AGREEMENT FORECAST IN PACKING HOUSE DISPUTE

Secretary Davis Tells Cabinet Good Progress is Made Toward Settlement of Labor Situation

HOOVER AND WALLACE ARE EXCUSED FROM ATTENDING FURTHER MEETINGS

WASHINGTON, (AP)—An agreement between the five big meat packers and their employees through which prices, wages and other disputes will be amicably adjusted was forecast today.

Secretary Davis told the cabinet at the regular session that good progress toward a settlement had been made and from other sources it was learned that the meat packers had advanced so far that the further attendance of Secretaries Hoover and Wallace at the conference was not regarded as necessary.

It was stated that both sides had tentatively agreed to a settlement at short intervals and that the meat packers had last night and early today and that all that remained was to bring them together on the final terms of the settlement.

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EXTENDS SCOPE OF WAR AGAINST DRUGS TRAFFIC

Special Police Commissioner Asserts Backbone of Illicit Trade Broken in New York and Tackles Bigger Job

NEW YORK, (AP)—Claiming virtually to have broken the back of the illicit drug trade in New York city, in a four months' drive, Special Police Commissioner Carleton D. Simon today declared war on an international ring which he charges is responsible for illegal distribution of dope throughout the United States.

In the anti-narcotic drive more than 1000 arrests have been made and millions of dollars worth of drugs seized.

Although the illegal drug trade has been broken Dr. Simon asserted the work of his bureau is not only to continue here but to coordinate with other cities to meet the problems in other big cities in America and abroad.

Collects Criminal Records.

By means of an international bureau of criminal records, now being established, all war concerning drug crooks is to be ready for cities where "leads" pointing to New York might be uncovered, the commissioner said.

In addition, Astorway police had requested information concerning an alleged leader of the international ring, in the commissioner's office.

"I made more arrests there past four months than in any other city heretofore," said Dr. Simon, who was selected to direct the drive because of his medical training. Every wing of the metropolitan police department was re-organized, working in conjunction with the federal agents. In consequence, the fear has been spread through the army of vendors.

Before he assumed his job, Dr. Simon said traffic in drugs in New York has been on a steady decline. His first move was to seek to clean up New York then aim in solving the drug vending problem in other cities.

Squads of special men were spread to all parts of the greater city, expert men being picked to patrol the lower east side where vendors were ever using school children as "go-betweens" to supply addicts.

Watches Incoming Ships.

Constant watch was kept on incoming ships where alleged smugglers were resorting to all manner of tricks to "smuggle" the narcotics into the country.

HOOVER CALLS RUSSIA TRADE POLITICAL ISSUE

Secretary of Commerce Considers Economic Phases of Secondary Importance

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—Trade with Russia is more a political than an economic question as long as Russia is controlled by the Bolsheviks, Secretary of Commerce Hoover declared Monday in a statement discussing the problem of resumption of trade relations with Russia.

"The whole question from a trade point of view," said Mr. Hoover, "develops into furnishing commodities equal to the gold, platinum and jewelry, variously estimated from \$600,000,000 in the hands of the Bolshevik government, and after that has been expanded there can be little expectation of continued trade."

"There has been little trade for gold because its title has been called into question by the French government and by threats of private actions in the courts on the ground that it is stolen or subject to foreign liens. If any one European nation accepts the gold, no doubt all of them will."

BRITISH WOMEN DEMAND PLACES AS DIPLOMATS

Suggest for Present that Female Attaches Be Appointed to Embassies

LONDON, (AP)—British women are beginning to demand the appointment of members of their sex as diplomats in foreign service. They do not ask to be made ambassadors or ministers, but there is no knowing how soon they may. At present they seem to be content with suggesting that women be appointed as counselors, one to each British embassy.

The idea has been put forward by Professor Winifred Childs of Cambridge university, who stated in an address before the English Speaking Union that women could aid the British ambassador and ministers in interpreting the points of view of people of other nations, now that women have a voice in the government. She also proposed that women should be sent on special diplomatic missions.

LAND PRICES IN SOUTH TAKE FALL

Crop Values Cause Reduction—Western Sections Not Hard Hit on Market

The average price of plowland per acre in the United States decreased about 7 per cent during the past year, according to a report just issued by the United States department of agriculture. The average value of plowland per acre on March 1 of this year was \$32.78, as compared with \$40.01 in 1920, and \$74.31 in 1919. The statistics of the department attribute the decline to the reduction in the prices of crops.

Decline Is Heavy.

The report shows that the heaviest drop in the price of land is in the southern states where cotton is the principal crop. In some sections of these states there has been a decline of 20 per cent in the price of plowland during the year. The average price of plowland in Georgia this year is \$16 per acre, while last year it was \$45 per acre. In Alabama the average in South Carolina last year was \$91, while this year it is \$100 per acre.

Iowa Feels Effect.

Iowa is the state having the highest price of plowland per acre. The report shows that it is valued at \$200 this year, as compared with \$197 last year—a decline of about 8 per cent. Illinois ranks second in the value of plowland, according to the report, the price per acre being \$157. In Minnesota and Mississippi the average price of plowland per acre is \$200.

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NEW MAP SHOWS CHANGES BROUGHT BY WORLD WAR

National Geographic Society Delineates Altered Boundary Lines

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The new map of Europe showing the boundaries of new and old nations established by the peace conference at Paris and by subsequent decisions of the supreme council has just been published by the National Geographic society together with an index of the names of the cities and towns.

Shows the prohibitive areas such as Silesia, Eastern Galicia, Schleswig, Sylvania and Bithonia. The French mandate area in Syria is outlined and also the international territory called the Zone of Straila (Dardanelles and Bosphorus) now governed by the international commission on control.

Other frontiers show the Bear basin, the Dnieper basin, the Polish corridor to the Baltic sea and the new national borders as the result of the war, Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Poland, Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia.

The Geographic society has announced that it soon will issue the new map of Asia.

Germans Make Home in Statue of Horse

COBLENZ, (AP)—Three Germans of this city solved their housing problem in a queer way when the city authorities caught them at it a few days ago.

They had installed themselves inside the giant figure of a horse bearing the statue of William I, which stands at the confluence of the Rhine and Moselle rivers.

They gained entrance to the inside of the horse by disjuncting a loose copper plate on one of its sides. Within they had installed a bed and laid in a supply of a number of cases of wine and were making themselves very much at home until the authorities discovered them.

JAPANESE LOOK TO SETTLEMENT

Shidohara is Quoted as Believing Harding Will Accept Ambassador's Pact

NEW YORK, (AP)—Bishop Yoshida, Hira-no of the Japan Methodist church, now in this city, declared today that while he was in Washington, Count Shidohara, Japanese ambassador, had expressed to him the belief that the Harding administration would adopt the Morris-Shidohara agreement in final settlement of the Japanese situation in California.

"The Japanese public is anxiously awaiting news to this effect," said the church man. "The Morris-Shidohara agreement will be satisfactory to the Japanese people, but it leaves unsolved the problem of racial expansion, which is pressing upon them."

"The Japanese will look toward the Western hemisphere as the only logical field for immigration. But contrary to belief in this matter, they are anxious to amalgamate with the people among whom they settle.

"Japan does not want Hawaii or the Philippines. The present interest has been greatly augmented, however, by the suddenly increased garriosity, and the extensive fortifications being erected there.

"Frankly, the Japanese people are extremely nervous over the possibility of aggression from the United States, and they are anxious to gain peace and wealth in the United States. They do not contemplate beginning any trouble of their own account."

"There is a strong movement in Japan for reduction of armament because the present military and naval expansion consume more than one-third of the yearly budget and the people are burdened with heavy taxes. Any action by the United States to demand an agreement would find a hearty response in Japan, but it must originate with your country, because of the relative size of the two nations."

TO CONTEST ENSIGN'S JURISDICTION IN CASE

Water Motor Decision Brings Question of Rights of Presiding Judge

Legality of the decision of Judge Harry F. Eneign, in the Twin Falls city water motor case, is to be challenged, according to official announcement, by the plaintiff in the case. It is understood the presiding judge's jurisdiction in the matter is to be questioned in the courts.

PROTECTION FOR THE FARM

Resolutions referred to by President Wilson in his veto of the Furber emergency tariff bill show that we imported more than forty-five times as much wheat in 1920 as we did in 1913.

According to the figures which are quoted, we imported in 1913, under Protection, 753,481 bushels of wheat, while we imported in 1920, under Free Trade, 25,448,648 bushels thereof.

This fact is highly interesting when it is considered in connection with the fact that there remained on the farms this year 205,000,000 bushels of wheat as compared with 165,000,000 bushels held by the growers at the same time last year...

Our farmers have been unable to sell all of their wheat during the past year because of a lack of market.

We imported 35,448,648 bushels of foreign grown wheat which found a sale. It follows, as a necessary corollary, that if we had not bought 35,448,648 bushels of foreign wheat for consumption in this country we should have bought 35,448,648 bushels more of home-grown wheat.

And, incidentally, as the price paid for the foreign wheat was over \$2 a bushel, it follows that our farmers would have had upwards of \$70,000,000 more in their credit had it been obtainable.

Most farmers are familiar with this situation and, along with the rest of the vast majority of Americans, find grounds for hope of betterment in the situation in the indications of sincerity with which the new administration is tackling the problem of setting up adequate safeguards for the agricultural industry.

Whether the protective measures to be adopted immediately shall be another emergency tariff, which seems to be favored by President Harding, or whether it shall be an embargo of some sort which is urged by some western senators with whom he is consulting, is a question which may well be left to the decision of the president and the congress.

The main thing, and the thing which should make for renewed confidence in the agricultural industry and all others which depend upon it in any way, is the fact that the problem is being tackled by both administration and congress with a determination to take care of the farmer, and with a vigor and determination that indicates an early and satisfactory solution.
