HARDING SENDS ELKS GREETING

Letter from President is Read at Opening of Fraternal Order's Convention

LOS ANGELES, (AP)—A letter of greeting from President Harding to his fraternal brothers of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks was read Monday at the opening session here of the fifty-seventh grand lodge of the order. The letter was addressed to Grand Exalted Ruler W. M. Abbott and said: "My brother Abbott: I am exceedingly sorry that I am not able to be in attendance at the meeting of the grand lodge of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, to be held in Los Angeles. In my absence I would like you to express my very cordial greetings to the brethren. I feel especially anxious to have you do so because you were good enough, in your official position, to express to me congratulations of the order over my election to the presidency. I always feel myself a member much interested in the good fortunes of the order because I know, from actual association, the highly patriotic character of the order. The Elks have done full well of its supreme contribution to the cause of the republic during the period of the world war."

"WARREN G. HARDING," Chicagoan Confident. Consideration of a location for permanent national headquarters was the first business before the convention. Members of the Chicago delegation expressed confidence that their city would be selected, but the special committee appointed to investigate sites and report today was said also to have visited Washington, Columbia, Indianapolis, Cincinnati, St. Louis, Dubuque, Minneapolis, Kansas City, Omaha, Denver and Louisville and found available sites in each city.

The committee is composed of former Governor John K. Tener of Pennsylvania, chairman; J. F. Fanning, New York; J. R. Nicholson, Boston; Edward C. Baker, New Orleans; Mayor Fred Harper, Lynchburg, Va.; and Bruce A. Campbell, East St. Louis, Ill.

Books Central Location. As a memorial of the magnitude and character suggested, the committee will point out that it should be located in a city of such size and importance that the largest possible number of people, and especially the largest number of members of the order, would have the opportunity to visit it, it was stated. "And it is equally obvious that careful consideration should be given to the character of the prospective visitors and the motives likely to actuate their visits."

Twenty-one new lodges were added in the past year with a net increase of 121,083 in membership.

DISPUTE HALTS SCHOOL SESSION

Oldest South American University Engages in Word War with Government. LIMA, Peru, (AP)—Scholarship activities at San Marcos university, the oldest educational institution in South America, have been virtually paralyzed for more than two months as a result of a controversy, said to be largely political, between the government and the university.

The student body, numbering more than 1000 is said to be divided in opinion with regard to the dispute which became more acute lately when the government issued a decree declaring the university in process of organization and disbanded Doctor Xavier Prado, the rector, and about 50 professors who had taken an "unauthorized recess."

A virtual deadlock now exists between the opposing elements. The difficulty is said to have had its origin in a lecture given at the university by Dr. Heland, of the faculty of international law, shortly after his return from the United States. Among other things the speaker is alleged to have attacked some of the government's policies. This criticism was resented by groups in the audience and the meeting ended amid riotous scenes. Guardsmen and the police intervened and dispersed the crowd after about 100 shots were fired and some damage done to property. Several persons were injured.

A group of professors charged that the "sanctity of university thought had been invaded" and refused to continue their duties. The university council called a general assembly of professors and students to discuss the situation whereupon the government intervened and disbanded the rector and about 50 striking professors.

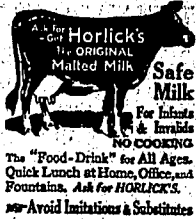

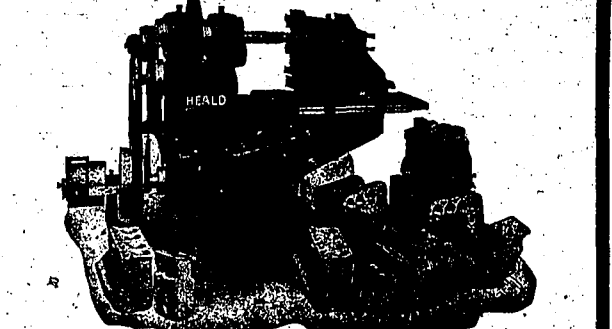

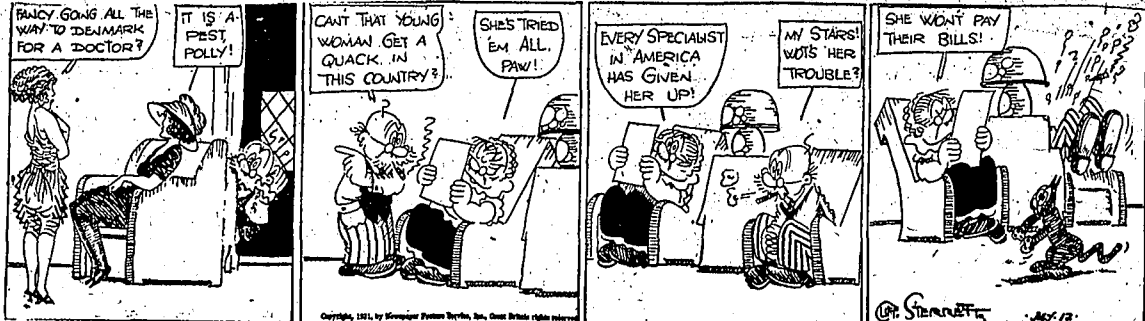

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SHOSHONE FALLS POWER PLANT RAPIDLY NEARING COMPLETION, IMPORTANT ELECTRICAL WORKS

One of Largest Jobs Undertaken in Intermountain Country for Generation of Electrical Energy will be Finished This Fall—Has Taken a Year in Construction

When the Idaho Power company completes its Shoshone Falls power plant, generation as an institution having a maximum capacity of 11,100 kilowatts will be added to the electrical energy force developed on waterways of Idaho.

The old plant of the big institution had a total capacity of 1,100 kilowatts and when completed will have cost the company \$1,250,000. Energy, it is expected, will be distributed from the new installation considerably before the first of the coming year, while the two generators of the old plant, which was shut down when extension operations were commenced some months back, have started operation again and are throwing "juice" into the company's general system daily.

An Important Plant The Shoshone Falls unit is a conspicuously important and large affair as electrically development works go. It is situated at one of the most tremendous water force sites in the intermountain country and is said to be susceptible of still further extraordinary development. Construction work on extension has been in progress since August 1, last year. At times as high as 200 men have been employed on the work. Above the plant a settlement of considerable proportions has been established, with construction workers and their families comprising the population. Until February 1 two shifts of men were engaged in the work. At present there is but one shift with 140 men on the payroll. Up to the middle of June the mess house, maintained for the accommodation of work crews, employed 40 men and 200 meals.

Upgrading the unit of water power needed for developing the 11,100 kilowatts of electrical energy has been in charge of the Phoenix Construction company. Dams have been constructed to close breaks in the natural rock face of the falls thus providing a diversion for a flow of water through a great steel tube for a distance of 10 feet in diameter and 162 feet in length. The penstock connects with a tunnel, drilled through solid sandstone rock and by which the upper river is tapped to carry water to the turbine in the powerhouse below. The turbine itself is set on a steel shaft and is constructed to develop a capacity of 240 revolutions to the minute. The generator sets at the top of the turbine, the whole being 30 1/2 feet from base to top. To provide an amply solid foundation for the immense weight of structure and machinery the contractors were compelled to drill and blast a huge prearranged back of a cotformid through stratified rock until unstratified granite formation was reached. This hole was filled with concrete thus forming an absolutely solid foundation for the installation. The excavation itself is about 42 feet in depth. In filling this hole the construction company used 8,000 yards of concrete for which between 25 and 30 cars of Portland cement were required. There is also six carloads of reinforcement steel employed in the foundation, the plant and the dam. By form building and other purposes 200 carloads of lumber were employed. The powerhouse is constructed of fireproof material. The new plant will have a total capacity of 18,000 horsepower, that of the old installation being 1700.

Conely Makes Statement In connection with this stupendous piece of construction Charles Conely, local manager for the Idaho Power company, makes the following statement: "The preliminary work was begun in July, 1920. The largest force was employed from August 1st to along in December of that year when from 200 to 275 men were employed. As the work has neared completion this force has been reduced as fewer men could be employed to advantage until at present about 140 men are employed. Except during our month two shifts have been employed—an 8 hour night shift and a 9 hour day shift. It is expected that the plant will be fully completed by early fall this year.
