

CHINESE FLOOD SHOWS COST OF DEFORESTATION

Recurrent Disaster in Anhwei Province Should Teach Lesson to Americans, Forestry Association is Advised

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP)—China's great flood disaster in Anhwei province last year, and the current year, should be a lesson to the United States showing what may follow indiscriminate deforestation, says Dean Reiser of the college of agriculture and forestry at the University of Nankin in a detailed report to the American Forestry association.

"China with her floods is an example to the world of the need of reforestation," says he. "A conservative expenditure for various forestry enterprises, mainly nursery work and forest planting, is from \$200,000 to \$300,000 million dollars, the production of 100,000,000 trees in over 10,000 nurseries, and the planting of twenty-five to thirty million trees on 100,000 acres of land. This may seem small when compared with some other countries, but large when one considers the background and the fact that China's forest land in forestry is only a very few years old."

Wide Area Stricken.
"The magnitude of the devastation in the Anhwei province," says Charles C. Park, president of the association in giving out the report of Dean Reiser, "may be seen when we consider that the flooded area is twice the area of Massachusetts about 15,000 square miles. The population of the Bay state is around four million people while in a million and a half less than the sufferers in the flooded area. The crowded conditions will at once be recalled. It is estimated that the flooded area is around 40 miles to the north of Nankin. The deforested condition of China are the causes not only of the floods but of most of her famines in that country."

Dun Yang Lin, a graduate of the Yale Forestry school is one of the leaders in the forestry work in China. He got into Tientsin after one of the floods.
"While in Tientsin," Mr. Lin reported, "I had the opportunity of going through the flooded area. It was a terrible sight. The boats pointed out the high water marks, told us of the millions rendered homeless and the thousands that had perished. Coffins could be seen floating in the streams. The country was under crop when the flood came and the loss of the harvest was a calamity."
"The recent provincial development," says Dean Reiser's report, "has been in Shantung province, which has come into world prominence

through the 'Shantung award' of the Paris peace conference. This work was organized by Mr. Lin.
"A provincial forest service has been established with a chief forester and eleven assistants. Work was prosecuted so vigorously that the first planting season saw the organization of three forestry stations, the establishment of three nurseries with sites for two more for the following season, over 600,000 trees planted on 2,000 mow of land and an additional 2000 mow seeded.

Railways Assist Work.
"Three government railroads are engaged in reforestation work looking forward to supplying their own lines and other timbers used in railroad maintenance. Several other railroads are contemplating similar developments. The budgets are voted by the various railway administrations interested. The forestry work of the Lung Hai railway, which is financed by Belgian interests, is under the direction of J. Hertz. The reforestation has been mostly along both sides of the railway where 4,000,000 trees have been set out.
"The Tientsin-Pukow railway forestry work is in charge of a graduate of Harvard forestry school. About 850,000 trees have been planted. The Peking

Hankow railway's forestry work is under the direction of Ngan Hui, a graduate of the forestry department of Michigan university.
"The outstanding forestry development continues to be that of the Kiangsu provincial forestry station, started in 1914, located near the famous Ming Tombs in Nankin, at the head of which is Mr. Rong Sing-Mou, a graduate of the Philippine Forestry school.
Arbor Day Observed.
"Thirty-four thousand mow of land (a mow being about one-sixth of an acre) have been replanted to date with two and a half million trees planted, among 23 different species. Trees and seeds for nurseries and over 50,000 trees for transplanting and use in the observance of Arbor day, were distributed to 136 district officials, agricultural societies, agriculture and forestry stations and companies or individuals.
"Anhwei province is now teaching forestry in four of her five agricultural schools. Chekiang province has a secondary forestry school with a large enrollment. Arbor day in China is a national holiday now and it is observed in schools and by high officials."

ROAD BUILDERS AT WORK IN ALASKAN TERRITORY

Construction of Railway Stimulates the Building of Wagon Roads to Tap Vast Region

ANCHORAGE, Alaska. (AP)—Territory on both sides of the United States government railroad being built between Seward and Fairbanks, Alaska, is being penetrated by wagon roads and trails which will serve as feeder lines for the railroad, according to Colonel James G. Strickland, chairman of the Alaska road commission.
During the past year \$200,654.82 has

been spent on road work in a strip 100 miles wide along the railroad. Several quartz districts have been opened, as a result of the road construction and eventually the mines will provide tonnage for the railroad it is thought.
Colonel Strickland has recommended that the government adopt a ten-year road-building program which will tap every producing district in the railroad area and through connections reach sections in other parts of Alaska distant from the road.

COPPER COINS RUN SHORT

Australia in Midst of Periodical, Mysterious Shortage of Change

SYDNEY, N. S. W., (AP)—(By Mail)—Australia now is in the midst of one of its periodical mysterious shortages of copper coins, which have baffled the treasury officials.

Children's banks, where held responsible at first for the shortage and an appeal from the treasury resulted in the exchange of many coupons for silver money. Despite this and the assistance of certain clumsy counterfeiters, copper coins are exceedingly scarce. In some quarters the approach of Christmas was blamed, as, during the annual busy shopping period large retail houses have heavy demands for change, and it was thought that some of the corporations had accumulated a surplus of coppers against these demands.

"We are using 800 pounds worth of pennies and about 300 pounds worth of half pennies every week," J. B. Collins, secretary of the treasury, said today. "We are at a loss to explain how there can be a shortage. The treasury never withdraws coppers from circulation so that our output is additional to those already in use."

TRACES JAPAN'S GROWING POWER OVER FAR EAST

Nippon, Like British Isles, Depends Upon Sea Power, But Confines Territorial Acquisitions to Orient

WASHINGTON, D. C. (Special)—Japan, which from a position of isolation in the Asian war, has emerged to become one of the dominant factors in the Pacific, might be termed the new power and less conspicuous than the Far East, says a bulletin from Washington, D. C., headquarters of the National Geographic society.

Has Remained Center of Empire. But there are differences as well as likenesses between these two island nations. Since she began to grow into an empire, Great Britain has repeatedly turned her back on Europe insofar as territorial acquisitions are concerned, and has sent her colonists into the farthest corners of the world.

Though Japan had imperial ambitions even in the early centuries, as indicated by the fact that she once conquered Korea, and laid claim in the sixteenth century to Formosa and even the Philippines, the national life, when Commodore Perry opened communications with the west in 1854, was confined to the three main islands.

WAR HAS CLAIMED JAPAN. These expansions to the north were of little value, for the cold, bleak northern lands have never appealed to the Japanese colonist.

COURTS WILL DECIDE IF PRODUCT MADE FROM DRIED APPLES IS CIDER VINEGAR

The controversial question as to the labeling of vinegar made from evaporated apples as "apple cider vinegar" might be used to indicate a product made from dried apple stock, but that such product should not be labeled "apple cider vinegar" on "apple cider vinegar" was the decision of the courts.

The hearing was attended by a number of vinegar manufacturers. Letters received from many state officials charged with the enforcement of food laws. Thorough and written statements indicated that the term "apple vinegar" be permitted for vinegar made from evaporated apples.

First Annual Outdoor Agricultural Conclave is Marked Success

The first annual summer encampment of Utah families was held on the campus of the state university, beginning August 8, and proved an unqualified success. Extension workers of the United States Department of Agriculture and the college, including county agents, home demonstration agents, and club leaders, and a Washington representative of the department joined in providing a pleasant college atmosphere for the 640 persons who attended the camp.

The women's rest room was transformed to a playroom for the smallest ones, fitted up with sand piles, blocks, saw, hammers, nails, doll, scissors, paper, painting sets and similar amusements. Many were present on a day. An outside playground offered swings and slides. Older boys and girls took canoe trips, hiker, swims, or lessons in basketball.

Livestock and grain-judging contests were held each morning between teams from the various counties in the state. The women completed in sewing and millinery work. The individual scores were added together and a large silver trophy cup, to be held until next season's encampment, was presented by a Utah Lake City bank to Utah county, which made the highest score.

The nutrition projects of the home demonstration work were ably assisted by talks given by Dr. Caroline Hodgson, child specialist. She stressed the need of an all-around training of the family in health matters, including general standards, care of teeth, healthful dress, increased recreation, good music, and a balanced method of living.
