CHILEANS HOLD DISCUSSION ON TRADE METHODS

North American Business Policies and Products are Attacked and Defended by Latin-American Editors

SANTIAGO, (AP)—The South American countries will be commercial clients of the United States so long as they are not able to avail themselves of more advantageous markets, says the newspaper *Ultimas Noticias* in an editorial in which it asserts American goods "ordinarily are of inferior quality."

By Force of Necessity.
The paper says the war permitted the United States to enter into commercial relations with the South American countries "by force of necessity were obliged to accept American goods and systems, diametrically opposed to those that had been used by the great producing nations of the old world." It is well known, the paper declares, that the methods employed by the North American exporter differ notably from those followed by the exporters of Great Britain and above all by Germany.

The American goods speak from being ordinarily of inferior quality are costly," the paper adds, "and in addition the goods are badly packed. This results in heavy losses. Moreover the Americans do not concede credit and if they do concede credit it is on terms little acceptable."

Replying to the newspaper's charges of inferiority in American merchandise, a writer in the newspaper *El Mercurio*, signing himself "Chilean merchant," says: "If American goods are consumed by 150,000,000 Americans and Canadians—in fact by nearly half the population of the universe—are you not able to be assured that American merchandise should be good enough for our South American markets?"

Defends Export Methods.

Answering the newspaper's assertion that American export methods are entirely different from those employed by the Europeans, the "Chilean merchant" says there are two reasons for this: first, because the Europeans have demonstrated that their system of selling has not proven beneficial since "it only has facilitated disastrous losses largely in heavy losses through bad arrangements or bankruptcies; and secondly, because the Europeans are not able today to extend long term credit through lack of means. The Chilean merchants think the period of long term credits has passed never to return, and continues.

"What occurred here in Chile before the world war? A foreigner would arrive and set up a business with, say, 20,000 pesos. He then received visits from the salaried men of European firms who would deliver him merchandise. At the end of two years he would have a credit with these houses for more than 20,000 pesos. At the end of another year he had declared bankruptcy—accidental or fraudulent—thus occasioning heavy losses to the European creditors."

The merchant adds that Americans always have extended credit to their firms that respect their obligations and do business on a solid basis.

MORAL RESPONSIBILITY FOR IRISH DISORDERS IS PLACED ON BRITAIN

Commission of Committee of One Hundred, in 30,000-Word Report, Admits Lack of Official British Side of Case, but Declares Imperial Army Guilty of Proved Excesses Not Incomparable to Those Alleged in Bryce Report on the Belgian Atrocities

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Moral responsibility for the present disorders in Ireland is placed upon the British government by the commission of the Committee of One Hundred investigating the Irish question in a 30,000-word report made public today and covering the examination of witnesses at public hearings held by the commission in Washington last November, December and January. The report has been issued under the title of "The American Commission on Conditions in Ireland," which announces that it will continue the inquiry.

Declarations that the commission was "under the disadvantage of lacking the official British side of the case," except as it was gathered from documents presented to it, the report declares that "the imperial British army in Ireland has been guilty of proved excesses, not incomparable in degree and character to those alleged by the Bryce report on Belgian atrocities, to have been committed by the imperial German army." The Bryce commission, it is pointed out, was similarly handicapped.

Hears Only One Side.
Thirty-eight witnesses of alleged atrocities, including 18 Irish, 18 American and two English citizens, testified before the commission. The commission admits that it reports on the Irish side of the case to hear all sides. The testimony available, the report says, gives the case, therefore, almost wholly from the Irish republican or anti-British viewpoint, "from sources not unoppositional to the application of the principle of self-determination to Ireland." The Ulster Unionist viewpoint and that of the British authorities in Ireland, the report says, were not represented among the witnesses.

Summing up its conclusions after hearing all the evidence, the commission finds "that the Irish people are deprived of the protection of British law, to which they would be entitled as subjects of the British king. They are likewise deprived of the moral protection granted by international law, to which they would be entitled as belligerents. They are at the mercy of the British army, which is in direct and contrary both to all law and to standards of human conduct, have instituted in Ireland 'a terror', the evidence regarding which seems to prove that:

- "1. The Imperial British Government has created and introduced into Ireland a force of at least 78,000 men, many of them youthful and inexperienced, and some of them convicts; and has inflicted that force on unbridled violence.
- "2. The Imperial British forces in Ireland have indiscriminately killed in cold blood, women and children, have tortured and shot prisoners while in custody, adjusting the subtleties of 'retaliation to halt' and 'attempting to escape'; and have attributed to alleged 'rebels' the crime of the British assassination of prominent Irish Republicans.
- "3. House-burning and wanton destruction of villages and cities by Imperial British forces under Imperial British officers have been continued, and ordered by officials of the British government; and elaborate provision by gasoline sprays and bombs has been made in a number of instances for systematic incendiarism as part of a plan of terrorism.
- "4. A campaign for the destruction of the means of existence of the Irish people has been conducted by the burning of factories, creameries, crops and farm implements and the shooting of farm animals. This campaign is carried on regardless of the political views of their owners, and results in wide-spread and acute suffering among women and children.
- "5. Acting under a series of proclamations issued by the competent military authorities of the Imperial British forces, hostages are carried by forces exposed to the fire of the Republican army; fines are levied upon towns and villages as punishment for alleged offenses of individuals; private property is destroyed in reprisals for acts with which the owners have no connection; and the civilian population is subjected to an inquisition upon the theory that individuals are in possession of information valuable to the military forces of Great Britain. These acts of the Imperial British forces are contrary to the laws of peace or war.
- "6. The British courts have refused to function, local county and city governments refuse to recognize

their home town and residence for a stated period in an unknown locality." The commission condemns the so-called legalized killings.

Many instances of alleged atrocities and wanton destruction of property by the British troops were testified to and publicly reported at the time of the hearings last winter. Denunciation of the methods of the Auxiliary Cadets "irregulars," that supplement the Royal Irish Constabulary and the regular British troops, is expressed in the findings. Evidence of witnesses and depositions from victims, according to the report, established the fact that those troops included in their ranks "burglars and highwaymen, gunmen and petty thieves."

Regarding casualties, the commission says that it is justified in concluding that "not more than 500 of the British have been killed in Ireland from May, 1916, to December, 1920. These 500 casualties would seem to have occurred in a force of 78,000 during a period of four and one-half years. It is pointed out, or at the rate of not more than .25 of one per cent per annum.

On the other hand, according to lists compiled by the Irish Republican government and submitted to the commission, more than 200 unaged Irish civilians were killed by the military and police during 1920 alone. This number, it was said, included six women, 15 children, 10 old men and two priests, but did not include persons killed in the fighting. The commission says it does not vouch for the exactness of the figures, but it does testify to them. It says, allowed the killing of civilians in 1920 ran into "many hundreds."

The testimony attributed to the British forces approximately 45,000 raids, entailing "wrecking of property, robbery, murder of citizens, brutality to priests and women and children, and indiscriminate flogging." Many of the raids, it said, were made at night by "members of the British forces dressed in civilian clothing."

Stress Moral Consequences.

Stress is laid upon "the moral consequences to Imperial British forces" of the British government's military discipline, the commission says, now prevails among the troops. "Citizens of the Irish Republic" are held blameless for "incidental, accidental and disciplinary casualties in the British forces, and for casualties incurred under circumstances of general violence and disorder." Many of the excesses of the British army are attributed to the incitement of fear of its assassination in the soldiers' minds by their superiors.

"We would extend our sympathy to the great British people," says the commission in concluding its report. "The army which is the instrument of their government in Ireland would also seem to be the instrument of the destruction of that moral heritage which was their glory and which cast its lustre on each and all of them. The sun of that glory seems finally to have set over Ireland. British justice has become a discredited thing. The official

Independence Declared.

"After this," the report declared, "the Irish people, their teachers and leaders, with less than 1,000 followers, rose in rebellion and declared Irish independence. Confronted with the Irish declaration of independence, the Imperial British government formed additional troops into Ireland. This rebellion was crushed in April, 1916. The Imperial British government then continued to pour troops into Ireland. The Irish to an increasing degree were deprived of civil and social liberty. Such British rule lasted until Dec. 13, 1918, when, at the conclusion of a war avowedly fought for the rights of all nations, the Irish people in the general election, held under British auspices, gave the endorsement of the suffrage to the Irish republic which was the election issue in Ireland. In fulfillment of their pledge the elected representatives of the Irish republic met in congress (the Dail Eirann) at Dublin, organized as a government, nominated officers and proceeded to function (Jan. 21, 1919), and an army known as the Irish Republican Army was organized, equipped with distinctive uniforms and drilled openly."

How Great Britain met the insurrection and the Irish related it are contained in the findings as indicated of which side is to blame.

Two Kinds of 'Killings'
Two kinds of "killings" have characterized the Irish republican warfare, according to the report. First, the casualties resulted from the British army's attempts to obtain arms and ammunition in attacking mortar lorries and police barracks, and, second, the secret "execution" of "apex, traitors and enemies of the Irish republic who have been adjudged 'guilty' by its courts and sentenced to death. It is admitted that the accused never appear before the Irish courts, but are sentenced by the British to be executed by hanging after suffering the right to enforced silence from

"We hope that the wrong done Ireland may be righted and the agony of her people cease. When those things shall be the great British people will emerge from the darkness that now encompasses them into the glory of a new day."

Personal of Inquirers.

Thirty-six states were represented in the commission which initiated the inquiry, the report says, including five governors, 11 United States senators, 13 congressmen, the authors of 12 large cities, Cardinal Gibbons, Archbishop Keane and four Roman Catholic bishops, seven Protestant Episcopal bishops, four Methodist bishops and numerous clergymen, educators, editors, business men and labor leaders. The parent committee elected the sub-committee or commission which conducted the inquiry. This commission was composed of L. Hollingsworth Wood, a New York Quaker lawyer, as chairman; Frederick C. Howe, former commis-

sioner of Immigration at New York; vice-chairman; Jane Addams, of Hull House, Chicago; James H. Moore, president of the American Federation of Labor of Pennsylvania; Major Oliver P. Newman, former president of the Board of Commissioners of the District of Columbia; United States Senator George W. Norris, of Nebraska; the Rev. Norman Thomas, a New York Presbyterian clergyman; and United States Senator David I. Walsh of Massachusetts.
