

3600 REGISTER IN CITY'S VOTE

Approximately 600 New Voters
Added to the Lists of Twin
Falls Electors

Care for the convenience of voters without other means of conveyance to the polls at the election Tuesday will be furnished upon application to headquarters of the committee in charge of the campaign in opposition to the commission form. The committee will maintain headquarters in the Magel Brothers garage, telephone No. 640, it was announced today.

Approximately 3600 Twin Falls citizens are qualified to vote Tuesday in

the special city election on the proposition of adopting the commission form of government for Twin Falls. About 600 of these electors have registered during the past 30 days for this election, the others being already qualified by reason of their having registered for the last city election last April.

The tide of registrants at the municipal building reached a crest during the closing hours for registration Saturday evening when 117 electors were registered between the hours of 7 and 9 o'clock.

As between wards, the registration lists will show approximately 1800 registered electors in the second ward and about 1600 in the first.

Polling places for the election Tuesday will be opened at 9 o'clock in the morning and will continue open until 6 o'clock in the evening.

Electors of the first ward will vote at the municipal building, corner of Second avenue and Second street north and voters of the second ward will cast their ballots at the Johnson Auto Sales Company, building, Shoshone street east.

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FOUND MANY PEDAL DEFECTS

Investigators Discovered Bad Condition of Affairs Among New York School Children.

The board of health of New York City has recently made a special study of the feet of the children in one of the public schools with a view to obtaining some idea of the prevalence of pedal defects among young boys and girls.

The examinations, made by orthopedic surgeons, appeared to show that such defects are much commoner than has been supposed. The number of children examined was 850. Seven per cent of the boys and 6 per cent of the girls were found to have formed toes.
