POISON GAS ELIMINATED IN WARFARE

Instrument of Death is Outlawed by Representatives of England, Japan, France, Italy and America

AIRCRAFT LIMITATION TO BE TACKLED NEXT

Arms Conference Takes Important Step in Matter of Curtailing Variety of Methods of Destroying Enemy

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Pulver gas as an instrument of warfare was outlawed today by Great Britain, Japan, France, Italy and the United States, who through their representatives in the Washington conference approved the American proposal to prohibit the use of that weapon.

After the adoption of the anti-gas resolution, the armament committee took up the report of its sub-committee on aircraft limitation, but reached no conclusion on that matter. The aircraft discussion will be continued on Monday.

On the question of armor, the sub-committee reported that it was deemed impossible to limit the size or use of characteristics of armor, other than lighter than air machines and that the question of limiting armor should be left open for a future conference.

When the subject of aircraft was taken up Senator Sherman, head of the Italian delegation, expressed the view that the conference should, despite the sub-committee report, take some action looking toward limitation of aircraft as implemented in the future.

Mr. Ballou, in expressing assent for the British delegation to the poison gas resolution, was understood to have also stated that Great Britain would agree to the proposal to prohibit the use of that weapon, but, however, keep in mind that developments in chemical warfare as to be prepared should war arise with any of the nations not represented in the Washington conference.

Secretary Hughes in presenting the report of the sub-committee on air craft, which consists of 21 closely typed sheets, called attention to the final recommendation of the committee, which reads:

"The committee is of the opinion that it is not practicable to impose any effective limitations on the use of characteristics of either commercial or military aircraft except in the signal case of lighter than air craft."

"The committee is of the opinion that the use of aircraft in war should be governed by the rules of warfare as adapted to aircraft by a future conference."

BALFOUR AND HUGHES TO AWAIT INVITATION

No Assistance to be Vouchsafed in Dispute Between China and Japan

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Arthur J. Balfour and Secretary Hughes, it was said today by a British statesman, probably will await a request from the Japanese or Chinese delegates to the arms conference to mediate the shantung dispute, before stepping into the breach caused yesterday when the two groups came to an end after failing to agree on terms of payment for the Kinoh-Chow-Tsai railway.

CANNES, France, (AP)—The allied supreme council planned to begin consideration of the question of Germany's reparations today. The atmosphere somewhat cleared by yesterday's decision to get together with Russia and Germany in an international conference, the allied supreme council. The Belgian delegation has announced that it will insist on Belgium's priority to 2,500,000,000 gold marks of the German reparations. This is regarded as an apparent obstacle to the British plan, while the French are disposed to insist in part.

Story of Edwin Duner Before Investigating Committee is Confirmed in Part by Statement of Pennsylvania Man

DEATH OF FITZGERALD WAS NOT DELIBERATE

Former A. E. F. Man Explains Situation as a Result of Which Soldier Was Shot and Killed

NEWCASTLE, Pa., (AP)—John Klippa, a railroad brakeman here, today admitted he had shot and killed Private Fitzgerald in a quarrel outside of Bradford, Pa., on the night of the killing. Klippa, as testified by Edwin Duner of San Francisco, before the senate committee investigating the charges against Americans were hanged in Philadelphia.

In a signed statement Klippa declared the shooting was entirely accidental. However, he said the soldier, who was on duty at the time, was shot in the chest. Klippa said he was in a fight with the soldier and he was holding a rifle. Fitzgerald said he exploded, fatally injuring the private.

DENIES CHARGE OF ABUSES OF MILITARY LAW

Statements that Men of Spanish Foreign Legion Were Forced to Firing Lines with Hands Tied Contradicted

LONDON, (AP)—The charge that American or British members of the Spanish Foreign Legion were marched into battle with their hands tied behind them has been denied by the Spanish ambassador here, Benigno Merry del Val. The ambassador said that when field punishment resorted to was confinement to barracks was not possible, but he insisted that none of the men actually came under fire in that condition.

Other charges of bad faith and treatment made by the American and British soldiers who left the foreign legion in October and November also were answered by the ambassador. In explanation of the charge that the enlistment bonus of 400 pesetas was not paid to them he said the Spanish custom was to withhold part of this bonus as a guarantee against desertion until the end of the year. He said according to custom from the men's daily pay to meet the cost of their uniforms and messing.

Thirteen Americans and about 55 British members of the Spanish Foreign Legion quit that service in October and November and are arriving in Paris and London complained of hardships and cruel treatment. The Americans said that none of the promises made to recruits in the United States were carried out, that they received only one peseta a day instead of four as promised, and that the food cooked in olive oil made them ill. They also criticized the sanitary conditions in the Moroccan service and described the hospital arrangements as deplorable.

GUARDS TAKE CARE OF PROHIBITION OFFICIAL

Action Due to Receipt of Letters Threatening Destruction by Bomb

CHICAGO, (AP)—A police guard met U. S. prohibition Commissioner Roy D. Hayes at the Pennsylvania station this morning when he arrived from Washington as a result of threats of death which he had received.

Seven letters have been received by the commissioner, according to Deputy Sherman Cause, threatening his death and a bomb attack.

All letters were postmarked Chicago and their source is now being investigated by postal inspectors.

GERMANY WILLING TO WAIT

BERLIN, (AP)—The German government has sent a note to the reparations commission, taking the ground that in view of the imminent meeting of the supreme council it is inadvisable to proceed with the reparations until further steps at present with regard to the commission's request for information concerning Germany's ability to meet the reparations instalments.

PIG CLUB GIVES OPPORTUNITY TO TWIN FALLS LAD

Alfred Strunk, Twelve Year Old Son of Twin Falls Postmaster, Makes Net Profit in Year of Over \$1,100

Alfred Strunk, 12-year-old son of M. A. Strunk, Twin Falls postmaster, and a member of one of the county's "pig" clubs, made a net profit of \$1,141.15 from a sow and eight pigs that won prizes at several livestock shows last year.

The following article appearing in the current number of the Idaho Farmer, tells how the lad did it.

"And a little child shall lead them."
No stronger argument in favor of raising hogs, and especially purebred hogs of high class, in Idaho, can be made than by simply reciting the actual experience of a 12-year-old boy of Twin Falls county, whose simple but interesting story should be an inspiration to all boys of Idaho who wish to accomplish at least a part of what this boy has done.

The first fair the Idaho Farmer representative attended in Idaho during the fair season of 1921 was that of Twin Falls county at Piler. There was a splendid showing of hogs of this fair, but one attracted more interest than that of Alfred Strunk, 12-year-old son of M. A. Strunk of Twin Falls, who had a sow and eight pigs that won many first prizes in a number of classes.

The boy, always accompanied by his father, who took an active interest in the showing and judging, seemed so little that he was almost overlooked. Little fellow, attracted the attention of the Idaho Farmer representative, who secured his story, but refrained from publishing it until after the show had planned to attend the state fair at Boise and the Western Royal at Spokane and the Pacific International at Portland.

"I realized that the hope of Idaho's future lies with the boys who are growing up now, and I wanted to encourage the boys," said Mr. Rambo. "I had just returned from the show circuit in 1920 and Mr. Strunk asked me if I had a splendid sow that could raise a litter and would sell to his son. I told him the best gilt I had in the lot was Pathfinder's Queen, and I valued her at \$500, but I wanted to encourage the boy, I would let him have her for \$275, on a year's time and take his note if Mr. Strunk would sign it. I sold him the gilt and bred her to Orlon Joe, and the pigs which have taken so many prizes are the result of that mating.

"Who would hesitate to go into debt for a start in hogs (or cattle or sheep or any other livestock, for that matter) if he felt that he could accomplish what this boy has accomplished? My \$275 investment grew in one year to \$1,417.15 and he has the sow, valued at \$500, left, and he expects to cullpan that sow next year.

The story of what Alfred Strunk, 12-year-old, accomplished in one year with a start of a Duroc Jersey gilt which was more interesting if told in his own words. At the request of The Idaho Farmer representative he wrote the story and here it is, just as he wrote it:

"On November 15, 1920, I purchased Pathfinder from Ed from Mr. Rambo for \$275. I gave him \$200 cash and my note for \$75, due November 15, 1921. At that time she was a junior gilt and bred to Orlon Joe. I gave her

good care and fed her ground barley, a small amount of corn, together with plenty of good pasture. On March 6, 1921, she farrowed 12 pigs, four sows and eight boars. One of the sows died the next day and she raised the other 11. I fed the litter a little ground barley, some skimmed milk, some mineral foods, and kept them on plenty of good clover and alfalfa pasture. At six months the three sows weighed 200 pounds each and the boars 100 pounds each.

"On September 13 I took the dam, three gilts and five boars to the county fair and won \$170 in cash. The prizes included all the first places against the breeders of southern Idaho, and the first and second in the club department in the club department only the club agent confined me to two places. On September 25 the three gilts and five boars were sent to the state fair at Boise, where they won \$120 in club and open competition.

"On October 22 they were exhibited at the Western Royal Live Stock show in Spokane and competition with the breeders of the United States and the club boys of the northwest, where they won \$110 cash. On November 5 they were exhibited at the International Livestock show at Portland, in competition with the club boys and breeders of the United States, where they won all the top in club work, and where the dam of the litter took fifth place in the open. The prizes at the Pacific International were very small and my total winnings were \$27. My total winnings were \$437.15 in prizes for the four sows were \$437.

"I sold all the boars to breeders for \$225 cash and do not want to sell my three gilts and Queen. I value the gilts at \$275 each and Queen at \$500. Queen is bred back to Orlon Joe and is due to farrow about March 2. I have a litter of four pigs due to be bred to the junior champion boar at the Idaho state fair and the Western Royal and the other one is bred to a litter mate of mine. I will farrow about March 5, 1922.

"I own my success to A. I. O'Reilly, my club leader, who helped me out in the showing and made suggestions that were of great help to me. Milo Davis and John Owen, who are older club boys, also helped me and showed the pigs for me at Spokane and Portland.

"I feel well satisfied with my club work in the last year and will try and do as well, if not better, next year. My total winnings were \$437.15. Sale of boars 255.00 Value of gilts 850.00 Total receipts \$1,417.00

"I was obliged to pay one-half of the freight charges to fair, as my prize money was about one-half of the total winnings won by pig club members of the county.

"ALFRED STRUNK, Age 12 years." In the report above Alfred did not count his sow, which cost him \$275 and which he values at \$500, making another \$225 profit to be added to the \$1,417.15 shown in his report.

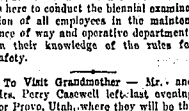

WELLESLEY HILLS, Mass.—In discussing his recent trip about the country, Roger W. Babson, statistician and business authority, outlines the first opportunity of the coming period of prosperity as follows:

"It takes no little courage to go counter to the popular current and spend money for advertising when pessimistic rumors are being spread but I am convinced that the man who has that foresight and courage will gain an advantage—immeasurable returns—right from the beginning of the coming period of improvement and prosperity.

"1922 is the year to use the resources set aside during the past year. Cut production costs as much as possible, but don't skimp your selling appropriation during 1922. Deferring expansion of plant until next year, when the market returns normal, is a mistake."

"Take the aggressive course. There will be considerable business this summer and next winter, more so than the man who goes after it now. Let the man who will get it."

"In the general business situation, the slight seasonal reaction which I forecast three weeks ago for January is being followed. The Babson chart shows business returning 17 per cent below normal—4 per cent lower than last week."

THE NEWS SUNDAY SERMONETTE

THE HOLY INNOCENTS
December 28th is set apart on the Church calendar as the day on which we commemorate the slaughter of the innocent—those few babies two years ago in the village of Bethlehem, when that wicked ruler, Herod, deliberately trying to put to death the Christ Child.

Today thousands of innocent children are starving to death in the famine stricken areas of Russia, the victims of war, starvation and disaster.

The Christmas season found the homes of most of us in the enjoyment of our usual happiness and comfort. The contrast with the distress and grief in homes in other lands and particularly in Russia.

In Russia the situation is worse than it is in any part of Europe. There they are not only lacking in food for the proper development of children, but are lacking in food even for the adults.

"I have read with great feeling your appeal to Americans for charity. It is the only way to help the people of Russia, more particularly the children. The American Relief Administration, supported wholly through the American people, has funds in hand by which assistance for the children and for the sick can be undertaken immediately.

"We visited homes established for the American people, or the little ones abandoned by their parents. In one village the home was prepared to have six children. When we were there the first of September, it already had 450, and another home was opened in the village. For these 450 children there were exactly thirty-one cups and bowls for them to eat out of, and no more could be had.

"The morning I left Moscow, the daily paper had this letter from a peasant living in the farming region: 'I have read in the newspaper that the hungry children, where the bread and the butter, what have failed. Only the noisy little children, are busy in our fields. The children who are starving and who are hungry, break up the waves of the sea; they break up with groans. You can hear their cries and hear their tears; you can hear what they cry out: Bring help, and soon!'"

This terrible tragedy is growing, and the American people are seeing it. It will grow and grow, unless abundant funds flow in from America.

LUNCHEON CLUB IN RIGOR
"RIGA, (AP)—An American luncheon club has been organized in Riga, with 50 members, membership of 50, most of whom are here on government relief administration of America's Red Cross society. H. L. Groves, the American trade commissioner, is the president. The American relief administration is constantly growing through arrival here of business men interested in Russian trade.

Pass the Word Along to the Missionaries

Davenport, Ia.—There are two institutions that Walcott, the richest town per capita in Iowa, prides itself in not possessing—churches and jails. For more than 50 years the town has been without a jail, and nearly as long without a church, and nearly as long without a jail. The jail building still stands, but there are no locks and its hinges have rotted off. It is never used.

"We are free thinkers, and believe in free American citizenship seven days a week. We do not need preachers to dictate to us. We are better off without them," states Mayor Strobel.

The mayor says while any denomination has the privilege of establishing a church in Walcott, the people will not patronize them. They would have empty pews.

"We are getting along very well as we are—much better than with churches. We like to be let alone. There is no more peaceful or law-abiding town in the whole United States than Walcott. Why should we want churches? They bring strife and dissension—we would prefer to be in a state of well-being, most of the time."

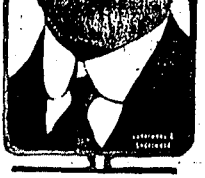
