EMERGENCY REVENUE BILL IS VETOED BY GOVERNOR DAVIS

Refuses to Approve Senate Bill No. 255 Which Would Have Permitted All Taxing Bodies to Borrow on Uncollected Taxes and to Pay Lawful Debts when Due; Calls the Proposed Practice Unsafe

BOISE, (Special to The News)—Governor Davis yesterday vetoed senate bill No. 255, according to statement of F. W. Brown, secretary to the governor.

This bill was introduced by Senator J. H. Sawyer of Twin Falls county, calling to summary interpretation placed upon its provisions it would have permitted municipalities, school districts and other taxing bodies to borrow on 50 per cent of annual tax-collected taxes, and to make further borrowing in any year when such local debts which may have been or may hereafter be contracted.

The governor raised two objections to the bill. He held in the first place that the use of the words "contracted" where obviously the word "collected" was intended would have invalidated the provisions on broader grounds, he said.

"I am not inclined to believe that it is sound for all taxing bodies to finance themselves by the particular way. I believe that in many cases securities in the form of taxpayers' certificates would not be made and that they would not therefore be unsafe."

The governor, according to Mr. Brown's judgment, to the opinion that errors or inefficiency in bookkeeping in some of the municipalities had given rise to complications and that removal of restrictions upon tax laying power might cause excessive expenditure of public funds.

CHICAGO BOMB MAKER IS FORMER SALT LAKE MAN

CHICAGO, (AP)—Search of the room of Elmer Adams, reportedly wounded last night by his own bomb, disclosed today the name of a member of a chauffeur's union in Salt Lake City in 1918 and a quantity of tools and other articles. Both his legs were broken and he was confined to bed for several weeks.

The report of the explosion, which occurred last far from the station of a taxi-cab, caused the attention of the police to be directed to the fact that the bomb was believed to be made against the taxi-cab company's station last night.

American Red Cross Worker is Quoted in Melsingfors Dispatch on Situation at Center of Attack on Petrograd

TROTZKY CALLS TALK OF UPRISING SILLY FICTION

COPENHAGEN, (AP)—Fifty thousand men have been gathered at the Russian fortress at Kronstadt, and this number is increasing rapidly, says a Helsingfors dispatch quoting an American Red Cross worker who has just arrived there from Kronstadt.

An organization of Russian emigrants in this city has been informed in a wireless dispatch that Kronstadt is receiving necessary provisions and has sufficient ammunition for five years.

Victor M. Teleroff, who is minister of agriculture in the Kerensky cabinet in 1917, was quoted by the counter-revolution, it is declared by the Politburo.

With regard to Russian gold exported from Russia as payment for imports, the British government does not expect the Soviet claim that such gold should be regarded as immune from seizure to pay British claims. The agreement covers this as a matter to be settled by ordinary court procedure.

The arrangement of the Soviet government is termed the "government of the Russian socialist federal soviet republic."

Planned Resident of Montana Announces Retirement from Federal Post

BUTTE, Mont. (AP)—After a service of 21 years in the internal revenue office in Butte, Clinton H. Moore, stamp clerk, has announced his retirement. TESTIMONY IN HANSON TRIAL COMES TO END

Hints of Threatened Violence Against Accused Woman and Against Prosecution Brought to Light

ARDMORE, Okla., (AP)—Introduction of testimony in the trial of Clara Smith Hanson for the alleged murder of Colonel Jake L. Hanson, republican national commissioner from Oklahoma and national man, ended at 10:30 o'clock this morning. Court was recessed until 3 p. m. to permit Judge Thomas W. Chapman to prepare his instructions to the jury.

Each side was allotted five hours for arguments, and it was said that if the court had prepared his charge by the time court reconvened they will be gotten under way immediately.

Charges on Three Points.

The court will charge the jury on three points: Murder, which, upon conviction would carry a term of death or life imprisonment; first degree manslaughter, the sentence for which upon conviction would be from four years to life imprisonment; and second degree manslaughter, with a minimum fine of \$1.

S. Price Freeling, state attorney general, in charge of the prosecution, said that H. H. Brown, special prosecutor, would make the opening argument and that he would close for the state.

Threats of Violence.

There were numerous reports about the county building, this morning of threats made against state counsel and the jurors should a verdict of guilty be returned against Clara Hanson: Sheriff Buck Garrett said, however, that no such reports had reached him, with one exception, that of a letter written to a member of the defense counsel in which a warning was made of possible violence to the defendant should she be acquitted.

H. H. Brown, special prosecutor, said threats had reached him, but that he would not go into details.

ONLY DESIGNATED LANDS TO GET WATER ON SALMON

State Reclamation Commission Makes Restrictive Order Permanent

W. G. Swendsen, state commissioner of reclamation, Tuesday issued an order making permanent a previous order of the reclamation department whereby the Salmon River Canal company was directed to restrict the delivery of water from its canal system to lands included in the patented area and designated specifically in what is known as the Whiffen report.

Tuesday's order is based subsequent to a public hearing held here last Wednesday for the purpose of considering the temporary ruling. The commissioner declares that attorneys who appeared at the hearing in behalf of certain parties at interest had not filed briefs within the five day limit given for this purpose, and, in respect to protests made by individual entrants, the commissioner continues that the matters offered in the said protests, to-wit: settlement with the said company, are matters that must be adjusted by the respective parties and not by the reclamation department. In the event of failure to effect such settlements satisfactorily, the state or this department is without jurisdiction, but the relief available to the said entrants, if any they have appears to be in an action for damages against the said company."

VITRIOL-LIME METHOD REDUCES WHEAT LOSSES

Losses caused by stinking smut in California were reduced to about 1 per cent on a wheat crop of 9,840,000 bushels in 1920 by treating seed by the bluestone-lime method. The state college of agriculture estimates that stinking smut has caused losses ranging from four hundred thousand to five hundred thousand bushels annually. In 1918 the loss was estimated at 5.8 per cent of the total crop.

County agents in 1918 began advising and demonstrating the bluestone-lime treatment for the control of this smut as recommended by the United States department of agriculture. These treatments brought such encouraging results that seed treatment has since become quite general. In 1920 losses were reduced to about two hundred thousand bushels. It is conservatively estimated, on the basis of \$1.50 per bushel for wheat, that demonstration on wheat smut control gives by this county agents in California resulted in a saving of \$300,000 for the farmers of that state last year.

A VIGILANT LESSON... Probably the climax has been reached. In all likelihood the remaining days of the trial of one Clara Smith for murder will lack to some extent, in the usual details which have provided an object lesson in immorality so recent as to weigh in the annals of crime in many years past.

NO MORE FLITTY LESSON IN CRIMINALITY... The more objectionable and indecent scenes have lately been for the education and amusement of young men and women. No moving picture of crime ever flashed on a public screen in America has been better calculated to break down the artificial force of happy home life than the unrelenting chilling of the details of a trial which, among clear thinking people, are at least unmentionable.

AT A TIME WHEN THE BEST THOUGHT OF THE NATION IS TURNED IN THE DIRECTION OF MORAL REFORM... Nobody pretends to believe that young men and women are actually compelled to emulate crime by reason of the suggestion contained in improper pictures or unclean stories. But to put up for public entertainment the details of a breach of morals could not even be discussed by decent men and women is certainly not doing much in the way of discouragement. To send people's thoughts into channels where decent conversation cannot follow is to set in motion a force which has only evil to recommend it.

IDENTITY OF LAW UPHOLD... In sentencing Alexander M. Howat and five other leaders of the coal miners of Kansas to one year in jail and payment of costs, Judge Andrew W. Curran, sitting in Pittsburg, Kan., vindicated the law which was repudiated by the defendants.

HOWAT, AS PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED MINERS WORKERS OF KANSAS, HAS REPEATEDLY shown his contempt for the laws of the state and defied the courts to compel him to obey the law which forbids strikes or lockouts in the state. When the six men alleged a strike order in defiance of the court, they were cited for contempt, gave a hearing and were fined. The action of Judge Curran should serve as a warning to radical labor leaders—men who attempt to impress others with the doctrine that they are above the law—that the whole force of the commonwealth or the national government if necessary is back of the instrument that the laws and the orders of the courts be obeyed.

IT SEEMS PROBABLE THAT THE KANSAS INDUSTRIAL COURT LAW WILL BE PASSED ON BY THE SUPREME COURT OF THE UNITED STATES. It represents such advanced ideas in the relations of the state to the employers and employees that there is reason to believe that the supreme court must determine its constitutionality.

UNTIL THE COURT OF FINAL RESORT HAS PASSED UPON THE KANSAS LAW THE LOWER COURTS OF THE STATE, ACTING ALONG THE LINE Laid down by Judge Curran, should insist upon the strict observance of the statute. To permit any individuals to treat it with contempt will have the effect of weakening the force of all law and encouraging radicalism to greater resistance of state and federal governments.
