SEES CHALLENGE TO JAPANESE IN HARDING SPEECH

Japan Times Declares Whole-hearted Meeting of Disarmament Proposal Will Banish Fear of War in Pacific

TOKIO, (AP)—The text of the inaugural address of President Harding was received here this day, and comment on it thus far gives no idea as to its general reception.

The Jiji Shimpo, commenting on President Harding's non-involvement policy, thinks it reveals the intention of the republican administration to stick to the policy of standing outside the league of nations.

"We respect much the United States for a solution of the restriction of armaments, which is a question of grave importance," said the article, "and hope the naval holiday project will be put into speedy execution by the efforts of the new president."

The most striking editorial appears in the English printed Japan Times, which recently was taken over by Countess Shiba, formerly of the Hawaiian Shimpo, who claims to be making the Times the unreflected voice of Japanese public opinion. The Times thinks the inaugural address a direct message to the government and people of Japan, for it declares, it is "hardly possible all the war talk of the past few months in America has left Mr. Harding unaffected."

President Harding, probably the newspaper continues, "hardly the Japan herself, through the war and conquest and desire to put the matter to a test by summoning a conference for the purpose of attaining at least partial disarmament. "If Japan, wholeheartedly, without attempted reservations, meets the American suggestion half way, all fear of war in the Pacific will vanish," the Times asserts. "If Japan hesitates, hints or attempts to secure reservations, the confidence of her naval program, she will bring the possibility, and even the probability, of war very close.

America Must Sacrifice.

America must be willing to make some sacrifice in behalf of the principle of disarmament advocated by President Harding in his inaugural speech, declares the militarist Kokumina Shimbun in commenting on Mr. Harding's address.

"Oftentimes," the newspaper continues, "no power would accept his suggestions. Disarmament must be mutual, and the confidence of the world for peace will oppose it."

Other newspapers here commented more on the controversy regarding the island of Yap than on Mr. Harding's inauguration. It appears to be the consensus of opinion that Japan should insist upon the conditions given her, but should make some concession relative to cable communication. The Nichi Nichi Shimbun interprets America's protest over the island of Yap as another indication of the "dark cloud lowering over relations between Japan and America, and hints evidence for the strengthening of their defenses in the Pacific." It demands that both governments strive to dispel misunderstandings.

In this connection, the Asahi Shimbun of Osaka says America's insist upon freedom of communication in the Pacific should be reported by Japan.

EARLY SPRING STARTS FARM WORK CLEVELAND HAS MODERN MILK PLANT

Ranchers Have Been Tilling Soil for Past Ten Days — Ground in Receptive Condition for Planting — William Cleveland Builds \$5,000 House and Immense Barn — Sanitary Processes for Handling Milk

Due to advanced spring weather early season work on farms in the immediate district of Twin Falls, is at least ten days ahead of the average in this district, according to statements of farm operators. For more than a week plowing and harrowing has been under way, and it is expected that planting of heavy seeds will be started in another week.

Land reclamation, agriculturalists accustomed to working Twin Falls district soil say, is in a particularly receptive mood this spring for working and planting; moisture in earth for immediate needs and it is said to have penetrated to a depth equally as great as any of the records of the tract itself. Farmers, generally speaking, are doing work now that should have been accomplished last fall, but which was delayed on account of the early rains and settling in of cold weather following autumn period.

Farmers Optimistic.

A tour of the farming country near Twin Falls gives the opinion of land owners and their great faith in the future of the country. Building improvements on many places last year even with material prices at top level, were numerous and of varied nature. Some of the improvements were in out-buildings, while others were residences constructed to replace the pioneer buildings that had served as homes for tenants and owners since the country was opened to farming. In all instances modern structures have been erected, with the plans covering modern conveniences in installation.

One of the noteworthy instances of up to date farm home construction is found on the William Cleveland place six miles south. Here an eight room structure, that would be a credit to any city, has been erected at a cost of \$5000. The building is large, commodious and imposing. It stands with a southern exposure and its plans include furnace heating, hot and cold running water and electricity.

Puts Up Great Barn.

In addition to the house Mr. Cleveland has constructed a monster dairy barn, capable of supporting stalls for 25 head of cattle. The building is modestly equipped with devices for caring for cattle, and is considered by experts one of the best structures of the sort in the district. Its floor and supporting walls are of well concrete, the walls rising seven feet high and on which rest the frame superstructure. The stalls and partitions are of steel, the latter being James patent which have a flexible setting permitting considerable action for the animals they hold. This building cost something more than \$2000 to construct. A silo erected \$450 was built last year.

Mr. Cleveland also has a complete milkhouse, in which is located a force pump drawing water from the deep well. The farm yard is so arranged as to provide ample drainage at all periods of the year.

At the present time Mr. Cleveland is milking 44 tested cows of high grade. Most of these are Holsteins, although a few are Jerseys in the herd. The animals are producing 100 gallons of milk each day. Separated cream is being shipped to the Portland market. Mr. Cleveland sets the average cost to him of each dairy animal on his place at \$150. Some of these are registered cattle. Surplus milk is being fed to hogs, while there is a small herd of Poland Chinas and Durocs on the place.

The operator of the farm points with a great deal of pride to the result of a test of milk, recently made by the state chemist, which shows 4.2 per cent butter fat and only 1,245 bacteria per c. cream, according to his test run 24.9 per cent in butter fat and only 3,177 bacteria per centimeter. The water test shows practically a pure flow. These tests were made in past few weeks by Jessie Godfrey, state bacteriologist. These reports are supported by later tests made by Dr. J. F. Coughlin of Twin Falls, copies of which are in possession of Mr. Cleveland.

There is ample indication in all details of the dairy section of adoption and practice of sanitation measures. Before milking the cows are well brushed, special attention being paid to the udders and milk veins. Sanitary covered pails are used, the streams of milk passing through fine cheese cloth into the pails. Straining is done through two folds of white cotton flannel. Plans are being made for installation of further modern equipment for handling and cooling milk, and for a steam heater to provide hot water for washing utensils.

AMERICA'S NEW NAVY ENTERS ON TRIAL TESTS

Command Faces Near Crisis with Almost Entirely Green Personnel in Joint Maneuvers Off Central America.

CALLAO, Peru. (AP)—America's new navy entered on its first period of test operations today at the Atlantic and Pacific fleet maneuvers...

With an almost entirely green personnel with something like 75 per cent of the crew, the fleet commander, Admiral Clegg, has decided against further diamond activity...

The difficult problem, however, according to staff officers, was met in a highly satisfactory manner. The men fulfilled the American tradition of an efficient "young" navy, and after a few days of uncertainty, the result of the maneuver was much of its old-time, previous.

Virtually every ship in the fleet of 40 straggled a "Neptune pants" when the fleet crossed the equator. Davy Jones and his assistant, Peg Leg, marched from the deck, and the other 100 or so were roared and warned all those who were crossing the line for the first time to appear at 8 a. m. the following morning before old King Neptune.

While the fleet wallowed at a standstill shortly after 10 a. m., the men and his entourage appeared all in costume. There was the old sea king himself with hemp whiskers and a two-pointed crown, Miss Columbia, Davy Jones, Dr. Pills, Aphrodite and court jesters, barbers, police and sea dogs.

There were speeches and then the acts of homage were rendered. A dose of salts from a squid cone, a mouthful of seaweed and a full of strange medicinal phrases.

Then the initiates were given a diploma decorated with mermaids, fish and other nautical symbols, and a full of strange medicinal phrases.

At 11 a. m. the fleet sailed for the westward in the thousands of naval recruits who are having their first taste of sea life.

Between different groups on each ship and elimination contests for the inter-ship-a-ship contest of the fleet are the chief features of this routine since the cruise began.

School Directors Hear Strong Pleas for Appointment of M. C. Mitchell to Become Superintendent of District

The board of independent district No. 1 had its first meeting at Monday night's session some 15 or 20 visitors on hand to voice their interest in the matter of a choice of superintendent. Brief addresses were made by Mrs. J. H. Seaver, Mrs. M. H. Prosser, Mrs. J. C. Porterford, John Clark, W. E. Seaver and others, all in favor of the appointment of M. C. Mitchell. At the conclusion of the remarks Senator J. H. Seaver asked for an informal vote on the nomination of Mitchell. Mr. Mitchell yielded to a 100 per cent approval of his selection. Later in the evening Mr. Mitchell appeared before the board and announced his willingness to be regarded as an applicant for the position on the basis of a two-year contract at an salary of \$4000 for the first year and \$4500 for the second year, the contract to contain a provision that if no funds were available for the first year the salary the contract would lapse automatically.

Motion Falls to Carry. It was moved by Mrs. Scott and seconded by George C. Davis that the proposition of Mr. Mitchell be accepted forthwith which motion failed to carry. Messrs. Clark, Nixon and Dico opposing their vote and the employment of a new superintendent until such time as it can be shown whether or not money for the operation of the school will be available.

Members of the board expressed themselves as being very much pleased to the employment of Mr. Mitchell but announced their willingness to take any steps of a definite nature with respect to the payment of the bill because of the general uncertainty with respect to school finances, a condition highlighted by the fact that up to that time the bill designed to correct this situation had not been signed by the governor.

Senator J. H. Seaver outlined the status of house bill No. 121, pointing out that while the governor had not up to that time actually signed the measure there was good ground to believe that the bill would eventually be signed. Mr. Seaver also gave an interesting account of the passage of the measure and the measures and the steps taken to bring about certain action with respect to measures which had already received thorough attention and had been disposed of on their merits in the ordinary course of legislation. He closed his remarks with the statement that he had not had the time to do so but he hoped he would have seen enough to stay there. BIBLE STUDENTS HER PURPOSE LIBRARY WINS LAUDATION FOR HIGH ECONOMY

Two Hundred and Fifty Representatives of Various Churches in Twin Falls Gather for First Meeting of Mammoth Christianity Promotion Association—Minister Outlines Urgent Needs and Laymen Plead for More "Sunshine"

"Sunshine" and "Buffy for the Advancement of Moral Matters" were the watchwords of a monster acquaintance meeting held in the Presbyterian church last night. Nearly 250 persons were present, being addressed by 6:30 by the United Men's Bible class. The speaker drew out one room men representing a half dozen of the church denominations in Twin Falls for the purpose of discussing the subject of moral matters in the community. It assembled men in an acquaintance and fellowship session who were held in each other in a way that was an opportunity for all to learn of the things going on in the community. The speaker outlined the need for greater optimism in moral uplift as well as in the commercial and industrial life of the city of Twin Falls, and urged the need for a more vigorous expression of his thoughts and ideas for the benefit of man. It was a pledge assembly too, in which an audience subscription was taken to the support of the work confronting the union and for the advancement of Christianity in the community. A. W. Leece was chairman and toastmaster in charge.

To Elect Officers. Opening the program following the election of the chairman, Jesse stated the object of the meeting was to organize a tentative program for future operations. On next Sunday, he said, each denomination will be invited to send a representative to the next meeting, which will be held at the home of the official staff of the union.

The principal address of the occasion was given by the Rev. E. L. White, pastor of the First Methodist church. He said the city has a moral problem which has appeared before a gathering of men mixed from varied congregations, and he proposed a number of questions for solution, and stated numerous problems that conditions had developed in the city.
