

POWERS REACH AGREEMENT ON NAVAL LIMITS

Retention of 5-5-3 Ratio with Admission of General Increase in Tonnage All Round Seems Probable

FOCAL POINT SHIFTS TO FAR EASTERN QUESTIONS

Committee in Adjournment in Subject to Hughes' Call After Japan Objects to China's Demands

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—A statement has been made by the United States, Great Britain and Japan on limitation of naval armament, it was said today by a spokesman for the British delegation.

The statement was made at the same time in American delegation circles that the retention of the 5-5-3 ratio had gone "over the top of the hill successfully."

The British delegation spokesman also said that the made public later in the day. The agreement was considered as assuring a plenary session of the conference tomorrow at which the American views will be presented and formal approval expressed by the heads of delegations of the countries.

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—With formal announcement of a complete agreement between Great Britain, the United States and Japan on the 5-5-3 ratio, the focal point of the conference now shifts to the far eastern discussions.

No session was scheduled today for the British committee which adjourned yesterday in response to the call of Chairman Hughes after China had requested that the meeting continue for the purpose of discussing the question which has been promptly objected to by the Japanese delegation.

Alternative proposals relating to the 5-5-3 ratio, as worked out apparently over night by naval experts were presented today to Secretary Hughes, Mr. Wilson and Rear Admiral Jellicoe, according to delegation spokesmen that no formal agreement had been reached by the big three.

The proposals, submitted as a means of balancing the naval ratio to compensate for the retention of the 5-5-3 ratio by Japan would permit Great Britain to build two super-battleships and one or two super-battleships of the type of the Tiger and Republic, or to build two battleships of the Royal Sovereign class, scrapping of four dreadnaughts, but no limit on cruisers.

It was stated that these alternatives are combined with all sorts of questions, as to the method of calculating tonnage, whether by the American or by the British or Japanese systems.

The increase of the American tonnage by 35,000 would admit the substitution of the super-battleships at the Washington or the West Virginia, for the older battleships Delaware and North Dakota. Japan in retaining the Matsun would scrapping of four destroyers.

The substantial effect of the adoption of either of these alternatives would be to retain the naval ratio of 5-5-3, while securing a general increase of tonnage all around.

A British spokesman said that some agreement was reached by the Japanese Pacific fortifications probably was near and that it was felt a plenary session of the conference might be held Saturday or Monday.

Sees Remedy for Farming Slump in Government Loan

North Dakota Senator Says Existing Financial Systems Fail

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—Failure of present day financial and credit systems to meet the needs of the people is threatening the destruction of the American people, Senator Ladd of North Dakota declared today in opening the conference called by him to seek legislative relief from the situation. Ladd proposed that the federal loan bureau as one method of relief, as setting that through it the government would renege its proper function of insuring against the loss of credit to all the people on terms of equality.

Estimating that a loss to all industrial classes during the last few years of \$25,000,000,000, Ladd said that the purchasing power had receded from the value of farm products he declared that this could be traced to the "non-functioning" capital held by a few great corporations.

GERMANY ASKS FOR MORE TIME

Announces Inability to Meet Reparations Payment; Calls for Moratorium

BERLIN, (AP)—The German government, it was announced today, has informed the committee of guarantees that it is impossible for Germany to pay the reparations that it contracted last year and that she consequently asks a moratorium.

If the moratorium is not granted, the German government will have to resort to a credit operation in order to procure the necessary funds by means of loans.

The role for the German government is to raise "certain portions" of the funds necessary to meet the payments, but it is unable to obtain the balance, either through loans or through interest or other financial measures.

SLAIN BROKER'S MOTHER APPEARS IN COURT ROOM

Mrs. J. D. Kennedy Hears Testimony on Alleged Murder of Her Son

LOS ANGELES, (AP)—When the trial of Arthur O. Burch, charged with murder in connection with the slaying of J. Bolton Kennedy, August 5 last, was resumed in superior court here today, Mrs. D. Kennedy, mother of the slain broker, appeared in court for the first time since the taking of testimony was begun.

This was the first day since the beginning of Burch's trial that Mrs. Madryne Oberlin, jointly indicted with Burch, was present in the court room, her case having been continued yesterday until next Monday.

Direct testimony of Deputy Sheriff Charles Sprague was heard today in connection with the case. Sprague testified yesterday he saw a truck extracted from Burch's garage in the county jail on or about August 10.

The truck, which was a Buick, was similar to those growing on bushes in the vicinity of Kennedy's Beverly Glen cottage, the scene of the shooting.

ULSTER ORGANIZATIONS READY FOR EVENTUALITY

London Hears Grand Orange Lodge Call on Its Members and Those of Royal Black in Situations to Join Causes

DUBLIN, (AP)—As the Dail Eireann met today for the continuation of its secret session it was declared by Michael Collins and Griffith that they and the other signers of the Irish peace agreement now felt certain of an ultimate majority in favor of the treaty.

Discount Opposition. They declared no prominent person in any part of Ireland had yet protested against the action. An agreement with the British cabinet, President De Valera's objections were stated to be in certain details of the treaty, which, he said, would have been improved if it had been transmitted to him and the Dail cabinet before it was signed.

The secret session is supposed to be held in the parlors of the Grand Hotel, and the members had gone far further along in their discussion than they have in any public session. It included early yesterday afternoon.

Courtesy Express Dispatches. The Freeman Journal states that at the private session of the Dail the Irish Free State, outside, reported the emphasis noticeable in the treaty. It was found necessary, however, to appoint a committee consisting of the delegates in London and the reports of this committee was presented today.

An crowd assembled again today to watch the members of the Dail arrive at the national university, where the sessions are being held, and the members of the press were again impatiently distributed.

Today's newspapers publish a letter from Mary MacSwiney, sister of the late Lord Mayor of Cork, protesting in strong terms against the treaty.

Investigate Killing. British and Irish liaison officers today were investigating the killing of Sergeant Enright, who was shot by constabulary at Limerick yesterday.

Another incident which the Irish republican army authorities dealt with immediately was an attempt this morning by a crowd of youths to break through the gates of the court terrace, opposite the meeting place of the Dail Eireann, with the words "Which fight" between the Union Jack and the Irish tricolor. Sinn Fein volunteers dispersed the party.

WOULD TAKE FUGITIVES WITHOUT USE OF BULLETS

Death of One Man and Fatal Wounding of Woman Resulting from Attack on Prison is Attributed to Hunted Men

JACKSON, Ky., (AP)—State guards planned to use force to graduate today in an effort to drive from a cave three alleged members of the mob of mountaineers who last Saturday stormed a county jail here, fatally shot two men, killed one man and fatally wounded a woman.

The men were discovered in the cave on John Little's creek, 15 miles from here, late yesterday. Captain Holbrook, who led the party, said that the fugitive trio into the cave last night to get the men to come out. They sent him word that if they came out it would be "feet first."

COMMISSIONERS SLASH SALARIES

Pacific Treaty Acceptance by Senate Deemed Certain

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—Definite estimate of the senate (loop) on ratification of the four-power Pacific treaty will be made by the senate tomorrow to excessive today of republican and democratic leaders, until the arm conference is concluded and its work submitted to the senate.

The prospect today in the opinion of prominent senators of both parties, is for ratification of the treaty, but many senators on both sides said they were withholding judgment and public expressions until the complete results of the conference have been ascertained.

RUSSIAN CLAIM TO RAIL SYSTEM IS RECOGNIZED

Soviet Protest to Discussion of the Chinese Eastern Affairs Draws Conferees' Attention to Tangled Problem

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—Advised from Peking that Soviet Russia has protested the discussion of the Chinese eastern railway by the Washington conference circles to the railroad committee of the League of Nations, which occupies a place on the American agenda.

Important to Three Nations. The Chinese Eastern is of the greatest strategic and economic importance to Russia, Japan and China. It is the great connecting link across China of the trans-Siberian railroad from Vladivostok to far away Moscow and Peking. When the east of Russia declined to build the trans-Siberian he obtained the right from China to run the line across northern Manchuria. This right gave the Russian railroad immense value which it would not have possessed had it been built entirely in Russian territory. From Harbin, a branch of the Chinese Eastern runs south to the city of Chang Chung, Manchuria, where it connects with a northern terminal of the North Manchuria railway, the great Japanese artery of communication which runs south to the city of Dairen on the sea.

With the military occupation of Siberia by various troops, including American, there was formed an inter-allied railway board with a subsidiary technical board of management under the chairmanship of John F. Stevens, American railroad expert now in Washington.

Legal Claim Recognized. Legally speaking the railway is regarded as belonging to Russia but both the United States and Japan are said to have made financial claims for the upkeep of the line. The great directors include both Chinese and Russians.

It is the future status of the Chinese Eastern that the conference may be called upon to discuss. Some action is believed by some conference delegates to be necessary because of the present chaotic condition of Russia.

PERUVIAN MOBILIZATION DENIED BY AMBASSADOR

Dr. Pezet Brands Argentine Report of Military Moves as Falsehood

BUENOS AIRES (AP)—Peru has denied the mobilization of 308 officers and 11,200 troops and is sending seven regiments to Tacico, in the province of Taena. An announcement by the Peruvian government to this effect has been telegraphed the newspaper La Nacion by its correspondent in La Paz, Bolivia.

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—Denial was made today by Dr. Ezequiel A. Pezet, Peruvian ambassador here, of reports telegraphed to the Buenos Aires newspaper La Nacion by its La Paz, Bolivia, correspondent, that Peru had decreed the mobilization of seven regiments of troops in Taena.

"Disturbances originating in Bolivia and Chile regarding a warlike attitude on the part of Peru are absolutely false and it may be said authoritatively that my government does not contemplate resort to force," said Dr. Pezet.

POLAND BUILDS RESERVE WITH GOLD FROM RUSSIA

Treasure Valued at Fifty Billion Gold Marks is Paid Under Treaty

WARSAW, (AP)—Gold and jewelry, estimated to be worth fifty billion Reich marks—the Russian Soviet government's first payment to Poland under the treaty of peace signed at Riga on March 18, last, have arrived here. Diamonds, rubies and other precious stones and gold bars, filling 100 cases in all, were brought here on a special train under military escort. The haul, weighing 1280 pounds, gives Poland its first substantial gold reserve.

ADVISES LONGER FARMER CREDITS

Congressional Com in I. S. To N
Makes Specific Recommendations

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP)—The joint congressional committee on agriculture in its report filed Wednesday in the senate, along with recommendations for legislation of co-operative marketing, combinations of growing freight rates on agricultural products and establishment of agricultural attaché in European capitals, said provision should be made for credit corresponding to the farmers' turn over and having maturity of from six months to three years which would enable payment to be made from the proceeds of the farm. The present existing system should be adapted to enable it to furnish such credit, the report said, adding that a concrete proposal to carry out this recommendation would be made later.

Propose Warehousing System.
Another recommendation is that there should be a warehousing system which would provide a uniform liability on the part of the warehouse proprietor. The commission suggested extension of the existing federal warehouse law and the passage by states of uniform laws regulating the liability of warehouse men and the services they render.

Among other recommendations are: Extension of the statistical division of the department of agriculture, particularly along the lines of gathering livestock statistics.

Development by trade associations of more accurate, uniform and practical grades of agricultural products and standards of containers for them.

More adequate wholesale terminal facilities, particularly for handling of perishable foods at primary markets and a more thorough organization of the agencies and facilities of distribution of the large consuming centers of the country.

World Restore Confidence.
The commission's final recommendations were for a removal of "conditions of confidence."

Industrial, as well as agricultural property, the report says, is dependent upon a readjustment of prices for commodities so that they will represent a fair division of the economic rewards of industry, the management and investment of capital.

Corn Recently Found in Tennessee Seems to Substantiate Belief Long Held by Scientists

Corn that grew in Tennessee in prehistoric times, possibly before Joseph put away his seven years' supply in Egypt, was unearthed recently by W. E. Meyer of the Bureau of American Ethnology and sent to the United States Department of Agriculture for identification.

During recent excavations in Davidson county, Tennessee, Mr. Meyer came upon a number of stone slab graves containing mortuary vessels. Some of these held specimens of charred maize in fairly good condition. From the size and shape of the grains it was possible to identify the variety as many-rowed tropical slint, a form about halfway between true flint and popcorn.

The same type of Indian corn occurs in the West Indies, and there is no question in the minds of scientists but that there was a very early communication between the West Indies and North America. Not only corn but beans, squashes, pumpkins and tobacco are of tropical and subtropical origin.

These staples, now so important throughout both hemispheres, found their way into North America and were cultivated beyond the Great Lakes in Canada long before the discovery of America. There is abundant evidence of communication between the West Indies and Florida, and up the Mississippi and its tributaries.

SUGAR FACTORY ACTIVITIES WILL CLOSE SATURDAY

Beet Slicing Operations About
Over for Season; Grow-
ers Get \$287,000

Beet slicing operations at the local factory of the Northwestern Sugar Company in progress the past 70 days, will be concluded on Saturday of this week. Cleanup of the season's work in connection with sugar making, will end about the middle of the coming week.

To Out Excess.
The end of the present week will see the commencement of factory work to the extent of 100 employees in various departments, principally the beet handling section. An additional start of from 40 to 75 workers will be dropping from the rolls of the plant during the coming week, and after that the factory will be placed on an "off-season" operation basis.

The foregoing information is given out by District Manager James Bellay, who explains that the mill has had a successful season, despite unfavorable field conditions during the growing period.

Had Good Season.
The local factory, according to figures presented by factory forces, has sliced 70,000 tons of sugar since the mill started active operations on this year's crop more than two months ago. Of the tonnage the factory ordinarily ships to the Twin Falls factory has supplied 48,500 tons of sugar beets for which the growers received \$6 per ton. The factory has received 14,000 tons of beets from the McCannon district and 7,000 tons from Burley. The sugar output of the factory this season will approximate 240,000 bags of sugar.

Today is the final payday at the factory for beet growers, the sum of \$40,000 representing the footings of the rolls. There have been three paydays at the works this year, the company giving out checks to the amount of \$287,000, including today's payments.

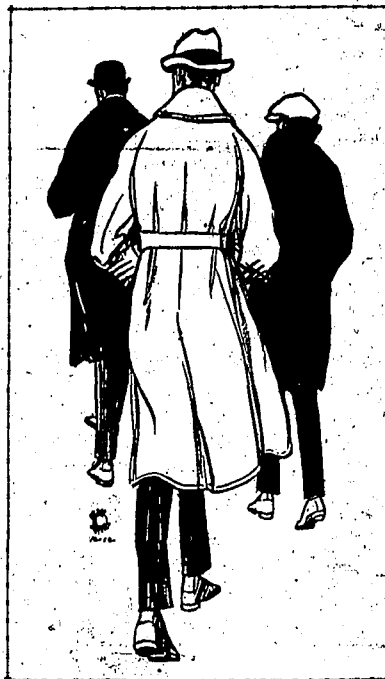

DENIES FRENCH PURPOSE IS TO RUIN GERMANY

Maurice Casanave Points to the Wiesbaden Agreement as Proof of Willingness to Collaborate with Former Enemy

NEW YORK, (AP)—The problem of reconstruction approaches all adherents to the Wiesbaden agreement, chief financial adviser to the French delegation at the armistice conference, declared in an address today before a luncheon of the National Industrial Conference board. The economic situation of France, he added, must necessarily be of interest to the whole world.

Mr. Casanave described the recent Wiesbaden agreement between Germany and France as "the most successful of all negotiations since the treaty of Versailles."

"It begins a collaboration with the living, working Germany," with that part of Germany, which honestly wants to pay its debt," he declared. "It proves that France does not seek to ruin Germany."

Explains Agreement.
The Wiesbaden agreement, the speaker said, established a French committee "for possibly a corporation" representing all the French sufferers of war damage. This corporation will receive credits from such sufferers for whatever materials they may require for reconstruction, up to the sum of one million gold marks per annum. They will be handled by the French corporation to a committee or corporation of Germans which will represent leading German manufacturers of all types of materials, payment for these materials in Germany being made at the price of the material bought on the French market. The German committee or corporation, according to further outline of the plan by Mr. Casanave, will open a credit in Germany on behalf of the French committee or corporation of an amount of seven billion gold marks, to be repaid in 1926.

German Pay Sellers.
The German seller will be paid by the German organization, the amount of each payment being placed to the credit of the German government and deducted from the German debt. Interest at 5 per cent, will be paid to Germany, Mr. Casanave said, because of the anticipated payments which will be to the credit of the German government, the maturity of the said credit, "the rights of France to indemnity have not reached the sum of seven billion gold marks. France will pay in cash the difference between the amount of the indemnity due her and the said sum of seven billions."

"France knows that all hope of being paid the debt owed to her is in the commercial rehabilitation of Germany," M. Casanave declared.

UNEMPLOYED LAY PLANS TO SEIZE KING'S CASTLE

Copenhagen Police Uncover a Plot to Convert Palace Into Dormitory

COPENHAGEN, (AP)—The police have discovered plans showing that the homeless unemployed in Copenhagen contemplated seizure of the Christiansborg palace, which is the king's official residence and the meeting place of the Danish parliament, intending to use it as a sleeping place.

The plans were taken from the persons of men leading the unemployed workmen's organizations, who, when arrested, also carried copies of a resolution addressed to the Danish minister, Dr. J. H. Prince, threatening reprisals for the conviction of murder in Massachusetts of the Italians, Sacco and Vanzetti.

GOLD-PLATED DOOR KNOBS

New York Apartment Hotel Would Seem to Be Last Word in Height of Luxury.

Three hundred Park avenue, New York, the new Sherry apartments just opened, is probably the most luxurious abode of wealth in the world, says a correspondent. It has gold-plated doorknobs, silver-plated chandeliers and a separate set of elevators running to each of the sixteen floors. The apartments really are private homes.

The largest of thirty rooms has been taken by Percy Rockefeller. The yearly rentals range from \$10,000 to \$20,000. There are ninety apartments.

Among the leading "director tenants" are Richard T. Wilson, Gen. Coleman du Pont, Col. D. B. McAlpin, Louis F. Howells, F. C. H. Page, F. Colt Johnson, Louis L. Dunham and L. M. Boomer. In furnishing the apartments Europe and America have been searched for ideas and materials. Louis Sherry has installed \$200,000 worth of "Thirteenth-century" "upholsteries" in his apartment. Mr. Boomer sent to Norway for the wood used in his apartment, Mrs. Boomer being a native of that country.

Some of the walls in many of the homes are huge canvases for paintings by noted artists. Magnificent banquets, restaurant, a grill, a tearoom and confectiery shop occupy the first floor and mezzanine. If you want to locate at "Three Hundred Park avenue," you must be voted upon by the "director tenants" who are "officials," very particular, indeed, says Philadelphia Public Ledger.

B. Hobson, financial editor of the Manchester Guardian, at a meeting of the Manchester and District Bankers institute.

THREE ENEMIES FACING SOVIET SEEN BY LENINE

Russian Bolshevik Dictator Defines Principal Foes as Communist, Aporogance, Illiteracy and Corruption.

MOSCOW, (AP)—Russian peasants and laborers tired of promises of a communist utopia, and have come to the "show me" stage Premier Nikolai Lenin said in a recent speech before a congress of political educational workers at Moscow.

The full text of this sensational speech, parts of which relating to Lenin's criticisms of economic failure were cabled from Moscow at the time it was delivered, has just reached Idaho as reported by the official Moscow Press.

People Demand Proof.

"There was a time," Lenin said, "when declarations, proclamations, decrees, etc., were necessary. We have had plenty of those. There was a time when it was necessary to show the people what we wanted to build. But can we continue to show and only tell the people what we want to build? No. The simplest solution is to show them, to show us, saying: 'You are always talking of what you want to do, but show us now what you can do. And if you are not doing, then get on to the devil!' And he will be right."

Speaking about the absence of education and the prevailing illiteracy of the Russian people, Lenin said that the very fact that a commission had to be appointed for the liquidation of illiteracy "shows, to say it as gently as possible, that we are something like half savages. For in a civilized country, it would be considered a shame to create commissions for the liquidation of illiteracy. In other countries, new laws have been passed which liquidate illiteracy. They teach, in the first place, to read and write. As long as this fundamental problem is not solved, it is ridiculous to talk of a new economic policy."

Masses Must Help.

Lenin said that soviet laws and propaganda were good, but could not succeed until the masses of people helped in the work.

"Several hundred thousand 'spontaneous and useless communists,' he said should be expelled from the party.

"Bribe," he continued, "should have a long which will teach us to fight graft, corruption and bribery. Expect more has shown that a politically educated state knows no bribery, whereas with us, bribery is rampant."

Lenin said the government was facing three principal foes, first, communism, second, illiteracy and third, corruption and bribery.

BARS FOREIGN PRINCE FROM RULE OF HOLLAND

Parliament Adopts Measure Settling Question of Succession to Throne of Netherlands

AMSTERDAM (AP)—The second chamber of parliament has adopted the bill settling the question of the succession to the throne of the Netherlands. It will no longer be possible for a German Prince to succeed to the Dutch throne in case of the death of Princess Juliana, the succession being limited to collateral descendants of Queen Wilhelmina in the degree of uncle, aunt or cousin.

The measure opens the possibility of a referendum on the question of the preservation of the monarchy or the foundation of a republic.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., (AP)—The twenty-fourth annual convention of the National Commercial Teachers' Federation will be held here December 27, 28 and 29, according to announcements, by Robert Grant, president.

The organization is composed of five divisions, with five inter-organizations, each having its own officers, as follows: A public commercial schools department, a private commercial schools department, a short-hand round table, a business round table and a general federation whose officers are selected by the entire membership of all departments.

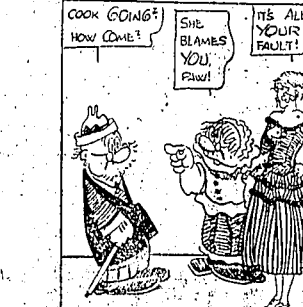

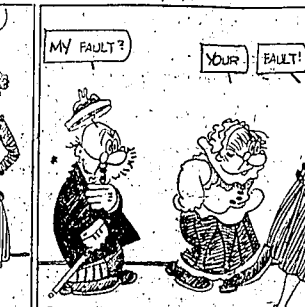

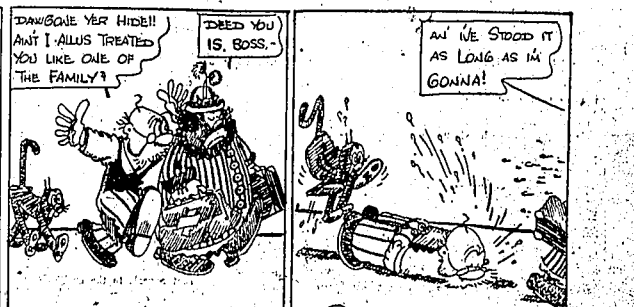
