Former Service Men on French Cemetery Duty Declare the Statements Made by Witness are Untrue

BLACK CAPS REMOVED PRIOR TO INTERMENT

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—Former service men detailed for duty with the American graves registration service in France denied before a senate investigating committee that the bodies of soldiers were regularly taken to France were buried with a stab rope around the neck and the black cap which had been placed on them on the gallows.

Hanging Methods Reviewed

Disagreeing with witnesses who presented the case, Richard C. Sullivan, sergeant major, an assistant embalmer with the graves registration service, declared he saw two bodies taken up with rope and black cap intact.

DUBLIN, (AP)—Owen O'Duffy, Sinn Fein leader, after he had taken up with the British authorities the arrest of ten men by the Royal Irish Constabulary on the occupants of automobiles on their way from Meaghlin to Londonderry who were reported by the constables to have represented themselves as British football players but who were Irish republican army uniforms.

Demands Immediate Release

O'Duffy declared that one of the men arrested was Divisional Commandant of the republican division of the Sinn Fein party and the other members of his staff. Unless the men were immediately released, O'Duffy announced he would take action.

GERMANY PREPARING FOR BIG DEVELOPMENT

Proposed Incorporation in Argentina Taken as Part of Plan of Expansion

BUENOS AIRES, (AP)—Hugo Simeon, Argentine minister, is believed to be planning to combine and expand his multiple interests in Argentina. Articles for the incorporation of the Argentine Republic into the Argentine Republic have been submitted to the government authorities, it is learned.

The Simeon interests include the development of petroleum and agricultural lands, lumber enterprises and importing organizations in co-operation with the Simeon steamship lines and the Simeon shipping agents.

One reason for the interest taken by Herr Simeon in South America is said to be the fact that his wife was born in Uruguay, and that his daughter recently visited this city.

The co-operative shop of the Wm. Davis company, packers, and the stables of the Magnus Metal company were destroyed, 35 horses losing their lives. The metal company's building was also damaged. Firemen reported the fires were apparently incendiary.

ROYALTY OF EUROPE IS HAVING NO EASY TIME

Mosgor Incomes Lead 'Little Joy to Existence of Former-Ruling Spirits

GENEVA, (AP)—Scattered throughout Europe, the members of the once proud house of Hapsburg and all living in difficult circumstances, some of them in poverty. Ex-Emperor Charles and ex-Empress Zila, who were sent to Puchal, Madrid as "guests" of the allies, are supplementing their allowance by the sale of some of their family jewelry. Archdukes Eugene and Ferdinand have been permitted by the Swiss government to remain at Lucerne, it being found after an inquiry that they had nothing to do with Charles' Madrid attempt at restoration. Archduke Max and Frederic are living with Archduchess Josepha in Bavaria. Albrecht resides with his mother Sabolla at Budapest; Leopold Salvator is staying at a villa near Barcelona. Joseph Ferdinand and Henry Ferdinand have settled down in the imperial hunting lodge at Salzburg, and Archduchess Maria lives alone in the chateau Valuz in Liechtenstein.

AMERICAN TROOPS IN ROME

Part of Forces Stationed at Coblenz to Take Part in Italian Ceremonies

ROME, (AP)—American troops under command of Major General Henry T. Allen arrived today from Coblenz to participate in the ceremonies at the grave of the Italian unknown soldier, which will be held tomorrow. The American ambassador, Richard Washburn Child, will then bestow the congressional medal of honor.

INITIAL SECTION OF NEW POWER LINE BUILT

Total Expense of Two and a Half Million Dollars Involved in Project

STOCKHOLM, (AP)—The first section of a high-power electric line which is designed to pass through the center of Sweden from north to south, has just been completed and is now in operation.

The section connects the high-power electric station at Trollhattan Falls, in central Sweden, to the city of Vasteras, one of Sweden's most important manufacturing centers. It cost more than 10,000,000 kroner (about \$5,500,000).

The large waterfalls of north and central Sweden will be utilized to provide the power for the great electric power line when completed. This is intended to enable Sweden not only to run its trains with electric power but also to electrify the big industrial plants of the country. It is expected in that way to greatly decrease if not entirely to eliminate the use of coal.

BUSINESS INTERESTS OF PORTUGAL TO TAKE HAND

Broad Scale Defensive Alliance Formed to Combat Bad Influence of Politics

LIBRON, (AP)—Business interests of Portugal have taken a hand to bring economic affairs of this country out of what they characterize as a deplorable condition. All the commercial, agricultural and industrial associations have formed a kind of defensive union to take an active part in public administration and enforce Portugal's right to work and prosper in spite of political party struggles and revolutionary movements. For this purpose, a national economic congress has been held at Oporto in which many leading business men and financiers participated. They declared that they refused longer to passively submit to the assassination of statesmen to be the victim of professional politicians.

REDUCED PRICES OF BREAD WILL SAVE ENORMOUS SUM

People of Chicago Will Pay \$12,500,000 a Day Less for Bread of Life

CHICAGO, (AP)—Bread prices were reduced one cent here today, Bureau F. Toole, secretary of the city council committee on living costs said. Pound loaves now selling for 10 cents will be sold for 9 cents and 8-ounce bread now sold for 15 cents will be sold for 14 cents. Chicago eats 1,500,000 loaves of bread a day, according to Toole, and the public therefore will save \$12,500 daily.

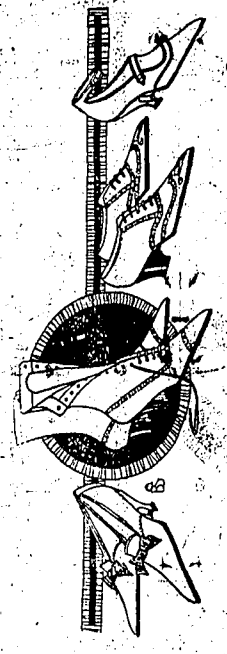

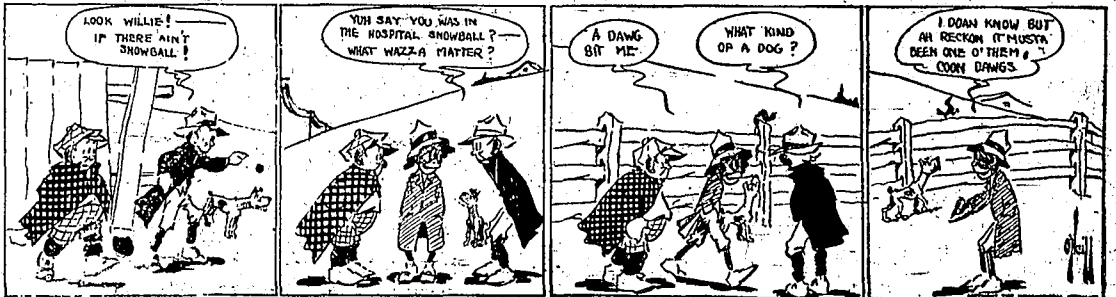
