

HEAD OF CULT STORM CENTER IN STOCKHOLM

Mrs. Tingley, the Theosophist
Leader of California, Stirs
Swedish Press to Attack In-
fluence Obtained During Tour

STOCKHOLM, (AP) — No person in private or public life who has visited Sweden in late years has aroused such a journalistic furor as Mrs. Katherine Tingley, head of the Universal Brotherhood and Theosophical society of Point Loma, Cal., who has now been here for several weeks. She has been the target of attack in the Stockholm press and Swedish ministers have joined in protesting against her influence in Sweden.

No Effect.
Thus far the storm of criticism has had apparently no effect on the American woman unless it has induced her to prolong her visit. A few days ago she left the Grand Hotel, Stockholm's principal hotel and moved into an apartment in the fashionable Strandvagen, an avenue where many socially prominent resident of the capital have their homes.

The Swedish newspapers say Mrs. Tingley came to Sweden because of fear that her Swedish sect was about to fall to pieces. The newspaper Dagens Nafter, adds that two of Mrs. Tingley's high executives in Sweden have recently resigned their posts. One of these was Captain von Greyerz, head of the Stockholm branch of theosophists and the other was Torsten Karling, leader of the Gothenburg Theosophical sect.

Reorganizing.
Nya Dagligt Allehanda and other newspapers state that Dr. Erik Dogren of Henningsborg has been chosen head of the Universal Brotherhood and Theosophical Society of Sweden. E. A. Gyllenberg, treasurer, and Mrs. Anna Wlander, a well-known Stockholm society woman, head of the Stockholm circle. If Mrs. Tingley came here to reorganize her sect, she has apparently finished her task.

One reason for Mrs. Tingley's visit here was understood to be to erect a Raja Yoga school on the beautiful island of Vingbo in Lake Vattern, central Sweden. Before the war Swedish theosophists raised about \$25,000 for that purpose.

The land was owned 300 years ago by Count Per Brahe, one of Sweden's most famous nobles. Stockholm newspapers say that Mrs. Tingley has asserted that she is a reincarnation of the count and that on visiting the island some years ago she exclaimed dramatically: "Ah, my old home!" One effect of the newspaper campaign has been to pick the lecture halls where Mrs. Tingley has been speaking.

Happenings of a Day In Sports

BIG TEN PATTERN FOR NEW LEAGUE

Organization of Athletics at the Smaller Colleges to be Completed This Week

DETROIT, Mich., (AP)—Organization of "Big Eight" conference, patterned after the "Big Ten" or Western Conference, expected to be completed in Chicago March 18, will have a tendency to increase interest in athletics at smaller universities and to check the spread of the "professional" evil in such schools, in the opinion of Charles L. Bruce, of Detroit, one of the instigators of the new conference idea.

Bruce on Committee
Mr. Bruce, graduate manager of athletics at the University of Detroit, is a member of the committee that is drafting proposed rules for the new organization. With him on the committee are Coach R. K. Poche, of Notre Dame, and William Coffey, graduate manager of Marquette University. Their proposed set of rules will be acted upon at the Chicago meeting, to be attended by representatives of each of the eight schools to be proposed to place in the organization at the start. The schools are University of Detroit, Marquette, Notre Dame, Michigan Agricultural College, Washburn, De Paul, University of Cincinnati and University of Kentucky.

They include the freshman and three year rules and require fifteen hours of scholastic work on the part of athletes. 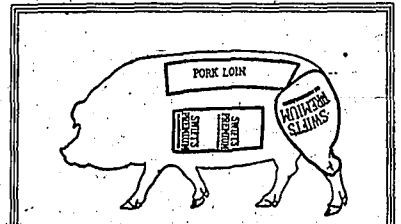

LET US NOT ADD TO OUR ALREADY HEAVY TAX BURDEN Voters of the City of Twin Falls are called upon to answer whether or not they desire to change the FORM of our city government. Two proposals are made for such changes. The one first submitted calls for the so-called commission form of government. Under it five councilmen would be elected, one of whom would act as mayor. Voters will pass upon this question at the election called for that purpose next Tuesday. This plan would not relieve the city of any of the present employees; would not reduce the payrolls of the city, but would INCREASE the salaries paid to the members of council. We cannot in these times afford to advance the salaries of our public officials. This form of government provides for the initiative, referendum and recall. Voters dissatisfied with the acts of an official can at any time petition for his recall, and the matter is submitted to the voters at a SPECIAL ELECTION. We would thus have the turmoil of special elections at every turn of the road. Voters desiring the repeal of any city ordinance have but to petition, and an election would be called under the so-called commission form of government to determine whether such ordinance be repealed. New ordinances can be enacted in the same way. The expense of such elections would be a heavy burden to the taxpayers at this time, and in addition would lead to interminable turmoil. To vote against such increased cost in government; vote against the commission form of government next Tuesday. If you voted at the last CITY ELECTION, you do not need to register to vote Tuesday. If you failed to vote at the last city election you cannot vote Tuesday UNLESS YOU REGISTER. SATURDAY IS THE LAST DAY FOR REGISTRATION. A change in form of city government will not lower taxes.
