## FORGES WIFE TO SWALLOW LETHAL DOSE

Extraordinary Story Brought to Light Through Poisoning of Well Known California Violinist

## UNFORTUNATE WOMAN IS NOW AT POINT OF DEATH

Husband, Paris Newspaper Man, Attempts Suicide; Conflicting Stories Puzzle the Police of Paris

PARIS, (AP) — Mrs. Audrey Croft-Ryan, better known as Miss Audrey Croft, California violinist, and prize winner at the American conservatory of music in the Pontnebian, is reported dying in the American hospital at Neuilly from the results of swallowing three poison tablets.

Her husband, Thomas Stewart Ryan, who is attached to the Paris staff of the Chicago Tribune, was arrested on a charge of administering the tablets to her, under the threat to kill her with a knife unless she swallowed them. Later he is said to have stabbed himself, but not seriously.

The young woman's mother, Mrs. Ryan, was taken to Neuilly on Wednesday and visited her and his wife. He told his wife that he was willing to facilitate a divorce but wished her to go with him for a farewell dinner.

Forced Her to Swallow Poison. Mrs. Ryan accompanied her husband to his hotel after the dinner when, according to a statement by the young woman, the authorities, her husband accused her of infidelity and forced her to swallow a knife to swallow three poison tablets.

Woman Leaves Home. Another version of the case was disclosed by Police Commissioner Poincaré in reporting statements Mrs. Ryan had made to him at the Cochin hospital.

### MILITANT IRISHMAN MAY BE SENT FROM COUNTRY

#### Dublin Dispatch to London Post Indicates that United States May Become His Goal

LONDON, (AP)—The Dublin correspondent of the Morning Post telegraphs the following: The shipment to the United States of a certain Irishman, who appears to have been hanging around the Dail Eireann with a loud throat, threatening to enter and shoot the entire assembly if it ratified the treaty, suggests that Michael Collins and Richard Mulcahy are alive to the necessities of the case.

There has been no previous intimation that Daniel Breen was to be deported from Ireland. A London dispatch in October, 1920, identified Breen as the commander of the 19th Tipperary brigade of the Irish Republican army. The British authorities in Ireland were said to have offered a reward of 1000 pounds sterling for his capture in connection with the murder of a Major Smyth, and he was also accused of killing two constables and perpetrating various outrages.

### CHIEF OF CHAPLAINS TO TOUR MILITARY POSTS

#### Religious Welfare of American Soldiers to Be Given Attention in Conference

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—A tour-nique in the history of the United States army will be undertaken in the course of the next few days when Colonel John T. Axton, chief of chaplains, will visit many posts and hold conferences with chaplains of the regular army, the officers reserve corps and the National guard.

The itinerary will cover approximately 10,000 miles and Colonel Axton plans to visit en route many chaplains located at small posts and in some cases, isolated posts. The trip will be unique in that it will be the first time that a chief of chaplains has toured the fields in the interest of the religious welfare of soldiers. The chief points at which conferences are to be held are Camp Lewis, Washington, Presidio, at San Francisco, Fort Bliss, Texas, and Camp Travis, Texas.

### NEVADA-UTAH HIGHWAY GIVEN SUBSTANTIAL AID

#### Primary Road Designation Provides for 60 Per Cent of Costs from Government

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—The Victory transcontinental highway, running through Reno, Lovelock, Winnemucca, Elko and Wells, Nevada, and Wendover, Utah, has been designated as a "primary road" by the states of Nevada and Utah and consequently is entitled to have sixty per cent of the construction cost defrayed by the government. It is announced by the California State Automobile association.

In Nevada this sum would amount to \$2,010,000 from the federal road building fund, it was stated. The Victory highway officially begins at San Francisco and ends at New York and the trip taken by the two states will make possible any communication by automobile from the east into the western part of California. The association has posted signs on the road as far east as Kansas City.

Statistics furnished by the Utah State Automobile association, it was announced, show that of 31,000 automobile tourists reaching Salt Lake City in 1920, 25,000 went by two routes into southern California.

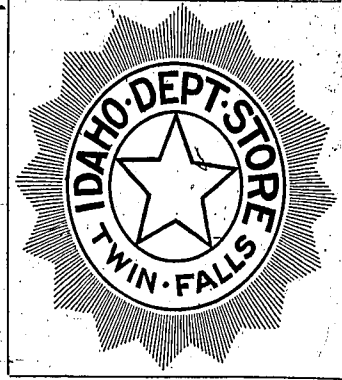

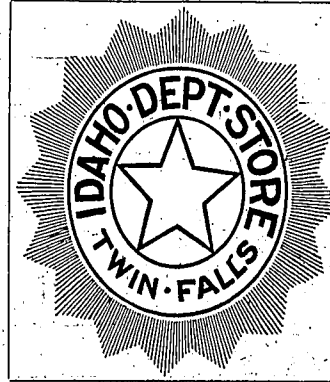

## SILENCE STILL LIVING FACTOR IN THEIR FAITH

### Walter C. Woodward of Quaker Church Declares Peace and Meditation are Main Needs of World Today

RICHMOND, Ind., (AP)—On the background of an expectation of more than 250 years, during which the Quaker church has relied upon "silence waiting before God" as the source of spiritual discernment, its members, known as the Friends, today will believe in the power of silence. Walter C. Woodward, general secretary of the Five Years Meeting of Friends in America and editor of the American Friend, in a statement issued here today said this religious group still believes that the world may be purified and strengthened through the power of a living silence.

"From the constant clash and confusion which distract it," he said, "the world must retire to the utter silence of the unseen reality of the spirit, if peace and good will are to become reality."

"The world is now stirred as never before with aspirations for world brotherhood. To become fruitful, these aspirations must be based upon the power of the spirit, rather than an intellectual process. It must come through spiritual communion with God, and through His will, man's brother. Hence, lies the power of silence, through which we may become in tune with the infinite."

**Power of Living Silence.**  
"This is not the silence of reclusion which would lead one from life's responsibilities to the introspection of the monastic cell. It is what Friends term a living silence through which men may become spiritually energized for the great tasks of human betterment."

"Spiritual things cannot be discerned without quiet meditation, the western world is reminded by Bahdu Sunder Singh, the Hindu ascetic. That American churches are coming to recognize this fundamental principle is illustrated by the church call for 'a period of silence' by the Churchman, organ of the Episcopalian Church of America. At a time when the soul of America is being stirred to meet the needs of the world, Friends wish for all friends of peace and good will."

## STORAGE PLACES CAN BE MADE CONVENIENT

### Care in Placing Shelves and Closets Saves Steps.

Keep Each Article Near the Place Where it is Most Frequently Used—Corner Spaces May Be Utilized for Storage.

In planning the arrangement in the kitchen and pantries the main factors to be considered are to keep each article near the place where it is most frequently used and to place the closets, shelves and drawers where they are easily accessible and easily kept clean, where they will not be in the way and where, when possible, they will utilize space otherwise wasted.

To insure cleanliness, storage places should be made of good wood, free from holes, knots or other roughness likely to catch dirt and harbor insects. A further help in making shelves easy to clean is to have a small space, say of an inch width, between the back edge of the shelf and the wall.

Corner closets provide an excellent method of utilizing space which may otherwise be of little value. The triangular space is not very convenient for the clothes and drawers where they must be stored but at those behind United States Department of Agriculture specialists suggest. A shelf not more than four inches wide will conveniently hold spoons, favoring extracts, baking powder and materials of this kind.

Placing deep shelves with shallow boxes or trays (light wooden boxes with sides about four inches high and with a knob or handle on the front end so they can be conveniently moved) is often worth while. These shallow boxes can be filled with bottles, cans and other small articles neatly arranged. To take out the tray, select the article desired and replace it in its proper position. This method is useful for a large number of things about on the shelf until one finds something which may be near the back. It also leaves the articles in much better order. Such a device as this has been tested and its usefulness proved. It can easily be made at home.

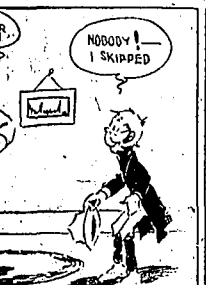
