

WINTER MOVEMENT SENDS MORE TO BOOK SHELVES

Drift from the Moving Picture Theatres to Public Library Accompanies Wage Cuts and Lack of Work in New York

NEW YORK, (AP)—Unemployment and lower wages are serving to make New York increasingly literary. A drift from the moving picture theatres seems perceptible.

These are the statements which come from officials of the city's public libraries, who declare that a new phenomenon has been observed—crowding of library attendants who during hours as well as during the afternoon and evening.

The recent rapid increase in the patronage of the branch libraries is attributed chiefly to unemployment and to lower wages.

Time Brings Proof The two years preceding last October have been marked by a steady demand for books at the libraries, although the normal increase continued as the main branch. Library officials have been forced to buy new editions for this situation.

It is interesting in any public utility service in New York that it should be overdone before it is ready to meet the demand of the library officials. It seems to be impossible to provide book service beyond the saturation point.

Wear and Tear Increases So great has been the demand for books at the branches with the result that wear and tear that the total of the volumes in the 44 branches in Manhattan, the Bronx and the high school buildings of the New York Public Library is actually decreasing.

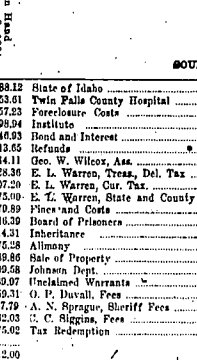

LEAF BLISTER RITE CAUSES DAMAGE APPLE TREE FOLIAGE UNDER ATTACK

Department of Agriculture Tells of Serious Injury Being Wrought in Many Orchards Throughout the State, and Gives Rollback Remedy and Method of Control

The foliage of apple trees is becoming so seriously damaged in many of the orchards that it has caused numerous inquiries to be sent to the University of Idaho concerning the trouble. The injury is caused, says Mr. Claude Wakeland, extension entomologist, by a very small mite, and he further describes briefly the mite, the injury it causes and tells how to combat it.

Nature of Injury. The presence of the leaf blister mite in an orchard is first made known to the grower by the appearance of the foliage of his apple or pear tree. In the spring, very soon after the first small leaves have unfolded, "ring-bloss" or pale green blister-like spots may be noticed, which at first are very small but which later grow in size and number until they cover the entire surface of the greater portion of the leaves. As the season progresses, these blister-like patches become more numerous and orange color but more often become brick red or brown, assuming a wrinkled, matted appearance, and the affected leaf tissue becomes brittle and droops. Heavily infested trees may lose their foliage early and whole orchards assume a brown dead or barren appearance. The effect of mites on the leaf tissue, often resulting in the loss of foliage, causes an interruption in the food-making processes of the trees and it is not uncommon that heavily infested trees will set but few fruit buds for the succeeding year. Another harmful effect of the mites is to induce the formation of thickened, distorted scales of the fruit and the galls formed mostly around the calyx end of the fruit.

How Mites Live and Work. Individual mites measure, on an average, about one one-hundredth of an inch in length and are so small that they are visible except by the use of a hand lens or a microscope. They pass the winter beneath the bud scales often being so numerous that when a scale is removed they may be easily observed as a red or pink spot. When the buds begin to swell in the spring the mites become active and soon after the leaves unfold they bore through the underleaf of the leaves, where they deposit their eggs. These hatch inside the leaves and many generations of mites are produced each year, all winter long, except for a winter of diapause, often resulting in the loss of foliage. This activity of mites within the leaves results in the blister-like swellings already described.

Adult mites may vary in color from whitish to pale green and at various shades of pink. They have but two pairs of legs. Except for size, the young bear a close resemblance to the adults. Eggs are described as whitish, translucent, globular and are deposited within the galls or blisters.

A Reliable Method of Control. The leaf blister mite is readily controlled on apple trees by the use of standard lime-sulphur solution. Application should be made at the beginning of the time when buds are swelling and before the leaves have unfolded. This lime-sulphur solution applied at this time is also effective in killing San Jose scale and one thorough application at the time mentioned will control both pests. Standard lime-sulphur solution, testing 22 degrees or 33 degrees Baumé is used in the dilution of one gallon to eight gallons of water. For persistent blights that every branch, twig and bud be covered thoroughly with the dilute solution. One thorough application usually reduces numbers of leaf blister mites sufficiently so that it will not become a pest again for several years. It must be especially emphasized that there is one right time for applying lime-sulphur solution for control of the leaf blister mite and that is in the spring at the time the buds are swelling. As the mites work within the leaf tissues during the growing season, there is no known method of killing them at that time. Lime-sulphur applied earlier in the season or during the winter will not so successfully control leaf blister but will kill San Jose scale. The advantage of the colored spray, as mentioned, is evident, for by its use both these pests may be controlled by a single application of lime-sulphur.

New Artificial Silk. Animal muscular fiber is the peculiar material of an artificial silk. The cementing material is dissolved away, and the separated fiber is then straightened in a suitable liquid. Fibers several inches long are said to have been obtained. These are woven into the usual way, and, if desired, the fabric may be waterproofed by impregnation with rubber. Such silk is claimed to be not very expensive, and adapted for such purposes as insulation and ball-turret cloth.

Section 3. A taxing district may borrow money for the purpose of meeting current expenses, interest and sinking funds on bonds and for other lawful corporate purposes, not in excess of 50 per cent of the unexpended tax for the current year, issuing therefor negotiable notes or bonds of such tax-district bearing interest at the lowest rate obtainable not exceeding seven per cent per annum.

Section 4. In the event that such notes or bonds are issued prior to the annual tax levy for the year in which such indebtedness is contracted, the amount so levied shall not exceed 75 per cent of the tax revenue for the preceding year, and there shall be added to the annual levy a tax sufficient to pay the same at maturity.

Section 5. In the event that the revenues in any one year are insufficient through delinquency or uncollectibility of taxes or other causes, to pay when due all lawful debts of such tax-district which have been or may hereafter be contracted, such taxing district shall, in addition to other levies now provided by law, levy in the next succeeding year a tax sufficient to pay all of said lawfully contracted indebtedness, and may borrow as provided in this act in anticipation of such tax to pay any such lawfully contracted indebtedness.

Section 6. In the event that any portion of this act shall be held unconstitutional, the remaining portions of the act shall not be affected by such decision.

Section 7. An emergency existing thereafter, this act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and approval.

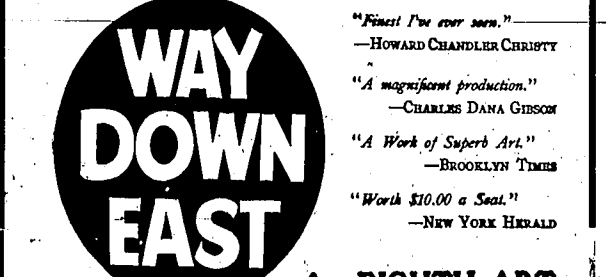

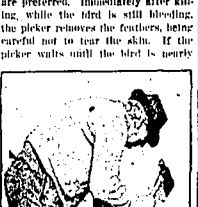

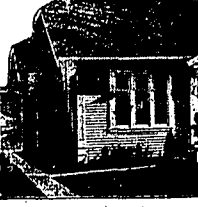

BILL OF SENATE CONSIDERATION

Measure Discussed with View to Taking Advantage of Financial Elasticity

The city council, in session last night devoted some time to study of senate bill No. 253 as passed by the sixteenth session of the legislature.

As contrasted by the council, this measure authorizes two methods of borrowing: 1. It provides that the city may borrow up to 90 per cent of the amount due the city in unpaid taxes, and in the second place that borrowing may be extended "to pay when the all lawful debts which may have been or may hereafter be contracted."

Discussion of this measure followed statement of City Treasurer Frank E.
