

RUSSIAN FOES OF SOVIET ASK TRADE RENEWAL

Berlin Dispatch Declares Mencheviki Argue Uninterrupted Sway will Bring Quick Downfall of Bolsheviki

BERLIN, (AP)—L. Martoff and B. Abramovitch, leaders in the Russian Mencheviki party opposed to Bolshevism, who arejourning in Berlin, have issued an appeal here in the name of their party, calling on the socialist parties and trade unions of all nations to make a common effort to secure the recognition of soviet Russia, to have the blockade raised and trade relations with the outside world resumed.

The appeal states that the defeat of General Wrangel is not the victory of Bolshevism but the victory of the Russian revolution and the whole Russian people.

The Mencheviki manifesto declares that the Russian people who are fighting communism in his own hamlet nevertheless furnished the government with troops to repulse Wrangel as did also the Russian Social Democratic proletariat, both of whom are determined to have "Russian soil cleared of international and Russian reactionaries."

The manifesto then goes on to say: "The time has now arrived when the question of putting an end to further intervention in Russia is a matter of honor with the people of Europe as well as with the United States."

The call asserts that the quickest way to accomplish the downfall of the present soviet regime is to permit it to be interrupted away, as it will then collapse from within, as a result of its anti-socialistic and Utopian policies, and that the redemption of Russia is only possible by the adoption of an automatic self-government of the Lenin and Trotsky government.

HUNDREDS PAY TRIBUTE TO "UNKNOWN WARRIOR"

Tomb of Unidentified Soldier in Westminster Abbey Scene of Many Touching Instances

LONDON, (AP)—Scores of touching instances have been witnessed at the tomb of Britain's "Unknown Warrior" in Westminster Abbey as long lines of men, women and children have passed the black marble slab covering the grave of an unidentified soldier during the past several days.

The fact that no one knows the name of the man whose body the slab lends many to offer tributes in the hope perhaps that the body is that of a missing son. The mother of one of the thousands of unknown warriors any one of whom might be reposing in Westminster Abbey, laid three war medals, the Mons Star, the Victory medal and the British war medal on the grave as she passed in the line. They had been awarded to her only son who was wounded three times and afterwards reported missing.

A soldier's modest offering of flowers bore the inscription: "In loving memory of my two pals and all the other pals."

The epithet placed on the slab reads: "For King and Country—Greater Love Hath No Man Than This."

BLOCKADE MAKES FIUME CITY WITHOUT LIGHTING

D'Annunzio Stronghold Early in December Shows Effects of Italian Policy

FIUME, (AP)—Fiume early in December had been compelled to dispense with virtually all lights except those of candles because the Italian blockade had stopped the importation of coal. When the Associated Press correspondent arrived here, he found the city in absolute darkness. Railways employees bearing a few lighted candles met the travelers as they alighted from the train from Trieste and escorted them to a small room where the officer, asked the light of a candle examined their passports.

Outside the railway station there were neither porters nor cabs nor was a light to be seen in the streets anywhere. Weighed down with their baggage, the travelers groped their way to the hotel only to find that also in darkness.

LICENSE CLERK WOULD CASE IN ON BRIDEGROOM'S JOY

CHICAGO, (AP)—Because bridegrooms are so full of "joy and hope" they won't object, Robert M. Switzer county clerk, proposes to the finance committee Wednesday that the price of marriage licenses be raised to the same scale as a dog license.

Marriage permits cost \$1.50 and dog licenses \$3.

"I don't see why the fee for a marriage license should not be raised to the dignity of that for a dog license," Mr. Switzer said. "A young man about to be married is so full of joy and hope that I am sure, few if any would object."

DUTCH ACTOR AWARDED DECORATION BY QUEEN

AMSTERDAM, (AP)—Louis Bouwmeester, 78 years old, a Dutch actor of Shakespearean roles, has just been decorated by the Queen of Holland. The honor was bestowed at the celebration of his sixtieth anniversary as an actor.

HUNDREDS OF FISHERMEN LEAVING NEWFOUNDLAND

Failure of Fisheries and Low Price for Product Causes Big Exodus

ST. JOHN'S, N. F., (AP)—Several thousand fishermen have left Newfoundland owing to the comparative failure of the colony's fisheries this year and the low price received for the product. They have gone chiefly to Canada and the United States.

The total catch of herring in the season which ended in the middle of last winter was only about half the average of previous years and, because of renewed competition with Scotch, Dutch and other foreign markets due to the return of peace conditions, the value was greatly reduced. The early spring fishery for cod off the south coast and the seal fishery off the east coast were failures.

The main cod fishery around the coast of the island and Labrador resulted in an estimated catch of 1,200,000 quintals (of 112 lbs.) as against 1,700,000 for last year. The price dropped from \$12 to \$10 a quintal for Newfoundland fish and from \$10 to \$8 for Labrador cod. The decline in prices of cod oil, lobsters, salmon and other subsidiary products has been so great that the fishermen will not receive more than half the amount which they obtained last year.

Another factor tending to emigration is the curtailment in the iron mines, where forces of 3500 have been reduced by one-half. Although the pulp and paper mills are making an exceptionally large cut of wood, they cannot absorb all the men seeking work from them this winter.

GOMPERTS GETS ASSURANCES

State Department Promises Co-operation to Pan-American Federation

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—Samuel Gompers called at the state department Wednesday in his capacity as president of the Pan-American Federation of Labor to ask co-operation of government representatives here and Mexico in connection with the meeting of the federation in Mexico City, January 10. He was desirous, Mr. Gompers said, that the purpose of the meeting "should be to further movement we have inaugurated for the establishment and maintenance of the best relations between the governments and peoples of all the republics of the Western Hemisphere."

"The department assured me of their beneficial assistance," Mr Gompers added.

AMERICANS IN ORIENT SEEK RELIEF FROM TAX

Engage in Campaign to Induce Congress to Make Exception in Matter of Levy Against Income

SIANGHAI, (AP)—American commercial bodies here and American commercial interests generally in China are engaged in a campaign to induce the United States congress to pass a law relieving them from the payment of income tax to the United States treasury.

They have appealed to legislators and members of commercial bodies in the United States to aid them in bringing about the passage by congress of a federal incorporation act for American companies in China which is expected to come before congress in December.

The American business men here have claimed that they are at a disadvantage owing to the fact that the British doing business in China are exempt from payment of an income tax. The Shanghai Chamber of Commerce has sent representatives to Washington to present data to members of congress in support of their appeal.

TWENTY MILLION CHINESE CAUGHT IN FAMINE PINCH

State Department Reports Emphasis on Gravity of Situation in Oriental Provinces

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—State department reports Wednesday emphasized the extreme gravity of the famine situation in the Chinese provinces of Honan, Shantung and Chihli. Many inhabitants were said to be selling their household property for what they could get, while others not so well to do, were subsisting on leaves, acorns and other forage crops.

It was estimated that 20,000,000 were affected and would need outside help for five or six months, until the new crops come in.

Committees have been organized in Peking for distribution of relief funds and it has been proposed to establish certain public works, which will give employment to the hungry refugees.

CHINA AFFORDS NO OPPORTUNITY TO BOLSHEVISM

People Have No Thought of Returning to Manchu Dynasty and are Immune to Communism, Says Foreign Office

PEKING, (AP)—Neither Bolshevism nor monarchism has a chance in China today, in the opinion of Dr. Phillip T'yan, assistant under-secretary in the foreign office, unofficially expressed to the Associated Press. Dr. T'yan, who is a student of international law, refutes "erroneous reports and insipid statements of a damaging nature which have been circulated recently both in China and abroad and which not only mislead public opinion but have a serious repercussion on trade." He writes as follows:

III-Founded But Persistent
"The reports which are most persistent are precisely those which are most ill-founded. One is that a monarchist restoration has actually occurred or is imminent; another that the country not only offers an attractive field for Bolshevism but that an insidious and far-reaching campaign of propaganda is actually raging which will engulf the nation.
"High sports disclose similar ignorance of existing conditions and the whole trend of Chinese thought. The factors which led to the abdication of the Manchu dynasty nearly a decade ago are not only operative today, but have been made a hundred-fold more powerful by natural development and by the march of events throughout the world. It may be said generally that the people at large are not completely accustomed to the republican idea that the conception of a hereditary ruler seems to belong to a remote past.

Challenge to Communism
"As for Bolshevist doctrines, China is probably the last country in the world that need fear what is the nightmare of other nations. Not only is the land all divided into tiny, but small parcels of little deed among tens of millions of cultivators, who comprise seven-tenths of the population, but capitalism in the Russian sense is virtually absent. Chinese society, with its ancient collectivist structure, indeed offers such a serious challenge to Marxian communism that the practice of the latter seems but a half-hearted and elementary. Contact with Bolshevist element along an open land frontier thousands of miles in length, and the continued presence of large Chinese trading communities in Russian towns—when all other foreigners have disappeared—lead to prove that the Chinese are immune and alone of all nations can hold their own in competition with socialism.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., (AP)—A thief snatched a satchel containing \$75,000 in checks and \$6,500 cash from two boy bank messengers today on a street crowded with thousands of Christmas shoppers, and escaped. The boys were Paul Sauer and Andrew Colly, 18 and 19 years old.
A woman solicitor was asking the thief to subscribe to a newspaper when he sprang across the sidewalk, seized the satchel, flung the boys aside, and ran.

NEW JERSEY PUTS BRAKE ON PARDONS AND PARDONS
TRENTON, N. J., (AP)—Because of the "annual number of crimes throughout the country," the court of pardons Wednesday adopted a resolution not to give pardons or paroles for few expiration of minimum sentences for murder, robbery, burglary and like offenses.

RAILROADS RETURNING TO PRE-WAR COMFORTS

Orders Concerning Heating of Trains Indicates Trend of Policy

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. (AP)—Railroads in this territory are returning to pre-war service so far as the comfort of passengers is concerned. The Pennsylvania has issued careful instructions for the heating of cars. Conductors in through service, says an order, must be heated to a temperature between 65 and 70 degrees; in suburban service, 60 to 65. Sleeping cars between 60 p. m. and 6 a. m. must have temperature of about 60; in the day time the temperature in sleeping and parlor cars should range between 65 and 70.

Other orders issued to trainmen include:
"Principal stations at which trains will stop must be announced in all coaches and diners before they leave terminals.
Approaching stations, the name of the station must be announced at least twice.
No baggage will be allowed in the night.
In cold weather doors must not be opened unless passengers are leaving the cars, and not opened before train starts.
Trainmen must not turn seats until arrival at terminal.
Conductors must report all cases where passengers are obliged to stand for the reason thereof.
Conductors must make frequent trips through sleeping cars at night to see that Pullman employes is on guard in each car in service.
Wagon tractors or wagons coupling steel cars must not be placed between steel cars or between steel cars and the engine.
Selling, giving, distributing hotel cards, advertising matter or literature not directly connected with the business of the company, must be prohibited.

MONTANA BECOMES OIL PRODUCER DURING YEAR

Twelve Months' Record Shows Ten Wells Capable of Discharging 12,000 Barrels a Day

GREAT FALLS, Mont., (AP)—The Montana oil industry is a year old and its producing wells, brought in during the past 12 months are capable of producing 12,000 barrels of crude oil daily, according to estimates of operators. The actual production is less than 12,000 barrels daily, however, because all the wells have not been capped and the flow is regulated. The field now developed in Fergus county, about 20 miles southeast of Great Falls, is 20 miles from the railroad and has two pipe lines, both connecting with the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railway at Winnett, Montana. Ten producing wells are in the Fergus county field and nine of them are on a north-west-southeast line two and a half miles long, with the discovery well three miles further east.
It is said that 250 wells were drilled in various parts of Montana prior to the first producer. In the Fergus county field, variously known as the Winnett, the Mosley and the Cat Creek all fields, approximately 50 wells are being drilled at the present time and innumerable companies are being promoted to exploit land.

ONLY GEM STATE NATIVES ON IDAHO FOOTBALL TEAM
MOSCOW, Idaho, (AP)—Coach Thomas Kelly's University of Idaho football warriors are thoroughly and wholly Idahoan from Captain Platino of Pocatello, who weighs in at about 190, down to aggressive little J. R. Gowen, Jr., of Caldwell, who tips the scales at 145. This is the statement of the university athletic department.
Not a single man of the 15 who received the official football "13" for services on the gridiron during 1920 hailed from outside the state and most of the 13 not only were reared within the state, but also were born in Idaho.

BANTAMWEIGHT CROWN IS WON BY JOE LYNCH

New Yorker Outflights Pete Herman in Tilt for Title—Verdict Popular

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, (AP)—Joe Lynch, the little boxer from the west side of Manhattan Island, who jumped into prominence about three years ago as a likely contender for the bantamweight championship of the world from Pete Herman of New Orleans in a 15-round battle at Madison Square Garden, Thursday night, won the bantamweight title in the 15th round. Lynch, who weighed 115 pounds, was called for in the articles of agreement at 2 o'clock in the afternoon but the official weights announced by the state boxing commission when the men entered the ring were 116 pounds for each. Lynch looked the much more drawn of the two men when the bout began, while Herman was in the better condition so far as looks went. Herman was an obvious favorite in what betting was indulged in.
Champ Is Cautious.
Both boys were nervous at the outset. Lynch's advantages of height and reach soon were apparent and excessive caution on the part of Herman was obvious when the men entered the ring to hold his title.
In four of the rounds Herman had the better of the argument but in only one of these had he any decided advantage over Lynch.
In this round he had Lynch in difficulty but that was all. Herman's defense at times was puzzling to the onlooker but whenever he landed one of his long lefts or right hooks or swings, a grip of satisfaction spread over Lynch's countenance while Herman's face denoted that he was afraid of his opponent's wallop.
In the rounds where he had the better of Lynch, Herman took chances. When he did attack he was very successful but these efforts were only spasmodic while Lynch was the aggressor in all the rest of the rounds.
Lynch Is Hardest.
Lynch was slated as he was carried ten rounds. Herman had four and the opening round was just about even. Lynch suffered from a cut lip early in the mill and badly injured the thumb of his right hand during the third round.

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HARRY FRAZEE, BOSTON OWNER, IN NASTY MOOD

Red Sox Master Demands that Ban Johnson Resign; Charges Falsehood

NEW YORK, (AP)—Characterizing (falsehood statements credited to Ban Johnson relative to the elections of the directors of the American league. Harry Frazee, president of the Boston club yesterday in a letter to Mr. Johnson invited him to resign as president of the league and declared there can be no peace while both remain in the American league.
The statements credited to Mr. Johnson and to which Mr. Frazee took exception were:
"The league had always resorted to the ballot instead of using the usual rotation method of the election board of directors when it was found the rotation method would bring an undesirable member to the board," and "It was the sentiment that two members be not brought into the directorate as they attempted to wreck the American league."
"I had hoped that you had learned something in the two past years," Mr. Frazee's letter continued. "And since the agreement of peace was reached in Chicago I have refrained from making any comment but upon this un-

called for attack upon Mr. Comiskey and myself, I think it is about time for you to stop making threats and prove some of the many misleading statements and assertions that you have made, regardless of the attitude of anybody else in the American league. I want you to know that from this time on, there can be no peace as far as I am concerned, while you and I remain in the American league.
"If you have your sense of justice or realization of the harm you have caused baseball, or any regard for the game which has made you possible, you would tender your resignation as president of the American league before causing any further harm."
"If you wish to go into any dispute either privately or publicly, you would tender your resignation as president of the American league since my connection with the American league in 1916, I will be pleased to meet you at any time or place you mention. But in the meantime, I strongly advise you to eliminate any further attacks upon Boston American league club or me personally."

KOREANS MAKE GRAVE CHARGES AGAINST JAPAN

Military Authorities are Accused of Deeds More "Frightful and Barbarous" than Occurrences in Belgium

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP)—A statement charging Japanese military authorities with deeds more "frightful and barbarous" than anything ever alleged to have occurred in Belgium during the war was issued here today by the Korean commission based, the commission said, on authentic reports received by it from Manchuria.

The Japanese punitive expedition sent to the Hanchun district following the clash last November between Japanese troops and Korean insurgents was alleged to have burned 32 villages, "killed all the male inhabitants of the district" and "murdered 145 peaceful inhabitants" in one town, whose one house was burned, it was added, "with women and children inside."

Authentic reports received by the Korean commission in Washington, the statement said, "show a total of 386 non-combatants arrested and executed, of whom 86 were wives and 12 were mothers, who answered 'Osuro Kana' (Good news, my government sent 5000 soldiers on a punitive expedition. The insurgents fled after giving a stubborn fight to the Japanese army).

Deliberately Wreak Vengeance. "That the Japanese soldiers set out deliberately to wreak vengeance upon the peaceful people who stayed at their homes, trusting to the humanity of Japanese officials, and that the punitive expedition was sent to punish only those who took part in the conflict. But the Japanese soldiers put to the torch all the villages in the district, burning them believing that the people were not aggressors.

DR. SKILLIANS TO BE GREEKS' ENVOY IN U. S. Partisan of Constantine Announces His Nomination as Minister at Washington

ATHENS. (AP)—Dr. Skillians, head of the political bureau of the foreign office, said today he had been nominated minister to the United States. He stated that he would go to America early in January, and possibly would be accompanied by the Princess Anastasia, who before her marriage to Prince Christopher of Greece was Mrs. William B. Lewis of New York.

ELLIS ISLAND OFFICIALS PREPARE FOR NEW RECORD CHRISTMAS RUSH

NEW YORK. (AP)—Immigration officials at Ellis Island are preparing for the greatest Christmas rush of immigrants in the history of this port. Special plans have been made to expedite the movement of about 20,000 and 30,000 newcomers during the few days preceding the holidays.

Thousands of immigrants timed their departure from Europe so that they might spend Christmas with relatives at this country, and the immigration authorities have speeded up the inspection machinery to make this possible.
