

MARSHALS FOES TO PROVISIONS OF POWER LAWS

Organization of Consumers Convenes in New York to Discuss Plans for Securing Changes in Federal Act

NEW YORK, (AP)—Manufacturers interested in the subject of water power, from the standpoint of the consumer, assembled here today for a conference called by the Water Power League of America to discuss the questions of fuel and amendments to be asked to the federal power act. The league hopes to induce the capital to invest in the enterprises of water-power development to relieve power shortages and reduce the cost of power to the consumer.

Amass Power Act

The Water Power League details the workings of the federal power act as "detrimental to water power development and asserts that the act has made it practically impossible for private enterprises to secure the necessary 'take-out'." The league also asserts that the federal act has taken from the several states all their rights to intrastate streams within 10 miles of the capital in their charge of the federal power commission, which is composed of the secretary of war as chairman, the secretary of the interior, and the secretary of agriculture. Also it is asserted that the act takes from congress the power. It was exercised and also takes from the war department the authority to issue permits and licenses to develop water powers. The total horsepower of these projects is estimated to be more than 10,000,000 and they were carried to completion it would require several billion dollars to finance them. League officials say that without the act, all these projects have been halted by rules and regulations promulgated by the power commission which passed out of existence March 4 with the change of administration.

Financiers Fight Big

The league declares that "American financiers refuse to consider the investment of hundreds of millions of dollars in projects which would be certain to bring them a steady stream of men subject to the changes which occur in American politics every four years." It is to discuss these features that the Water Power League has called the conference.

A statement from the league urges congress to "pass the power act to create a body which would be able to grant licenses to prospective power developers and relieve them of the terrible delays incident to getting a bill through congress for such proposed development."

The league announces its determination to make an effort to break the deadlock in water power development in this country and bring about an immediate and general movement in the development of every ounce of hydroelectric energy in the country to the end that the fuel supplies may be conserved.

United States Senator Theodore E. Burton, for years chairman of the rivers and harbors committee of congress and chief of the advisory council of the Water Power League.

The officers of the league are: Charles T. Root, first vice president; John H. Allen, second vice president; and Frederick L. Long, secretary.

FARM BUREAU PURCHASE OF COAL IS APPROVED

National Organization Authorizes a Scheme for Elimination of Middleman in Fuel Buying

CHICAGO, (AP)—Purchase of coal by farmers of nine middle western states through their county and state farm bureaus was approved Monday when a plan drawn up by the American Farm Bureau Federation coal committee was adopted.

It is estimated that at least \$1.50 a ton will be saved through the co-operative buying plan.

Farm bureaus in the following states adopted the plan today: Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Iowa, Illinois, Minnesota, Missouri, Wisconsin, Kentucky.

PULLMAN COMPANY LOSES IN FIGHT FOR OPEN SHOP

Railroad Labor Board Upholds Contentions of Union Labor Leaders

CHICAGO, (AP)—The Pullman company lost its open shop fight before the United States railroad labor board today when the board upheld the contention of union leaders that the company had acted "in the letter and not in the spirit" of the transportation act when it conferred with its employees in mass meetings.

Delays Action on Wage

The shop craft and clerks in the Pullman works are involved in the case. The board's decision will delay any action on a reduction in their wages for several weeks. Under the transportation act the company must meet the union leaders, and in the event they fail to reach a decision, file a petition before the board and ask a new hearing.

The company has declined to deal with union officers in matters affecting all employees. The company takes the position that employees not members of the unions are not represented by the labor organizations.

When the company proposed a wage reduction recently, mass meetings were held and all employees were invited.

Denies Conference Valid

According to the company figures, the total number of employees on the rolls June 2, when the mass meetings were held, was 10,070. Of these 6,172 were present, the company said. It was brought out at the hearing, however, that representatives of the company presiding at the meeting had no other authority than to present the proposition that a wage cut of 12 per cent be established in the June 1 wage decision of the labor board, be applied. The board held that this proposal did not constitute a conference as contemplated by law.

JEW'S BREAK OFF PARLEYS WITH POLISH GOVERNMENT

Negotiations Lead to No Improvement in Conditions, Hebrews Assert

WARSAW, (AP)—Negotiations between the Polish government and a commission of representative Jews designed to improve relations and living conditions of Jews in the now republic were broken off recently, it was announced, after a series of meetings had been held at intervals during several months.

Since the negotiations began, according to Jewish members of the commission, conditions generally so far as the Jewish population is concerned have become worse, with little prospect of improvement. The Jews contended that further meetings with the Polish committee were useless at that time.

The government committee included Prince Sapieha, then minister of foreign affairs; M. Bielezowski, minister of finance, and other cabinet members. The Jews were represented by a group of the most prominent Jewish members of the diet and other prominent in looking after the Jewish interests of the state.

Poland has a total population of about 30,000,000 of whom approximately 4,000,000 are Jews.

DENNY ALLOCATES VESSELS TO BATTLE SHIPS

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The battleships Arizona, Nevada and Oklahoma were Monday ordered transferred from the Atlantic to the Pacific fleet by Secretary Denny. The battleship Maryland, now under construction, will, when completed, also be sent to the Pacific fleet.

By the same order the battleships New York, Texas, Wyoming and Arkansas are transferred from the Pacific to the Atlantic fleet.

WAR'S DISABLED MEN TO GATHER

Blind Hero is Chosen as Chaplain for Veterans' Convalescent in Detroit

DETROIT, Mich., (AP)—A blind hero of the world war will be the center of attraction at the formal opening of the first annual convention of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War, here on June 27. He is Michael Aaronson, rabbi and student at the Hebrew Union college, Cincinnati, who as chaplain of the Disabled American Veterans, will deliver the invocation at the first day's session of the veterans.

Rabbi Aaronson at the outbreak of the war enlisted and served in the 147th infantry. Both of his eyes were blown out when in the capture of Metz in France in the Argonne, he was struck by a shell as he was bringing back wounded American soldiers.

Captain Robert S. Marx, judge of the superior court of Cincinnati, national president, has announced that on Monday June 27 there will be a reception of delegations.

Tuesday, June 28, addresses of welcome will be delivered by Governor Goodrich of Michigan and Mayor Cousins of Detroit. Ambassador Jusserand of France will deliver the greeting from the republic of France, and if General John J. Pershing can be present he probably will make an address. General Pershing has notified Captain Marx he will either be present or send personal greeting.

In the afternoon a parade will be held which will include floats visualizing the problems confronting the disabled soldier and what is being done to help him. Tuesday evening there will be a French fete at Belle Isle, given by the United French Society of Detroit.

On Wednesday there will be a business session and an address by Uol Lankin, director of the federal board for vocational education. Mr. Lankin has 72,000 disabled soldiers in training and he will tell about their activities.

French Military Class Ordered Demobilized

ELECTRICS STRUGGLE ALONG FAR. IN WAKE OF FAST LEGIONNAIRES; GAME RUNAWAY FOR 'BUDDIES'

Sparkers Unable to Keep Pace with Soldier Men in Twilight League Contest; Hobson Pitches a Weak Game and is Badly Mauled, while His Mates are Unable to Make Headway Against Legion Flingers

The Legion team of the Twilight league last even staged two attractions at Lincoln field. One was a Derby race, the other a circus.

The former soldiers were guests of the Electricians in the first of the week Twilight match, and what they did to their hosts was a caution, and, perhaps, should not be recorded in all of its gory details. The simple final score, 18 to 9, really tells enough of the details. To recount here is hardly fair to the game.

However— To assist the contest here little likeness to what the national sport should be, except, perhaps, in spots, and these were like hen's teeth—few and a long distance apart. Slugging and scoring, the play, the world war heroes slugging two of the Electricians' flingers for 10 blows which might just as well have been twelve that makes the end of the fifth. Eighteen runs were counted off Hobson, a bean-like moundman who had speed but nothing else. "Hobby" is regular and probably only real wild man of this company. Besides giving 15 of the 18 hits the Legion compiled, the Electric's bill netted walked nine batters on balls and issued seven wild pitches.

As an illustration of this wild streak one instance alone may be pointed to: In the second inning Bonwell was up for a man. He got four straight balls, and went to first. A wild pitch let him down, another similar heave gave him third and he romped home on another of the error.

The Legion did its hardest work in the second and fifth stanzas, taking six runs in the former and eight in the latter. After the run in the fifth the soldiers refused to play ball, that is as is written in the book, hippodroming in order to get the thing out of the way as quickly as possible. Lyons pitched the last two innings and but one hit was made with two runs.

Fossem handled the pitching business for the Legion and got away well. With the game well stored away Fossem stepped at the end of the fifth and "Red" Bell circled through the remaining two rounds. The Legion sent in a lot of substitute hitters in the last half of the seventh, but this purely for the fun of the thing, if fun it can be characterized.

During his tenure of office as a billman Fossem gave four hits, which yielded three runs. In the opener the outstanding coterie started off like all-season winners, banging Fossem for a brace of healthy blows before that young man got his eyes opened and his flingers sent into a perfect operation. "Kiddie" Joslyn opened the doings

with a two-ply hit to left and Miller followed with a three-bagger to left of center. But it was only a flash in the pan, those hits constituting the biggest part of the Electric's main offensive. It is true that Gro made a double and Lewis a single in the sixth, and two runs were counted off Bell, and also true that in the seventh Joslyn got a single and Gill a fresh homer, but that is all worth remembering. Catcher Taylor got a homer inside the park when a rap he sent over Jarvis' head got lost in the brush in the fifth inning. One man was on at the time.

CHAMPION ADDS BOXER OF CLASS TO HIS COTERIE

"Kid" Norfolk, Colored Star with 'Mitts, to Help Put Dempsey in Pettie.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., (AP)—Kid Norfolk, negro light heavyweight, who has been clearing for a match with Jack Dempsey today joined the heavy-weight champion's staff of sparring partners and probably will work with him for the balance of the training grind. Norfolk is regarded as one of the leading light heavyweights of the country. He is aggressive, a clever boxer and Manager Kearns thinks he can develop Dempsey's speed.

Norfolk is the first of a number of high class boxers who will be brought into camp to put Dempsey on edge in the final ten days of his training. There is a possibility that Battling Greer may be dropped from the champion's staff because of his inclination to keep away from Dempsey instead of forcing the champion to extend himself. Greer, who was knocked down three times and had two teeth knocked loose the first time he boxed Dempsey, managed to keep out of range yesterday.

Larry Williams appears to be the only sparring partner in camp who gives Dempsey any kind of a workout.

Yesterday Dempsey nearly secured a clean knock down over the blond sparring partner, with a right hook to the jaw.

Yesterday the champion increased his boxing to eight rounds for the first time since he started training. The crowds which witness the daily workouts at Dempsey's outdoor camp are getting larger each day. Women spectators are numerous and they applaud the champion as he goes through his paces.

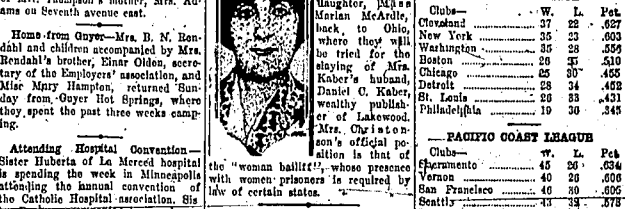

FORTLAND, Me., (AP)—The theory that pirates are afloat in the North Atlantic has found credence here. Belief in the explanation for the disappearance of the crew of the five-masted Bath schooner Carroll A. Deering, mystery ship of Diamond Shoals, was written by Henry Bates of Fortland, Me., a member of the crew. Question of the genuineness was settled by handwriting experts who compared it with letters written by Bates.

Discredit Pirate Stories

Investigators here say that they do not take seriously suggestions of hold ups or piracy on the ship. They say that they had no good as good as they do not.

They are inclined to the opinion that the two cases will go down in history with other unsolved mysteries of the sea, the greatest of which on record, they declare, is that of the American bark, the Carroll A. Deering, which was found off the Azores three months after she left Europe in 1872 with all sails set, unladen, in calm weather, but with the crew missing.

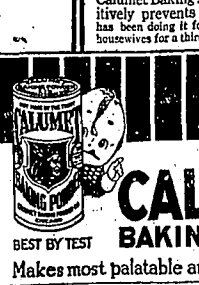
