WOMEN NOT YET GIVEN EQUALITY

Discrimination Chiefly Lies in Right to Sit as Members of Juries

CHICAGO, (AP)—Granting of woman suffrage has not yet given women full rights with men in a large part of the United States, it is indicated by a survey of the middle and southwest made by the Associated Press...

The stumbling block in this case is generally a constitutional provision which forbids women to sit on juries...

Other exceptions women are under in various states include these: In Iowa, they cannot sit in the legislature...

In Wisconsin, they cannot serve as a legislative officer. In North Dakota they do not pay poll tax...

In Nebraska, although an Omaha woman recently sat on a jury, she was barred from jury duty by constitutional provision or statute...

In Minnesota the state does not bar women from jury duty, as women have served of a circuit court jury in Ramsey county and on both petty and grand juries in Le Sueur county...

In Indiana the legislature has just passed a law permitting women to serve on juries but not requiring such service...

In Illinois until the supreme court rules definitely judges are permitted to determine for themselves whether women shall serve as jurors...

In Missouri the natural guardians of their children, instead of the father alone, town women contemplate effort to have their inability to sit in the legislature removed through an approaching constitutional convention...

"Poor quality seed amounting to carload lots is held by farmers and dealers in Idaho," says C. B. Ashton, deputy state seed inspector.

"The orders cannot be filled," says Mr. Ashton. "Too much laxity in regard to buying, selling, trading, planting and harvesting has been practiced the last few years."

"The pure seed law has been promulgated for the protection of the farmer who desires to produce a clean, marketable product. Violations have been frequent, as indicated by the quality of the seed this year."

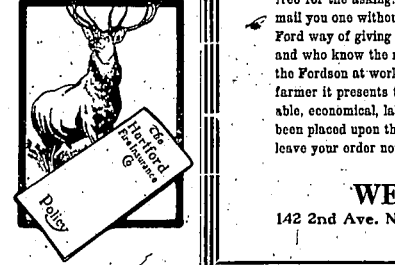

AVIATOR MAKES FIGHT FOR LIFE

Lieutenant Conroy Has One Chance in Ten to Recover, Physicians Say

NATCHEZ, (AP)—With his back broken and his body paralyzed from the chest down, Lieutenant W. D. Conroy, transcontinental flyer, who airplane crashed near Crowlley, La., yesterday when he was attempting a record-breaking flight from Jacksonville, Fla., to San Diego, Cal., today was fighting for his life in a Natchez hospital. Physicians said he had about one chance in ten of recovering and his condition was "very serious," but the fier himself remained cheerful and expressed the hope he would yet be able to make the flight.

HONORED NAME IN MEDICINE

Henry Detwiler, Native of Switzerland, the First to Practice Homoeopathy in America.

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'HILL' BOUGHT BY BREWER

Hotel May Be Erected on Ground in France That Will Hold Immortal Memorials.

"Hill 00," whose record is written in British hearts with the blood of her young army, has been sold to a brewer.

"It is expected," says the London Times, "that a hotel will be erected there, from battleground of immortal memory to history in a fate which may be depicted, but it is possible, even probable, that, by an enterprise hospitably foreign to sentiment, all that is associated with the place may be preserved."

"Lion 60," sacred with the memories of Lorraine and of many a subsequent resurgence of the tide of battle, consecrated as few other spots of earth have been by repeated baptisms of heroic blood, long ceased to be a hill. It was held, as one commanding officer reported, geographically, though its military value had been utterly destroyed.

"The hill itself was blasted to dust long before the struggles for its possession had ended. Its name will endure as long as British history, and it is perhaps as well that its name should mark the site of so many heroisms, even if the monument presents a commercial aspect."

Public-Type Cottages Are Cement

All the quiet charm of the old public style of architecture is preserved in concrete in a series of little cottages now under construction in Montevideo, Cal. The one-story buildings are cement reinforced for their concrete use of cement, woodwork being practically eliminated. Even the roofs are concrete, and the doors are made of manganese, according to an illustrated article in the January Popular Mechanics Magazine. The paneled walls are five inches thick, inclose a web of waterproofing material, while the cement floors are stained in Spanish-leather effect, waxed and polished. The brick structure, as a whole, fireproof and easy cleaning is assured by the absence of moldings, casing and baseboards. Inclosed courts off the kitchen and sleeping chambers, partly roofed and partly screened, provide outdoor protection and privacy.

E. Benard, who is here after a four year stay along the northern coast of the North American continent, says a Vancouver dispatch.

Though priceless from a collector's point of view, the utilitarian value of the relics is negligible, and they were obtained by Benard for a price of twenty worth possibly 20 cents on the spot.

A few brass buttons among the relics are believed to have belonged to the distinguished leader, though there is as yet no positive proof of this. Benard also obtained a number of primitive scientific instruments used by the northern tribes. These will be sold to various museums and universities for which the explorer has been collecting ethnological specimens and skin since 1910. The entire collection of rare worth approximately \$25,000.

Sir John Franklin, with 154 companions, sailed into the Arctic in 1845 on the northern passage, and was never heard of again. After many relief expeditions had failed, his fate was ascertained in 1850, when bleached skeletons were found on the trail to Hudson bay.

The Middle Initial.

With the exception of William H. Taft, Senator Harding is the first President sinceutherford B. Hayes, to use more than one Christian name. Grover Cleveland, William McKinley, Theodore Roosevelt and Woodrow Wilson (who dropped his first name Thomas, early in the career) got along without middle names or initials.

The use of more than one given name is puzzling to a Frenchman. When Senator Lodge is mentioned in the French press, he is never "M. Lodge," but "M. Cabot Lodge," or as one prominent Paris daily writes it, "M. Cabot-Lodge." The President-elect may look forward to be known on the continent as "President Gannard-Hilliard."—Editorial Digest.

Bokhara in Hands of Reds?

Nominally the government of Bokhara is in the hands of the anarchy, an absolute autocrat, but actually power is largely exercised by the Mohammedan clergy. The houses in the capital are closely packed together and narrow streets are infested by dirt. At night the streets are patrolled by police patrols, who beat drums to scare away thieves and robbers. The city is surrounded by a ruined but still strong wall of five miles in circumference. It is now reported that Bokhara has been captured by the Reds.

Old Fort Bull Useful.

Less than half a century ago almost every American community west of the Mississippi was protected against Indian raids by a fort or stockade. Most of these structures have now fallen into dust, says Popular Mechanics Magazine, in southern Utah. However, the stone structure, known as "Cave Fort," which was built in 1837, at the time of the Blackhawk-Mormon war, yet is today in a state of perfect preservation. It is now used, in fact, as a ranch house and hotel.

Federal Reserve Board Head to Remain in Office, is Report



William F. G. Harding of Alabama, governor of the Federal Reserve Board, is no longer likely to resign from office indefinitely, according to reports from Washington. It is said that President Harding and Secretary of the Treasury Mellon admire the way Governor Harding has handled financial affairs and desire him to remain in office as long as he conveniently can. Much satisfaction was expressed in the capital because of the new president's attitude, as it indicated that the federal reserve system is to be kept out of politics.

FREED FROM TURKISH YOKE

Chaldeans Promoted a Measure of Independence Under the Guiding Hand of France.

The American army officer, chosen by the Chaldeans to present their appeal for independence to the council of all powers, reports that he has been unable to get a hearing for that intent during the peace conference to obtain recognition, having heard that "self-determination" was to be a guiding principle in the settlement of the world's affairs. Those at Versailles who had some familiarity with Chaldean history may have recalled the Chaldeans, of course, but they failed to make an impression on minds, unaccustomed with acute problems of twentieth-century statesmanship.

The Chaldeans, an Assyrian nation, however, may count on being better off than has been their lot for many centuries. They will get some benefit from the new one. Resulting in northern Mesopotamia, which France now will control—the southern region being confined to Great Britain—they will be freed from their old oppressors, the Turks, and the French government has indicated a purpose to give them a measure of autonomy. The Chaldeans were once a warlike people, capable of demanding what they desired. More than 1,000,000 of them are now said to be dwelling in the region that will be reclaimed from Turkey.

FAMINE TAKES TOLL OF LIVES

Death Rate in Twenty-two Stricken Chinese Provinces is 1,000 Daily

Peking (UP)—Famine, which holds the province of Honan, Shensi and Chihli in its sinister grasp, is rapine, a dreadful havoc, according to reports received at the headquarters of the international relief organization in this city. In 22 counties of Honan, the average daily death rate on March 25 was 1,000. Daily deaths from famine in the six northern counties of the province averaged 300 daily.

Sixteen counties in Shensi covered by relief committees have suffered terribly. It is shown by reports, the most serious phase of the scourge being found, apparently, near Puping, a small town northeast of Shanpei, capital of the province. In the 16 counties there have been 90,000 deaths from starvation since the beginning of the famine, 50,000 of these deaths occurring in Puping county.

Pneumonia plague recently made its appearance in the American capital of the border between the provinces of Shantung and Chihli, 108 persons dying from the mauling, which, however, has been controlled.

In Szechuan province in Honan there is a dangerous condition arising from the lack of typhoid cases being reported daily. Medical authorities there, however, have conditions under control.

Funds amounting to \$250,000 gold taels (normally \$4,000,000), including one million taels from the American Red Cross have been appropriated to all famine districts. The advisory committee of all working organizations in the stricken regions. This committee is informed the American relief committee for the China relief fund, headed by Thomas W. Lamont, is doing its utmost to provide food for six million persons and ascertain if more can be there are three million more destitute.

It is estimated by the advisory committee that 4,000,000 gold taels will be required to carry on the work of feeding the starving people, although this amount might be cut to 1,500,000 taels if cash should arrive from America by the last of April.
