



**ENGLISH LOOK FOR SENATE TO RATEY TREATY**

London Newspaper Comment Is Highly Laudatory of the Achievements of Armament Conference at Washington

LONDON, (AP)—Ratification of the new power treaty relative to insular possessions in the Pacific is believed to be assured when the convention is submitted to the United States senate. In the view of newspapers here, many journals greeted the terms of the treaty with enthusiasm and based their forecast of ratification upon the fact that Senator Lodge presented the draft at the Washington conference.

**Bold and Magnanimous Stroke.**—The apparently impossible is, in effect, an accomplished fact," said the Telegraph. "Our alliance with Japan has paved out of existence upon the only terms which Japan could regard as satisfactory, and which we could feel to be honorable. . . . By this achievement alone, President Harding's administration has fully justified the bold and magnanimous stroke of statesmanship which it announced the world a few months ago." In the opinion of the Westminster Gazette, "the eye, weakness of the treaty is the fact that it does not guarantee the integrity of China. . . . We have emerged from a nightmare of misunderstandings about secret motives, and Mr. Harding has earned the good will of the world by his initiative," said the Gazette.

**"Real Thing at Last."**—Under the caption: "The Real Thing at Last," the Associated Press expressed hope that opinion regarding the ratification of the United States senate on the treaty was well founded. It reiterated its opposition to the league of nations, saying:

"Article 2 of the new treaty is a much surer guarantee against a breach of the peace than all the debates and the edicts of the members of the league at Geneva. The world at last, is returning to common sense." Great Britain will be immensely benefited by the treaty, while Holland also will gain through it, declared the Daily Chronicle. It expressed gratification over the "prospect of close and definite cooperation with America."

**Real News in Times.**—Reports that a world economic conference will probably follow the parleys at Washington were referred to by the Daily Express, which said: "This is the best news the world has had in many years."

**\$250,000 FOR DISABLED VETERANS DREW'S GOAL**

Forget-Me-Not Flower to Symbolize Plea for Men Wounded in Service

CINCINNATI, O., (AP)—A drive to raise \$250,000 for disabled veterans of the World War is planned for December 17 throughout the United States by the disabled American veterans of the World War, whose national headquarters are here.

# WALLACE SEES BETTER TIMES AHEAD ON FARM

### Secretary of Agriculture Gives Reasons for Optimism with Frank Survey of Plight of Farmers

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Freely and frankly discussing the present plight of the American farmer, Secretary Wallace tells the president in his first annual report that there "seems to be good reasons for believing that the agricultural sector will be reasonably happy for gradual improvement from now on." He adds that "a clear recognition of the conditions as they exist should help us to realize this hope."

In large part the troubles of the farmer today are due to world-wide conditions and the inevitable result of the war effort, he says, adding that it is not to be expected that "miraculous transformation" of the period of adversity may be turned over night into a period of peace.

#### Giving Depression Causes

High freight rates, big crops produced in the face of high costs, unemployment in other industries in the country, the increasing demand for buying of foodstuffs, and the lack of foreign markets for the farm surplus are given by the secretary as the more immediate causes for present conditions in agriculture. He lays particular stress upon the lack of foreign markets and high freight rates.

"It is a terrible indictment of modern civilization," he says, "that with such abundance here there are millions of people overseas suffering for the bare necessities and other millions starving to death. And surely we are sadly lacking in our understanding of economic laws or in our adjustment to them when the production of bounteous crops grown by the hard labor of 13,000,000 farmers and their farm workers and their families is permitted to play such a large part in paralyzing our industries and business at home."

Such advances in freight rates while bearable in time of high prices, Mr. Wallace says, if continued are bound to involve a re-making of the American agricultural map.

#### Proposes Alternatives

"The simple process of marking up the transportation cost a few cents a hundred pounds," the secretary writes, "has the effect of increasing the producing state as picking it up and setting it down 100 to 300 miles farther from the market. Agriculture is depressed and the farmer is poorer and his population and industry still to meet this new condition."

With the heavy consuming population of the country massed near the coast, long distances from the producing areas, Mr. Wallace says, substantial advances in the transportation costs have the effect of imposing a differential against American producers in favor of their competitors in foreign lands, particularly those to the south of this country, who have the advantage of cheap water transportation.

#### New Lands Opening

The agriculture secretary thinks that when the country finally emerges from the present condition it will find itself at the beginning of a new agricultural era. Pointing to the large increase in the country's population and the fact that most of the easily cultivated land has been taken up, he said the time is not far distant when new lands will require practically all that American farms produce in the average years. "This means," he adds, "a more intensive agriculture, with larger production."

to the general and inherent cost, if we are to meet foreign competition and still maintain our standard of living."

The department is planning to meet these new conditions, Mr. Wallace continues, by strengthening certain phases of its work, more especially the scientific research; the application of the result of research to farm practice; the extension of studies of marketing farm crops with a view to reducing costs, investigation of both production and consumption at home and abroad for the purpose of better adjusting American production to market needs and studies looking toward making available to the farmer those devices of modern business which provide needed capital and credit, and which may help to distribute production risks more equitably.

#### Asks Minimum Bums

The amounts asked for this work in the coming fiscal year have been "reduced to the minimum," the secretary says, adding that in the future the appropriations will be increased just as rapidly as needed.

In this connection, Mr. Wallace draws attention to the advisability of congress granting permanent, not big, commissions of the bureau of markets and crop estimates and the office of farm management, into which would be merged all the forces of the department that are engaged in agricultural economic work.

In his discussion of present conditions, Mr. Wallace declares that the difficulties of the farmers are a matter of national concern and one that should be given attention by every thoughtful citizen.

"We must accept the cold fact," he declares, "that agricultural production in this country is not being continued for any length of time on a basis which does not give the producer a fair price," and proceeds to show how inadequate prices to the farmer leaves the nation relying upon throwing men out of employment and creating what he calls "a vicious circle" that it is difficult to break through.

#### Olives Congressional Aid

Congress has aided in improving the situation, he says, by passing a special session legislation of a constructive character that "will be more helpful than is now now being done in the adequate extension of the power of the war finance corporation, the increase in the capital of the federal farm land banks, the bringing of the farmers and about agencies and the great exchanges under government supervision.

Reviewing the work of the various bureaus of the department, Mr. Wallace says that during the past year more improved roads were built under the federal aid road act than during any similar period, the mileage completed being more than three times as great as the entire mileage completed during the preceding years under the act. During the fiscal year 7,400 miles of highways were completed and 17,977 miles were under construction.

Under a policy now being worked out by the department, the secretary says, it is estimated that the two national forests in Alaska can furnish perpetually 9,000,000 cords of pulp wood annually, amounting to an equivalent of one-third of the present annual consumption in this country. Two large sales already have been made with one small mill erected, Mr. Wallace says, and with financial and industrial conditions returning to normal it is expected that there will be extensive development along this line.

# STATE POLICE GUARD PRISON

### Extra Precautions Taken at Michigan Penitentiary Following Rioting

MARQUETTE, Mich., (AP)—Michigan state policemen were standing guard in Marquette prison today following a riot among the prisoners yesterday morning that resulted in the serious stabbing of Warden T. B. Catlin, the beating of Deputy Warden Fred Menhennit and the serious wounding of the latter's son, Arthur.

Three to be Flogged.

Three inmates of the prison who are charged with leading the riot were to be flogged in the institution's bull pen today, the punishment having been ordered by Charles Blaney of Kalamazoo, chairman of the Michigan state prison commission.

Warden Catlin, who received nine knife wounds, is said to be in a serious condition. Young Menhennit was stabbed in the lung. Each is in a local hospital.

The outbreak came in the prison chapel while a large number of the prisoners were witnessing a moving picture performance. "O'paly a Hot Harper, Jasper Perry and Charles Roberts, all of Detroit, are alleged to have rushed upon Warden Catlin in the darkened room and to have slashed him with knives stolen from the prison kitchen.

Guard Steps Revolt.

A guard with a rifle stopped the revolt after the warden and the two Menhennits had been stabbed.

Harper had expressed ill-feeling for the warden because his privileges had been revoked following his capture after an escape three months ago.

#### CHICAGO LIBRARY COLLECTS \$40,000 A YEAR BY FINES

CHICAGO, (AP)—Fines on overdue library books paid to the Chicago public library run \$40,000 a year, reports Librarian Carl B. Boden.

Several buyers, with \$25,000 in cash, left on the Hudson Bay railroad recently to purchase furs. The traps stop at each trading post for only a few minutes, but in this brief period the buyers rush on the trader or trapper and make offers for their furs. This method of buying has been followed for years by many.

# WARDEN FINDS SHAVING HELP TO GOOD CONDUCT

### Prison Official Prescribes Regular Use of Safety Razor as Incentive to "Go Straight"

SAN QUENTIN, Cal., (AP)—Shaved faces help men to "go straight," believes Warden James J. Johnston of the big California state penitentiary here.

Johnston recently issued a bulletin to the 2100 prisoners to the effect that they could shave themselves daily, if they so desired. Safety razors must be used, the bulletin said, and will not be issued, but must be purchased by the prisoners or given them by friends on the outside.

In the past prison barbers shaved the inmates twice a week. The number of prisoners, however, has increased recently, but not many barbers have been among the arrivals. As a result some of the men were getting only once a week.


"The right to use a razor will induce many men to improve their appearance and from the practice may will cultivate a determination to go straight," Johnston said.

War-Time Chief of Staff Makes An Urgent Recommendation Against Permanent Reduction of Army

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Warning against a permanent reduction of the regular army below 200,000 called for in the report of the chief of staff on the 1921-22 budget...

General March declares in his report that the idea that army of 150,000 men, the strength now authorized by mandate of congress, furnishes 75 per cent, as much national defense as a force of 200,000 "is a fallacy."

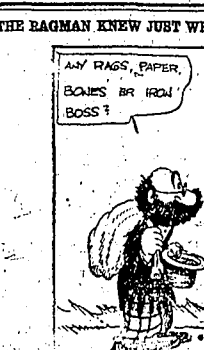

ARREST RESULT,  
"STILL" FOUND

Salmon District Farmer Held in Jail on Dual Charge; Said to Have Admitted

Arrest yesterday afternoon of Roy G. Kirkman by Deputy Sheriff V. H. Ormsby is said to have resulted in confession to the theft of an automobile from the late car owner, W. H. Hardin, of Kimberly, and also to the maintenance and operation of an illicit still. Kirkman was arrested in Twin Falls when he was driving the lost car in his possession. The "still" is alleged to have been discovered in a cistern on the Kirkman place. The confession is said to have been made before competent witnesses.

**Find Evidence.** The Hardin car, records show, was stolen from a street in Twin Falls last June and, although constant close search was made no clue developed. It was whereabouts until a few days ago. This clue implicated the man arrested on Sunday, suspicions leading to a search of the cistern at thirty feet after noon yesterday. The object of search was not found on the farm, but it is said certain evidence was disclosed supporting the theory of evidence. The dismantling of cars had been done at the place in an effort to change their identity. A windshield and some tools, which Mr. Hardin is related to have identified himself as being the automobile, were found and are held as evidence by Sheriff Sherman.

**Search "Still" in Cistern.** The still and material were discovered by accident during a hunt for evidence bearing upon the theft of the automobile, the opening of a cistern containing a supply of water for domestic purposes, and a quantity upon the secret "still." A light quantity of "moonshine" liquor is said to have been found hidden in a granary.

No exact plans had been made by Kirkman to obtain release on bonds, authorities say. His confession is alleged to have been orally made to Ormsby in the sheriff's private office last night.

Witnesses at the trial will be W. H. Hardin, owner of the lost car, and D. C. Graybill, witnesses.

DISTRICT CONFIRMATION  
STRIKES SMAG IN COURT

Protests Lodged Against Acceptance of Low Lift System From Two Sides

Confirmation by the district court of proceedings creating the Miller Low Lift irrigation district met with protest from the irrigation districts of the district and the county commissioners' proceedings were opened by Judge 27 Bailey Lee this morning. Evidence was taken from the district attorney, J. H. Murtagh, irrigation district representative by J. W. Porter, of Porter & Williams, and by the Northvale investment company, which concern owns the Miller irrigation. John R. Baile, of Walters, Hudgin and Bailey represented the outside company. Harry Hanzel, of Hazel & Bergon, represented the district attorney. The Murfurg irrigation district people protested confirmation on the ground that through inadvertence, five dollars had been included in the low lift project. Judge Walters protested on the ground that 200 acre of land brought into the district and the investment company had been confirmed in the low lift district contrary to the wishes of the owning company. The district itself is proposed for the irrigation approximately 300 acre of land in the east end of the county.

WALTON ALLOWED SMALL DAMAGES AGAINST CITY

Jury Gives Former Store Operator \$150 in Suit Against Town for \$3,000

Damages in the sum of \$150 were awarded today to the Walton Millinery company in a verdict against the city of Twin Falls, read in the district court this morning. The award was made in liquidation of damages to property and merchandise stocks through the flooding of premises when a city water main burst in June, 1919. The district was reached late in the afternoon, after the case had been in the hands of the jury several hours. The finding was sealed and given to the jury at the court's request for presentation in court at opening today. Plaintiff in these cases, tried jointly, claimed the total sum of \$3000 as damages to the amount both equally divided between the two plaintiffs. The cases were tried at a previous session of the court, the jury reaching a verdict on the first agreement, resulted when half the jury voted against awarding any amount for damages. The verdict today also follows the plaintiff's suit for \$25,000 as interest in each case. Damages on the total for each to \$17,250. To the award of interest Taylor Connolly, city attorney, moved to strike out the interest feature.

IDAHO STATE BANK BOUGHT BY TWIN FALLS NATIONAL

Consolidation of Banking Interests Results in Merger of Local Capital. Through arrangements which have been pending for some days and which were completed late last night the Idaho State bank has been purchased outright by the Twin Falls National bank. Transfer of the business to the quarters of the latter institution has already been made and all checks drawn on the Idaho State are cashed at the Twin Falls National. Assets and liabilities, including all accounts are of course included in the transfer.

News of the purchase this morning was discussed with keen interest in local business circles the acceptance of final arrangements for the purchase were completed with a national bank and a representative of the Federal Reserve Bank of Salt Lake.

Officers and directors of the Twin Falls National bank are Joseph Keefe, president; Dr. T. O. Boyd, vice president; J. A. Keefe, cashier; N. J. Keefer, assistant cashier. These officers, already in the Twin Falls National, are Robert Hodgson, Andrew Hodgson and T. J. Lloyd constitute the board of directors.

The Idaho State bank was established some six or seven years ago by Leo E. Buecken, his son, Leo E. Buecken having been cashier of the institution up to the present time. The Twin Falls National was organized about three years ago by the Keefe interests, having purchased of local real estate, including the Hogerton hotel block being made by the Keefers at the same time.

BOY SCOUTS DELVE INTO MYSTERIES OF BIG CAVE

Spend Day in Exploration of Curious Formation North of Hansen

Under direction of Scout Master Donald McLean the boys of Troop 4 and one car of boys from Scout Master George W. Caldwell's troop spent Sunday afternoon exploring the mammoth cave four miles north of the Hansen bridge. The road ends two miles from the bridge head and here a glenzer of sandstone cliffs, red rock and gravel was prepared, following which the scouts hiked to the cave, reaching there about 3:30 o'clock.

Exploration was conducted under two groups, which took the opposite sides of the cave and proceeded with complete explorations of all side chambers; meeting at the farther end, which is fully half a mile from the opening. Allaytations were narrowed by the casting in of the side walls, but the measurements taken show the cavern to average 50 feet in width, and to be 30 feet to the apex. The walls are jagged. Collections were made of water formations as well as the bones of animals. The exploration required about an hour, and the return trip to the car was on foot by a steep at an ice pond. Refreshments were again served upon return to the cars.

The distance from Twin Falls to the cave being thirty miles, a first class soccer test in hiking about 14 miles, four groups decided to walk home. Those were Willard Whitman and George Winslow; Joe Deles and David Alford; Carl Blum and Walter Weaver; Howard Berg and Donald Lenz. They reached town between 7:30 and 8 o'clock. A written description and a map of the lake is necessary to complete the first class test in biking.
