LYOUD GEORGE ATTACKS SOCIALISM IN BRITAIN

Prime Minister Investigates Against Activities of Marxist Agitators

LONDON, (AP)—A bitter attack on socialism was made by Prime Minister Lloyd George in a speech at a luncheon Tuesday of "The New Members of the Coalition group," as the participants in the luncheon party were styled.

"The military dangers which entailed the parties have disappeared," said Mr. Lloyd George, "but greater, more insidious, more permanent dangers will confront us. The great peril is the rise to power of a new party with new purposes of the most subversive character."

"It calls itself 'labor.' It is really socialist. It is tearing the parties to pieces on its way to tearing society to pieces. Those who are inclined to agree with Mr. Asquith and Lord Balfour that the labor party is a bogey should read the socialist and labor papers for a week."

"Socialism is fighting to destroy everything that the great prophets and leaders of both parties united and liberal have labored for generations to uphold. Parliamentary institutions are its mainstay as private interests and the rule of class organization is to be abolished for them."

The premier asserted that an addition of 4 per cent would put the cost of the majority and that from 15 to 20 per cent do not vote.

ARGENTINE TAKES TIGHT GRIP ON RED AGITATORS

Drastic Measures Outgrowth of Numerous Bomb Explosions in Capital

RIO DE JANEIRO, (AP)—As a result of a number of bomb explosions in various parts of the city during the last few months, the government is taking stern measures to curb the activities of alleged foreign anarchists in the city.

President Pessoa has just signed a decree providing for heavy punishment for persons propagating subversive activities as well as those connected with or inciting outrages.

Meetings held under false pretenses may be dissolved and those responsible imprisoned. The government is empowered to close up societies and organizations whose action is opposed to the public good and dissolution of such bodies may be ordered by its courts.

PROMOTERS PULL DOWN FABULOUS PURSE FOR FIGHT

Half Million Offer to Jack and Georges Supplanted by Percentage Plan

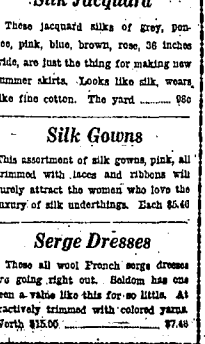
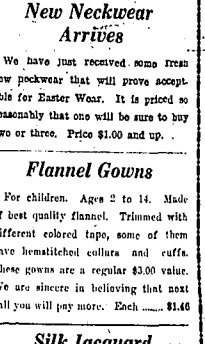

SERVICE FIRST

Self-sacrificing courage displayed by the three officers of the Twin Falls School Board, who have resigned as a result of representations that their continuance in office would endanger the approval of a bond issue that is necessary for continuation of school sessions this year and next, is something that ought not to be overlooked by a citizenship that is appreciative of the heroic deed.

It is a hard thing for men to continue in an official position trying to work out a solution for a bad situation for which they may be responsible in some measure; but it is an infinitely harder thing for the man who will make the right sort of an official to quit his post under fire. The natural thing to do for that sort of man in these circumstances is to stand by his guns and work the problem out and vindicate his name and reputation as an official.

That mistakes have been made by the school board under the administration of the retiring officials is hardly debatable; but errors of the nature that have been committed in this instance have not been uncommon, especially during the past few years, and there is scarcely an institution or individual who has not erred similarly.

It is entirely possible that a sufficient number of voters in the coming school bond election would have been disposed to overlook those mistakes and give the men who have resigned another chance to relieve their errors by having carried the election; but these men have refused to take that chance, and if the school boards to their official reputations, they have removed every possible ground for opposition to the bonds. It is clear that they have not been actuated by self-interest, but through sincere appreciation of the necessity for continuation of school sessions and all that such continuance implies.

They have proven themselves broad-minded citizens in an hour of stress; and their example should place the question

of the bond issue on a plane where the approval of the bonds will be established beyond peradventure of a doubt.

Chinese Residents of Honolulu Express Views on Proposed Consortium in Mass Meeting

The cablegrams set out the points: "Such a loan at the present time will prolong war in China and ultimately injure the mutual friendship between China and America. We sincerely pray that you will use your influence to postpone this loan until such a time as a legal parliament is established to represent the republic of China."

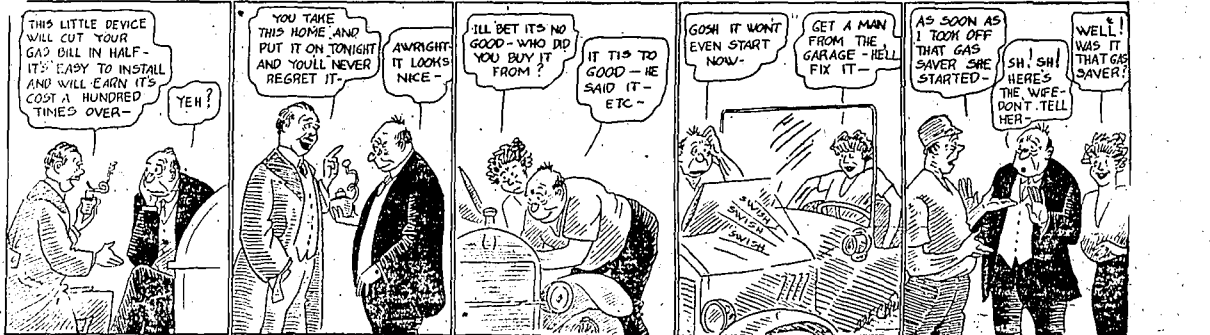
