the risks of depression between the crests of the waves of domestic demand is the allotting of a substantial quota of the firm's product for foreign commerce and the building up in the world's markets of a selling organization and clientele that will necessarily fluctuate with the waves of demand at home."

"A depression regularly follows a great war, and its times of occurrence may be estimated, from historical analogies, to recur two to three years after the close of hostilities. We are not going to have a panic in the United States, but we certainly feel the kind of reaction that the rest of the world call shock after an operation."

To meet the increased demands of business and carry on the work of the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce \$1,400,000 was asked of congress for the next fiscal year. This is an increase of more than half a million dollars over the present year's appropriations. Of the total for next year \$1,000,000 would be asked for commercial attaches abroad and for the promotion of commerce.

Would Enlarge Forces

It is proposed to double the number of commercial attaches, making 24, and to increase the number of trade commissioners to 17, making a total of 50, while commercial agents would be tripled with a total of 33.

Estimates include \$300,000 for commercial attaches, \$500,000 for promoting commerce, \$1,000,000 for promoting commerce in Central and South America, and \$150,000 for promoting commerce in the Far East. The increased appropriations would permit greatly increased development of new markets for American goods in Latin America and the Far East which are considered the most promising fields for American commercial effort at this time, the report stated.

Going back three thousand years, Director MacLewee traced the center of commercial supremacy from Phoenicia westward to Rome, and then to Venice and Genoa between 1651 and 1700 and said the last war had moved the center of commerce westward again, the predominant interests at the present time being in the Pacific in addition to the Atlantic. Analysis shows, he said, the reason for the rise of nations that successfully dominated the world's commerce to be that they were situated at the crossroads of transportation, that they developed their merchant marine and a navy to protect it; that they possessed the raw materials needed to supply the wants of man, and developed the artifice to shape these raw materials into the form in which man could use them.

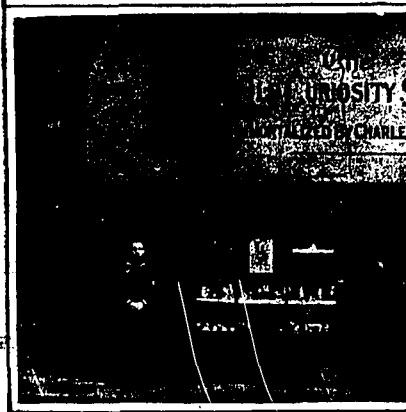
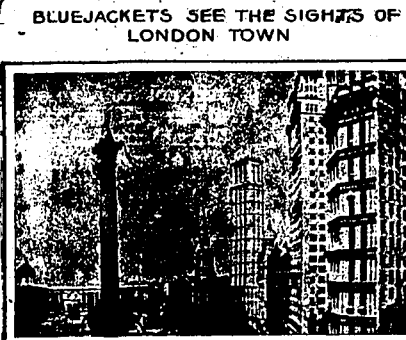
In Path of Destiny

"We are spread out across the paths of the westerly movement in the destiny of commerce," Director MacLewee said. "As to natural resources and the skill of our artisans, these need no comment. Despite high wages, Yankee ingenuity and laboring industry have made it possible for us, for many years, to dominate the world's commerce in such articles as harvesting machinery, sewing machines, cars, registers, typewriters, office supplies, automobiles, and many other kinds of goods."

LOVERS OF "DICKENS" WILL FIND A TREAT IN THE OLD CURIOSITY SHOP.

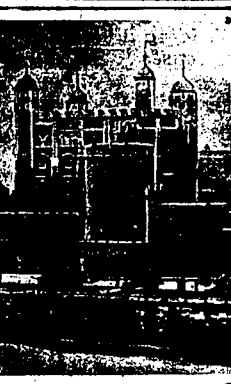

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TAX COLLECTIONS MEET HOUSTON'S EXPECTATION

Reports to Treasury Indicate No Inability on Part of Taxpayers to Meet Obligations

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Reports thus far received by the treasury from its revenue offices over the country show that from \$400,000,000 of the income and excess profits tax due on December 15 has been collected. Treasury officers said Monday that when complete returns were in they probably would show collections in excess of the \$500,000,000 estimate made by Secretary Houston.

The reports, it was declared, did not indicate any inability of the taxpayers to meet their obligations to the government.

The view was expressed by many of those who had stated that they would be unable to pay their last installments of the 1920 tax had paid up at the last moment when it became evident that congress would not act immediately on legislation extending the time for payment.

FIGURES SHOW DOMINION SENDS MUCH GRAIN HERE

Competition Statement Compares the American Exports and Imports of Canadian Cereals

PORT WILLIAMS, Ont., (AP)—The board of grain commissioners Monday issued a statement showing the amount of grain shipped by boat from Port Williams and Port Arthur between September and the closing of navigation, December 14.

To Canadian ports went 28,502,400 bushels of wheat; 6,413,781 of oats; 2,387,081 bushels of barley; and 535,480 of rye.

Wheat destined for United States ports totaled 37,325,005 bushels; oats 795,284; barley 631,514; flax 820,296; rye 331,856 bushels; and elevator screenings 41,940 tons.

MANY HARVARD STUDENTS EARNING OWN EXPENSES

Survey Shows Half of Men Enrolled are Working Way Through College

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—Half the Harvard university student body of about 6000 is working its way through college in whole or in part. A survey of student employment just completed at the graduate school supplemented by figures from the student employment office shows that those obtaining regular and casual employment ranging from professional house-hunting to instruction in languages to an inmate of an insane hospital earned more than \$77,000 toward the expenses of the academic year 1919-20.

Nine hundred and ninety-eight men registered for work last year, 382 of whom obtained it. The number of positions available is always less than the number of seekers.

Occupations in term time include that of waiters, chauffeurs, shoemen, furriers, hotel clerks, window cleaners, university guides and players in jazz orchestras. Some students spend Christmas holidays chopping wood in the forests of Maine. One man is reported working nights, sleeping five hours out of the twenty-four, and earning \$50 a week.

Tutoring is the most popular employment in term time and in no other department it is also remunerative in the summer recess. One man last summer earned \$150 a month and expenses as supervisor of children's play. Another spent his mornings with a group of children at a popular resort on the Maine coast and made \$1200 in two months. Several took ocean cruises as tutors.

Some students spend several weeks posing for an artist.

NORWAY PLACES BAN ON BOLSHEVIKI PROPAGANDA

Prohibits Importation of Literature from Russia No Matter in What Language Printed

CHRISTIANIA, (AP)—To stop the circulation of Russian Bolshevist propaganda, the Norwegian government has prohibited the importation of literature from Russia no matter in what language it is printed. The only exception is strictly scientific non-political literature.

It has been charged here that for some time the Norwegian socialist headquarters have been the center for the distribution to other countries of Russian soviet propaganda literature which is imported from northern Russia by way of northern Norwegian towns.

This literature is printed in Moscow in different European languages and preaches civil war and revolution. It is re-exported by Norwegian agencies and through different channels it is smuggled into other countries. This action has caused unfriendly feelings toward Norway and in some instances Norwegian vessels and crews have encountered trouble in foreign ports.

GERMAN CIVIL SERVICE EMPLOYEES ASK MORE PAY

Petition Says Need is Urgent Both for Increase in Salaries and Revision of Living Costs

HAMBURG, (AP)—Ten thousand civil service employees here have unanimously adopted a petition to the Berlin government for wage increases amounting to 70 per cent dating from October 1. For a minimum salary of 7000 marks a year and 100 per cent increase in family allowances.

All other German government employees have been urged to unite and force the granting of the demands by a strike if necessary.

The petition says that the need is urgent not only for an increase of salaries but for a general revision by the government of the cost of living which is endangering the nation's economic existence. "We find ourselves in the predicament where we must either have government aid or try to ensure the impossible living conditions," the petition states. The Civil Service Employees' league has several millions of members.

OWN WORN BY EMPRESS OF FRANCE TO BE SOLD AT AUCTION

PARIS, (AP)—The beautiful dress worn by Empress Marie Louise, second wife of Napoleon, on the day of her coronation as empress of the French will be sold at auction shortly.

The dress is made of exquisite lace, made by the French lace workers of Calcutta, to whom Napoleon himself sent the design.

It was stolen from the Tuileries during the riots of the revolution of 1848 and found its way to the Galliera museum. The empress was the daughter of Emperor Francis I, of Austria-Hungary.

WATER WASTE ENORMOUS REPORT OF PLANT SUPERINTENDENT SHOWS

Eight Thousand People are 'Consuming,' at Times, Water Sufficient to Provide for Wants of Nearly Double that Number—J. J. Pilgerim Makes Illuminating Statement on Meter Installation and Need of Economy

Approximately the agitation now rife against installation of water meters, and tending to prove that there is a dire need of metering devices as a means of checking extravagance and waste in the use of filtered water.
