

HARDING URGES ASSISTANCE IN FAMINE RELIEF

Appeals to American People to "Do Everything in Their Power" Toward Betterment of Conditions in China

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—An appeal to the American people to "do everything" in their power towards the relief of famine conditions in China was issued today by President Harding.

"At this, the hardest practicable moment of my administration, and the president's statement, I desire to add my own to the many appeals which have been issued heretofore in behalf of the suffering people of a large section of China.

Means at Hand Inadequate.

"I am informed that the American committee, and the church and other organizations co-operating with it, have already relieved several millions of dollars to the American and international relief committees in China and that already a great relief work has been accomplished. Nevertheless, my information is that the means thus far placed at the command of these organizations are entirely inadequate to take the relief work forward.

"The picture of China's distress is so tragic that I am moved therefore to renege the appeals heretofore made and to express the hope that the American people will continue to contribute to this humanitarian cause as generally as they possibly can.

Kindred by Friendly Ties.

"The cry for succor comes to us from a people far distant, but linked to us by manifold ties of friendly association, confidence and good will. The American nation has never failed to demonstrate its friendship for the people of China and that friendship has always been reciprocated in a manner which I feel justifies the hope that in this hour of China's distress our people will do everything in their power for its amelioration."

CHILDREN HEAVY SUFFERERS IN FAMINE STRICKEN ZONE

NEW YORK, (AP)—Two hundred and seven children have been sold, three abandoned and one killed by their famine-stricken parents in the province of Chihli, northern China, according to a dispatch received here today by the American committee for the China famine fund.

These figures, the report says, were the result of a famine survey made in 77 villages of the province, which included more than 10,000 persons were found destitute.

Prebendary of St. Paul's Cathedral Calls Exclusion of Clergymen Monstrous.

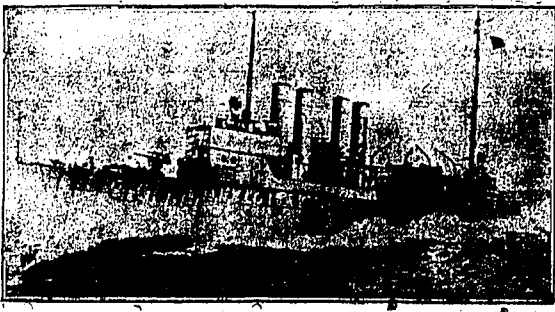
LONDON, (AP)—The Rev. Dr. Gough, prebendary of St. Paul's cathedral, protested in an address he delivered recently against the exclusion of clergymen from the British parliament. He pointed out that to be eligible for parliament they would first have to give up the church.

It was monstrous, said Dr. Gough, that a country calling itself democratic, should stipulate that a man should give up his calling if he wanted to serve his country. It was putting the clergy in the same category as the only two other classes barred from parliament—criminals and lunatics, he declared.

Dr. Gough intimated that in his opinion clergymen were quite as well qualified to be legislators as lawyers. The whole training of the legal mind, he said, was against the development of the creative faculty so necessary in the making of laws.

HALF OF SHANG HAI'S SILK STORES BURNING

Closing of More Spinning Establishments and Cancellation of Many Contracts Seems Inevitable

SHANGHAI (AP)—Several silk warehouses, containing over half of the amount of silk available for export in this city, were burned here today, the loss being estimated at \$5,000,000. Seven other warehouses took fire and are still burning. Should their loss be complete, the damage will reach \$10,000,000, it is estimated.

The destruction of silk cocoons stored in the warehouses will enforce the closing of most of the spinning establishments here until the new crop in May. Cancellation of many contracts in silk is considered inevitable.

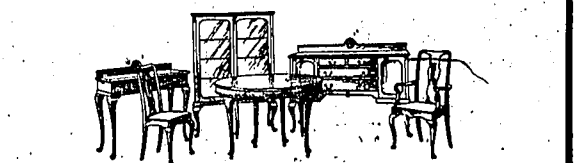

INDIAN CREEK BURIAL GROUND

Shadows of Old Tanks and Towers Play Over Last Resting Place of Chiefs

OKMULGEE, Okla., (AP)—Reverent civilization is crowding that the old Creek burial grounds in the northern part of the city—some that contain the remains of many of the famous old chiefs that roamed the prairies of the Indian territory before civilization lent its advances to the trader that are now pushing it into the back ground.

The cemetery, now located near the old refinery of Okmulgee, has been gone by the national burial grounds of the Creek tribe. In those days the country was watched over and cared for as are the larger burial places of the country today. But now, the burial ground is becoming different, the tombstones and markings are broken and scattered.

Roots of the graves are unmarked, and many of them have been lost in the new building. The old designs of the coverings are decayed and fallen, the larger stone boxes which in some cases were used as caskets, being the only tablets of the dead to withstand the waste of years.

LONDON, (AP)—A wreath presented by the American Society of Boston, was among the dozen floral tributes laid on the tomb of Charles Dickens in Westminster Abbey this afternoon when exercises were held in commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the author's birth.

The exercises were conducted by Edwin Drew, a Dickens devotee, and there was a sprinkling of Americans among the score of persons gathered in the poet's corner of the Abbey during the ceremony.

The presentation of the wreath by the Boston club was a recognition of the custom followed for many years before the world war.

Following the services at the tomb, there was a luncheon at the "Cheerful Cheese" and to the Cork Tavern in Fleet street, spots often frequented by Dickens.

The Dickens anniversary was celebrated by several other gatherings in various parts of the city.

NICARAGUA CANAL IS NEGOTIATIONS SUBJECT

Costa Rica Takes Up Claim for Compensation from America for Acquiescing in Treaty

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, (AP)—Negotiations between the governments of Costa Rica and the United States relative to efforts by the former to secure compensation for its acquiescence in the treaty for the construction of an inter-oceanic canal through Nicaragua have begun, it is said, in advices received here from San Jose.

A protocol by which the two countries agreed to enter into negotiations, should it be found necessary to accomplish the construction and provide for the ownership and control of such a canal, was signed on December 1, 1914.

Several amendments to the original bill, which passed the house several weeks ago, were considered, the chief being the reduction in the pension from \$60 to \$30 a month.

Children Excluded.

Court convened at 9:15, 15 minutes late, and the crowded room was again cleared of children less than 16 years of age.

He said he saw no bruises on Clara's face or hands.

Paster also testified on cross-examination that Clara had been at the house she was planning to go to in Oklahoma.

SAYS HAMON WAS SOBER. W. B. Nichols, former chief of police of Oklahoma City, now in the oil business, said he was in Hamon's office on the afternoon preceding the evening on which Hamon was shot, that he had two drinks and Hamon then told him that Hamon was going to take the officers two hours before he was shot.

Mr. Nichols said Mr. Hamon showed the suit he had intruded on Hamon at the presidential inauguration, March 4. He said after he heard Hamon had been in time to see Hamon ordered Mr. Nichols identified a 25-caliber steel bullet as similar to one taken from Hamon's body. The inference was that it was the fatal bullet and it was admitted as evidence.

Quotes Frank Ketch.

"Now, Clara, Mrs. Hamon is coming from Chicago and she has not yet left here," Mr. Nichols quoted Frank Ketch, Hamon's business manager, as saying to Clara after his shooting.

"Clara, I understand you are in your affairs here, but I am now no more disgrace for the Hamon family."

Describes Shooting.

On Tuesday Mr. Nichols said Mr. Hamon told him he had been fatally shot. "But she got me," he quoted Hamon as having said.

He quoted Hamon as having said he was lying down for a rest when Clara came to him, put her hand on his head and went into his body. He said Hamon said he threw up his arm, but not late.

"Let's call it an accident," Nichols said Hamon quoted Clara as saying after he had disarmed her and searched on the floor for the weapon he had picked from her hand after he was shot.

Nichols said he tried to buoy up Hamon and told him they had to go to the beach. He said Hamon said that where he was going there would be plenty of junks but no beach.

On cross-examination, Mr. Nichols said Hamon told him he had been shot while in his own room.

Explains Defeat.

W. P. McLean, "of the defense," brought out that Mr. Nichols had not told Cliff Garrison of the defense counsel Brown about Jake Hamon's alleged dying statement. He said Hamon executed a promise from them he would reveal the statement so as to protect the name of Mrs. Hamon and their two children.

Mr. Nichols said while at a hospital Hamon talked rationally. He said Hamon, however, would say "what's the use; I'm going to die." He said persons seeking appointments both before and after that, when he realized he was going to die, Hamon asked him to go direct to Yank Hamilton "to have some friends taken care of."

ALLEGED SHOOTING OF WOMAN BY HAMON TO BE REVEALED

MUSKOGEE, Okla., (AP)—Dr. C. V. Rice, a Muskogee physician, will be called as a witness for the defense in the trial of Ardmore, Okla., of Clara Smith Hamon, charged with the slaying of Jake L. Hamon. It was made known today in a communication from Charles Conkley, Dr. Rice's counsel. According to Mr. Conkley, Dr. Rice will testify to dressing wounds alleged to have been inflicted on Clara Hamon by Jake L. Hamon aboard a train in this city four years ago.

DENY CHURCHES PROPERTY RIGHT

Mexican Government Agents Institute Suits Against the Catholic Clergy

MEXICO CITY, (AP) — Representatives of the Mexican government have brought suits in the states of Oaxaca, Michoacan and Jalisco, to bring under federal control church property which is alleged to belong to the Catholic clergy in violation of the Mexican constitution. Under the constitution the Catholic clergy are not allowed to own or administer church property.

It is alleged that the property owned by the Catholic clergy has been placed in the hands of lay societies, which, in reality, are acting for the clergy. It is said that numerous other similar actions are contemplated to divest these alleged societies of property the value of which is estimated in millions of pesos.

The actions just brought are based on the precedent set by the Mexican supreme court in its decision in January last in the case against the Society of Piety whose holdings in the state of Puebla valued at more than 20,000,000 pesos was ordered to be returned to the Mexican government. The supreme court in that case ruled that the Society of Piety was controlled by the Catholic clergy.

FOUR AMERICAN BAITERS REPORTED KILLED IN TAMPECO

TAMPECO, (AP) — Four baiters, said to be American, were killed in Tampico yesterday, according to newspaper dispatches received here today. Up to noon the United States embassy here had received no word of the killing other than the newspaper advices.

The men who were part of the crew of the Norwegian ship Cason, were attacked as they were leaving the harbor by five masked men in another launch, the press dispatches say. The bodies have not been recovered.

PLANS FOR SEPARATION OF REBEVY BANK CONSIDERED

WASHINGTON, (AP) — Plans for the separation of the federal reserve banking system from the treasury department, which includes abolition of the office of comptroller of the currency, were discussed today, with President Harding by Chairman McMillan of the house banking committee. Legislation designed to bring about these changes, Mr. McMillan said, will be considered at the special session of congress.

PROFESSOR AIRS VIEWS UPON FALLING IN LOVE

Dr. Halbert H. Britan Tells Bates College Students Principal Reason Why People Yield to Cupid's Darts Is Because It Is the Natural Thing To Do

LEWISTON, Me., (AP) — The why and wherefore of falling in love, as explained by Dr. Halbert H. Britan, professor of philosophy, to students of Bates college are quite simple.

"The principal reason why people fall in love is because they are so constituted, both physically and mentally that it is the normal, the natural susceptibility of the individual and the stimulus that calls forth the mental reaction."

"Awakening of true affection is compared in this professor's love story to the preparing and combustion of high power explosives. "In love, nature has prepared the element, combined them through countless years and guarantees the result when some vision of loveliness, some heroic deed or even some insignificant word or act unlocks the stored up energy of the emotional life."

"There is not one, single formula for arousing love. Just as anger or fear, for example, may be excited by a wide variety of circumstances and conditions, so love is capable of being awakened by stimuli equally diverse. A beautiful face by no means has the power often assigned to it. It is by no means indispensable nor does it add noticeable to the intensity of the affection felt for its owner. In many beauty is almost wholly subordinate to other attractions."

Dr. Britan puts little faith in love at first sight.

As a summary of the several ages of susceptibility in love Dr. Britan said: "After twenty, individual remarks will hardly serve to focus attention and to awaken interest; after that, the retirement of prolonged experience has settled over the student and often so solidified, that yet feels will seldom suffice to break through to the ecstatic beating of the human nature. After this age, falling in love is no longer a matter of instinct. Common sense, good judgment, a true perspective of life tend to discount the enthusiasm and exaggerations of love's young days and demands a firmer basis for the happiness to be won."

LITTLE TIME NEEDED TO KEEP LABOR DATA

Records Often Are Means of Saving Working Costs.

Farmer Enabled to Determine Number of Days of Man and Horse Power Necessary to Produce an Acre of Any Crop.

A record kept of farm labor does not require much time, yet it is often the means of saving labor costs. The labor records show just how much labor and team work is required on each crop and the time in the season when it is used. They should show what proportion of the labor is devoted to work that produces an acre and the amount that is consumed on odd jobs of unproductive tasks. This will enable the farmer to determine the number of days of man and horse labor necessary to produce an acre of any crop, or the cost of any class of animals for a year says the United States Department of Agriculture. Thus he may be able to rearrange his system of management so that he can get along with less labor and at the same time maintain production.

A year's labor records show also just how much man power and horse power is necessary to run the entire farm at different seasons, and point out accurately just when the rush seasons occur. With such records before him, the farmer knowing approximately what his labor requirements will be in advance of the rush season. He is able to increase or decrease the difference between expenses and fit them together until he has outlined a complete year's work with an even load of labor for the entire season.

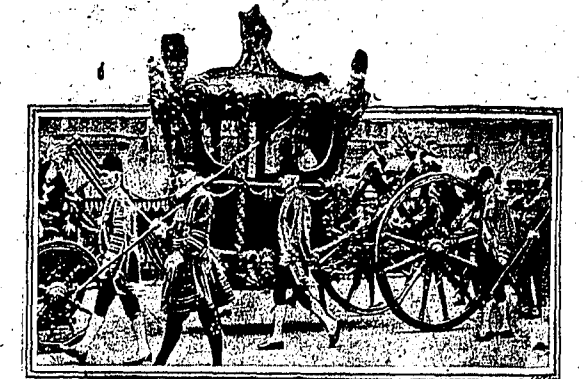
