

FARMERS' GRAIN POOLS FEATURE MARKET SCHEME

Details of Plan of Committee of Seventeen Submitted to Meetings are Explained by Chairman

CHICAGO, (AP)—Pooling of farmers' grain, either on a national or local scale, constitutes the outstanding feature of the national co-operating marketing plan proposed by the Committee of 17, Chairman C. H. Gustafson, said here today, explaining the details of the plan.

The committee, whose full name is the Farmers' Grain Marketing Committee, is holding a national meeting this month preparatory to a ratification conference in Chicago, April 1. The committee represents co-operative organizations of farmers interested in grain marketing, prominent among them the American Farm Bureau federation.

As an alternative to the pooling plan, farmers may sell direct.

"The national pooling plan calls for pooling grain with a central agency, either by grain elevators, or by the profits equally to each contributor to the pool," Mr. Gustafson said. "This would operate to give each producer the average price of the grades of a certain grade which he contributed to the pool. It would insure the producer the average price for his grain. The pooling plan in this manner has reached its highest development among the California co-operative organizations."

"Products so pooled pass out of the control of the individual producer and the grain will be sold by the directors of the pool at the time that they deem most opportune."

"Provision is also made for a loan pool by members of a single community. In both local and national pools the control is centralized and the selling price averaged."

"The direct sale plan allows farmers who do not desire to bring their grain to the co-operative elevators and sell on the current market quotation at a profit at the present time at privately owned elevators. Further, they can avail themselves of the warehousing facilities of the co-operative elevators and terminals and not sell until weeks or months later. Producers who dispose of their grain in this manner share equally in the profits of the warehousing facilities, export corporation and other national co-operative departments on the basis of the number of bushels which they deliver to the elevators."

"For those farmers who do not wish to enter the pool or to sell direct, there is another avenue of reaching the markets. One farmer or several farmers who have sufficient grain to make up one or more carloads, may transfer grain by the carload through the co-operative elevator to co-operative marketing agencies to be handled at the different terminal markets such as Chicago and Minneapolis. The grain would then be sold at market price upon arrival. By handling his grain in this manner the farmer will pay only the actual overhead cost of marketing it."

"Altogether, we believe the new plan is most likely to allow the producer to use his own judgment and market his products in the way that he considers best while, at the same time, he has the benefit of a complete national marketing market that has no purpose or excuse for violation, but to protect his interests and return a larger per cent. of the market value to him without infringing upon the rights of his consumer customers. Of these three alternatives, the method of marketing which proves most satisfactory and more profitable to the farmer is that which will make farming profitable, will be the marketing method that will develop and increase in popularity."

"The plan, in fact, we believe, is the next logical step in co-operation that the farmers have already undertaken. Through co-operative elevators and the way they are handling today a great deal of the grain they produce, but their co-operative effort stops at the railroad track. With more than 50,000 of these co-operative elevators in operation the foundation is already laid for a new national marketing agency."

May Be Collector of Port of New York

NEW SECT INVADES TOKYO

Branch of Church Emanating from Korea to be Established in Japan

TOKYO, (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—Tendokyo, a Korean religious sect which is said to be closely resembling Christianity in doctrine and philosophy, is to establish a branch church in Tokyo. The action is taken at the instigation of 12 Korean students at the Imperial university.

Tendokyo is the religion of Sun Kukka, a leader of Korean malcontents who was said to be determined not to abandon the cause of independence for his country. The metropolitan police force here will not interfere with the Tokyo followers provided they do not disturb peace and order according to the Yemuri.

BINGHAMTON PRINTERS ON STRIKE SUITED BY SITUATION

BINGHAMTON, N. Y., (AP)—Union printers on strike in the city to enforce laws and have demands declined in maintenance today that they were satisfied with the situation and advanced the claim that local newspapers were obliged to limit advertising because of inability to obtain strike papers.

Publishers declared in answer to the statement that additions to their force were being received daily, the size of the papers and the amount of advertising have increased and there have been practically no circulation losses as a result of the strike.

TO FORCE COMPLIANCE WITH RULES OF HEALTH

County Department Lays Plans for Action Against the Violators

Immediate action is to be taken by the county health department against persons violating health rules, according to Dr. C. M. McGinnis, head of the department. The physician announced he had been forced to this action by the growing disregard of rules designed for the prevention of disease spread or for common support of sanitation.

The first step toward enforcing observation of health and sanitation laws is to be the arrest of persons either suffering from contagious diseases or in houses where such ailments are known to prevail who break quarantine during the course of the disease run. Dr. McGinnis says he will start proceedings in court against Charles Quast, 322 Third avenue west, who is said to have failed to observe regulations for the prevention of disease spread although quarantined at his home for the past 20 days. ORDEE DESIGNATES VOUBOS AS CHARGE D'AFFAIRES

ATHENS, (AP)—Dr. Alexander Vouros, who has been named Greek minister to the United States, will have the status of charge d'affaires, according to the passport issued to him by the Greek government. The American legation here declined to issue Dr. Vouros' passport as minister, pointing out that President Harding has not yet established relations with King Constantine.

Following this action, the Greek foreign office has amended the passport issued to the diplomat.

JAPAN'S STAND ON KAMCHATKA IS UNYIELDING

Foreign Minister Uchida Tells Peers Nation Will Take Necessary Action if Grant to Soviet Goes Through

TOKIO, (AP)—Japan will be obliged whatever action may be deemed necessary to preserve her rights in Kamchatka, if the Russian for Eastern republics persists in its course of transferring a part of that peninsula to the authority of the Bolshevik government. Uchida, foreign minister, declared in the house of peers here Tuesday.

After stating that Japan had recently received information that this transfer had been made, he said this country had sent a protest to the Paris Eastern republic administration at Chita and had submitted five demands. He declared that these demands had not as yet been accepted.

Japan has extensive interests in Kamchatka.

This report of the transfer of part of the peninsula of Kamchatka to the soviet government in Moscow appears to have a direct bearing upon conference granted there to Washington B. Vanderbilt of California, by the Bolshevik regime in Russia. The conference, covering the explanation of the silk and industry interests of Kamchatka, was granted last year.

FORMER DISTILLER SUES TO GET BOOZE RELEASED

Kentucky Court is Asked to Require Volstead Law Enforcers to Give Up Whiskey Stock

LOUISVILLE, Ky., (AP)—Suit to compel distillers law enforcers to release from government bonded warehouses a large quantity of whiskey forfeited by its owner, a former distiller, for personal use has been filed in federal court here by John W. Kelber of Paducah, Ky.

The plaintiff claims that he has had the liquor sold for entertainment of his friends, guests and himself in his Paducah home and that in January he applied to Edward Hamilton, revenue collector for permission to pay the tax and remove the whiskey. Mr. Hamilton, he says, referred him to Paul W. Hines, state prohibition director, who denied permission.

PHYSICIAN CALLS CARDINAL GIBBON'S CONDITION SERIOUS

BALTIMORE, Md., (AP)—Cardinal Gibbons passed a restless night and was weaker this morning, his secretary, the Rev. Albert E. Smith said, adding, however, that the doctor had reported the patient's pulse to be good and that he told the members of the household that there was no immediate danger unless something unforeseen set in.

His legs are stiff and he has to work and his temperature low. His physician, however, says the cardinal's condition is serious.

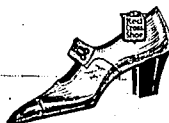

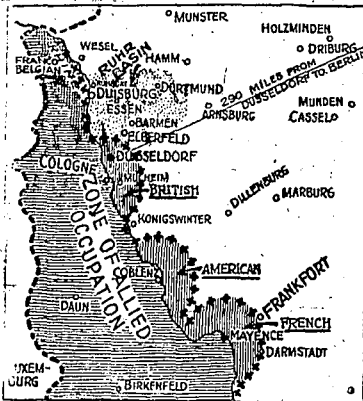
Appetite Not Quite Gone

GIANT WARSHIP IS LAUNCHED AT CAMDEN YARDS

Superdreadnaught Colorado is Added to Nation's Sea Power; Largest and Most Powerful Ship Built on Delaware

CAMDEN, N. J., (AP)—The superdreadnaught Colorado, the largest and most powerful battleship ever built on the Delaware river, and launched at the New York Shipbuilding corporation yard here Tuesday. The great fighting machine was sponsored by Mrs. Michael Morley, of Dunwoody, daughter of United States Senator Samuel D. Nicholson, of Colorado. The general public was not admitted, but all employees were given an opportunity to see the launching. River craft gave the ship the usual color reception and an airplane circled over the river as the Colorado dropped anchor and was picked up by ten tug boats and warped into a berth.

Theodore Roosevelt, assistant secretary of the navy, and Senator Nicholson stood by the sponsor as she smacked the gold articles and sailed her way out of the bubbling mineral water from Colorado against the prow of the giant hull as it began to recede into the distance. The ship was christened at the christening platform was a large party of specially invited guests of the builders, including members of Congress and below them were thousands of other persons, who cheered when the 6,000 tons of steel sped down the ways.

The Colorado is the second of the 11 great superdreadnaughts authorized in 1916 to be launched. A sister ship, the Maryland, is now nearing completion at Newport News and probably will be commissioned this year.

There are four ships of this class, the first in the American navy to be armed with 16-inch rifles. The others now building are the Washington and West Virginia and all four were given names previously assigned to armored cruisers, which since have been named for cities.

Although far more powerful than any American warship now in commission, the Colorado class will be surpassed by the other six battleships authorized in 1916 and known as the Massachusetts-class. The Colorado class mount eight 16-inch guns each, whereas the others will carry 12 such guns.

The Colorado's main battery will be mounted in four turrets, with two guns each, located along the center line, two turrets forward and two turrets aft of the superstructure. The Massachusetts-class will carry three guns in turrets and will develop two turrets more speed than the 21 knots of the Colorado class.

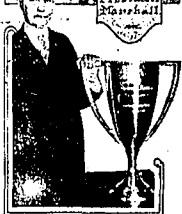
The Colorado is 624 feet long and slightly more than 97 feet wide with a normal displacement of 32,000 tons. The motive power will be furnished by four Westinghouse steam drive turbines constructed to develop 28,000 horsepower. The crew will consist of 55 officers, 1,345 enlisted men and 75 marines.

The secondary battery of the Colorado will be 14 five-inch rifles, four in each anti-aircraft gun and two torpedo tubes. The Massachusetts-class type will have two additional five-inch guns in the secondary battery.

TITLE OF PUBLICATION IS "GRASSHOPPER PEST"

State Entomologist Issues Book for the Benefit of All Communities

"The Grasshopper Pest" is a 28-page bulletin by Victor Jones, assistant extension entomologist, has been issued by the University of Idaho extension division. "This bulletin is issued as a guide to counties and communities planning in the future to initiate anti-grasshopper campaigns," says the foreword. "The year 1918 was the beginning of recent grasshopper outbreaks in Idaho. That year great damage was done with little effort to control the pest. In 1919 the worst outbreaks occurred in Adams, Blaine, Idaho, Lemhi, and Valley counties; serious damage was done and hundreds of acres of crops were completely ruined. The pest is so effective that very few grasshoppers appeared the following spring.

In 1920 a sensational campaign was made by the different counties in conjunction with the farm bureau and the university extension division. Fifty counties were troubled with the pest. Three counties put an such an effective campaign as to remove expectation of trouble there the following year. These counties were Idaho, Lemhi, Valley and Owyhee. The remaining 11 counties had large numbers of grasshoppers in different localities doing more or less damage. These were Adams, Ada, Blaine, Blaine, Cassia, Elmore, Franklin, Kootenai, Lemhi, Power and Washington. The bulletin will be available from the farm bureau offices, the extension division, and various agents. Propagations are under way for the destruction of grasshoppers this spring in the affected counties.

TRACES DRUGS TRAFFIC TO ORIGIN IN GERMANY

New York Special Deputy Promises Startling Disclosures in Campaign

NEW YORK, (AP)—Opening of a fight to curb the traffic of an international drug ring said to be headed by Louche Bert of Germany, Japan and England, was announced here Tuesday by Dr. Carlton Spoon, special deputy police commissioner. Declaring high ranking officers of steamships plying between New York and Mediterranean and South American ports have been transporting the drugs to this country, Dr. Spoon and many raids are planned and development of a startling nature expected. He said the underground passage ways which have been discovered, through Switzerland these drugs, Dr. Spoon asserted, have been transported to London, China, Japan and Italy.

ARMORED AIRPLANE TO BE TESTED AT CAMP LEWIS

Innovation in Aircraft for Military Use Carries Ton of Plate with Machine Guns and Rifles

CAMP LEWIS, Wash., (AP)—Preparations are being made here to try out three airplanes of a new type. A landing field is being cleared and a hangar will be erected. The planes are due within three weeks. Each plane will carry a ton of armor and will be the largest ever in military government will purchase ten of them. The planes, which are considered a distinct innovation in aircraft for army use, will carry machine guns and light rifles.
