AMOUNT ASKED IS LESS THAN BUDGET FIGURE

Independent Offices Appropriation Bill is Reported Out By Lower House Appropriations Committee

LARGE SUMS ASSIGNED TO GOVERNMENT EXPENSE

One Hundred Million is Made Available to Emergency Fleet Corporation During Forthcoming Fiscal Year

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP)—The total of \$108,297,500 in excess of the appropriations for the fiscal year, the annual independent offices appropriation bill, carrying \$40,394,238 was reported today by the house appropriations committee.

The bill which provides for expenses during the fiscal year beginning next July 1, recommends \$17,471,632 for the veterans' bureau, \$104,620,000 for the shipping board, \$4,855,500 for the interstate commerce commission, \$1,050,700 for the housing corporation, \$370,000 for the alien property custodian's office, \$53,000 for the national labor board, \$229,450 for the salaries of the president and vice president and for White House expenses, \$355,000 for the federal trade commission, \$300,000 for the tariff commission and \$210,000 for the national advisory committee for aeronautics.

Less Than Budget Estimates. The amount carried for the veterans' bureau is \$81,901,000 more than appropriations for the current year, but \$2,147,080 less than budget estimates. The total \$108,297,500 is recommended for military and naval commissions, \$35,290,000 more than appropriations for the current year. For hospital and medical services, \$44,638,000 is recommended, \$1,000,000 more than the appropriation of the current year.

A resolution was placed in the bill upon the vocational training appropriation permitting only one training school to be opened at each place that is to be at Camp Sherman, Ohio, and limiting the number of those in training there at any one time to 1000. Of the amount recommended for the shipping board, \$50,000 is for salaries and expenses of the board, \$42,500 less than the appropriation of the current year. A provision of \$200 is provided to continue the investigation of foreign discrimination against American vessels and shippers.

Expressman Killed and Booty Taken in During Train Theft

Special Guard Not Disturbed and Crime Unsuspected Until Arrival of Train

EL PASO, Texas, (AP)—Bandits who looted a train on the Mexican National line as passengers at Santa Rosalia, near Chihuahua City, Chihuahua, yesterday, stopped into the express car, killed Juan R. Figueroa, expressman, seized 1000 pesos and escaped without the knowledge of the special train guard, according to passengers on the train who arrived in Juarez last night. The bandits failed in an attempt to force open a strong box on the express car, which contained 5000 pesos in gold, according to reports. The murder and robbery were not discovered until the train pulled into La Cruz, where the guard took charge of the train. The expressman's body was left at Chihuahua City.

NEW YORK, (AP)—Mysterious fires in two public schools in New York City, which destroyed hundreds of pupils, have led to the arrest of three boys, after investigation has shown that the fires started in waste paper baskets in empty class rooms. Detectives today were seeking other boys thought to be responsible for two other school fires.

Police Engaged in Search for Two Youths Accused of Taking Locomotive from Roundhouse as Aid to Crime

MILWAUKEE, (AP)—Police and deputy sheriffs today were seeking two youths who stole a switch engine from the Chicago and Northwestern railroad roundhouse at Neeshuter, a suburb, in an attempt to rob a merchandise train. The engine was found abandoned on the main line half a mile out of Sunter, nearly 45 miles west of Milwaukee. One man is under arrest, as a suspect.

WILL TELL LURID STORY OF CRUELTY IN FRANCE

Witness Prepared to Testify as to Death of Two Men Following Beating by Sergeants

DUNKIRK, N. Y. (AP)—George Walters of this city, who served in the Forty-ninth infantry at Camp Merritt, will testify before the senate investigating committee as to instances of cruelty he claims to have witnessed in the gunnery there. Walters declares that cruelty was practiced to death with a pick axe handle by sergeants. One prisoner was clubbed because he failed to work fast enough in scrubbing the floor with a toothbrush, Walters asserts.

Witness Weeps as He Recounts Theft of Personal Effects Including Bible by Military Police in France

HEARD SERGEANT'S ORDER THEN VIEWED DEAD BODY

South Carolina Man Relates Incident of Shooting of Prisoner—Killer Never Tried for Crime, He Testifies

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP)—Four of the ten witnesses summoned to appear today before a senate committee investigating the charges that American soldiers were hanged without trial in France, failed to appear and the sergeant at arms of the senate reported to the committee that it had been found "impossible to locate" them.

Harry K. Walker of New York city told the committee that while in the air service in France he was transferred to another station, the name of which he did not remember, and a corporal through Paris was picked up and put in prison as "a lost and found person," although he was in possession of his papers.

"I was put in a room with so many others that we could not sleep even on the floor," the witness said. "And we kept there two days. There was not even a chair in the room. We were never allowed to see our families or friends."

Raid of Barracks Emphasizes Unrest Over Southern Ireland

BELFAST, (AP)—The police barracks at Charlestown, County Mayo, were raided by fifty armed men today, who escaped with a considerable quantity of arms and ammunition. One sergeant was wounded during the raid.

"A spirit of extreme republicanism," the correspondent declares, "still flames in the south, where large bodies of armed men refuse to accept the British. There has been an epidemic of robbery and other crimes of violence in Dublin and in rural districts, which demands strong measures from the government."

CONSPIRACY IS CHARGE FILED

Lorillard, and the Liggett and Myers Tobacco company—were charged with keeping up prices in a report transmitted today to the senate by Senator Smith, Democrat, South Carolina, as former part of the "tobacco trust" disclosed by the supreme court. The J. Reynolds company, the report said, was not a party to the alleged conspiracy and was consequently not its application. The commission promised prosecution where evidence disclosed there has been violation of law.

RAILROADS OF CHINA AGAIN IN SPOT LIGHT

American Delegation Preparing to Lay Before Washington Conference Plans for National Operation

JAPAN WILL NOT OBJECT TO PRINCIPLE INVOLVED

Special Interest on Part of the Mikado Likely to Draw Close Attention of Students of Far East

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP)—The American delegation, it was stated authoritatively today, is expected to lay before the Washington conference another Far Eastern resolution which will relate to Chinese railways, the purpose being to bring the roads so far as possible under American control, creating to prevent discrimination in favor or against the nationals of any particular country.

What some Japanese held that the resolution of the conference would be a real test of the American proposal, which was submitted yesterday. It is expected that the resolution refers specifically to a part of the world in which Japan has the most extensive railway system, the so-called 21 demand, treaty, they did not appear excited over the possible application of the resolution to this section of the Far Eastern situation, it was explained that Japan would never consent to any questioning of the validity of the 21 demand treaty, but was ready to accept the American proposal, or before the proposed board of reference, to discuss any allegations that sections of the 1911 treaty with China, including Manchuria, on the one hand, however, that no power would endeavor to obtain a special or predominant position in Manchuria.

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP)—"An effort at this time to set aside the six per cent rate fixed by the transportation act would alienate whatever confidence exists in the future of our railroads and their securities," Jerome J. Haney, a New York investment banker, declared today at the latest meeting of the Interstate Commerce commission. Mr. Haney at the same time expressed his conviction that it would be impossible for the commission to find rates which, under present conditions, would enable the roads to receive a 6 per cent return on their property in the hands of the stockholders. He said that a 6 per cent return would allow a 10 per cent dividend for stockholders, interest on bonds and a margin of safety for loan years would be 6 2/3 per cent.

PASSPORT IS LIKELY TO GO BEFORE LONG

Indications Are That World Travel Will Soon Become as Free of Restriction as in the Pre-War Days

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The passing of the passport is gradually being brought about in response to a growing disposition on the part of the nations to get rid of burdensome war-time regulations concerning international travel. The diplomatic affairs here unhesitatingly predict that as a consequence the time is not far distant when tourists may glide the globe virtually unhindered, as in the days before 1914.

The agitation for a removal of the necessity for consular visas upon passports and letting down of the bars in border regulations had its inception and strongest backing among the business men of all nations. Restrictions upon travel have reacted upon the commercial life of those nations accustomed to gather large yearly harvests from the well-filled pockets of foreign visitors. It was pointed out that the necessity to carry the pendulum of travel restrictions back to its old position.

Restrictions Used

Belgium was the first to ease the restrictions upon travel imposed at the beginning of the war. Convicted that the necessity for rigid examination of visitors was at an end with the coming of peace, the Brussels government so modified its restrictions that persons passing through Belgium en route to other countries, and persons intending to visit Belgium for a period not greater than 60 days, might do so without incident. That move was followed by agitation in Switzerland for similar letting down of the bars, and the recent action of Switzerland in granting permission for visitors to enter the country without passport restrictions is believed to be indicative of the trend of thought in virtually all the other European countries.

American Position Easier

The position of the United States is somewhat different from that of its sister nations, it is explained by officials of the State department. America's restrictions on immigration make it vitally important that immigrants be carefully sorted at the points of origin. It is said, and few that reason so persons intending to enter this country must appear before an American consul and have their passports approved with a visa. By so doing, the prospective immigrant is spared a trip to this country and his return to his native out being allowed to land because the quota of nationals of his particular country allowed to enter America within the year immigration law had been filled before the immigrant's arrival here. The provision for culling immigrants abroad was laid down by congress in an effort to facilitate operation of the immigration laws, and there is little prospect that the rigid rule requiring passport visas will be rescinded, it is said.

Retaliatory Move

Other nations adopted the custom of requiring visas on passports shortly after the American law went into effect. Their action was rather in the nature of a retaliation, for what was believed to be an undue hardship imposed on their subjects by the American regulation, it is said, and sentiment abroad is veering to the belief that that retaliation has not paid and it would be wise to make travel as convenient for visitors—American and others—as possible. The action of Belgium and Switzerland was cited in support of that belief, in as much as these two countries decided to ease their restrictions from American travelers without demanding a reciprocal arrangement in this country.

MAINE SHIP RECORD FALLS OFF SHARPLY

Figures of Production for Year Just Closed Indicate Material Shrinkage

PORTLAND, Me., (AP)—The gross tonnage of ships produced in Maine shipyards during 1921 decreased 35,000 tons as compared with the output for the preceding year. Statistics show that slightly over 25,000 tons went down the ways last year while in 1920 60,000 tons were sent over. While the figures show a large falling off from the peak of the industry reached in 1919 when 110,000 gross tons were produced, the output is 15,000 tons above that of the average pre-war production. Further declines are anticipated this year.

At Bath, the shipbuilding center of the state, it is said, a majority of the 1921 production is credited, so widespread to be in sight except a government contract for five steel lightships. Several yards in Maine have become involved in financial difficulties and many others have ceased building because of lack of demand and the cost of operation. Although work has been stopped at most of the plants in the state, the builders claim the industry could be revived in a short time if it were necessary.

The object will be to establish a clear understanding between silk producers of Japan and silk consumers in foreign countries thereby contributing to improvement of agricultural industry in this country.

FALL IS URGED TO SIGN BY IRRIGATION DISTRICT

Director of Murtagh Reclamation Project Ask Approval of American Falls Contract

MURTAUGH, Idaho (Special).—Director of the Murtagh irrigation district which expects to draw its water supply for reclamation from the American Falls reservoir, at a special meeting here Monday evening adopted resolutions urging acceptance by Secretary of the Interior Fall, for the reclamation service, of a pending contract with the Idaho Power company under provisions of which the reclamation service would take over certain rights and property deemed essential for construction of plans for the American Falls reservoir project. Copies of the resolution were wired to Secretary Fall and Representative Addison T. Smith.

The text of the resolution follows: Whereas, A contract is pending between the United States reclamation service and the Idaho Power company whereby the power company releases certain rights to the reclamation service which are vital to the construction of the American Falls reservoir; and Whereas, The Murtagh irrigation district comprising 4300 acres of land in Twin Falls and Cassia counties, is dependent upon the American Falls storage for a water supply. Now therefore, We, the board of directors of the Murtagh irrigation district petition and pray that the secretary of the Interior, Albert H. Fall, sign that pending contract.

BOOZE PROFITS RUNNING HIGH

Permits from Liquor Sales in Quebec Will Pay Off Public Debt in 20 Years

QUEBEC, (AP)—Profits from liquor sales in the province of Quebec will pay off the public debt in twenty years, maintain roads and provide funds for education, according to a report prepared by Premier Taschereau for submission to the legislature in its present session.

Based on his findings on the business done since May, 1921, when the liquor trade was given temporary monopoly, the premier estimated that the yearly profit would be \$4,000,000. Besides \$28,000,000 loaned municipalities for building and improving by sinking fund, Quebec's debt is \$28,000,000. The government sold \$9,325,727 worth of liquor from May 1 to December 31, 1921.

BUSINESS MEN MUST STABILIZE INDUSTRY

Efficiency Engineer Declares Waste in Management to Anti-Trust Laws

CLEVELAND, O., (AP)—Unemployment may be eliminated and business losses and depression controlled by a consideration of management in industry, J. Park Chanusing of New York, told members of the national convention of the Associated General Contractors today. Mr. Chanusing is chairman of the American Engineering Council's committee on elimination of waste in industry.

"The way in which the owners in industry may be of value in the elimination of waste," he said, "is in stabilizing production. There are the people, more than anyone else, who can prevent or at least reduce the peaks and valleys of booms and depressions."

He cited soft coal mining as an example of a poorly organized industry. "It is over equipped," he said, "both as regards plant and personnel, and the soft coal mines instead of being able to get 300 days of work as he should, gets, I believe, about 100, and this means that there are altogether too many men ready to migrate and that part of the waste in industry is to modify the anti-trust laws so as to permit consolidation now prohibited."

ALLIES' DEBTS BILL TO COME BEFORE CONGRESS

Republican Senators in First Conference of Session, Agree Upon Priority of the Pending Legislation

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—Decision to press first the allied debt refunding bill and next a soldiers' bonus bill was reached today by republican senators in their first conference of this session of congress. A second conference was called for 2 o'clock to discuss details of the measure.

Opposition to a soldiers' bonus bill developed but it was announced officially that the motion to place the legislation second in the list was carried by "a large majority." Elimination by the finance committee of the requirement in the allied debt bill for annual payment of interest on the bonds to be accepted from the foreign debtors nations also was discussed but a decision on this feature of the bill was deferred.

GREATEST GATHERING OF IRISH IN CENTURY

World Congress of Races to be Held in Paris Attracts Much Attention Over Europe

PARIS, (AP)—Promoters of the World Congress of the Races, to be held in Paris for one week beginning January 31, say it will be the greatest gathering of the Irish race since King Brian Boru's assembly in 1014.

The congress, which will attract 25,000,000 persons of Irish blood throughout the world can assist in the economic reconstruction of Ireland made necessary by the years of conflict before the conference. The revival of Irish art, language and literature also will be considered.

One of the large halls in the center of Paris has been obtained for the sessions and an exhibition of Irish art will be held in another hall near the headquarters. The best known Irish artists are sending pictures for the exhibition.

Consequently with the congress will be a representation of Irish drama. In French in one of the Parisian theatres and a concert of Irish music by one of the best known orchestras in Europe.

Many descendants of Irish exiles of the 17th century who played historic roles in France and other countries have responded to the invitation of the general secretary, Miss Katherine Hughes, who will be present.

Five South American countries have already indicated a desire to send delegations. These are Brazil, Argentina, Chile, Bolivia, and Peru, while delegations from New Zealand, Tasmania and other remote countries are already on their way.

GERMAN SMUGGLERS ARE REAPING HIGH HARVEST

English Cloth, Brought Into Country Illicitly, Sold at Prices Which Give Big Profits

BERLIN, (AP)—Smugglers are making immense profits by bringing English cloth for men's suits past the customs line to the tailors of Berlin. Their illicit earnings are made possible by the high German import duties on first class material.

The tailoring establishments are visited almost daily by sailors or other ship employees with huge rolls of English tweeds and other fabrics, in one suit piece, which they have succeeded in purchasing at English ports and bringing to their feet. One of these smugglers, a New York man, said some English cloth dealers here are making a regular business of supplying the smuggling trade.

The cloth is sold at one-fourth to one-fifth the price it would cost if the import duty was paid. Tailors are able to purchase the fabric. The smugglers also visit foreigners and offer their wares for sale.

The smugglers go quite openly about their business, walking the streets with big bundles on their backs. A few of the more venturesome have even offered the people for a look at the side-walks, where they find ready takers.

A French sailor who had been smuggling for several months said he was going to retire from the game, "having made enough money to open a shop of his own in Paris."

Establishes Two Records.

SOUTH BEND, Wash., (AP)—Two new weather records were established in this section of the west today on record and the wind attained a record velocity during the year.

The rainfall here was 17.55 inches or 2 1/2 inches less than 10 feet. The record wind came on January 29, 1921, when the recording instruments at North Bend registered 132 miles an hour before they were destroyed by the gale. It is estimated the storm attained a 100-mile velocity. It was this same gale which blew millions of feet of standing timber on the Olympian.

CHILE ACCEPTS INVITATION

SANTIAGO, Chile, (AP)—Chile, it was announced today, had accepted an invitation from the United States government to designate a plenipotentiary at Washington to study the form of execution of the treaty of Ancon, under which the Tana-Arica dispute between Peru and Chile arose. It is said the United States has extended a similar invitation to Peru.

White Caps and Gowns.

Candidates for degrees from the University of the Philippines will wear white caps and gowns at the next commencement exercises, which come in April. This adaptation of traditional academic costume to the needs of the tropics was made by the board of regents of the university with little or no thought, probably, for the Ku Klux Klan, yet were some members of the faculty and the student body who demurred. They had not forgotten the masquerade possibilities of sheets and pillow-cases. Yet the University of the Philippines is doubtless right in making the change instead of following unquestioningly the clerical traditions of the Middle Ages. It is going back to the simple precedent set in the grove. Academia.

Mozart's Youthful Opera Given.

Mozart's comic opera, "La Fluta Semplice," written when he was twelve years old, has been given a first performance in Karlsruhe in a textual rearrangement by Anton Ludolph. The opera was performed but once, in Salzburg, sixty years ago, and then was completely forgotten. The Cologne Gazette says that for the original silly and unenjoyable text Ludolph has substituted something reasonable, at the same time maintaining the strictest respect for the music, which is full of melody and youthful freshness, though positionless.

Cost of Mosquitoes.

According to the New Jersey department of conservation and development more than \$500,000,000 would be added to New Jersey's industrial values in the next 20 years if the mosquito were eliminated in that state. The department claims that a million dollars spent in a period of five years would rid the state of the pest.

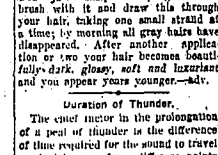
