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# CO-OPERATION SPELLS PROFIT FOR THE CROP

California Plan in Use by Tobacco Growers Results in Prosperity as Against Former Hit or Miss Methods

LEXINGTON, Ky., (AP) — From the days when buyers went from barn to barn and bought tobacco, to the highly organized Burley Tobacco Cooperative Marketing association, which this year is advancing as much money to growers as in any year, the plan has been paid for the entire crop last season, is the progress made in marketing Kentucky's annual Burley tobacco crop of 17,500,000 pounds.

The farmer's fight for good prices for his product has been one of ups and downs. The 1920 crop brought him the highest price in years, but was paid for tobacco, but the 1921 crop, that rose upward of 15 cents a pound to grow, was sold at a loss, the season's average being 14 1/2 cents.

With a view to averting a repetition of this, Judge Robert W. Bingham, Louisville newspaper owner, became interested in the cooperative marketing plan, and in company with several growers, visited Barney Baruch in New York and laid before him a plan for financing the crop.

## FOLLOW EXAMPLES OF CALIFORNIA

On March 23 a meeting of tobacco growers from Wisconsin, Virginia, Virginia, Kentucky, Ohio, West Virginia, North and South Carolina and Georgia was held here, at which Aaron Baruch presented the plan under which California fruit and grain growers and other producers are organized. From this meeting the movement to organize the Burley tobacco growers was launched, and after several months 85 per cent of the crop was pledged and the Burley Tobacco Co-operative Marketing association incorporated in North Carolina.

When the Kentucky general assembly met the first of the year, the Bingham co-operative marketing bill was passed in record time and the association then incorporated in Kentucky. In the meantime, however, the association had secured 117 tobacco warehouses in Ohio, Indiana, West Virginia and Kentucky for its exclusive use. The War Finance corporation and banks in the interstate districts pledged at least \$6,000,000 to the association.

On January 26 the warehouses here were opened for the receipt of pledged tobacco and it was graded upon delivery by the growers and a check for an estimated value of 40 per cent of the worth of the crop advanced to the growers. Four days later the houses throughout the buyers' district were opened and tobacco began to pour in.

## FIVE-YEAR PLAN IS ESSENTIAL

This plan will be in operation for at least five years, the farmers having signed up for this period of time.

After several years the Equity disbanded. The Burley, however, continued to operate. It is said that never more than 50 per cent of the crop was pledged to it in any year.

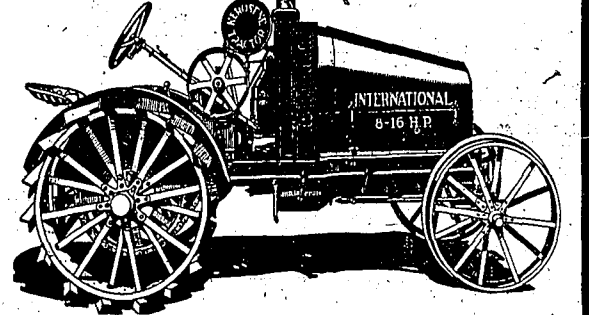
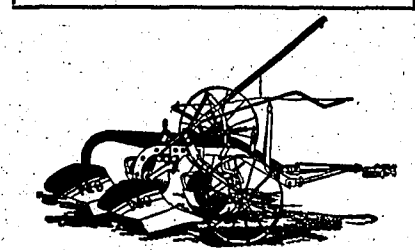

NEXT FEW DAYS ANXIOUS ONES ALONG BORDER

Temporary Cessation of Hostilities Marks Past Twenty-Four Hours but Period Ahead Full of Menace

LONDON, (AP) — Twenty-four hours of calm on the Ulster frontier were forecast by the north and south are facing each other, have brought some relief to the tension of the Irish situation. The statement by Lord High Chancellor Birkenhead yesterday, however, that "in the next few weeks we are going through the most grave and critical period probably in living memory," is generally regarded as in no particular overstatement.

Further hope for lessening the tension is based on the fact that the British government has indicated to Premier Craig and Mr. Collins the appointment of British officers on each side of the line to keep in constant touch and calm local irritation.

BRYAN WILLING TO SERVE AGAIN

Commoner Issues Statement That if Florida Wants Him He Won't Refuse

MIAMI Fla. (AP) — William Jennings Bryan, responding to many inquiries as to whether he would be a candidate for the democratic nomination for United States senator from Florida, today issued a statement in which he said: "I have been actively engaged in politics for more than 30 years. With the exception of less than seven years my work has been done as a private citizen, and I prefer to continue to serve the public without the constraints of office. If the democrats of Florida felt that as a senator I could render a service to the state and to the party in the nation sufficient to justify them in calling upon me to represent them at Washington, I would consider the matter from the standpoint of duty. In connection with the democratic nomination here with Florida democrats who have been my collaborators for a quarter of a century—I am sure that our relations will be pleasant so long as no plans are not in conflict with the ambitions of others or with their personal preferences."

WORLD COURT IS IN SESSION FOR THE FIRST TIME

Peace Palace at the Hague Is Scene of Initial Gathering of Institution Called Cornerstone of League of Nations.

THE HAGUE, (AP) — The peace palace which Greek cynics during the war labelled "closed owing to bankruptcy" was the scene today of the inaugural session of the permanent court of international justice, the cornerstone of the league of nations. The event was hailed by adherents of pacifist ideals as a new milestone in the evolutionary progress of the world toward peace, or in the words of Lord Curzon, "the beginning of a new era of peace and concord among nations." At the opening session the judges were to take the oath to fulfill their duties faithfully, impartially and conscientiously. In the future sittings they are expected not only to clear up such doubtful points of international law as may come before them but also to create laws wherever their need is apparent. The first meeting was held in the great hall of justice. Members of the court represent 12 nationalities. The judges in accordance with the law created by the court, possess the "qualifications required in their respective countries for appointment to the highest judicial offices" or are "jurisconsults of recognized competence in international law."

PROMINENT MEN. ARE PRESENT.

The representative of the United States is John B. Moore and the others present in the Hague for the meeting are: The president or chief justice, Hermand Cornelius Johannes Lodes, Holland; Dr. Rudolf Altmann, Austria; Stanislas Dabrowski, Poland; Anselotti, Italy; Viscount Robert Finlay, Great Britain; Dr. Max Huber, Switzerland; Dörm Nyholm, Denmark; Dr. Yuzuru Uchi, Japan; and Dr. Andre Weiss, France. The other two judges, Dr. Ruy Barbosa of Brazil and Dr. Agostino R. Bustamante of Chile, were unable to come to the Hague. Three of the deputy judges are here: P. W. N. Beichmann of Norway, Secretary of Legation of Romania and Michael G. Vostokovitch of Japan. Dr. Wang Chong-hui of China being absent. The judges and deputy judges have at their disposal two panels of technical assessors to advise them on points arising in labor and transit questions. There are no Americans on either panel.

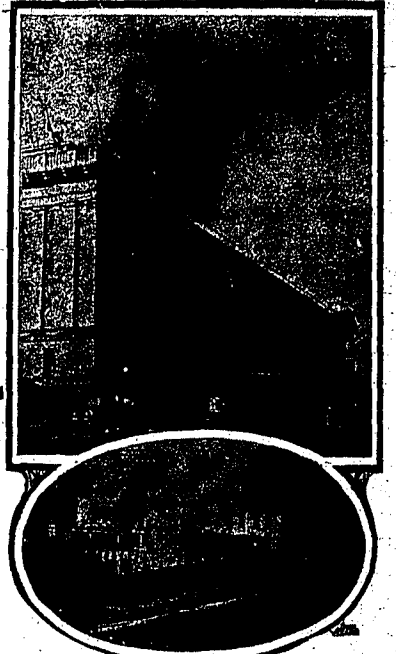
