

ELEPHANT HUNT IS FEATURED FOR PRINCE OF WALES

Solon of British Royal House Royally Entertained on Tour of India

MYSONG, India, (AP)—The wild elephant hunt witnessed here by the Prince of Wales was one of the most picturesque and exciting of the numerous events arranged for his entertainment while on his tour of India. He saw only the final stage of it but was the most excited part of the hunt.

Mounted on an elephant and accompanied by the Maharajah, the prince was an interested spectator whose 28 white inhabitants of the jungle were rounded up and driven into an enclosure to be fettered.

Capture Is Big Job.
The herd was captured by the kheddah system, the usual method followed in this part of the country. It involves relays of thousands of hunters, who force the herd selected for capture to follow a particular course, generally lying on the usual line of march until the elephants are driven into an enclosure about 400 yards in diameter. There, surrounded by a ten-foot trench, the animals can be kept indefinitely. Fires are lighted on the outside to prevent them from crossing the trench. Finally, the herd is driven into a small enclosure, only 40 feet wide where they are fettered.

Fierce Resistance.
The wild herd of 28 included bulls and cows and four calves. The leader was a heavy tucker who gave fierce resistance to capture. Two of the animals had been in captivity before and were still wearing parts of the shackles they wore when they escaped. These also gave considerable trouble. When the captives had been securely bound, they were led out and picketed in the forest.

MARRY SOCIAL EQUAL FOR TRUE HAPPINESS

Slavery Only Awaits Woman who Takes Spouse from Outside Clan

NEW-YORK, (AP)—Edith Rockefeller McCormick, daughter of John D. Rockefeller, tracing the progress of women's organizations here yesterday said that "if a woman marries outside her own clan or tribe she'll be a slave. History proves it."

The meeting at which Mrs. McCormick spoke was preliminary to the women's progress exposition to be held here June 7 to 10, of which Mrs. McCormick will be general chairman. The engagement of Mrs. McCormick's 16-year-old daughter, Mathilde, to Max Oser, Swiss riding academy professor, recently was announced.

"In olden times," Mrs. McCormick said, "if a man were bored with the women of his own tribe, he went and stole a wife from another clan." The stolen bride had a sorry time of it, according to Mrs. McCormick, who said the women of the men's tribe all hated the alien bride, who consequently had to depend for happiness entirely on her husband, to whom she was virtually a slave. From this condition, she said, there grew up, a kind of serfdom for women which meant women who married outside their own tribe.

"This period of serfdom was an era of down curves for women, she said, but it was sandwiched in between two up curves, the ancient and modern."

"Women are now victors. But they are much more than victors," Mrs. McCormick said, "for they have done much more than fight for their place, which has been won through sociological development and growth."

"All the modern woman wants is to be let alone, to develop, to demonstrate and to expand," she said. "Mother love is important, but it is not everything. Woman's universal love is a bigger thing," she said in conclusion.

RUSS WOMEN ADOPT DRASTIC SCHEME TO LEAVE NATIVE LAND

Willing to Pay and Be Temporarily Adopted by Passport Holding Foreigners

ODESSA, (AP)—Marriage-to-the-foreigner-only is one of the new forms of commerce in Russia. Women are willing to pay handsomely those foreigners who by virtue of their passports, may pass freely out of Russia and also enter Poland, Rumania, Germany or other countries and take with them women passing as their wives.

As Russian subjects neither men nor women may easily get permission to leave Russia, and if so, the other countries will not receive them. Subjects of Turkey and other Moslem countries engaged in this marriage, sometimes take out four wives at a time, the number allowed by their marriage laws.

POILIS WILL REPLACE DOUGBOYS ON RHINE

French Soldiers to Take Over and Occupy Both Sides of Coblenz

PARIS, (AP)—The American troops on the Rhine who have been ordered withdrawn will be replaced. In the Coblenz neighborhood by the French, who now occupy the sectors on both sides of Coblenz.

The only consequence of the withdrawal foreseen in official circles here is a possible interpretation by the Germans that it is in a way a sign of disapprobation of the Allied policies toward Germany.

WIEDFELDT GETS EMBASSY PLACE

German Statesman Appointed to Fill Bernstorff's Position in Washington

BERLIN, (AP)—Dr. Otto Ludwig Wiedfeldt has been appointed German ambassador to the United States. Dr. Wiedfeldt will fill the post which has been vacant since February, 1917, when Count Johann Heinrich von Bernstorff left Washington prior to the declaration of war between the United States and Germany. Since the resumption of normal relations between the two countries the question of naming a new ambassador has been one of the knottiest problems confronting the German government. In addition to diplomatic experience it was necessary that the incumbent be wealthy, as the exceedingly low value of the German mark will place him at a financial disadvantage in the American capital.

Forecast Was Correct.
Berlin dispatches to the Associated Press for the last few days have forecast the appointment of Dr. Wiedfeldt, who is 60 years of age, and one of the foremost German industrialists and economists. He is reported to have been released from his position at the

head of the directorate of the great Krupp works so that he might accept the post.

Dr. Wiedfeldt is reported to be one of the wealthiest Germans of the present day. He is an experienced diplomat, having for years occupied important positions in the German home office. He also spent about three years in the Far East as consulting expert to the Japanese government in connection with the organization of its railway system.



OPERATORS DENY "MERE MADNESS" CAUSES ACTION

Coal Men Declare Acts Result from Desire to "Cure Deep-Seated Disorder" in Working Coal Fields Properties

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Coal operators who face the prospect of a strike of their employees April 1, but who still refuse to enter a national conference with the coal miners' union are not controlled by "mere madness, but a determination to cure a deep-seated disorder..."

Federal court indictments which have charged operators of union mines with conspiring with the miners' union in endeavors to fix coal prices and damage non-union coal mines were held by Mr. Cushing as largely responsible for the unwillingness of the coal operators to confer.

CITIZEN PREFERENCE ORDER STIRS ALIENS

Push for First Papers Starts as Employers Favor Naturalized Workers

DETROIT, Mich. (AP)—Circuit Court judges here were called into conference today by Presiding Judge Ira W. Joyce to discuss the frantic efforts of aliens to obtain first citizenship papers following announcement by several industrial heads that American citizens, particularly former soldiers would be given preference in employment.

Courts See Seriousness. Circuit court judges indicated they regarded the situation as serious and Judge John Faust of the municipal court, who also is chairman of the American Legion employment committee, characterized it as a "disgraceful prostitution of American citizenship."

The rush of aliens for first papers began with the opening of the legion's employment campaign on behalf of ex-soldiers. Dr. Frank B. Hartz, state welfare officer of the legion, declared a number of alien lined up at the courthouse building at 4 o'clock Monday morning "in an effort to save their jobs."

Many Aliens Employed. It is estimated there are 30,000 alien factory employees in Detroit and that 20,000 former soldiers are out of work here.

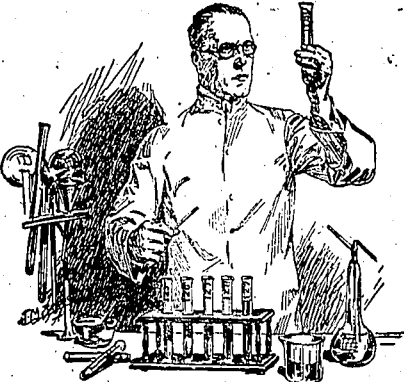

CHICAGO FACES MORALITY CHAOS

Crooked Lawyers Defend Criminals Who Laugh at Law, Chief Declares

CHICAGO, (AP)—Law enforcement is on the edge of chaos, Charles C. Fitzmorris, general superintendent of police, told more than 100 persons representing 54 civic and industrial organizations last night. Elisham Scanlan, chief justice of the criminal court; Robert E. Crowe, states attorney, and James A. Patten, board of trade member and civic leader, in addresses agreed with the police head.

On the brink
 "We are on the edge of chaos," Mr. Fitzmorris said. "The work of the police department is being undone as fast as we can do it."

"There is an organized band of criminals in Chicago, well entrenched, a mafia, which considers itself above and beyond the law, and which not only laughs in the face of justice but spits in the face of justice," Mr. Crowe said.

Judge Scanlan attacked crooked lawyers, whom he called greatly responsible for crime conditions, and scored business men for evading jury service.

Accuse Judges
 "There are judges on the criminal bench of Cook county (Chicago) who should be removed," Mr. Patten said. Ex-lier, Chief Fitzmorris had asserted: "There is an organization of criminals here; they have their judges and lawyers."

JAIL DELIVERY ATTEMPT IS FRUSTRATED BY AUTHORITIES

CHICAGO, (AP)—The second attempt in two days at a jail delivery was frustrated yesterday when armed guards under Warden Wesley H. Westbrook checked the uprising and forced seventy prisoners back to their cells. When the prisoners refused to return to their cells after the exercise hour, Mr. Westbrook stationed guards with riot guns at advantageous positions, stepped to the front and told the prisoners he would give them ten minutes in which to obey the command, or direct the guards to begin shooting. Watch in hand, he tolled off seven minutes and all the mutineers had disappeared.
