## TAX ON SALES MAY BE MEANS DECIDED UPON

Possibility that Retailers of the Country Will Be Called Upon to Supply Cash for Soldiers' Bonus Looms Daily Larger

WASHINGTON, (AP)—President Harding informed congress today he contemplates a general sales tax the only feasible method of raising funds for a soldiers' bonus.

The president's letter was regarded generally at the capitol as leaving the bonus question open for consideration, but before Senate and house subcommittees were to meet late in the day to receive and consider the White House communication.

When the war sales tax was discussed in the sub-committee last week, it was understood that senators were informed that less than one per cent of the tax would be collected in the house could be mustered for a sales tax as a method of financing the adjusted compensation.

The text of the president's letter, which was addressed to Chairman Clegg of the house ways and means committee, follows in part:

"In accordance with the promise made to yourself and your associates on the senate and house committees, I have directed the secretary of the treasury to prepare a bill for a general sales tax of one per cent on the value of all goods sold in the United States.

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## Troops Are Mobilized To Protect the Border

Reports of Rebel Activity South of Juarez Contribute to Situation Described as Tense—Five Thousand Soldiers are Held in Readiness at Fort Bliss

EL PASO, Texas, (AP)—Tension is tense in Juarez today and at Fort Bliss, where reports have caused emergency steps to be taken to see ready for a threatened rebel attack on Juarez. Five thousand American troops have been mobilized at Fort Bliss "to protect the border."

While the Juarez garrison, under command of General J. T. Mendez, is especially alert, having been cautioned by the commander, the general himself declared today he has little confidence in Juarez, coming primarily from the rebel factions and other members of the rebel junta in El Paso that Juarez is the first object of rebel leaders.

General Mendez flatly denied reports that he had been approached by representatives of rebel factions regarding the revolution, and that he had been asked to surrender his command to that faction.

He said, however, that he had heard that the rebels were attempting to concentrate near south of Juarez, but that he discredited the report.

Army officers at Fort Bliss admitted that they had heard that General Mendez was invited to join the revolution, and that the report was partly responsible for troops being mobilized at the fort and elsewhere in El Paso.

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## HEAVY APPROPRIATION IS ASKED FOR OREGON

One and Three-Quarter Millions Requested to Widen Channel to Mouth of Columbia

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP)—An appropriation of \$1,750,000 for increasing the width of the ship channel from Portland, Ore., to the mouth of the Columbia river, was urged today at a hearing before the ways and means committee by Representative George H. Kelly, a member of the Port of Portland commission. It is proposed to increase the width of the channel from 300 to 500 feet.

Representative Kelly said that the improvement is undertaken. The channel, 110 miles long, is used by ocean vessels in reaching Portland.

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## WILL LOOK OVER ALL EVIDENCE IN TAYLOR MURDER

Apparent Tangle in Financial Affairs of Late Movie Director May Lead to Clue, Officials Believe

LOS ANGELES, Cal. (AP)—The search for the person or persons responsible for the murder here two weeks ago of William Desmond Taylor, motion picture director, continued today but those in charge admitted that they had exhausted almost every possible source of information and were trying by a minute recheck of the threads already entangled to find out something of value toward the solution.

The angle involving Taylor's personal affairs today had to do with the belief that Taylor left a considerable amount of money to his wife, and that she had some bearing on the solution.

Investigators according to Charles A. Jones, investigator for the district attorney, said that they had been looking over Taylor's personal papers and belongings, and then conferring with Miss M. J. Perry, an income tax expert, to see if there was anything in the "1917 income tax" report which had not been located.

Further investigation into the matter was being done by Mr. J. H. L. Woolwine, district attorney, at the suggestion of his office, but would be suspended at that time by his agents. It was believed the publicity attending their visit to his office might prove valuable.

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# COARSER FOOD IS GREAT NEED IN PRESENT AGE

### Kansas Woman, Aged 98 Years, with Descendants Numbering 274, Gives Her Ideas on How to Live a Long Life

BAEETHA, Kan., Feb. 15.—Mrs. Bertha Perkins, who will be 98 years old next April, found a real thrill recently when three additional great-grandchildren arrived in three Baeetha homes, within a period of 48 hours. They brought the number of her descendants up to 274.

Mrs. Perkins' two generations of descendants are divided as follows: 10 children, eight of whom are living; 76 grand-children; 156 great-grandchildren; 56 great-great-grandchildren; 9 great-great-great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Perkins was born in Virginia on April 25, 1824; married David Perkins in Ohio, March 16, 1843. Her maiden name was Bertha Marcum. In 1848 they emigrated to Iowa and in 1857 took a homestead in this—Nebraska territory—where she has lived ever since. Mrs. Perkins died in 1882.

### OLD FASHIONED COOKING IS THE BEST

"Good and old fashioned cooking," is the recipe Mrs. Perkins gives for her longevity. "It is no wonder people do live to old age like they used to, considering the rich foods they put in their stomachs nowadays. People do not eat bread—coarse food. Corn bread once or twice a week would improve their health. I never eat any of her ideas as she expressed them: 'I believe women should aid their husbands in voting right, do not believe women should go into politics or vote.'"

"Cooking courses in schools and colleges run too much to fudge and fancy. I believe, I believe, that the best place for a girl to learn housekeeping and cooking is from her mother—just I am in doubt whether some of these things the mothers know much about such things."

"Work is the best tonic. Why, I do something every day. In the summer time I take care of my vegetable garden. Last summer I raised a few vegetables I had them to use around among the neighbors."

# WILL MODEL GOVERNMENT ON FORMER SUGGESTIONS

### General Wood Prepares Plans for Furtherance of Interests of Philippines

MANILA, P. I., (AP) Governor Wood has announced his intention to follow in the near future the policy outlined in the report of the Wood-Forbes mission, as the basis of his administration of the Philippine government. The chief executive, through circular letters to all department secretaries, states that while excellent principles and policies have been followed in the past, there are at the same time evils that have grown up, which need to be remedied. In this connection, Governor Wood states he intends to inaugurate a government program that will make possible the realization, for the next four years at least, of the policy which the Wood-Forbes mission's report advocated, and the secretaries of departments and all their subordinates are urged to co-operate in making the necessary changes and adjustments.

Each secretary of department is instructed to submit to the governor general a program of activities of his department in line with the suggestions and recommendations contained in the report of the mission and to this end, the chief executive has issued to the secretaries memoranda prepared by members of the mission which suggest some of the subjects which should be considered and a definite method of dealing with the problem.

### Motorcycle Spray

A farmer's motorcycle came in useful this summer. He had 600 acres planted to potatoes, and these were threatened with destruction by the potato bug. With his horse-drawn sprayer he could only cover about 25 acres a day, and in the hot weather which prevailed this would have spelled ruin to his crop. But the rancher was a resourceful soul, and he attached an insecticide-spraying outfit to the side-chassis of his motorcycle, utilizing the power of the machine for traction and for spraying. With this outfit he found it possible to spray 100 acres per day with paris green and so save the situation.

# SECOND ONLY TO UNITED STATES

### Number of Telephones in Use in Canada Per 100 of Population is High

OTTAWA, Ont., (AP)—Canada ranks second among the nations of the world in use of telephones per hundred of population, according to the statistical bureau of the Canadian government. The United States has 18.6 telephones per hundred of population and Canada has 16.8, according to these records. "In 1921 there were 856,256 telephones in use in Canada, an increase of 10 per cent over 1920. The wire telephone usage was 2,105,011 and the average persons per mile were 4.2," says the bureau report. "Naturally the most telephones in the dominion are in the large cities. Such cities as Montreal, Quebec, Toronto, Ottawa, Winnipeg, Calgary, Edmonton, Vancouver and Victoria have a good telephone service as any cities in the United States. But in the last two or three years there has been a very large increase in the number of telephones in the rural districts of the prairie provinces."

### War Mascot Dead

The hero in question was named Diamond, and was a cat that attached himself to the French in the lines before Amiens. Every day Diamond might be seen threading his way through the entanglements of the German front trench. M. Milhaud, leader of Polytonic School, Says He May See the Time Gypsy Jazz Becomes.

Charles Henry Melizer, well known music critic who has recently returned from a study of the modern European composer, writes in the Polytonic of Paris, "I describe an interview with the much talked of Paris musician, M. Milhaud, as follows: 'Some day,' M. Milhaud said, 'I may compose a jazz sonata. The jazz form has been called an inspiration. One says at times has excellent music in the halls and much had music is performed in concert rooms. I have told you of my love of melody. By this I mean that in my compositions I try to give equal importance to all the instruments I employ. 'My orchestra, of course, varies according to the weather of the work I write, and I have tried my hand at a good many styles. One form which I am fond of is the chamber symphony, with large orchestra and just now I am turning out four examples of a few solo instruments. I have published various piano compositions, among them a set of six which I grouped under the name of 'Le Temps.' I have made pieces for ballet with large orchestra and just now I am halfway through a tragic lyric drama, named 'Les Flamandes.'"

### X-Ray Cancer Treatment

Remarkably successful results in the treatment of cancer are expected at the Lenth hospital, Whitechapel, by the "Dimpl Method" of applying X-rays. At least five cases must elapse without recurrence of cancerous growths before it can be conclusively said that the disease is cured. But one of the cases described to me recently at the hospital is almost miraculous. A doctor, in whom several surgeons diagnosed cancer, and regarded the case as hopeless, submitted himself for treatment with X-rays. Death had seemed certain within a few weeks, but he is now back in active practice."

HONOLULU, T. H., (AP)—Extensive drillings into the great active volcano of Kilauea on the island of Hawaii, will be undertaken during 1922 in an endeavor to determine the heat of the volcano, the quantity of steam underneath, the mineral constituents and the solution of other related questions.

Professor T. A. Jaggar, Jr., government volcanologist at Hawaii, announced here today.

A fund of \$8000 has been raised to defray the expense of the experiment, \$3000 having been contributed by John Brooks Henderson, scientist of Washington, D. C., and the remainder by Hilo and Honolulu business men.

SHOULD EAT MORE CABBAGE

Diet Experts of Cornell's College of Agriculture Recommend it as Article of Agriculture.

Experts at Cornell's college of agriculture at Ithaca, N. Y., urge a wider use of cabbage, asserting that this succulent vegetable should be more generally included in the diet. It is rich in iron and other mineral salts and contains a small amount of growth-promoting substance.

"Cabbage," says a statement from the college of agriculture "plunged in to boiling salted water, and cooked uncovered for 20 minutes, no longer, will be a delicate light green color, tender and easily digested. Long cooking in a tightly-covered kettle, produces a dark, brownish mass in which chemical changes have taken place that make it almost indigestible."

"Food specialists at Cornell suggest broiled cabbage served with lamb, mutton or beef, sautéed cabbage with cheese sauce, fried cabbage with minced onion, cabbage cooked in milk and water, or baked with hamberg or frankfurters, lady cabbage, sautéed, or four cabbage, or filled cabbage. Recipes for these dishes are found in most cook books."

"For salads, cabbage gives an almost endless variety; with apple and onion, or with onion, celery or carrot, with green peppers, tomatoes, carrots, salmon, shrimp or even pineapple shredded cabbage makes an excellent combination. In general, cabbage salads are best served with a 'holland dressing'."

Please Travel on Flies

A new "flea's flea" with an extraordinary life history was described for the first time at a recent meeting of the Royal Microscopical society in London. The discoverer, F. Martin Duncan, F. R. M. S., explained that it started life in the underground nest of the humble bee. These nests are raised by moles, and during the summer the little insect attacks them, being by means of suckers to the mole's parasite, the "great mole flea." These tiny pin points of life are ob-scure cousins to the scorpion, and it is believed that they travel on the mole flea until they come across a certain underground fungus, where they feed and mature.—Brooklyn Eagle.

Nitrate From Explosives

A plant has been established near Turin, Italy, for the transformation of explosives into nitrate for agricultural use. These nitrates are to be gathered from the hedges to the value of 1,000,000 lire, and their products combined with other materials for the production of fertilizers. The factory now employs 220 men and is expected to produce 30,000 quintals of fertilizers, containing 10 per cent nitrate, within a short time, according to a report of Coastal News C. Sreka.

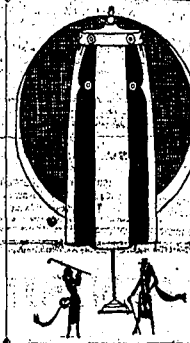

DOWN THE HILL AND UP: It was hides and wool which led the plunge of commodity prices in the early days of the financial debacle of 1920.

These two staples of the livestock industry wrought havoc with farming and stockraising. The stockman, caught in the meshes of the slump, was unable to protect himself; hay and other food-stuffs followed in the wake of hides and wool, and the farm industry awakened to full realization that it had a hard-won collapse.

With the collapse of farm product prices there came a rigidity of credits and business paralysis.

Now hides and wool are leading in a steady advance, which is carrying with it all the important farm products. Foreign demands have happily arrested a market here in tone and raising the movement. Wheat and other grains are advancing persistently, following in the wake of the advances of hides and wool even as they followed these two commodities in their downward course in 1920.

We are on the upgrade. Business conditions are better. And hides and wool are leading the march up the hill even as they led in the disordered slump two years ago.

'GETTING' BERGDOLL: Members of the House of Representatives who saw service in France, have not yet given up the idea of getting Bergdoll, the army dodger, back from Germany or wherever he is hiding. One of the qualities developed by military training is stick-to-itiveness, and these ex-soldier legislators are to be admired for their perseverance in a righteous cause. 'Get Bergdoll' may seem rather a large order, in view of his technical legal status as a political prisoner whose offense is not extraditable under existing treaties, but it is said that Representative Fitzgerald of Ohio has a plan that may work, and if so, more power to him. Nothing would give more satisfaction to the country than to have Bergdoll back serving his sentence for his disloyal conduct. It is strange that even at this late day the mystery surrounding this scandal of the last administration has never been entirely cleared up. The report of the special congressional committee of investigation is matter of official record, but it is only a half-told tale. There were two reports, indeed, the majority and minority, differing only in the amount of blame apportioned to former Brig. Gen. Samuel T. Amel who was one of Bergdoll's counsel. It will always remain a reflection upon Secretary Baker's administration of the War Department that the complete history of this case was not cleared up and made public, without fear or favor, at a time when it was possible to get at the facts. As a result of this failure the impression has remained in the public mind that someone in high position was being protected. The forced return of Bergdoll would not clear up the mystery, but it would be a satisfaction to have him receive the punishment he so richly deserves.

There seems to be a disposition to remind our debtor nations that this country was established that they might come here and settle. FREE LUNCHEONS IN SCHOOL MAKE HAPPIER AND HEALTHIER CHILDREN

Practice Begun in Europe Over One Hundred Years Ago Finds Highest Expression as Applied to Educational System of Twin Falls—Cold Winter Days Pleasurably Added To by Operation of Plans in Interests of Boys and Girls of Entire District

(Continued.) THE child of today is acknowledged the most important factor in the country of the future and the one thing in which the whole world has a common interest. That physical health is necessary for full mental and moral development is generally accepted by thinking people, and the proper enlightenment of the foundations of health, is no longer a theory.

This child has a right to expect the country of the future to shelter the child who is disappointed, it matters not whether it be the fault of the parent through indifference, poor management or financial conditions, the result of the same is him. Since his stomach is a small engine that runs the body, surely great care should be taken to keep this engine in good running order. To keep food at the right time and of the right kind. One can scarcely imagine anything more pathetic than drawing on the vitality and nervous system of a child who is hungry, whether he be taxed physically or mentally.

SCHOOL LUNCHEONS ORIGINATED IN EUROPE

The idea of providing warm meals for children at school is not new. In 1790 soup kitchens were established in Europe, and groups of school children were sent each day at noon, although before, it was not until 1882 that a fund was set aside for maintaining school restaurants which were supervised by a child who was chosen by Victor Hugo started the work in England by providing warm lunches in his own home at Gournay for the children in a nearby school. The English movement spread until it has national recognition in most of the countries of Europe, and it is surprising to know that our own country has been the last to recognize the importance of a movement that has been a success in Europe for half a century. But when realization finally came, it spread rapidly.

Twenty years ago hot lunches played an important part in the school system of many of our cities, but today it extends over the whole country. In cities where the welfare of our American schools, and American boys and girls at heart do not ask, "Should we have school lunches?" the answer is "Yes, if we can do it." And that is the question that Twin Falls has been asking for several years.

PLANS WORKED OUT WITHOUT FUNDS

Since the organization of the parent teachers' association the question has come up frequently but the time never seemed ripe until a few weeks ago. It was a good proposition to work out with no funds, no plans and no experienced workers, and it was left to the present chairman of the parent teachers' association to do the organization what it had done to warrant its existence and what it was going to do. This was the time for the question of school lunches, to come in to its own.

To the Lincoln school is due the credit of taking the initiative in this work. It meant time and sacrifice on the part of the women who started the work, the district to follow, the Blackie and the Washington last.

People in general who are comfortable, whose children have a good breakfast, leave a warm home and walk a few blocks to school, forget that about 25 per cent of our pupils come from homes a distance of six or six and a half miles.

Many have to leave home long before daylight, walk a half mile or more to reach the wagon and then the long cold ride over rough roads after trying with the cold when reaching school, if they have had little breakfast or improper food they are certainly not in their best physical or mental condition.

If some of the people who honestly question the worth-whileness of the school lunches could get out with these children in the morning, walk over frozen roads before daylight, eat a roll lunch at noon with cold water to drink, not one dry but work after work and month after month, the effort which is being made by the few would have better support.

SOME CHILDREN ACTUALLY HUNGRY

MOST of the country children come from homes where they are properly nourished and clothed, but a few under present financial conditions are actually hungry, but it matters not if a child come from the best or the poor, and the proper enlightenment of the child to help him through the hardships which he endures to reach his school. The enthusiasm and optimism carried by the child over rough roads and he keeps cheerfully on in the race when most of his older ones would give up. About 20 per cent of the children in our schools are under-nourished. Physical defects are the cause in some cases, but it is reasonable that proper food will put them in a better condition to have the defects corrected. Not all homes are in a position to give what is needed, not all parents are capable of caring for the child as it should be and it is our place to help them.

At the work at the Washington school, the last and the smallest, would seem an easy matter in view of the experience of the other two. But starting with no funds, no plans and no supplies, and preparing to serve one hundred and twenty-five people was not an easy matter, but it was accomplished in ten days.

The cooking and serving is done in a room that is not being used for school purposes at present. A woman is paid to prepare the food and to supervise the cooking and distribution of the dishes, which is important. The buying of supplies, paying bills, serving the meals and collecting tickets are all done by a committee of five volunteer workers. Each member of the committee serves one day of the week and arranges for her own help.

LUNCHEONS SUPPLIED BY VOLUNTEER PARTY

BREAD and butter or some lunch is supplied to the children by a committee of five, child, and he or she is given a cup of hot soup, mashed potato and cream and cold cocoa. If the child is unable to bring any lunch from home he or she is provided by the school with sufficient food for his meal. No distinction is made in any way between those paying for their meal and those receiving it free. In order to give any consciousness on the part of the less fortunate ones, a uniform ticket system has been adopted and is handled by the teachers and principal who have made a study of the children and their needs. The ones who pay for the tickets and those who have them free are all given the same ticket. In the three schools, 600 children are fed each day, about 80 of whom receive it free of charge. The committees are trying to make it self supporting with the help of the voluntary contributions which come in. Voluntary workers and visitors are always welcome, for each one who sees the work becomes an enthusiastic supporter and many have pronounced it the most worth while work to which the people of Twin Falls have ever set their hands.

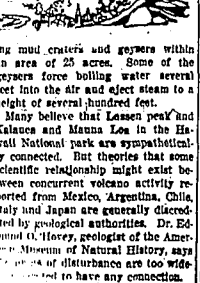

PEARL FISHING IN SCOTLAND

Low Water During the Season Just Ended Brought About Many Successful 'Catches.'

The pearl-fishing season, which has now drawn to a close, has for many of the Scotch fishers been an extremely successful one, says Violet Basham in the Edinburgh Spectator. Owing to the low volume of water in the rivers after the long drought, they have been enabled to see more easily the shells on the river bed, also to wade farther into the water. These fresh water pearls are contained not in oyster, but in pearl-nusel shells, which are to be found in several of the Scotch rivers and streams.

The methods of fishing vary slightly. The fisher with whose method we are most familiar wears an angler's hip boots and wades far into the water. He carries in his hand a piece of corrugated iron, shaped much the same as a jaw, the base of which is made of glass. This enables him to see the shells which lie at the bottom of the river. In his other hand he holds a "toop" consisting of two pieces of wood with iron liners.

On seeing a shell he lifts it with toop and puts it into his pocket. Then when he has a good number of shells he opens them on the river bank to discover if he has had any luck. It may be that he will find a pearl in the first one he opens, or he may open into the feature of the program "Molly O," the most human story that has found its way to the screen in many months.

RESERVOIR SITES ALONG OHIO

Government Geologic Survey Points Out Enormous Possibilities for Impounding Storage of Water.

A comparison of records of the flow of the Ohio river with those of the upper Mississippi and Missouri shows that although its drainage area is but one-third that of the combined Mississippi and Missouri it carries an average and low-water flow is 1.5 times as great as their combined flow, and its maximum flow is 1.5 times as great. This fact is accounted for by the greater rainfall in the Ohio basin and by the general character of the region.

In the Ohio basin there are apparently many opportunities for storage, especially in the southern tributaries. On topographic maps of the geological survey that cover part of the drainage area of the Ohio a large number of reservoir sites have been located, some of them of enormous capacity, and it is believed that careful surveys would show many sites suitable for dams that would impound large quantities of water in reservoirs.

The volume of water flowing in the Ohio may perhaps be better appreciated by noting that a discharge of 800,000 cubic feet per second would in one day cover 545,000 acres to a depth of one foot.

Lassen Peak Is Smoking and Steaming

RUBBING, CAL.—Eruptions are not liable to occur at Lassen Peak, the only active volcano in the United States proper, as long as the mountain continues to emit smoke and steam, as it is now doing, according to E. Dittmar, geologist in charge of the work on conditions in the Lassen Volcanic National park.

The action of the volcano, the geologist declared, is similar to that of a steam boiler. As long as steam can get there is not any danger of an explosion, but if the steam is confined and cannot escape, the pressure gradually increases until finally the boiler blows up. Just as the top of the mountain blows off, the gas and steam inside are confined.

There is a great deal of steam and gas coming from the cracks in the mountain, Dittmar reported. Before the big eruption of 1915 there was very little steam emitted. Several geysers have made their appearance since the eruption in what is known as the Devil's Kitchen in the north of the hotel spots in the park. At the Devil's Kitchen there are about 700 and 800 active hot springs.
