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DISABLED MEN PETITION FOR SQUARE DEAL

World War Sufferers Memorialize President Harding in the Interests of Better Treatment

SET FORTH CONDITIONS WHICH CANNOT CONTINUE

Contract System in Use by the State Institutions Engenders Situation Amounting to Downtight Cruelty

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP)—Assuming that the more than 150,000 disabled former service men now placed in state institutions were victims of such "gross neglect, indifference and profiteering" as was constituted by "black repression on the honor of the nation," the disabled American veterans of the world war, in a memorial presented today to President Harding urged immediate action by the government looking to the treatment of all such cases in federal institutions. Neglect of these cases in state institutions, the memorial stated, is committing to permanent incapacity many of the victims who by timely treatment probably could be cured.

Describing the condition of "contract" cases of this class in the institutions of the state of Ohio as typical of those in "practically every state," the memorial stated that the government had "favored out the issue service men of Ohio to state asylums which are notoriously overcrowded, under-manned and inadequately equipped to treat and care for them," while it has not provided one federal institution for this purpose in the state.

Men Sleep on Floor.—The location of the Hamilton county, Ohio, memorial said, "is so very crowded that the men sleep on the floor like cattle every night." On the memorial, it is stated that the institution of the state of Ohio, it was said, "provides no beds which might be used for treatment, but only a few beds for the treatment of the most serious cases." An average profit of \$800 on each man put in the state by the government was shown in figures for the nine institutions of the "white celtic" in the memorial.

FAR EASTERN QUESTIONS ARE BEFORE CONFERENCE

Final Word of Japanese Acceptance of Disarmament Treaty is Still Delayed

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP)—Still awaiting the receipt by the Japanese delegation of instructions from Tokyo which are expected to permit completion of the naval limitation treaty, the arms conference today prepared to turn again to the study of Far Eastern and Chinese questions.

The delegations of the nine powers participating in the discussions of these questions were called to meet at 10:30 o'clock in the first session held by that portion of the conference since January 6. Prior to the meeting, the heads of the delegations of the five great powers held another session and the American delegation met.

The meeting of the Far Eastern committee was called according to the understanding at the Chinese delegation headquarters for the purpose of passing on the final draft of the Chinese tariff agreement.

Under the tariff agreement which was put in final form on Friday at a meeting of the most committee to draft the Chinese would be permitted to levy a surtax of 1.5 per cent on accessories, and a 5 per cent surtax on luxuries.

Ten Arrests Made Following Finding of Bodies of Two

Discovery of Dead Men Believed Result of Attempted Hijack or Raid on Ship

BILLOXI, Miss. (AP)—Discovery of the bodies of two men, apparently foreign sailors, on the beach here, has led to ten arrests by the local police, who assert the men were killed in a fight which followed an attempt last week to board up and raid a liquor smuggling schooner at anchor near the coast. The police theory, it is stated, will disclose what is said to be the first instance of attempted piracy in connection with rum running on the Atlantic.

About the middle of the past week, according to the police, a Cuban fishing schooner, the *San Juan*, was in the vicinity of Dog Keys, and the captain made agreement for a party of Billoxians to come to the smack in galleys bound to carry the liquor to the mainland.

Kecks of Both Broken.—On Friday night, the police report, the party made the schooner *Cuban* boat, but instead of paying for the liquor, they overcame the crew of the fishing smack and brought about 100 kecks of liquor to the mainland.

Most of the liquor has been seized, the police declare. The foreign boat disappeared after the fight. The crew of the schooner, it is stated, were members of her crew. An autopsy showed the neck of each man had been broken.

Land Forces are to be Heavily Reduced in Next Five Years

Japanese Newspaper Announces Policy, Without Reference to Conference

TOKYO, (AP)—The Japanese was official newspaper of the outcome of the Washington conference, plans reduction of the Mikado's land forces by 50,000 men within five years, according to the Tokyo *Yomiuri*. To make up for the consequent loss in effectiveness, advanced types of machine rifles, and aircraft guns, tanks and other equipment will be purchased to each fighting unit.

Proportionate reduction will be made of clothing, ammunition, food, and other supplies, and other land property to meet the cut in personnel.

Preliminary investigations in the region plan are already under way.

Identification was accomplished by a bank pass book No. 4178 issued by the State bank of Omaha, Neb.

Officials believe Larson kindled a fire to warm himself and then fell asleep and rolled into the blaze.

RAILROAD MEN IN LONG TALK WITH UNION OFFICIALS

Gathering Called by Hoover at the Instance of President Harding—Resumes Its Sessions

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Conference between railroad executives and leaders of railroad employees' unions which have been inaugurated under the direction of Secretary Hoover with a view to eliminating disagreements and controversies, was resumed today with executives representing the principal roads of the country in attendance along with heads of the four brotherhoods.

The meeting today was the second held under the direction of Mr. Hoover, who is acting at the suggestion of President Harding. The first meeting was held about a week ago, at the home of the commerce secretary.

Wages and railroad rates were under discussion at the meeting and it was thought that today's discussion ranged to a considerable extent around those points.

Prominent Men on Both Sides.—Among the railroad men participating in the gathering today were Carl Gray, president of the Union Pacific, W. W. Atterbury, vice-president of the Pennsylvania, A. J. South, president of the New York Central, and B. F. Plath, president of the Missouri Pacific.

For the railroad-brotherhoods Warren B. Stone, chief of the engineers; W. G. Lee, chief of the trainmen; Timothy Shea for the engineers and L. E. Sheppard for the conductors, were present, and it was understood other officers of their organizations as well.

GOVERNOR OF IDAHO IS ASKED TO SHOW LETTERS

Controversy Between Executive and Head of Committee Will Not Down

CHICAGO, (AP)—Demanding that he reveal correspondence with Herbert Hoover, which newspaper reports from Detroit, said formed the basis of a statement by Governor Davis at a meeting of the American committee for Russian famine relief, that committee today received a telegram from Governor Davis asking that he be understood any charges had been made.

FREIGHT ON GAS IS CUT

Tariff to Salt Lake City, Ogden and Provo is Materially Reduced

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP)—Railroad rates on gasoline from a number of points from Colorado, Colo., to Salt Lake City, Ogden and Provo, Utah, were ordered reduced today by from 10 to 20 per cent, effective April 1, by the interstate commerce commission.

New rates were prescribed which the commission said, should not exceed 50 cents per 100 pounds from Florence, Colo., to Salt Lake City, 70 cents from Greeley, Wyo., 70 cents from Wilmington, Cal., and 81 cents from Denver, Cal. From the mile-point of Salt Lake City, the new rates shall not exceed 41 cents 100 pounds.

British General Elections Are Not Probable Until May

Lloyd George Declared to Have Reached Decision that Earlier Date Not Advisable, in View of Political Situation Generally

LONDON, (AP)—The English political situation, especially the question as to when the government is going to call a general election, has again been brought to the fore by the return of Prime Minister Lloyd George and the removal from the foreground of the Irish situation.

There was a fairly general opinion among the political writers in this morning's newspapers that the date of the election, recently forewarned for February, probably would not be held before May. It was said that Lloyd George had become convinced that an early election was undesirable.

POLICE BREAK UP STRIKE SYMPATHIZER GANGS BUT ONLY FOUR ARRESTS ARE MADE IN THE ENTIRE CITY

General Walkout of Operatives of Street Cars Brings Out Huge Flocks of Jitneys. Many Driven by Strikers—Order is Ignored by Some Employees of Company

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—Strikes called for today by platform men and shopmen employed by the Virginia Railway and Power company in opposition to a wage cut, were effective today by striking jitneys in Norfolk and Portsmouth, according to early reports to the company. In Petersburg it was declared the employees ignored the strike order.

Only a few cars were being operated here on the main lines of the company and thousands were forced to walk to their work in the morning. Many of the strikers were reported to have taken jobs as drivers of jitneys which immediately made their appearance in considerable numbers.

Four arrests were made here when the police broke up gangs of strike sympathizers who were attempting to interfere with operation of single cars.

DOUBLE MURDER IS CHARGED AGAINST FORMER OFFICIAL

Dr. Robert McCracken of East St. Louis Accused of Killing Man and Woman

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill. (AP)—Two warrants charging murder were issued this afternoon against Dr. Robert McCracken, 59 years old, of Jolville, in connection with the deaths of Mrs. Clara Bickwin, 36, and her father-in-law, William Bickwin, 74, who were found shot to death in the Bickwin home last Monday.

Dr. McCracken is a former coroner of St. Clair county and former health commissioner of East St. Louis.

CHINESE TAXES NOT OUR AFFAIR

Resolution Introduced by Senator King Would Curtail Proposal of Delegates

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP)—Under a King, democrat, Utah, by Senator King, introduced today a resolution expressing his disapproval of a proposal now before the members of the conference which would result, the resolution said, in certain powers, including the United States, "controlling the Chinese finances and taxes and would otherwise abridge the political and economic freedom of China." The resolution would put the senate on record as saying, "That any attempt to extend to China the internal taxation of China, in violation of settled policy of the United States and an unwarranted interference with the independent power and sovereign rights of the Chinese government, and is in violation of international law and that international community of nations between free and independent states."

CONFERENCE MEMBERS GO TO PARIS FOR LAND OF THE MIKADO

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP)—Ten members of the Japanese arms conference delegation will leave tomorrow for Paris for Japan, embarking from San Francisco on the steamer *Shimada Maru* on January 24. Among those returning are Major General Otake, who left Europe to assist Gen. Otake, the chief army expert for Japan at the conference; Lieutenant Colonel Morita, Major Nishikawa, Professor Nagai of the Tokyo Commercial university, who is one of the advisors to the delegation; Dr. Tuchi, an advisor to the foreign office on international law, and several secretaries.

IRISH POWER IS FINALLY VESTED IN IRISH PEOPLE

British Authorities in Dublin Castle Transfer All Governmental Rights Under Treaty Terms

DUBLIN, (AP)—The governmental powers for Ireland, as vested under the British authorities at Dublin castle, were turned over today to the provisional government of Ireland, as constituted last Saturday under the Anglo-Irish treaty. The transfer was made by Viscount Fitzalan, the high lieutenant, in the privy council chamber.

The news this morning awaited a telephone message announcing that the new ministry had arrived at the castle but not until 1:25 o'clock this afternoon did the cheers of the crowd outside announce the arrival of Michael Collins, Professor John McNeill, P. J. Hogan, Joe McGrath, Kevin O' Higgins and Eamon Dwyer. Immediately afterward Viscount Fitzalan, with two aides arrived and they all proceeded to the privy council chamber where the transfer of power was effected.

From an early hour this morning all approaches to the castle were blocked by good humored crowds watching for the arrival of the new ministry at Dublin castle. The metropolitan police dealt in a friendly manner with all comers and the auxiliaries in uniform were kept from the streets of the old quarters, where they had crammed so many arrested Sinn Feiners.

BURCH JURY STILL OUT—NO VERDICT IS LIKELY

Attorneys and Judge in Conference Decide to Permit of More Time

LOS ANGELES, Cal. (AP)—The ten member jury which composed the Burch jury, charged with the murder of a woman, August 5, last, returned to Superior Judge Sidney D. Beane's court today for the second day of deliberations as has been the case since 3:37 p. m. last Friday.

About one hour after the jury resumed its deliberations Judge Beane sent for the attorneys for both sides and held a conference with them on the case. It was understood that a verdict might be held in one hour, the jury resumed its deliberations to permit the deliberations to continue at least for four hours.

When the jury went back into its room it had been in actual conference a total of 20 hours and had the case under consideration more than 65 hours. Attorney said after the close of the local record for long consideration of a verdict.

PROMINENT IRISHMAN IS BELIEVED SUICIDE

Mystery Surrounds Finding of the Body of Honorable Victor Gibson in Hotel

LONDON, (AP)—The body of an Irish man found dead in a hotel at Hordam, in Sussex, on Saturday, was identified today as that of the Honorable Victor Gibson, son of the late Lord Ashbourne, and brother of the present Baron Ashbourne. His wife was an American, and he was a member of the staff of Frederick D. Biller, a former editor, whom he married in 1909.

Gibson, on arriving at the hotel Saturday, asked to room to be allowed to remain in the smoking room, which he did later found dead. He had previously stated at the hotel that he was an Irishman and a rebel, and that he had lived with his father, a former chancellor of Ireland, at the vicarage lodge in Dublin fourteen years ago. Some broken bottles were discovered in the fireplace and a small quantity of liquid had been spilled on the hearthstone.

# OXFORD MAN IS EXPELLED FOR RADICAL VIEWS

### Twenty Year Old Student Willing to Affirm His Faith in Nicolai Lenine Cannot Remain at University

OXFORD, England, (AP)—Arthur E. Reads, a 20-year-old student of Worcester college, has been "sent down," otherwise removed, from Oxford university by the vice chancellor and principal for editing a revolutionary newspaper.

Young Reads came to Oxford from Kion, the most fashionable public school in England last year and set forth his advanced views in "Free Oxford, a Communist Journal of Youth," an inter-university paper.

Clyde H. Owen, his associate editor, has been "sent down" for two terms. Has Faith in Lenine.

A general young plant, Reads published his "substantive" for Lenine and his faith in the dictatorship of the proletariat. He gloried in the admission that his name reached the ears of the other students. One of the other newspapers stated that "the bourgeoisie would be offered the alternative of surrender or extermination," and that "the destruction of a few would terrify the rest into surrender."

The Oxford university authorities believe that bolshevik propaganda among the English youth is becoming a menace.

**Permission Refused.**  
Leonid Urasin, the soviet trade unionist in England, addressed in connection with the Russian famine relief in the hall of the Union, the famous Oxford debating society but permission to use the hall was refused, and Krasin delivered his speech in an assembly room belonging to the Society of Friends, admission to which was only gained by running the gauntlet of an uproarious crowd of non-supporters.

# DEADLY PTOMAIN IS BELIEVED CONQUERED

### Members of National Cannery Association Learn Results of Scientific Research

FOURVILLE, Ky. (AP)—Science has laid low the ghost of ptomaine poisoning, according to members of the National Cannery Association, who are here for the fifth annual convention of the organization.

Food poisoning, as it is ordinarily understood, it was declared, is often due to improper diet or the careless handling of food on the part of the consumer.

Speakers at a dinner declared that the cannery now spending \$50,000 annually in "scientific" research and that some of the notable results have been final eradication of the danger due to botulism, especially from canned ripe olives.

Speakers included Dr. W. J. Bigelow of Washington, D. C., director of the association's laboratory, and C. H. Hoyle of San Francisco, vice president of the California Packing corporation.

# GARMENT WORKERS STRIKE LIKELY TO BE CALLED OFF

### Each Side Apparently Satisfied that It Has Won a Victory and End in Sight

NEW YORK, (AP)—The garment workers' strike, which has disrupted the industry in New York since November 14 and kept thousands idle, is expected to be called off. Members of the strike of the International Ladies' Garment Workers union will meet tonight to consider the situation.

Each side to the controversy apparently is satisfied that it has won a victory. Resumption of work, under old conditions, as suggested by Secretary Hoover and Davis, temporarily continues the 44-hour week and piece work, which the union desired, while the employers expect an investigation of labor conditions which they expect need remedying.

### POWER COMPANY PLANS NEW WORK

#### Engineers Make Surveys for Parallel Line from Shoshone Falls to Milner

In anticipation of early authorization for construction of a power transmission line to parallel the line now in operation between Shoshone falls power station and a distributing station at Milner, engineers in the employ of the Idaho Power company are now engaged in making surveys in this district.

#### Serves Government Project.

Through the Milner station power is delivered to a number of reclamation projects, including the Milner Low-lift project and the Minidoka and Burley reclamation districts. This year began to augment from this source their power supply from the power station established by the reclamation service.

#### Increases Demand for Power from the Milner station also are being made by the Vipont silver mining district situated across the state line in Utah about 20 miles south of Milner. Power to the mining district is delivered over the line that serves Oakley and other Casita county towns.

#### Serves as Safeguard.

In addition to providing for delivery of heavier loads of electric current, construction of the proposed auxiliary line from Shoshone falls to Milner would serve as a safeguard against interruption in service in case of fire or other factors which have occasioned trouble heretofore.

#### The Idaho Power company's budget as approved by the directors last week at Boise, does not include appropriation for the construction of this line, but it is believed that funds for the purpose have been set aside in view of the demands for increased service materialize.

An affirmative and a negative team of two men each and one alternate for each team will be selected from the squad of five. The university has an unusually early schedule of debates this year.

### EARTHQUAKE RECORD OF WORLD IS ESTABLISHED

Forty-Nine Shocks are Recorded in One Year in Chile, Says Long Duration

SANTIAGO, (AP)—Two hundred and forty nine earthquake shocks were recorded in Chile in 1920 according to a report just published by the national seismological service. The average interval between shocks was 31 hours while in the year previous a shock was registered every 28 hours.

The greatest seismic activity in 1920 was the area embracing the Aconcagua and Maipo valleys in which the principal cities are Santiago. The most pronounced shock was recorded on July 26, the center of which was in the Aconcagua valley.

OBERAMMERGAL, Germany, (AP)—One hundred thousand or more visitors already have applied for tickets to the Passion play to be staged next season, from May to September.

### DIVORCE COMES EASY BUT THREE CONSTITUTES LIMIT

#### Marital Troubles Easy of Settlement in Soviet Russia, Says Visitor

RIQA, Latvia, (AP)—Three divorcees to any one person are considered all right in Soviet Russia, according to Parley Christensen, of Chicago, candidate for president of the United States by the Farmer-Labor party ticket in 1920, who recently spent a month in Moscow. Mr. Christensen visited several Polishvok courts.

"It is fairly easy to get a divorce in Soviet Russia," said Mr. Christensen when in Riga, "but I understand the limit is three for each person. If a woman has appeared in the divorce courts more recently than three, she has a very difficult time."

#### Proceeding Simple.

"I visited one divorce hearing. It was extremely simple. The pair was separated in half an hour. On arrival at the court from the man and woman were separately questioned by the judge. He then got them together and tried to persuade them that their quarrel could be patched up and they might do together. They could not do that way, so the judge took them into another room to adjust papers dissolving their marriage."

Mr. Christensen also visited a number of "people's courts," corresponding to police courts in America, where persons are tried for minor offenses. Most of the judges could not be dressed in rough clothes, including brown flannel shirts.

"In general," said Mr. Christensen, "I was amazed at the fairness of these courts."

### COLLECTS DATA ON MOTOR FEES

#### Assessor Gathers Information on Progress of Gas Wagon in Idaho

Fee collected for registration of motor vehicles reached its high record level in Twin Falls county and in Idaho in 1920 when total collections for the county on 6328 licenses issued were \$91,628.75, and for the state on 51,623 licenses, \$882,034.51. Last year the county issued 4988 licenses and collected \$18,184.14 in fees, while in the entire state there were 52,041 licenses issued and \$841,204.25 collected in fees.

These facts and figures are embodied in information supplied by Secretary of State Robert O. Jones to S. Claud Stewart, Twin Falls county assessor, who is to present a paper on "Methods in Collection of Motor Vehicle License Fees," at an annual meeting of the county assessors of the state in Boise, opening Thursday.

MYSTERY OF MOUNT EVEREST

Finding of Footprint on Mountain Given Various Explanations

The progress of the Royal Geographical society's expedition to Mount Everest, under the leadership of Col. Howard Bury, was watched with keen interest by scientists, especially at the Natural History museum, South Kensington, to which the spoils were to be brought for study and classification on the return of the party.

One statement in a dispatch received from Colonel Bury excited special curiosity, and it is hoped that this will be satisfied by further discoveries in the course of the expedition.

"Even at these heights (more than 20,000 feet)," writes Colonel Bury, "there were curious tracks in the snow. We distinguished here and fox tracks; but one track, like that of a human foot, was most puzzling. The cowles assured me that it was the track of a wild, hairy man, and that these men were occasionally to be found in the wildcat and most inaccessible mountains."

Naturalists here are by no means prepared to scout the idea of a human race living in such a situation. The probability is, however, that the supposed "wild, hairy man," is in reality a baboon, known as a Macaque, which is known to live at great heights on the Himalayas, and the footprint would be very similar to the human foot.

Washington's Harvest of Moss. 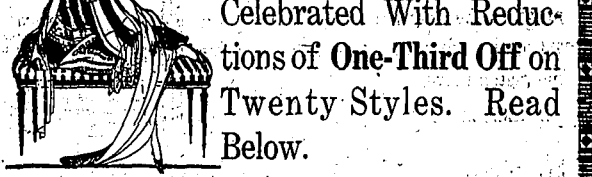

# AMERICANISM IS KEYNOTE IN NAVAL CIRCLES

### Over 99 Per Cent of Personnel of the Ships Officers and Crews are United States Born

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP)—The United States navy is 99.7 per cent pure American. Secretary Denby is proud of his navy and said today that it is the best in the world. He made this statement by figures recently compiled by the bureau of navigation which show that on July 1, 1921, 105,000 sailors represented 91.8 per cent of the total manning of 115,000 men of which number 109,457 were natives, 4,820 were born in Guam, Samoa, the Philippines or Virgin Islands, and 750 were naturalized citizens.

### Men Are Handpicked

The figures also show it is a handpicked navy for out of 125,000 applicants, only 72,386 were accepted. It is a healthy navy afloat and ashore, according to the statement of the bureau general.

It is a well-behaved navy, too, as only 68 per cent of the total number of discharges were dishonorable, and but 4.6 per cent of the total number in the service during the year deserted. Good conduct medals in the service total over 1,200,000, some men having eight to nine medals. Also 25,000 to the credit of the gallantry medals.

### New Yorkers Prominent

The distribution of men by states gives New York the lead in both the former and 14,170 in the latter. Pennsylvania comes second in each list, with 9,961 and 9,250, respectively. The native sons of the state follow in Massachusetts, fourth to Illinois, and fifth to Texas.

Out of the total, 110,000 sailors there are 10,000 in the fleet, 23,850 in the service, 100 Chinese, 88 Japanese, 139 Samoan, 219 Chinese, 200 Hawaiian, 107 Porto Rican, and 800 Indian in the fleet.

The American navy also is a young navy, 43,553 being under 21; two-thirds of them are 24 years and under; and only 8,000 are 40 and over, although 53 are over 60 and still active.

Eight per cent of the enlisted men are married, a total of 9,836 men. Over 500,000 the men have had previous sea service, and 440 of them have served over 20 years.

## WEDDING GOWN IS OF MAGNIFICENT DESIGN

Costume to be Worn by Princess Mary is Triumph of Native Dress

LONDON, (AP)—Princess Mary's wedding gown is to be one of cloth of silver, the most magnificent. The material was brought by the queen from India some years ago, and is described as a triumph of native manufacture. The dress will be of the form of heavy silk, shot with silver, which is being woven by hand workers at Bristol, Essex, an old English mill manufacturing cloth where the ancient industry has been passed down from generation to generation. So great is the care taken in the manufacture of this material that only a few inches are finished each day.

The train is expected to be ready soon and it will be placed in the hands of the bride. Many plans for presenting wedding gifts to the king's daughter are afoot. The lord mayor of London is opening a public fund for the purpose, with contributions limited to one pound sterling.

## POLISH DEMAND IS IRRITATING TO NEIGHBORS

Right to Vise Passports of the Travelers Making Use of Danzig Corridor May Cause Trouble

PRAGA, (AP) — The Latvian government has become irritated by Poland's attempt to prevent free transit of foreign passengers through the Danzig corridor without Polish visas on their passports. The Latvians questioned Poland's right to this partial closing of the corridor and declared Poland's action is in direct contradiction to the terms of the Versailles treaty which set up the famous corridor giving Poland access to the Baltic.

Poland's practice in demanding that foreigners crossing the corridor must have Polish visas on their passports has caused complaint by travelers between the Baltic states—Lithuania, Estonia and Latvia—and western Europe for more than a year.

For many months Polish gentlemen have boarded trains at the station and exit to the corridor that divides Germany into two parts and in many instances, have ejected passengers who did not have the Polish visa, even when they were only in transit through the corridor between countries on both sides of it.
