

TO PERPETUATE NATIONAL SHRINE IN PHILADELPHIA

Historic Old City Hall to be Center of Interesting Program Planned for Ancient Independence Square

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. (AP)—The old city hall or supreme court building, a group of structures centered by independence hall and facing on Independence Square, is to be rededicated with appropriate ceremonies May 2. The restoration of this building to its original form has been completed as part of the work of restoring the entire group undertaken by the city of Philadelphia to perpetuate the shrine of American independence and the beginning of our government.

For the commemorative exercises the chief justice and members of the supreme court are to be guests of the city. The principal address is to be made by Hampton L. Carson, widely known as the historian of the supreme court, and Chief Justice Taft and Chief Justice Robert W. Moore, chief justice of the Pennsylvania state supreme court, will participate in the program as well as William C. Spang, governor of Pennsylvania, and J. Hampton Moore, mayor of Philadelphia.

Other Celebrations.

The dedication of this building will constitute the beginning of a series of historic celebrations culminating in the celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence through the Sesqui-Centennial exhibition in Philadelphia in 1926 by illustration of the world's progress in science, art and industry since the centennial celebration of 1876.

The work of restoring the Independence hall group was begun in 1906 and 1907. The supreme court building, sometimes called the old city hall, was constructed much later than Independence hall, which began in 1790 and finished in 1791. It corresponds with the other buildings and appears as a wing extending to the Fifth street corner of "the row." It was intended to be occupied by the municipal offices of the city of Philadelphia, but, at the moment of completion coincided with the transfer of the seat of federal government from New York to Philadelphia, the use of it was accorded to the supreme court of the United States.

CITY CHEMIST MAKING BEER TO DETERMINE QUANTITY OF "KICK"

OMAHA, (AP)—They are making beer at the Omaha city hall.

By Friday the first brew will be bottled. Three days later the beverage will be ready for a test to determine how much of a "kick" it may contain. Professor C. F. Crowley, city chemist, is brewmaster and it is to be the test, assisted possibly by James H. Hanley, former federal prohibition director.

Dave Bernstein and Max Fric, who conducted a grocery store, were arrested several days ago by federal agents and a quantity of malt and hops prominently displayed in their store was seized. The officers also confiscated a

recipe, putted in a conspicuous place near the malt and hops, and it is this formula which the city chemist is following in his brewing operations.

Mr. Hanley is counsel for Bernstein and Fric and he contends that if the ingredients noted at the grocery and according to the recipe do not make a beverage of more than one-half of one per cent alcohol, the seizure is illegal.

If the brew is not ready by Saturday when the hearing in federal court is scheduled to be held, Mr. Hanley says he will request a postponement until such a time that the percentage of "kick" to the beverage now being brewed can be determined.

New Trick in Confidence Games Unearthed Through First Arrest

OKMULGEE, Okla. (AP)—An alleged confidence game in which three men are charged with having offered one dollar bills for sale at 12 1/2 cents each and found a lively market for currency, but failed to deliver the cheap money after they received their price, was revealed here last night when officers arrested Jack Gardner of Muskogee on a charge of fraud and robbery.

Bob Smith, pool hall proprietor and

former politician, and Bert Davis of Tulsa are being sought on the same charge.

The men are alleged to have claimed they had a great number of \$1 bills from defunct banks and in order to handle money conveniently they had to have it in larger denominations. They took \$20 bills, and in some cases \$50 bills in payment for the cheap dollar bills, according to the county attorney's office.

USE LETTER CARRIERS TO GATHER DATA ON CROPS

Postmaster General Authorizes Employment of Force for New Set of Duties

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP)—Utilization of the services of rural letter carriers for gathering crop data and other agricultural statistics was authorized today by Postmaster General Work.

"The postoffice department realizes," the postmaster general said, "that the services the rural carriers could render would be of tremendous value to agricultural interests of the country, and we would be heartily glad to have them co-operate with the department of agriculture by serving as crop reporters. It is understood that the filling out of the report blanks required but a few moments each month, so that work of great importance and interest could be performed with expenditure of but little time, and without interference with postal duties of the carriers."

SHAKE BIG SWORDFISH.

HONOLULU, T. H. (AP)—A swordfish weighing 1200 pounds, the largest reared in Hawaiian waters in the past six years, was caught by the crew of a Japanese sampan which recently returned to port here.

Another strange fish, similar to one captured about a month ago, also was reared by the crew of the sampan. It weighed about 100 pounds. Published descriptions of the first of this species included in receipt of many inquiries from ichthyologists throughout the mainland. David Starr Jordan, chancellor emeritus of Stanford university and noted ichthyologist, wrote that it was probably one of the species known as the "moon fish," whose habitat is the Pacific ocean, especially near the California coast.

BET SUGAR PRODUCTION SHOWS DECLINE IN 1921

Total Manufactured Less By 68,000 Tons Than Amount in Previous Year

WASHINGTON, D. C. (AP)— Beet sugar production for 1921 amounted to 1,050,489 short tons, Secretary Wallace announced today, adding that this amount was 68,835 tons less than the production of 1920. The sugar beet

crop of 1921 grew on 614,988 acres, an area that was 66,858 acres less than that of 1920 and it was said, the report was the result of enumeration and not of estimating.

Farmers received \$49,164,000 for the 7,782,000 tons of the beet sugar crop for 1921 which averaged an average of \$60 per acre and \$4.32 per ton, and the price per ton was said to be as low as in 1916. Ninety-two factories were in operation for 76 days on the average. If it was said, and the fraction of sucrose actually extracted was 13.70 per cent of the weight of beets, as compared with an average of 13.53 per cent for the years 1916-1920.
