

REACTIONARIES FORM COALITION RULE AT PEKING

Liang Shi-Yi, Alleged Monarchist Plotter, Named Premier of Chinese Cabinet to Succeed Chin Yun-Peng

PEKING, (AP) — Liang Shi-Yi has been named as premier of the Chinese cabinet to succeed Chin Yun-Peng, who with all his ministers resigned on Sunday. The fall of the cabinet followed the arrival here of General Chang Tso Lin, governor of Manchuria, who is now engaged in forming a new coalition government in which all the reactionary parties are participating. It is charged that Chin Yun-Peng is guilty of speculation and the sale of office.

The new premier is credited with having inspired the attempt by Yuan Shi-Kai to create himself emperor in 1915. Among those in General Chang's following are Wang Chao-Yuen, former military governor Hupoh, and Chang Ching-Yao, the war governor of Hunan province at the time of the murder of Her. W. A. Belmont, an American missionary in June, 1920. The American Legation demands that he be held responsible for the crime. The Legation is said to be preparing a protest against his presence in Peking at the present time.

TIMES ARE HARD FOR DOCTORS OF ENGLAND

Physicians and Surgeons Give Various Reasons for Their Hard Times

LONDON, (AP) — Physicians and surgeons have fallen quite hard, and complaints of dwindling practices are widespread. The other day a doctor from the fashionable Harley street district was sued in the courts for a small debt which he declared he was unable to pay because his practice had "dropped almost to the vanishing point."

"Publishable doctors say that so many ordinary practitioners have had wretched experiences with surgery cases, that in thousands of instances, they now do their own operating instead of sending their patients to specialists. Another reason is that many formerly wealthy people who would in other circumstances have consulted a prominent physician now go to hospitals where they obtain treatment at much lower cost. Others say that women now prefer to be attended by doctors, for their own sex and that psychoanalysis and various forms of faith healing account for the falling off in the number of patients."

SPANISH MOST POPULAR OF FOREIGN LANGUAGES

Idaho High School Students Display Preference for the Castilian Tongue

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow — Spanish is by far the most popular foreign language among high school students in this state, according to a comparative census taken by Dean J. Ziegler, head of the University of Idaho modern language department. French followed, with Latin the last. In addition to the 20 students taking German at the university, there are only six taking it in other parts of the state. A partial summary, including the more important high schools of the state, shows there are 1,213 registered for Spanish this year, compared with 873 for last year. French enrollments from the same schools are placed at 945, a slight increase from the 975 enrollment of last year. Enrollment of students in the same two languages at the university is in about the same ratio, according to Dean Ziegler. Two hundred forty-four are enrolled for Spanish this year compared to 185 for last year; 216 are taking French 976 year against 103 last year. The figures for the state were very low compared with those for Spanish and French.

TALE OF INDIAN FEUD TO BE TOLD IN MURDER CASE

Trial of John "Redbird" Beauregard is Expected to Disclose Long History of Killings in Redmen's War

WASHINGTON, Wis., (AP) — The tale of a feud, generations old, which the descendants of two Indian tribes have been nearly wiped out, is expected to be told in court here at the trial of John "Redbird" Beauregard, charged with the murder of John Mealey, aged 65 years.

Taken Near Scene of Crime. "Redbird" Beauregard was captured near Barnes, only 150 yards from the cabin where a week ago he is alleged to have slain Mealey, when he became engaged at Mealey's house. "Redbird" was "not man enough" to avenge the death of his father.

LONG CHAIN OF DEATHS

Mealey's death is the latest of a long chain of traditional and recorded deaths in a feud between Indian tribes resulting in feud warfare between "Redbird's" father and an Indian called "Blackbird." In the course of the feud "Redbird's" father fatally wounded "Blackbird" the dying chief, then imposing upon his son the oath of vengeance. Years later the elder Beauregard, "Redbird's" father, was shot down, his slayer escaping into the woods.

DAUGHERTY SAYS SUGAR TRADE IS UNTRAMMELED

Attorney General Approves the Decree Disposing of Suit Against Refiners

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP) — The long pending suit-trust suit against the American Sugar Refining Company is to be disposed of by a decree which has been approved by Attorney General Daugherty, who said investigation shows that the company "is no longer a trust or monopoly."

Whereas when the suit was instituted in 1910 the American Sugar Refining company controlled "about 75 per cent" of the refined sugar industry of the country, Mr. Daugherty said, the control has now decreased to about 21 per cent and it is believed to be added, that under the provisions of the decree the consumer can now rest assured that the "price he pays for his sugar in the future will be the result of natural, unrestrained competition."

TREASURE IS RECOVERED FROM TORPEDOED LINER

Salvaging Operations Result in Taking of \$25,000,000 Worth of Bullion Out of Broken Liner

LONDON, (AP) — Nearly \$25,000,000 worth of bullion has been recovered from the liner, Laurentic, which was sunk in January, 1917, off the north coast of Ireland by a German submarine.

Operations have been suspended for the winter, but they will be resumed again in the spring when an effort will be made to recover the remaining \$10,000,000 worth of bullion which is said to be still at the bottom of the sea.

Great difficulties have been encountered by the salvage crew, for after three years pending by the Atlantic swell the liner has been transformed into a heap of twisted debris. For weeks settled down on the sea bottom, covering an area of several hundred feet. The wreck was practically covered with gravel and silt, as it is in a position which it received the full force of the Atlantic swell. This obstruction had to be removed, as far as possible by powerful pumps placed in position by the divers, as the gold was at the bottom of the huge mass of wreckage.

AMERICA PAYS DELATED HONOR

Benjamin West, Pioneer in American Art, Comes to Own in Native Land

NEW YORK, (AP)—Benjamin West, obscure pioneer in American art, though he later became painter to the king of England, at last has come into his own in his native land.

For the first time in the century and more since he was laid to rest in St. Paul cathedral, London, notable Harry Reynolds and Van Dyke, a couple of the noblest of the century, are being held in Philadelphia near the place of his birth, by the Philadelphia Art Alliance.

The exhibit comprises 25 selections, paintings and drawings and, according to Albert Rosenthal, secretary of the committee in charge, presents a full view of West's career and creative work.

West was born in the Quaker community of Springfield, now Swarthmore, Pa., October 10, 1781.

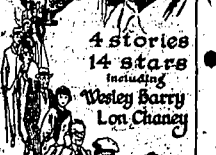

ERUPTION OF AMERICAN VOLCANO IS NOT LIKELY

Authority on Lassen Peak Condition Issues Reassuring Statement

REDDING, Cal., (AP) — Eruptions are not liable to occur at Lassen peak, the only active volcano in the United States proper, so long as the mountain continues to emit smoke and steam, as it is now doing, according to M. E. Dittmar, geologist and authority on conditions in the Lassen section here. Dittmar, known as the "father" of Lassen National park, which includes the volcano and the country surrounding it, recently returned from an extensive tour over the country.

The action of the volcano, the geologist declared, is similar to that of a steam boiler. As long as steam and gas coming from the cracks in the mountain, Dittmar reported, before the big eruption of 1916 there was very little steam emitted.

Several geysers have made their appearance since the eruption in what is known as the Devil's Kitchen, one of the noted spots of the park. In the Devil's Kitchen there are several geysers and 800 active hot springs, boiling mud and geysers within an area of 25 acres. Some of the geysers flow from Philothalibi Kuppam, which is a boiling water several feet to a height of several hundred feet.

LOSSES ARE PREVENTED BY WEATHER FORECASTS

Aviators, Insurance Men and Road Builders Join Farmers in Taking Advantage of Government Meteorologists' Warnings

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The importance of weather forecasts in the daily life of the people of the country is being made more apparent by the United States department of agriculture, in the annual report recently issued.

The usual weather forecast service which regularly to year to year in certain new phases of weather work which have been developed recently. The increase in aviation and the growing demands for service and advice. There is also a call for data and verification of facts with reference to storm weather areas in the northwest.

According to the report, the weather service and advice carry with them an immediate and direct economic benefit in the saving of lives and property and foodstuffs for the nation. The weather bureau and its field stations are overwhelmed with applications for information. Advice sent out daily, the weather bureau is required to meet this demand.

The weather bureau has been receiving from many parts of the country, the great increase in traffic on highways makes necessary the preparation of comprehensive reports of road conditions.

OPERATRIUMS OVER HANDICAP

Metropolitan Opera Companies Meet with Success Despite Death of Caruso

NEW YORK, (AP)—Its light undimmed by the passing of the greatest of all opera singers, the Metropolitan Opera has reached the height of what its social and professional sponsors acclaim as the most successful season since Caruso's eyes were focused on New York as the hub of the operatic universe.

Not officials of the opera said today that a great era has not been left in the ranks of the artists who have made it so famous. Caruso's place, they declared, cannot be filled in a few months, or even in a few years.

Great changes have taken place in the opera as a social institution, they declare. The social side of the gathering has been changed, but the artistic side taken on the aspect it was a generation ago.

In a widespread reaction from the fashions of years before, and during the war, the gentleman opera goes up in evening dress, whether he sits in a box or any other part of the house below the gallery.

As the weather changes, the Metropolitan has mastered the post-bellum reaction for opera fans, manifested in 1919 by threats of violence that would cause the suspension of their presentation.

Twice this season the stately march of Wagnerian opera have rebounded in the ears of audiences that have taxed the capacity of the house, and "Die Walkure" new to American devotees of the art.

As to the much heralded successor of Caruso—the operatic maestro whose name they are seeking now, as hope for the future. After touring Europe most of last summer, General Manager Giulio Gatti-Casazza returned with many singers added to his company and several new operas for his repertoire.

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MOSLEM DEFIES DEATH SENTENCE

KARACHI, India. (AP)—The all-brothers' trial has ended here after holding the attention of all India for several weeks. By the jury's verdict, the defendants were acquitted of the charge of conspiracy to seduce British troops, but on the charge of making statements intended to cause His Majesty's troops to fall in their duty, all except one were found guilty and sentenced to two years imprisonment.

The summing up by the judge to the jury took about one hour and ten minutes. The court emphasized the majesty of the law and declared that the jury must not give a verdict of acquittal through fear of assassination because of threats by Shaukat Ali, one of the defendants.

Finds Religion Immunity. The chief argument for the defense was the plea that had been acted in accordance with religious precepts, over which civil law had no authority. In reply to a question by the judge as to whether or not a man who committed murder on the ground of his religion ought to be excused from punishment, Metropolitan Ali said he would not say that a man could kill because of his religion. He said that his religion did command him to kill people, stating that the law

of Moslems was conditional upon the precepts of the Koran, and that any government that forbade the practice of these precepts could not expect to be obeyed. He said that he was not a proselytizer vigorously inculcated this contention.

In an address to the court, Shaukat Ali is reported by the Hindi Observer as saying: "I am a subject of God, and a free citizen of India. I do not want the king nor his court nor the army. Even had I am persecuted to death, I shall be happy. It is my duty as a Moslem to not only to free myself, but to carry this message to every Mussalman in the country. Whoever kills a Mussalman intentionally, his punishment is hell everlasting, and God's wrath will be upon him."

Throws Down Gauntlet. "Queen Victoria announced religious freedom in her proclamation, but when the matter comes to action, it is unheeded. It is my duty to carry the message of Islamic duty. I don't care whether soldiers or officers listen to me or not. Mr. Magistrate, you might have me on earth or sky. Do as you like; I don't care. I can't be friendly with the enemies of Islam."

Here the magistrate interrupted him, saying that he was not prepared to listen to political speeches. Thereupon Shaukat Ali flow into a passion and said: "You are insulting my faith. I don't say, my you! What are you here? You are a more grammophone."

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CAROLS AS PART OF THE CHRISTMAS SERVICE.

The origin of the Christmas carol is uncertain. It is probably as old as Christianity. Judeus, Bishop Taylor in his "Great Exemplar" remarks that the first "Carol" is the hymn of the angels to the shepherds to the plains of Bethlehem: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." In the fifteenth century carols were widely sung throughout Europe. In fact, the first pieces printed by the very first printers were carols. In one of the oldest collections appears "The Boon's Head," which used to be sung as that old ditty was carried to the table during the Christmas revelry:

The Boon's Head in hands is bring With garlands gay, and hinds I sing I pray you all to help me sing "Qui calis in contrivis!"

The Boon's Head represents one of the convivial carols or "Jolly" chansons, which had their place at the feasts, dances and other gay festivities of the Christmas season. In one of Shakespeare's "I.iv" bands of itinerant singers used to wander about the streets and make their carols a pretext for getting money.

During the eighteenth century carols declined greatly, and in the nineteenth century old customs which had marked Christmas festivals for centuries became obsolete.

Carols still exist in parts of England. In Wales it has preserved in small number, and in Scotland, too, has her Christmas caroling in time-honored style. France has its "Noels," and in Italy Christmas carols have been sung since the time of St. Francis of Assisi, who discovered the power of sacred song in the vernacular.

In churches all over the world many of the delightful old carols are now a part of the Christmas service.

Good Reason, Too. At Christmas the children of a certain minister refused to collect money by going from house to house singing carols and snatches of hymns. Many complaints reached the pastor's ears of bands of youngsters scampering through the first verse of "White Shepherd" and then, also, intently inquiring on the second. So he instituted inquiries on the second occasion he visited the school.

"Why is it," he asked, "that instead of singing the hymn in a reverent way, you scamper through one verse and then sing the half?" Silence reigned for a short time. Then a shrill voice from a small boy at the back of the room was heard to exclaim:

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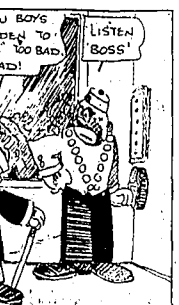

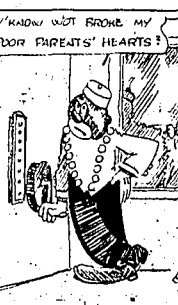
