EVIDENCES OF HARMONY ARE GROWING FAST

Controversy in Disarmament Conference Between Chinese and Japanese Over Shantung Is Dying Down

DELEGATES DECIDE TO RESUME CONVERSATIONS

Both Sides Indicate Willingness to Give a Point and Hope of Speedy Settlement is Now Entertained

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP)—Further indication of a settlement of the Shantung controversy was imminent developed today when the Japanese and Chinese delegations were called together.

The Chinese, it was said, would be willing to grant the Japanese concession for Japanese experts with full titles to the Chinese managing director.

Members of the Chicago delegation indicated that the prospect of a settlement of the Shantung problem was based to some extent on an advice lately received by them from Peking.

It was thought in Chicago circles that the Japanese probably would not make the Chinese half way in reaching an agreement on the basis of some modification of the Japanese proposal.

Every feature of the Shantung problems previously has been settled except details of the Tangtze-Yanfu railway settlement and redemption of Chinese mortgages.

At the same time, a call was issued for a meeting late in the day of the naval commission of 15, presumably to discuss the Japanese reply on fortification.

WILL PUT DOWN KURDISH CHIEF

Persian Government Equipping Expedition to Settle Rebellion at Tabriz

CONSTANTINOPLE, (AP)—The Persian government has organized an expedition to put down the rebellion headed by Sliko, the Kurdish brigand chief, who has several times menaced the city of Tabriz, according to advices from Teheran. The government troops have been augmented by Cossacks from Toheran and by contingents from northern provinces.

Colonel Lodenberg, one of the British officers now in charge of the Persian militia, has been placed in control of all the military operations against Sliko. The British officers have succeeded the British who have withdrawn from any action with the Persian forces or in other similar organizations in Persia.

Riza Khan, Persian minister of war and formerly a member of the Cossack military organization in Persia, who is now almost the dictator of the Persian cabinet, is determined to put an end to Sliko's uprising.

One of Sliko's most recent raids took place in October when part of his forces attacked the American Lutheran mission at Sijuhak with 500 gunners, who surrendered were shot down with machine guns. Sliko's will tribute then looted the town.

REGINA, Sask., (AP)—The provincial historical museum now contains a sample of "medicinal rock," the location of which has been a secret for centuries. The rock is a fossiliferous limestone in northeastern Saskatchewan. The famous rock was visited last summer by a government exploring party. Only a few Indians were acquainted with its location, and the party respected the hereditary rights of the family which has had custody of it.

The rock is "looked upon by the Indians as one of the greatest remedies for loss of blood or any run down condition. An analysis of the material shows that "Medicine Rock" is composed of what its name implies, as it is a form of iron which might be of value in anemic conditions.

MAKES BID FOR FOREIGN MONEY

Bulgarian Government Anxious to Interest Capital Particularly in America

VARNA, Bulgaria, (AP)—The Bulgarian government invites Americans to come to Bulgaria to build highways, gas pipelines and harbor improvements at Varna on the Black sea and to establish industrial enterprises at other points.

The government believes that Russia before many years will emerge from her present state of disorganization and that she will require many ships which could be conveniently built at Varna.

Alexander Radoloff, Bulgarian minister of the interior, told the correspondent one of the greatest opportunities for enterprising Americans existed in the canning, sugar, fishing, forest and mining industries. He said huge profits awaited Americans who might establish canning factories for the enormous quantities of fish that surrounded the Black sea, the Danube and other rivers, and for the packing of compressed beef, fruits and vegetables in which the country was so rich. There was not a single canning industry in the state, he declared.

"We have enormous forest areas where it will be necessary only to build narrow gauge railways to produce some of the finest timber and paper-pulp in the world," said M. Radoloff. "We are prepared to give responsible American corporations in these regions. We feel the United States knows us better than other foreign power. That's the reason we want its business men, capitalists and engineers to help us develop our natural resources."

COUNTY CLERK'S FEES IN EXCESS OF ALL EXPENSE

C. C. Siggins Turns \$2,446.85 Into County Fund. After Meeting Entire Cost of Office for Year Just Closed

Fees collected by the office of the county auditor, recorder and ex-officio clerk of the district court, under the administration of C. C. Siggins during the year just closed amounted to \$10,715.15 and exceeded by \$2,446.85 the total expense of maintaining the office during the year together with the amount of remittance to the state in connection with actions filed in the district court, according to figures contained in an annual report for the office submitted for the approval of the board of county commissioners.

Into County Treasury.
The amount of the excess, \$2,446.85, has been turned over to the county treasurer to be applied on the county's current expense fund.
Total expenses of the office for the year just closed are given as amounting to \$15,715.15. This includes all salaries, purchase of supplies and equipment and general operating expenses. A total of \$1737 was remitted to the state covering the fees received in filing of 579 actions in the district court.

It is believed that surplus turned over by the office to the county funds is equalled by similar office in no other Idaho county.
Additional duties have devolved upon the office during the past year by reason of the fact that almost continuous sessions of district court have been held.
Investigation and relief in cases of indigent persons has been turned over largely to this office by the county commissioners, in consequence of the adoption of legislation at the last session of the state legislature reducing the standing of the county in the scale of classification and providing only for quarterly meetings of the commissioners instead of monthly meetings as has been provided for.
A further burden upon this office resulted from carrying into execution of the public depository law, also adopted at the last session of the state legislature which provides that most public units such as school districts and highway districts, must place securities for their bank deposits in the office of the county auditor as custodian.

Shows Increasing Business.
In connection with submission of 1922 report for the past year, figures were given at the office to illustrate the increasing volume of business handled. These figures showed under the administration of Mr. Siggins, dating from January, 1919, receipts during the year 1919 amounting to \$15,785.85. Expenses amounted to \$14,231.05. Remittances to the state for 233 actions filed in district court totalled \$714, and there was turned into the county's current expense fund a surplus in the sum of \$108.81.

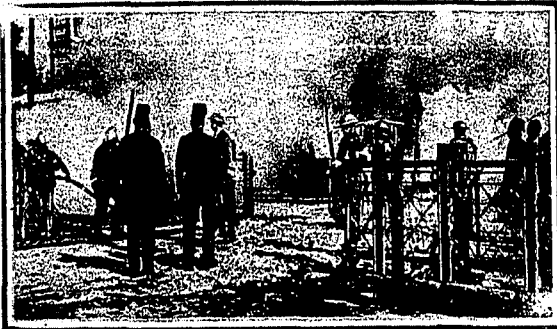

"A few years ago we were trying to persuade our women to wear them shorter," said Commissioner Peart in commenting upon the order. "The skirt that trails in the dirt gathering germs is a menace to its wearer's health; but the skirt that flaps around the knees is pretty much of a menace to the modesty of the woman who wears it. The skirt is about the only thing which doesn't appear to be coming down these days and a back to normalcy drive on the too-short dress will do a lot to protect the morals of the rising generation."

Commissioner Peart stated that the order would affect every Salvation Army member in 17 countries and colonies where the organization operates with the possible exception of China and Japan where most of the women wear trousers.

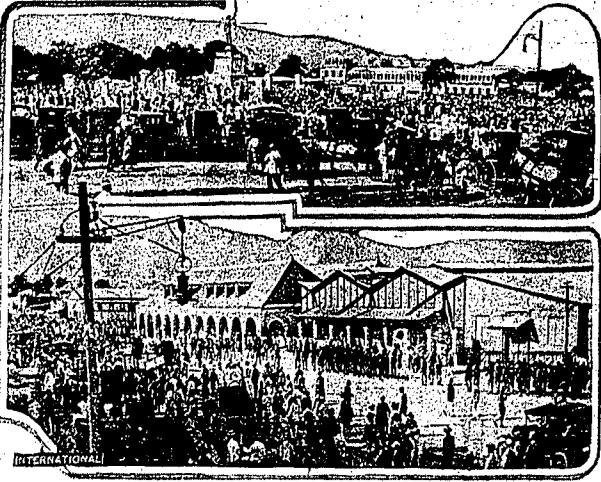

CHARACTER NOT EASILY READ

Ideas to the contrary, Long Field, Havre, Bismarck, and Minneapolis, Minn., are the products of the Paintmaking Studios.

Even one of the most plausible statements, namely, that a high forehead is a sign of intelligence, has been definitely disproved by the painstaking studies of Carl Pearson. He demonstrated experimentally that the color of the hair, or its straightness or curliness, shows one's intelligence better than does a high forehead, although these are not offered either as good indices. In other words, there has been found no definite relationship between any single peculiarity of the shape of the head and any trait of character. Henry Foster Adams writes in "Scientific Monthly":

For many years an Italian criminologist, Lombroso, made a study of criminal structural peculiarities and their relationship to crime. He found well-marked tendencies for criminals to possess certain stigmata or signs, but unfortunately the signs of the criminal were found to be widely prevalent among those whose names had never been upon police blotters. It was his pet scheme to have all individuals who were marked by a peculiar sign watched by his detectives, thus preventing crime instead of merely punishing it after it had been committed. It was entirely impracticable, for the characteristic sign of a murderer was found in altogether too many tender-hearted individuals to make the scheme at all feasible.

All systems of similar nature, in which relationship has been sought between traits of character and peculiarity of the structure, have met about the same fate.

EXPLAINS SUGAR COMPANY MOTIVE

District Manager Disclaims Charity as Purpose of Seed Cost Refund

Disclaiming charity as the motive for refunding to growers in some instances for the purchases for seed and arguing that sugar beet production is entitled to consideration on its economic merits, James Bellamy, district manager for the Associated Sugar Company, today issued the following statement, with a view, he said, of clearing up misunderstanding regarding the situation:

Land Owners Present Claims

"On account of the very unusual season which existed last year in the beet crop, particularly from Twin Falls west creating a hardship on a great many farmers who were expecting to make their living expenses out of their beet crop, I took the matter up with our company and persuaded them to let me stand part of the loss with the grower. This was not an easy matter to do since our company paid out millions of dollars last year for beet seeds that got out of them, and since they are in line for another such year unless sugar advances materially. Nevertheless, my point of view was adopted and checks were sent out accordingly. Immediately I am berated by land owners who are not 'and to beet growers, claiming that they should get all or part of the money to apply on rent and the principle was to seed in that no more beets will be grown on my land. In most cases we do not know what kind of a deal the tenants and landlords have. If the money is to be used for this refund, that is a matter for them to settle between themselves. We are making the refund to the man that grew the beet. It helps him out so he will be able to grow another crop and we do not admit there is some selfishness about it on our part."

"In 1920-21 we had an average tonnage of 12 tons per acre for the Twin Falls factory, running from six to 22 tons per acre. We paid \$12 per ton for these beets and all growers, or practically all, made more money than at anything else. The present year has hit some growers, but that is no reason why the crop should be condemned."

Better Season Ahead.

"I feel that next year is going to be just as good as the past has been disappointing. I also feel that it would be better if each farmer prepared a certain piece of his land each year and grow a certain amount of sugar beets regardless of price, study the crop and grow the best he can get possible. I think he should get away from the idea that he is growing the beets to accommodate the sugar company, or myself, but that is in growing them because he expects to make money out of the operation, and because the sugar beet industry is one of the industries which helps up the land physically and increases the value."

"If the farmers of the Twin Falls tract would go at it wholeheartedly and take advantage of the feeding of the pigs and molasses, by sowing a car or two of sheep or cattle, or a bunch of milk cows, thus using up their own hay and getting the fertilizer back on the land or any other rent the industry would flourish, but just as long as farmers and land owners keep the idea that they are accommodating the sugar company, they will never succeed. It depends on the success the farmer has, and while I am willing to give every farmer the best that I have, at the same time I do not wish any farmer to plant an acre of beets or any land to rent an acre of land for beets unless he feels that it is to his advantage so to do."

Forget Sugar Company.

"At the present time I know of some thirty farmers who are renting land and shipping their outfits into this territory to grow beets with a view to

buying land after the first year, bringing in several hundred thousand dollars with them and I feel that it will be only a few years until sugar beet growing will be one of the principal crops of this tract. Whether that is accomplished by me or someone else, I have done my best to help make a success of the beet crop and feel that in the next two years I have gotten some results. What I want is to get each farmer on the tract this coming year, to commence now to select a suitable piece of land for sugar beets, prepare the soil as it should be prepared, plant early and give the crop the necessary attention, then if he is not satisfied with the results, give it up for a bad job. If, if farmers will, the sugar company exists until he has his crop ready to harvest; but realize that he is growing that crop himself to make as good a crop as he possibly can. My attention now to the price of beets, because I assure you the company will pay all it is possible for them to pay and live. If farmers will, they can grow a certain portion of their farms in sugar beets and go ahead on this assumption, I am sure all will be sugar beet growers in the near future."

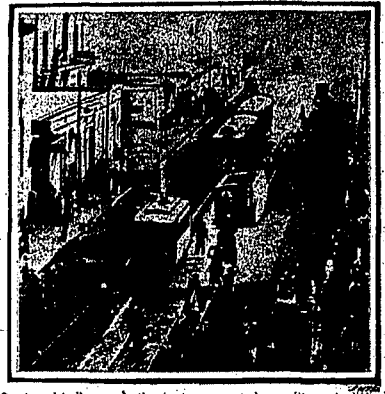

STEADY IMPROVEMENT IS NOTED BUT PERMANENT RECOVERY IS MATTER OF NEXT CROP RETURNS

Monthly Report of Federal Reserve Bank of Twelfth District, of San Francisco, Shows Much to be Thankful For in Analysis of General Financial Situation Throughout Western States

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—States of the Twelfth Federal Reserve District, being so largely dependent for prosperity upon the agricultural and livestock industries, must await the results of the 1922 crops before they will recover permanently and substantially from the severe readjustment of the past year, John Perrin, San Francisco, federal reserve agent, declared in his monthly report issued here today.

"There is already apparent, however," the report said, "pronounced improvement in the credit situation when compared with the beginning of 1921 as indicated both by the strong position of the banks generally throughout the district and by the availability and cost of bank credit for agriculture, industry and commerce."

"Total borrowings of member banks from the Federal Reserve Bank at the beginning of 1922 were \$17,211,000, or more than twice the \$7,121,000 borrowed at the beginning of 1921."

All Loans Reduced.

"Improvement on the condition of the 67 reporting member banks is reflected in the reduction during the year in the ratio of their total loans and discounts to total deposits from 81.2 per cent at the beginning of 1921 and 78 per cent at the beginning of 1922."

"Favorable interest rates charged by the reporting member banks were reported to be easing slowly late in 1921 and it would appear that conservative enterprises in general will not be hampered in its conduct in 1922 either by lack of available bank credit or by its cost."

"Customary yearly returns to the United States department of agriculture show that the December 1 farm value of the 15 principal crops of the district was \$318,000,000 compared with \$270,000,000 in 1920, a decline of 3 per cent."

Show Decreased Prices.

"These figures reflect the substantial decreases which have occurred in the prices of farm products."

"As a measure of the purchasing power of the rural communities, however, they should be qualified by allowance for reductions which have occurred during the same period in the price of living, which were 20.4 per cent between July, 1920, and December, 1921, and particularly in the farmer's cost of production. In the latter figures of farm labor are one of the predominant elements and these are reported by the department of agriculture to have been \$15.50 per principal

clearing December of \$1,837,958-000 was only 4.1 per cent less than the clearings of December, 1920. This is the smallest percentage of decrease for any month of 1921, when compared with the corresponding month of 1920, and a considerably smaller percentage of decrease than occurred in wholesale and retail prices during the period. It would appear that the physical volume of business is now greater than it was a year ago.

"Notwithstanding exceptions in Seattle and Spokane, business details generally throughout the district do not show the decline which might have been anticipated, but, instead, an increase of 4.9 per cent in amount during the year ending December 15."

"December sales of 28 reporting retail stores were 3.4 per cent less in dollar value than they were in December, 1920. Sales in San Francisco and Los Angeles were larger in dollar value than in December, 1920. It is apparent that the physical volume of business was appreciably larger in physical volume than it was last year."

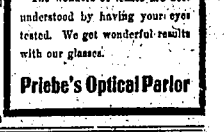
