UTAH TOWNS
THREATENED
BY WATERS

Huge Dam in Washington County in Danger of Breaking and Grass Valley in Path—Salt Lake City Hard Hit

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, (AP)—Flooded conditions are reported from several points in Utah today. Alarm was sounded in the southwestern part of Salt Lake City as the water rushing from Parley's canyon rose and flooded many of the streets to a greater depth than has prevailed for several days. Bales of hay were used as a bulwark by merchants in the street who were attempting to keep the current from entering their premises.

The snow last winter was exceptionally heavy, causing a greater amount of water to run from the mountains. As a result the channels have proved inadequate to carry all of the water and in some places street car tracks are under water. A thunderstorm broke over Salt Lake City at 7:30 a. m., adding to the waters from the rapidly melting snow in the mountains.

Several towns endangered.

The New Castle dam in Washington county is in danger of breaking, according to word received at the capital here. A large number of men are working to save the dam as a break would endanger Grass Valley and several towns.

Floods are reported to have washed out a greater part of the highway through Kings Meadow canyon in Sevier county, which connects with Wayne county points. Several bridges are reported to have been washed away. In Bear Valley a dam at Brimhall Springs and another at the Fall Bank dry farm have gone out.

SETTLER SUES
CANAL COMPANY

R. Glavin Would Prevent Distribution of Surplus Stock Among Stockholders

Litigation to prevent distribution of surplus water stock among landholders of the Salmon river project and to prevent delivery of surplus water on the basis of water stock rather than by pro rata distribution of available water supply, was instituted in district court here Saturday by R. Glavin and others against the Salmon River Canal company and Robert Ray.

Alleging that he and other persons similarly situated with him will be damaged by reason of inadequate water delivery this season if water is distributed on the basis of water stock, Glavin in this suit asks that the company be restrained from transferring surplus stock to Ray and others and that it be ordered not to deliver water this year except upon a pro rata basis among the land holders. He alleges that only five-eighths of an inch of water for each acre of land is available this season.

Plaintiffs named besides Glavin are: G. A. Salles, C. L. McFarland, Bert Kankel, J. E. Foshman, A. E. Caldwell, C. W. Hinchel, R. C. Carr, Albert Holmgren, Orville P. Parrot. All are holders of land within the area of 35,000 acres retained in the project when it was released from 60,000 acres. Surplus water stock is that which was used for lands excluded from this area.

Attorneys for the plaintiffs in this action are A. A. Fraser and John W. Graham.

MURDER AND SUICIDE
INDICATED BY FIND

Pistol Found at Scene of Tragedy in which Young Man and Woman Die

MAHARONKE, N. Y. (AP)—The bodies of John C. Kano, 31, and Miss Elizabeth Dunn were found in the woods of Allen Wood park, near here today.

Miss Dunn had been slain by a bullet through the heart. Kano was killed by a bullet through the mouth. An automatic pistol was found at his side. Kano, a clerk in the Maharone postoffice was reported to have been engaged to Miss Dunn, a school teacher. Police reported there was no evidence of a struggle at the spot where their bodies were found.

THROUGHOUT Illinois a search for the slayer of Miss Gertrude Hanna, daughter of a wealthy mill-owner is being carried on. The body of Miss Hanna was found in the cellar of a church parsonage at Hoopston, Ill.

BRITISHER ASKS
PRIVATE ESCORT

Alexander Robertson Requests Assistance in Suit for Girl's Hand

NEWARK, N. J. (AP)—A request that the British embassy send an agent to escort him from the station tomorrow so he would not be molested, has been presented by Alexander Robertson, British war veteran, who plans to go to Washington to press his charges that private detectives attempted to force him out of the country because of his fight with the hand of Miss Mary Culbertson, daughter of Senator Charles A. Culbertson of Texas.

"This became known today when it was learned that Robertson, who lives in Bloomfield, has written a special delivery letter to Morris Peterson, secretary of the British embassy, supplementing a telegram sent yesterday.

Robertson is seeking to have the embassy assist him in obtaining the return of his daughter, who was kidnapped on charges of impersonating federal officers. He already has caused the arrest of John F. Billa, another detective, on a charge of kidnapping.

The friendship between Robertson and Miss Culbertson was said to have started at the University of Texas, throughout the age, when they both were students. The two met again recently in Washington, where Miss Culbertson was entered in the Hilton Arms school.

BODY OF WINNER
IS RECOVERED

Last of Victims of Sea Tragedy Found Floating Near His Capsized Yacht.

OAKLAND, Cal. (AP)—The body of Edward A. Christensen, wealthy San Francisco lumber and shipping man, was found floating near his capsized yacht, Craft, whose overturning during a squall in San Francisco bay Saturday night resulted in the drowning of Christensen's companions, John A. Hanley, another wealthy San Francisco ship-ping man, and Captain Peter Anderson.

Bodies of Hanley and Anderson had been found earlier today near the wreck, and a third life preserver was found near the wreckage. The craft was said to have had four, and it was believed that Christensen was using the remaining one. A sailor familiar with the boat stated that it was hardly possible that he could have survived the heavy sea, but was running at 25 degrees of the capsize, at dusk Saturday.

More Rainfall is

With fields still moist from eight one-hundredths of an inch of rain, more fell here early this morning, more rain is predicted by the official forecaster for tonight and Tuesday.

Safe Blower Killed
in Attempt to Rob
Nebraska Postoffice

Fire Follows Explosion; Body of Alleged Crook Charred. Beyond Recognition

OMAHA, (AP)—The post office at Bellevue, Neb., about ten miles south of Omaha, located in a grocery store owned by William Hunt, was destroyed by fire early today following an explosion believed by authorities to have been set off by a safe blower, whose body burned beyond recognition was found in the debris.

A terrific explosion preceded the fire which also damaged an adjoining building, according to the night telephone operator at Bellevue. The night watchman of a training school for disabled war veterans said he had seen two strange men driving about the town in an automobile before the explosion occurred.

RUSSIA DEMANDS
MORE CASH THAN
ALLIES CAN GIVE

Atmosphere of Gloom Again Pervades Genoa Conference. Circles; France and Belgium May Drop Out

GENOA, (AP)—Prime Minister Lloyd George of Great Britain, former Minister of Finance of Italy, addressed today a strong appeal to the Russian representatives at the Genoa conference, urging them to accept the allied memorandum on the main points and promising Russia an international loan.

It was asserted that although the proposed loan would amount to 200,000,000 gold francs, it had been stated that the Russians were asking for three billion gold rubles, or 25 times as much as the allies offer.

Atmosphere of gloom pervaded the conference circles in spite of the assurance of England on one hand and Belgium and France on the other that the reconstruction of Russia would be undertaken.

Bill Look to Lloyd George. Admirers of Mr. Lloyd George believe he may yet have some trump card in reserve, but in other quarters no such hope is felt. It was conceded that several dockloads have been broken when dissolution seemed certain.

The report is circulated that Mr. Lloyd George will present a direct governmental loan to the soviet if they accept the allied memorandum. Another is that the conference will be continued even if France and Belgium drop out in protest against the recognition embodied in the allied memorandum of Russia's right to hold foreigners' property under the soviet nationalization program.

The fifth week of the Genoa conference, opening today, will see the end of the convalescence, it is generally believed.

DEATH OF AGED PAIR IS
DUE TO QUEER CAUSE

Use of Vermin Exterminator in Adjacent Room Believed Responsible for Fatality in New York Hotel; Manager is Charged With Second Degree Manslaughter

NEW YORK, (AP)—Eli Du Pay, manager of Hotel Margaret in Brooklyn Heights and Albert Bradish, a vermin exterminator, were held in \$5,000 bail on warrants of suspicion of homicide by Magistrate Gelsman today, as the result of the deaths at the hotel recently of Mr. and Mrs. Fremont M. Jackson, aged invalid pair, who are alleged to have been killed by fumigating gas.

The action followed examination of the body of Mr. Jackson and a secret autopsy which was said to have shown death was caused by poisoning from cyanogen gas alleged to have been used in fumigating rooms beneath those in which the Jacksons lived.

Du Pay and Bradish are alleged to have caused the deaths by negligence in not properly sealing the rooms in which the fumigating gas was used.

TO AID VICTIMS

Mississippi Flood Suffers Will Call Upon President for Proclamation Requesting Contributions from Nation

NEW ORLEANS, (AP)—Approximately 70,000 men, women, and children are homeless in Mississippi and Louisiana as the result of the Mississippi flood and of this number 40,000 are being fed, sheltered and clothed by the Red Cross and other organizations. It was officially announced today by various relief bodies. No provision has been made to aid the 30,000 persons who have not yet reached the refugee camps, the statement said.

"Battions are now being tried to 16,664 individuals, who were driven from their homes in Louisiana.

20,000 in One Valley

In Mississippi the committee plans to feed 20,000 persons in the Yargo valley.

"The committee at a mass meeting yesterday declared its funds were 'pitifully inadequate' and decided to ask President Harding to issue a national call for contributions.

Refuge camps established in Louisiana and Mississippi are taxed to capacity and additional refugees are arriving daily. The Red Cross is endeavoring to reach out into new territory."

Request of Late Henry P. Davidson as to Funeral Details Will Be Carried Out

NEW YORK, (AP)—The family and close friends of Henry P. Davidson, who died on an operating table at the Long Valley hospital Sunday, will follow his request that they not wear mourning at his funeral tomorrow in the Episcopal church at Letting Town, Long Island.

Eight men connected with the firm of J. P. Morgan and company, in which Mr. Davidson was a partner, will serve as pallbearers. Their names will be announced later.

NEGROES OF
COUNTY ARE
ORGANIZING

Armed Bands Said To Be on Way to Scene of Recent Lynching; Two Detachments of State Rangers Ordered Out

PORT WORTH, Texas, (AP)—The body of a negro, Tom Cornish, brother of John Cornish, one of the victims of the Elgin mob Saturday morning, was found hanging from a tree by a farmer between Elgin and Fairbairn this morning.

Armed bands of negroes are said to be marching toward Elgin to avenge the burning of three negroes here Saturday, who were accused of attacking and murdering a 17-year-old white school girl. Governor Neff today ordered two detachments of state rangers to be sent immediately to Fairbairn, to prevent an uprising of negroes which Sheriff W. M. Mayo of Freestone county said was imminent. The sheriff requested the rangers in a message today. He said the negroes of the county are threatening to avenge the death of the three negroes who were burned the night of Saturday morning.

Situation Critical.

The situation in Freestone county is becoming critical, according to the information given Adjutant General Barton in a telephone message this afternoon from a deputy sheriff at Fairbairn. He said that the situation is threatening to become critical.

WILSON WANTS
REED DEFEATED

Former President Steps Into Arena to Redeem Reputation of Democracy

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP)—Referring to United States Senator James A. Reed as a "Marplot," Woodrow Wilson in a letter to former Governor Louis V. Stephens, has asked the defeat of Reed in the Missouri election.

The letter is in reply to one by Mr. Stephens, follows:

"My dear Governor Stephens: Your letter of April 22, has gratified me. I am glad to be sure in your judgment of Reed by your own clear knowledge of him, and I shall hope and confidently expect to see him repudiated by the democracy of Missouri. Certainly Kansas cannot afford to be represented by such a marplot and it will check the enthusiasm of democratic voters in Missouri. I am sure your own great influence will contribute to the desired and expected redemption.

"I have accepted assurances of my entire confidence in the Missouri democrats and believe me, with best wishes, 'Sincerely yours,'

(Signed) "Woodrow Wilson."

In a letter last week to John C. Higgins, a local lawyer, Mr. Wilson asked Mr. Higgins "not to complicate the contest in Missouri by becoming a candidate for the nomination."

The primary is August 14.

SALMON TRACT SETTLERS
DEMAND WATER DELIVERY

J. R. Diebolt and A. E. Caldwell Ask Court to Issue Writ of Mandate

With a mandate to compel the Salmon River Canal company to deliver irrigation water this season on a pro rata basis to lands outside the 35,000-acre area retained in the project, J. R. Diebolt and A. E. Caldwell asked in two separate suits instituted in district court here Saturday by A. A. Fraser and John W. Graham, attorneys for J. R. Diebolt and A. E. Caldwell.

Hearing on the application for the writ had been set by Judge T. Bailey Lee to be held May 18 in district court at Boise.

Diebolt also asks for \$25,000 damages for alleged failure of the canal company to deliver water to his lands during the season of 1921.

CLUBS ARE USED TO SUBDUDE RIOT IN CHICAGO JAIL

Inmates of Cook County Bastille Beaten by Warden and Assistants to Restore Order Following Demonstration

CHICAGO, (AP)—Leaders in a riot in the Cook county jail here last night were taken from their cells early today and whipped by Warden Wesley Westbrook and 50 guards armed with clubs and blackjacks, before the disturbance which lasted more than four hours, was stopped. The riot started because of an order limiting the prisoners' right to receive visitors to once instead of twice a week.

The riot started on the fourth tier. Flaming blankets set afire by prisoners were dropped to the ground floor. Dense smoke almost suffocated many inmates. With steel strips torn from their banks the prisoners gathered on the second, third and fourth tiers. Guards armed with clubs and blackjacks, before the disturbance which lasted more than four hours, was stopped. The riot started because of an order limiting the prisoners' right to receive visitors to once instead of twice a week.

KILLS HIMSELF RATHER THAN BE RECAPTURED

Prisoner at Silver City Escapes, Is Surrounded and Commits Suicide

BOISE, Idaho, (AP)—Fred A. Young, 37, member of a prominent Oregon family, said in the Silver City, Idaho, jail for the past two years after conviction of murder in the second degree for the killing of a Grand View rancher in an altercation over the price of beer. Sunday morning when Sheriff L. R. Pearson entered the jail spring upon the officer, thrust him into a cell, locked the door and walked away, heading for the hills.

Hearing the sheriff's outcry, a deputy released him and a posse was formed which quickly overtook Young, who fired with a revolver he had in some means procured, his first bullet passing through the sheriff's hat. The posse returned the fire when Young placed the muzzle of his gun in his mouth and fired, dying instantly.

Young was held in the Owyhee county jail in default of bail on appeal from his conviction of two years ago. He came to Idaho from Mitchell, Ore.

UNCHARTED SEA SOUGHT BY VENTURESOME SAILORS

SEATTLE, Wash., (AP)—Bivining the ventures of Horatio Hudson, the Cabots and other early navigators, the tiny 67-foot pinner boat Blue Sea of Olaf Swenson and company, will leave Seattle on this week for the Korymbos river, Arctic Siberia, nearly 1000 miles west of Bering Strait.

She will be outfitted to remain several years in that remote corner of the uncharted area. No vessel from the Pacific has been able to reach Korymbos in two years. Captain Albert H. Anderson, who went into the Arctic last year with the power boat Eagle, carrying an expedition of the Smithsonian Institution, will command the Blue Sea.

Superintendent of Prisons Condemns "An Iron Hand and Mere Confinement"

JOLIET, Ill., (AP)—An iron hand and mere confinement "make convicts and no more," is the negative scale of prison policy, according to John L. Whitman, superintendent of Illinois State penitentiary at Joliet, near here, is being constructed. The architecture of the building is designed to facilitate application of the "Illinois plan," or progressive method. Prisoners will be grouped according to their grade of advancement under the system, and each group will be assigned to one of the eight cell houses, the second of which will be completed and in use within a few days. Prisoners will move from cell house to cell house with their advancement in grade.

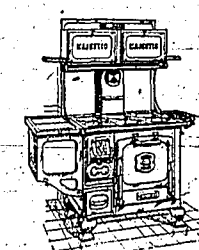

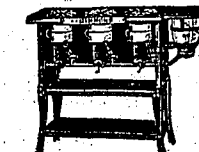
