## STORY CONFORMS WITH OGDEN POLICE RECORDS

Victims of Osheterfieldian Bandit on Baltimore and Ohio Ticker are called to identify Prisoner

CHICAGO, (AP)—Clyde Timmons, whose companion, Ben Shot, was shot and killed last night after they had kidnaped and robbed Mrs. James J. Callahan, her daughter and brother, confessed to the police today that he and his partner had taken part in several holdups, including a Utah train robbery last August and the sudden interruption of a card party at the home of Jacob Losh, in Chicago, last June.

Following the confession, police took into custody Mrs. Mary Roberts, 27, who is said to have been an intimate acquaintance of the dead robber.

The train robbery, Timmons said, was in an Oregon Short Line train, on August 31, when the two collected \$400 from passengers.

Last Friday the pair held up J. F. Walsh in Chicago, according to Timmons' confession, robbing him of his automobile and a \$5 watch. The automobile was later recovered.

Interruption Card Party Timmons told the Lyons Park police that his home was in Hammond, Ind., and that his wife's name was Margaret. He said that his wife was kidnapped and held in a room in Chicago for several days. A \$300 diamond ring, taken from one of the victims, was found in his pocket last night, the police say.

The captured robber, who was known as Clyde Timmons, and his dead companion, Ben Shot, had been arrested at Chicago last night, the police say.

Victims of the Osheterfieldian bandit, who were called to identify the Baltimore and Ohio Ticker, today called at the police station for the purpose of identifying Clyde Timmons, who was captured last night.

Timmons, who was captured last night, said that he and his partner, Earl Timmons, alias Carl Gilbert, had been killed by a policeman.

The two men had kidnaped Mrs. James Callahan, wife of the former manager of the Chicago American League baseball team, her daughter, Margaret, 17, and George Harlow, her brother, and had taken them to a tavern in front of their home on the south side.

Policeman William McNaughton, leading down the main street, was pursuing a car, commanded by Mr. Callahan, killed Earl Timmons, and forced Clyde Timmons to surrender, after a wild struggle, when the car was wrecked by the robbers. The occupants were unharmed.

Officers Boush and Dwyer, when taken to the station had \$100 in the pockets. Officers said he resembled the hand who held up the B. and O. train on Tuesday night, the night he said he arrived in Chicago. He said he met "Gilbert" a year ago in San Francisco, and came with him to Chicago last October.

"Neither of us had any money," said Timmons, "and 'Gilbert' had a gun, so we decided to hold up somebody."

RECORDS AT OGDEN CHECK WITH BANDIT'S CONFESSTION OGDEN, Utah, (AP)—There were two men in the robbery of Oregon Short Line passenger train No. 7 on an afternoon of August 31. The train was stopped nine miles south of Ogden by tampering with a black signal. The two had a head-on collision, and the train proceeded to rob the passengers in a leisurely manner, leaving the train as it entered the yards at Salt Lake City.

# RUSSIAN BELIEF BILL IS SIGNED

President Gives Approval to Appropriation of \$20,000,000 for Sufferers

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—President Harding today gave his approval to a bill which carries appropriations of \$20,000,000 to be expended under the supervision of the American relief administration. The funds become immediately available.

Grain will be moving into Russia within five days from the \$20,000,000 appropriation, Secretary Hoover said. The grain will be sent in the hands of the grain corporation, he added, so that the funds will become available in a commercial manner and without the delay incident to usual government expenditures.

# DEBATE RATE IN FAMINE DISTRICTS MOUNT RAPIDLY

MOSCOW, (AP)—The death rate in the famine districts of Russia is rising rapidly. More than 200 victims are buried every day in the Stravro region.

The American relief administration is feeding more than 800,000 children, and the number is expected to increase to 1,000,000 in the next few months. Distribution of relief is being hampered by the lack of transport, the first being sent into the Kharkov and Odessa districts.

# Executive Clemency Is Extended to Debs

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—The sentence of 10 years imprisonment imposed upon Eugene P. Debs, ex-convict, following his conviction of violating the espionage act was commuted today by President Harding.

Debs, who several times was a candidate for president, was convicted on three counts growing out of his alleged obstructive activities during the war but when his appeal reached the United States supreme court, it was set aside on the ground that the government charged, relied on the speech of Debs, which was not in evidence.

The president also granted pardons to five former soldiers, effective Christmas day.

Debs was ordered released from Atlanta penitentiary by President Harding along with 23 other persons convicted of similar offenses.

# UNION PACIFIC'S WAGE DISPUTE IS UNSETTLED

Controversy Between Officials and Railway Clerks and Station Employees Goes to Federal Board

OMAHA, Neb., (AP)—Representatives of railway clerks and station employees and officials of the Union Pacific system failed to reach an agreement yesterday on a wage reduction proposal by the company and the United States railroad board today according to H. R. Dutser of Omaha, representing the brotherhood of railway and steamship clerks, freight handlers, express and station employees. The company's offer failed to reach an agreement amounting to about 41c a month for each man while the employees countered with a proposal for an increase of approximately the same amount.

LOWERS TAXES ON COOTTON AUSTIN, Texas, (AP)—The Texas railroad commission in a circular issued today granted a ten per cent reduction in cotton rates in Texas. It is expected that the railroads will soon submit applications for reductions on other agricultural products.

# ITALY PROPOSES ANOTHER NAVAL LIMITS SESSION

Would Include Nations Not Represented at Washington Conference in Discussions of Auxiliary Crafts Problem

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—The failure of the French delegation to receive further instructions turns attention to general discussions.

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—The failure of the French delegation to receive additional instructions as to auxiliary naval craft from its home government promised to lead to further discussion today of the submarine question by the Washington conference in the afternoon.

The meeting of the full naval committee was set for 3 o'clock.

While the various delegations prepared for the afternoon meeting, suggestion came from the Italian representative through an authorized spokesman that another conference be arranged soon after the adjournment of the present gathering to take up further the question of auxiliary naval craft.

Italian through the spokesman, made the point that a number of nations having submarines either built, building or planned were not represented at the present conference, and unless brought into agreement with the spirit of the present gathering might be comparatively small outlay, construct sufficient submarine tonnage to menace the feeling of security of the powers here represented.

Will Be Presented Formally. The Italian suggestion will be brought up for consideration before adjournment, it was said.

Physical circumstances were said to be holding up the further instructions of the French delegation.

Reverts to the suggestion relative to the holding of another conference the Italian spokesman said there would be no objection to such a conference engaging its attention.

CAIRO, Egypt, (AP)—Sold Zogul, one of the Egyptian nationalist leaders, who refused to desist from order issued by the military authorities that he and his chief followers cease all political activity and leave Cairo, was escorted by British troops here Wednesday by British troops.

His removal was accompanied by some disturbances in the course of which the British warships were ordered to leave at the shortest notice.

The military now has assumed control of the city, and the authorities have announced their determination to suppress any trouble.

# CHURCH TO PAY DEATH PENALTY

Jury Reaches Verdict in First Bailout in Case of Slayer of Auto Salesman

CHICAGO, (AP)—Harvey Church charged with the murder of two automobile salesmen, was found guilty this afternoon by a jury in the first case in which the death penalty was awarded.

The jury, which received the case last night, reached a verdict on the first ballot, being unanimous for the death penalty.

Church, who is 21 years old, was arrested at Adams, Wis., his former home a few days after the double murder. The body of Aumus was dug up under the floor of the garage at Adams, Wis., and the body of the other salesman was found in the Des Moines.

Made Three Confessions. Church, according to police, made three detailed confessions telling how he had arranged to buy a \$6000 automobile from the salesman, and then killed him with a baseball bat. The defense rested entirely on an insanity plea.

Selling Below Cost. The statement is made by members of the bureau that a heavy percentage of goods now being sold in Twin Falls are disposed of at prices actually less than cost and that an investigation would disclose the truth of the statement.

The unsettling of public confidence as between buyers and sellers is a factor which is operating to the detriment of retail business as a whole.

# SUOVET AGENTS DEFEND NEW ECONOMIC POLICIES

MOSCOW, (AP)—Sharp debate occurred today in the meeting of the all-Russian communist conference when the party took up discussion of the soviet government's changed economic policy.

Leo Ramenski, president of the Moscow soviet, and Bogdanov, chairman of the soviet economic council, spoke in favor of the new program which was opposed by M. Larin, the noted economist, on the ground that industrial trusts might be formed by consolidations of industries, allowed in the new program.

Efforts to divert from the leaders program proved futile. A resolution declaring that the soviet government should be organized on the basis of the party was to unite workers and peasants and perpetuate nationalization of industry, land and transportation was adopted.

# TAKAHASHI SAYS PACIFIC TREATY WILL AVERT WAR

## Premier of Japan Sees Assurance of Lightened Burden and Strengthened Position for Nippon

PARIS, (AP)—Premier Baron Takahashi, is quoted by the Tokyo representative of the newspaper Excelsior as declaring "the quadruple entente, which for Japan replaces the Anglo-Japanese alliance, is much wiser as being, and removes all chances of war."

"I venture to say," he continued, "that the Washington conference has opened a new epoch in the Pacific and the world. I not only believe that the entente will result in making the Japanese people happier, but further that it will lighten the burden which has been placed upon the Japanese by reason of the guarantee we obtain, the position of Japan is strengthened in the Far East."

"In regard to China, the premier was quoted as saying: 'China is in an advanced stage of decomposition. It will be an unpleasant situation for Japan, and a misfortune for China. If, as the result of herarchy, she does not co-operate with the friendly powers, seeking to bring about her unification.'"

Baron Takahashi characterized the report that Japan had designs on the French Indo-China as "an absurd idea." Japan had not been given a mandate in the Pacific, but he hoped that a commercial agreement on this subject would strengthen the good relations between Japan and France.

### COLLEGIANS WILL DEBATE KANSAS INDUSTRIAL COURT

ST. LOUIS, Mo., (AP)—A triangular debate between the University of Wisconsin, the University of Missouri and Washington university on the subject, "Resolved, That the Kansas Industrial Relations Court System for the Settlement of Industrial Disputes Should Be Adopted Throughout the United States," will be held in January, it was announced.

Each university will have two teams, one taking the affirmative and the other the negative side of the question.

### CALLS FOR WORLD CONGRESS ON ECONOMIC PROBLEMS

WASHINGTON, (AP)—A resolution, which President Harding would "authorize and direct" to call an international economic conference was introduced in the senate Thursday by Senator France, republican, of Maryland. The conference would be held in Washington in March, 1922.

# RADIO IS EXPECTED TO HELP ORIENT'S TRADE

## Commercial Interest of China Looks Forward to Opening of Wireless

SHANGHAI, (AP)—Commercial interests of Shanghai and of China generally are looking forward hopefully to the opening of radio communication between Shanghai and America to be brought about by the erection in Shanghai in the next two years of a wireless station which it is said will be second to none in the world. The building of this station and of a general radio system for the interior of China is to be carried out by an American concern, the Federal Telegraph company, under agreement lately concluded at Washington between the United States and China.

According to plans announced in Shanghai the station to be erected here will have towers, each 1000 feet in height and will have mechanical equipment equal in power to the great radio station at Dorniers, France. The system is to give wireless communication through the interior of China will include stations to be built at Harbin, Peking and Canton. H. B. Deane, vice president and general manager of the company is in China carrying forward work of preparation for the erection of the various stations and a considerable percentage of the equipment is being processed in America.

In addition to the ordinary commercial service to be provided through the Shanghai wireless station, it is said that a new service from the United States which in the past China sadly lacked is to be supplied.

# SOVIET RENEWS THREAT OF WAR

## New Note to Finland Demands Withdrawal of Alleged Aid to Insurgents

HJGA, (AP)—The Russian bolshevik government has issued a new note to Finland calling for "exact and unequivocal fulfillment" of its previous demands for withdrawal of alleged Finnish aid to the insurgents in Karelia, and expulsion from Finland of General Boris Savinkoff (General Savinkoff, a member of the former Kerensky government of Russia, was recently expelled from Poland at the request of the soviet government).

"If the Finnish government in the future tries to avoid carrying out these conditions, then the responsibility for endangering the peace between Russia and Finland will rest on the Finnish government," the note declared.

The incident in Karelia, numbering about 3000 is scattered in strange Arctic guerrilla warfare along the forest trails. They have taken a few miserable villages and are inhabited by only a few hundred persons.

# PARIS MAY BAN HORSE TRAFFIC

## Reformers' Proposals Contemplate Use of Streets by the Motors Alone

PARIS, (AP)—The horse soon will be a memory, so far as the principal thoroughfares of Paris are concerned. If plans of "traffic reformers" are adopted in an effort to disentangle the traffic jams which are daily making the pedestrian's existence more uncertain.

These experts propose to bar all horse-drawn vehicles from the chief traffic arteries during the daylight hours, leaving the horse only a few hours at night in which to jog along. The traffic authorities would go further and even banish ordinary horse-drawn vehicles from the streets. They propose putting them all underground on a moving sidewalk.

In any event those who take a gloomy view of the traffic situation see one optimistic aspect of it. They say it can't get any worse. Accidents are almost hourly occurrences on the boulevards and a deep is the inevitable result.

The real hands at work, directed to give attention to the work, have proved a failure. Only a heavy rain reveals their presence and even then the drivers ignore them. "Crashing" taxicabs add to the confusion and it is further suggested that this practice be prohibited. The existence in the buses has deprived taxi-cabs of much business and they are now forced to sell business, a thing unnecessary since 1914.

Young, McNeil and Mayberry, the latter custodian at Camp Mabury, were arrested and released on bond of \$1,000 each. Federal Agent Wiles was not in Austin today.

Miska says the non-action will result in clearing twenty Austin citizens who were arrested in connection with Clayton's death and who will be given a hearing tomorrow.

ANCESTOR OF CANADA'S PREMIER WAS FUGITIVE

King's Grandfather, as Opponent of Tories, Ouldo Rebel and Forc'd to Flee

ROCHESTER, N. Y., (AP)—William Lyon Mackenzie King, premier-elect of Canada, has the distinction of heading the government of eight countries from which his grandfather, an opponent of the English Tory party, was forced to flee as a "rebel" and serve a term in the Monroe county jail.

In Buffalo he collected a disorderly "army" and seized and fortified Navy Island, in the river between the two countries, and for some weeks troubled the Canadian frontier. This attempt also failed and in 1839 he was tried here for a breach of the neutrality laws which prohibited a citizen from assisting in the rebellion in 1812.

CALIFORNIA'S CHILDREN LEAD IN PHYSICAL TESTS

Federal Children's Bureau Makes Public Interesting Results of Comparison of Mass of Data

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Boys in this country under 6 years of age average four and a half inches tall and weigh 33 pounds, and girls average four and a half inches tall and weigh 30 pounds, according to a report today by the federal children's bureau, said to be based on the largest mass of data in the history of the bureau.

CHRISTMAS SHOPPING IN CHICAGO BREAKS RECORD

Volume of Business Larger Than Ever Before Although Value in Dollars May Not Measure Up

CHICAGO, (AP)—The Christmas shopping season in Chicago has broken all records in volume of business, according to leading State street merchants, but probably will not measure up, dollar for dollar with the seasons of 1919 and 1920.

The city's total retail merchandise business for the month of December is estimated at \$500,000,000 and the State street stores garnered the bulk of the trade, their figures running between \$30,000,000 and \$40,000,000.

That their words are often in negro dialect and express negro sentiments is simply a historic accident due to the fact that in Foster's day the negro minstrels, real or "cooked," were the only means of depicting music before the public.

DENVER MEXICAN SOVIET STORIES

Pani Says Puebla Governor's Persuasion Ends Trouble Among Unemployed

MEXICO CITY, (AP)—A report circulated in the United States that a soviet republic had been established in the city of Puebla was denied tonight by Alberto J. Pani, secretary of foreign relations. It was explained that there had been trouble at the Mayorazgo Hacienda in the Atlixco district of the state of Puebla, where a factory had reduced its force leaving 400 persons without work. Several families were ejected from the houses furnished by the factory without a court decision. The ejected families, including the other workers, built shacks on lands belonging to the Mayorazgo Hacienda, upon which the factory is situated.

Activities from Puebla circulated among the unemployed, inducing a red and black flag and tried to induce the workers to seize the factory. General Gustavo Elizondo, military commander of the state of Puebla, sent troops to protect the plant and later General Pso Sanchez, governor of Puebla convinced the unemployed of the wisdom of changing their attitude. It was stated today that order and quiet prevailed.

PHILADELPHIA TO RAISE FUNDS FOR EXPOSITION

City Council to be Asked to Approprate One-Fourth of \$10,000,000 to Finance Proposed Fair

PHILADELPHIA, (AP)—As the first step toward raising a fund of \$10,000,000 to finance the proposed Beaquecentennial exposition to be held in Philadelphia in 1926, city council will be asked for an appropriation of \$2,500,000, Mayor Moore announced today. Later popular subscriptions for an equal sum will be sought. The proposed fair will be staged at different sites, including Fairmount park and Hog Island, have been proposed for the exposition.

LIMITS ATTENDANCE AT FRENCH ASSIZES COURT

Minister of Justice Bales Out All Except Witnesses and Newspaper Men Bearing Official Permits

PARIS, (AP)—Only witnesses and such newspaper men as bear official permits will be admitted to French courts of assizes hereafter. Minister of Justice Bonnevay ruled in the recent five-day trial of French photographers will be barred absolutely.

The ruling came after an interpellation by Senator Philippe presenting the department of Gers, on "what measures the government intends taking to prevent recurrence of the scandalous scenes and incidents in the Venetian prisons during the Laporte trial." He referred to the trial of Henri Dostre Landru, now under death sentence for the murder of ten women and a boy whose case attracted the attention of all France.

Senator Philip inquired that "scandalous behavior on the part of newspaper profifiers of both sexes was manifested both before and after the verdict."

POSTAL ROBBERY SUSPECT FLEES QUINCY TO CHICAGO

TOLEDO, O., (AP)—George Rogers, alias George Lewis, convicted of conspiracy in connection with the \$1,000,000 Toledo post robbery, last February, today fled guilty to the charge of robbery in connection with the case and was sentenced to serve 99 years in the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, by Federal Judge Killip.
