WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—The Capper-Volstead co-operative marketing bill which legalizes co-operative associations of farmers and producers in the Sherman anti-trust law, was signed today by President Harding.

The act limits the profits of co-operative associations to 8 per cent and stockholders to one vote each no matter how much stock they may hold in such organization. Its administration is under the secretary of agriculture.

ELIMINATION OF STRIKE, OBJECT

Representatives of Various Associations on Both Sides Reach Agreement

WASHINGTON, D. C., (AP)—An national agreement between the labor jurisdictional dispute said to have caused most of the strikes in the building industry in the past, was reached by the Associated General Contractors of America, the American Institute of Architects, the Engineering Council, the National Building Trades Employers' association and the Building Trades department of the American Federation of Labor through the national board of jurisdictional awards in its quarterly meeting just concluded here, it was announced today.

The agreement provides that local building trade councils shall suspend and refuse to recognize or support unions which fail to abide by the conditions of the board. It provides that general contractors and subcontractors shall incorporate in agreements with union labor a provision for compliance with all decisions of the board and shall advise employers and members of local unions which do not abide by its decisions. Architects and engineers also are bound under the agreement to include in all their specifications and contracts clauses providing that the board's decisions shall be followed.

The agreement was reached with the adoption of a report of a special committee of the national board of jurisdictional awards. The board at its recent meeting also settled a dispute between elevator construction and electrical workers by awarding the former jurisdiction over the hoisting, lowering and placing of elevator machinery. NORTH IRELAND IS STILL QUIET

Temporary Cessation of Hostilities Marks Progress of Boundary Struggle

LONDON, (AP)—Peace seems for the moment to have again descended over northern Ireland, the release of the remaining kidnapped unionists announced yesterday tending to ease the tension. Nevertheless, both sides still hold prisoners, and it is understood the south is determined not to release the special constables captured at Omagh with the Monaghan football players are freed by the Ulster authorities.

Yendency on Upward Trend—Opening and Closing Show Sustained Strength

CHICAGO, (AP)—Initial transactions in wheat showed advances of 5 1/2 to 1 1/2 c as compared with yesterday's close, when the board of trade opened today. May was quoted at \$1.38 1/2 to 1.39 and July \$1.31 1/4 to 1.31 3/4.

The buying was induced by strength at Liverpool but the market quickly reacted on a renewal of profit taking, the long run being inclined to carry high winnings over the week-end. Despite good support on the breaks no signs of a check developed until the reaction reached yesterday's finish.

The market developed strength later when Buenos Aires closed 50 higher and with the pit element short, the finish was argued 50 higher here than yesterday. Final prices were \$1.34 3/4 for May and \$1.23 5/8 to 1.23 3/4 for July. Corn, starting unchanged to 1/4 c lower with May 63 1/4 to 62 3/8 and July 64 to 64 1/4 c, showed strength on commission house buying. It was explained that country offerings had fallen on off because of bad weather and that exporters had to come to terminal markets to get grain.

There was plenty of support for corn in all breaks and the rally in wheat also helped the corns grain. Final prices were 62 1/2 to 62 5/8 for May, 64 1/2 to 64 3/8 for July and 60 1/2 for September.

Oats were steady at the start, but eased off in sympathy with wheat. Final prices were 1.06 lower to 1.06 1/2 higher with May 41 1/8 to 41 1/4 and July 42 1/2 to 42 3/8 c.

Provisions brought the highest prices of the season. Further advances in the live hog market was the determining factor.

BRITTON DEFEATS HIS MAN

Young Dave Shade Gets Draw Decision But News Writers Think He Was Beaten

NEW YORK, (AP)—Jack Britton, at 35, still is the master boxer and victor of that fact but today remains the world's welterweight boxing champion.

Last night in Madison Square Garden Britton met Young David Shade of San Francisco, a courageous, able lad in a 15-round match.

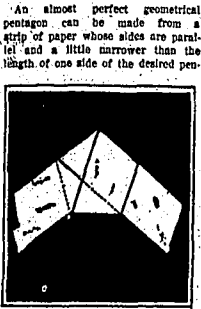

MAY BE BONES OF PRIESTESS

Skeleton Found Near Smoking Coter of Kilauea Believed to Be Last of Her Order.

The skeleton of a woman, believed that of the last of the priestesses of the Hawaiian fire goddess Pele, whose traditional home was in the Kilauea volcano on the island of Hawaii was found recently in a carefully prepared crypt not far from the smoking crater. The tomb was found in the western sector of the main wall of the great outer crater of Kilauea, where stood a great temple dedicated to Hialeka, the sister of the goddess Pele. Nothing now remains of this temple. The last occasion upon which it appeared in history was when it was destroyed by the Emperor Kamehameha in 1824, when the royal Hawaiian Christian journeyed to the volcano for the purpose of offering defense to Pele. The journey formed the motif of one of Alfred Lord Tennyson's poems. Local tradition says that the priestess was met at the crater rim by a baggery priestess—the last of her line—who came from her abode in the ruined temple near by and made one last attempt to avert the priestess and to appeal to her fear of the supernatural.

The tomb, believed to be that of this priestess, was discovered immediately below the site of the temple. The position of the bones indicated that she had been buried in a slumped position, with her back protruding against the wall, with her head placed so that her slightest eyes were in line with a small orifice immediately in front of her and in a direct line with the middle-staircase of the volcano.

Fear Extinction of Chamols. Extinction of Chamols in the mountains of Savoy in Italy and Switzerland, is threatened, just as the Buffalo disappeared from the western American prairies. The Chamols are now preparing to petition their government, demanding the protection of the Chamols. An investigation of the Grenoble district showed that the war was responsible for the now devastation of the Chamols. Before the war, mountaineers took out hunting licenses. In fact, comparatively few of them could bear the expense of buying a good rifle. After the armistice, however, thousands of veterans returning to the Savoy mountains, armed with rifles and great supplies of ammunition, which proved useful in combating the increasing cost of living. So general has hunting now become in the mountains that departmental officials say that all sheep and goats are to be protected for at least two years they will become extinct inside of 20 years.

Followed Leader to Death. Seventeen pedigree sheep, the property of a Methuen Priory, Norfolk, England, have followed their leader to death in a field where there was an old well which had been covered over, one of the sheep tried to make a leap of the leaves of a tree which hung over the well. It stepped on the covering, fell through it and fell into the well. With their curious passion for following each other, the remaining 16 sheep followed it, and all of them were killed.

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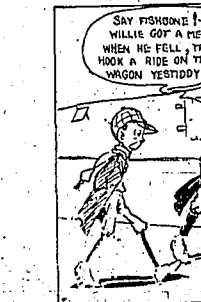
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
