ELECT TO MURDER CHARGE AGAINST FILM COMEDIAN

District Attorney Brady Announces Readiness to Proceed in Court on Graver Allegations Against Arbuckle

PRELIMINARY HEARING IS SET FOR THURSDAY

Course Chosen by Prosecutor Automatically Denies Defendant His Liberty on Bail, Court Officials Say

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—District Attorney Brady announced in the police court today that "the people are ready to proceed on the murder charge" against Roscoe G. (Fatty) Arbuckle, who is held in custody by the authorities for the death of Miss Virginia Rappe, a motion picture actress.

The announcement came after a conference between Brady and police officials called for the purpose of deciding which of the four charges against Arbuckle would be tried. There are two murder and two manslaughter charges pending against Arbuckle.

Judge Lazarus continued the case until next Thursday at 1 p. m.

Arbuckle on Foot

Arbuckle, surrounded by his attorneys, stood up at the counsel table during the brief session. A crowd of men tried to rush the courtroom door just before the hearing started but were headed off by the police.

Frank E. Dominguez, chief counsel for Arbuckle, asked for a ten-day continuance following Brady's statement. The district attorney objected, saying five days would be sufficient.

Dominegas explained that the defendant is willing to stay in jail until his counsel prepares his case, the people of the state of California should not mind.

Prosecution of the murder charge automatically denies the defendant his liberty on bail court officials explained.

Attorneys for the film star yesterday demanded \$5000 cash to cover the manufacturer charge.

IDAHO VETERANS WILL BE GUESTS OF TWIN FALLS

Festival Committee Extends Invitations to Former Service Personnel

Former service men and women throughout the state of Idaho are to be guests of honor at the fall festival and carnival to be staged here on the third anniversary of Armistice day, November 11, under auspices of Twin Falls post, American Legion.

PRESBYTERIANS OPEN SESSIONS IN PITTSBURGH

Representatives of 70 Different Churches Included in Alliance Undertake Analysis of Problems

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Analysis of problems confronting churches throughout the world will be undertaken here at the eleventh general council of the Alliance of Reformed Churches holding the Presbyterian system opening today. Sessions will continue until September 25.

Seventy different church bodies, numbering nearly 35,000,000 members and adherents, are included in the Alliance, according to Dr. John McNaughton, president of the Pittsburgh Theological Seminary and chairman of the local committee.

Face Baffling Problems
"This meeting is one of utmost importance, because of the baffling problems confronting not any one nation or group of nations, or one church or group of churches, but all nations and all churches," Dr. McNaughton said. "They are world church problems and only a world gathering with the leader in religious work and thought from all corners of the earth in attendance can properly diagnose those problems and work out the remedies for those ills."

"The general council of the Alliance is expected to solve many of the problems of the Reformed Presbyterian churches. Ministers and church members in these churches are expected to get the results of the deliberations of the council, because this is the first meeting since before the war, and the war has been responsible for many of the church's problems."

Follows Old Custom
Since the first convention in Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1877, it has been the custom to hold meetings of the general council of the Alliance every three or four years. The last one was in Aberdeen, Scotland, in 1913.

GOTHAM BUILDER DEFIES OLD AGE

Frank D. Johnson, 72 and Wealthy, Continues to Build and Sell Houses

NEW YORK CITY, (AP)—Although entering his seventy-second year with enough money to retire and take up golf, Frank D. Johnson of Brooklyn continues to erect houses all by himself and sell them.

For the last 50 years he has worked 10 to 12 hours a day at his parson and now is putting up a one-bran house on Gravesend avenue. No hands but his own have touched the structure since he started it.

Last July while he was working on the house, it was struck by lightning. Digging himself out of the debris, Johnson rubbed some medicine onto his bruises and was back on the job the next day.

Born in Boston of revolutionary war stock, Johnson expects to live 100. He has all but two of his original teeth and secretly a hair has fallen from his head.

"I could have knocked off and taken it easy, but if I had done so I would now be repining in some graveyard," was the way Johnson put it.

Besides being a stonemason, bricklayer, carpenter, plasterer, plumber, tinmith, painter, paper hanger, decorator, glazier, electrician wood carver and cabinet maker, Johnson studied all the ins and outs of law government and politics so as to save all time searching and all legal fees.

COPENHAGEN, (AP)—Rumors that King Christian of Denmark is about to pay an official visit to the United States are unfounded.

The rumors probably arose from the fact that many influential Danes and Americans living at present here were of the opinion that an official visit to America by the king and queen would be likely to further strengthen the natural basis of friendship between the two nations. They also thought that it was desirable the king should go as his own ambassador and express Denmark's gratitude toward America for her valuable aid in getting back Danish slaves from Germany.

TWIN FALLS RESIDENT WILL ASSUME OFFICE

Captain Longley Leaves for Boise to Take Position of State Assayer

Captain C. L. Longley, who for years has been a notable figure in business and political circles of this city, with Mrs. Longley, left this morning for Boise, where he takes charge of the office of state assayer.

The Twin Falls man is one of the first men in Idaho to receive recognition at the hands of the administration through appointment to an office. He has been granted one of the most desirable positions to be bestowed in the reorganization of the political status in Idaho. He is considered amply qualified and able to fulfill all the requirements of the office.

Captain Longley was born at Hawley, Mass. His great grandfather was married to the niece of Lexington and was mustered out of the army a captain at the close of the Revolutionary war. His grandfather commanded a brigade during the war of 1812 and he served three years during the Civil war in the Twenty-fourth Iowa Infantry.

He has held an official position except that of postmaster at Tipton, Ia., to which he was commissioned by Pres-

ident Garfield; was editor and publisher of a republican paper in Iowa for 22 years, and came to Twin Falls, Idaho in 1913, after 23 years at Vicksburg, Miss. in connection with the construction of the Vicksburg National Military park.

of the liquor alleged to have been consumed at the Arbuclke party in a hotel suite here, at which Miss Rappo is said to have suffered injuries which led to

her death, has been carried to Los Angeles. Robert Camarillo, assistant United States district attorney, declared in Los Angeles that several people had made statements to him which would show that Arbuclke transported twenty quarts of whiskey in his automobile when he motored to San Francisco to stage his party. It was also learned, Camarillo said, that a case of gin and other liquor was delivered to the Arbuclke rooms at the San Francisco hotel.

Motor May Be Seized. The automobile in which Arbuclke is said to have carried the liquor from Los Angeles to San Francisco, is declared to be worth \$25,000. Officials point out that should it be proven Arbuclke transported liquor in the machine that the automobile could be confiscated by federal authorities under the terms of the Volstead act. The body of Miss Virginia Rappo, according to announcement, will be sent to Hollywood, Cal., probably late today. Hollywood, a suburb of Los Angeles, is the city of the motion picture people.

Witnesses Under Guard. Witnesses in the Arbuclke case are being watched and guarded by police to prevent their possible intimidation. Police officials stated this step was taken, in some cases, at the request of witness themselves. District Attorney Brady in a statement late last night declared he was prepared to bring Arbuclke to trial in about three weeks. He expressed the belief that the defense in the case would be ready to proceed within that time also.

Arbuclke Avoids Newspapers. Arbuclke yesterday received twenty-six telegrams and 101 letters, sent to him care of the city jail. Arbuclke spends his time in his cell reading his mail, telegrams and magazines, according to prison attendants. He avoids reading newspapers, they said.

Prosecutor in Conference. Before Arbuclke was taken into the court of Police Judge Sylvain J. Lazarus, District Attorney Brady and his assistants, L. Mc Golden and M. T. U'ren, went into conference with Captain of Detectives Duncan Mellican to determine on the announcement which will be made in court relative to the prosecution of the murder charge which is to be heard there. Only those having business with the court were allowed to enter Judge Lazarus' courtroom. A crowd of approximately 500, mostly men, assembled outside the courtroom before the session started, and a special police detail was stationed in the crowded corridor.

Women Crowd Courtroom. The courtroom was filled at 10 o'clock, most of the spectators being women. Among them was a committee from the Women's Vigilant committee, an organization made up of club women which has pledged itself to assist the authorities in every way in investigating the case. Arbuclke had not appeared when the calling of the calendar was begun. It was reported from the city prison that he felt more cheerful today than for some days past.

Alternative Charge Open. Court officials explained that even if Arbuclke is held on the murder charge, it may be reduced later in the trial court if the evidence does not justify its prosecution. The murder charge itself includes the minor charge of manslaughter and a trial can be had and a verdict returned on either charge even though murder is the only charge showing on the docket, it was said.
