JURY'S VERDICT DECLARED TO BE STATE DISGRACE

Lack of Respect for Law on the Part of Men in Box Made Basis of Unusual Action by Chicago Judge

CHICAGO, (AP)—Declaring that their verdict was a "disgrace to the citizenship of this state," Judge Marcus Kavanagh Monday dismissed a jury which had acquitted Bernard Tondl of robbery.

The jury, accepted in the morning and with still two weeks to serve, was discharged after the judge had told them that in rendering their verdict they had either disregarded the evidence or deliberately sought to free the accused man.

BONUS WILL BE TAKEN UP WHEN TARIFF IS LIFTED

Compromise Agreement Reached in Senate Favoring Disposal of Both Measures Before Adjournment

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The compromise program of republican leaders to defer action on the soldiers' bonus bill until after the tariff measure has been disposed of was approved Monday at a conference of majority senators.

Before adopting a resolution embodying this program, the conference rejected a resolution by Senator McCumber, Republican, North Dakota, to lay aside the tariff for consideration of both measures.

Several senators on both the republican and democratic sides were present to offer a motion that the bonus be taken up immediately but republican leaders appeared confident that such a motion would be defeated.

Should the majority's compromise program be put through, final session on the bonus probably would be some before September. But that Monday were that the tariff bill could not be brought to a vote before August 15 at the earliest, and more likely not before Aug. 15.

There was a sharp controversy in the conference over the language of the resolution which a number of senators construed as binding them to vote for the bonus. The resolution was said to have been drafted by a committee of republican senators that this was not the case.

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—Use of the whipping post and pillory as means of punishment for hold-up men and sneak thieves was advocated by Wm. A. Pinkerton, founder of the detective agency bearing his name in an address at the 25th annual convention of the International Association of Police Chiefs here Monday.

Chief of Police William Rathbone of Detroit, Mich., another speaker, declared he believed unemployment had little to do with crime. During a period of much unemployment, he said, crime in Detroit was reduced 60 per cent by the police.

SPOKANE, (AP)—G. E. Begli and Edward B. Chambers, of Chicago, were killed Monday night, and a son, Edward Chamber, Jr., injured, in an automobile crash on the Apple Way, three miles east of Coeur d'Alene, near here, Monday afternoon.

Wives of both men killed, witnessed the accident. Dool followed with a car and struck the rear end of the car which smashed into the rear of Begli's machine, which was stalled on the right hand side of the road.

WINS POINT IN MURDER TRIAL

FOREIGNERS IN CANTON FORCED TO LEAVE CITY

Intensity of Gun Fire Between Rival Forces Compels General Evacuation of Points of Safety

PEKING, (AP)—Foreigners at Canton were forced to flee for safety from the indiscriminate firing of Sun Yat Sen's forces Monday, according to a Canton dispatch to foreign legations here. Two thousand persons, including many foreigners, boarded a vessel when hostilities ceased and went to Hong Kong.

After a considerable exchange of fire between the Chinese-Chiang forces and Sun's forces, a truce was arranged and firing ceased. General Chen Chiang-Ming, who drove Mr. Bhu, president of the South China government, out of Canton last week, still holds the city.

TACT IS GIVEN WARM WELCOME BY ENGLISHMEN

Chief Justice of America Guest of Honor at Pilgrims' Banquet — Discusses Relationship of Two Countries

LONDON, (AP)—Britain's foremost statesmen, jurists and lawyers and a great body of American friends joined in an important reception to William Howard Taft, chief justice of the United States supreme court, upon his first public appearance in England Monday.

Mr. Taft appeared with a graceful tribute to the spirit of justice and a commitment to great Britain's peace policy. Mr. Taft was introduced by the Earl of Balfour, who expressed the hope that the distinguished visitor would not be disappointed in the great British greeting by the prevailing chilly weather.

OPPOSITION TO SALES TAX IS MAIN FEATURE

Delegates to American Federation Convention Disposes of Routine Work in Record Time

CINCINNATI, (AP)—Opposition to a retail sales tax, with a warning that effort can be expected to have it written into the sales tax bill and the re-drafting of a policy opposed to the accelerated immigration, marked the action Monday of the American Federation of Labor convention as it settled down to its final week's work.

By unanimous vote, the convention directed officers of the federation to wage the fight against the sales tax with "unabated force," and the decision of the delegates coming without debate on the legislative committee's report.

The immigration policy provoked only brief discussion during which Max Greenstein of the Jewelry Workers' union, urged unrestricted immigration at least for skilled workers, while Charles L. Bayne of the shoe workers' union replied there was "too much unemployment in this country now without bringing in more immigrants."

For Budget System.

Administration of the federal budget law also was debated before the convention by the committee report asserting that—the "budget administrators have prostituted the high purpose of the budget system by using it for political propaganda." The committee, however, declared in favor of a "satisfactory budget system," and its report was adopted with the provision instructing "the federation's executive council to use every effort to correct glaring administrative defects which are operating to the disadvantage of the present budget system." Special complaint was made by the committee that administrators of the budget had been over-reckless in reducing expenditures in the department of labor.

Quick Action Rules.

Paced with a big work program for the final week, the delegates were not inclined to delay action. Quick action generally ruled in the disposal of all questions and when adjournment came, no more work was ready for immediate attention. Aside from the committee work, interest was centered in a movement to contest the reelection of Frank Morrison as secretary of the federation. Friends of William Clark, president of the Glass Workers, were active among the delegates, and Mr. Clark indicated his willingness to make the race.

LOCOMOTIVE ENGINEERS ARE BUYING COAL MINES

Acquiring Properties in West Virginia and Kentucky and Hope to Reduce Price

CLEVELAND, O., (AP)—The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers has "tackled the coal problem," according to a statement by Albert F. Coyle, chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers' Journal. "The Locomotive Engineers are making a \$2,000,000 investment in West Virginia and Kentucky coal mines," said Mr. Coyle, which means not only a fair deal for the miners but better and cheaper coal for the consuming public.

"The leading officers of the Brotherhood have obtained control of more than 6,000 acres of the best coal land in the United States situated on the Coal River in Boone county, West Virginia, and in Floyd county, the heart of the big Staley coal district, near Prestonsburg, Kentucky.

Many Engineers Buy Stock

"The Coal River Collieries, as the new company is called, is owned by hundreds of locomotive engineers throughout the country, who have subscribed in small amounts to the capital stock of \$2,000,000.

"The Engineers are not only going into the business of mining coal, they are also planning the establishment of retail yards to sell their coal at reasonable prices to railwaymen and other workers in the large cities. Locomotive engineers and their friends have already organized these auxiliary coal yards in Ohio and Michigan, and have placed contracts with their coal companies for delivery direct from the mine pits to the consumers.

Will Eliminate Abuses.

"Without much blame of trumpets and band music, the experiment of the Engineers promises to revolutionize the coal industry. First, they have cut out watered stock and over-capitalization, organizing a company whose sole purpose is efficient production and not financial exploitation of its coal resources. In the second place, they have laid down the doctrine that the workers ought to share in the prosperity of the industry. Then they have employed the most competent mining engineers obtainable and have given them a free hand in the technical development of their properties. Finally, they are going to reorganize their own cooperative coal yards, cut out middlemen's profits, and sell their own coal to themselves at cost."

Modern machinery, including powerful electric locomotives, is called for. It is estimated that the mines will have a capacity exceeding 6,000 tons a day.

SHARP ACTION IS REQUESTED OF PRESIDENT

Charge of Falsifying of Records Made Basis for Resolution Asking Discharge of Nebraska Man

WASHINGTON, (AP)—A resolution censuring Commissioner Frank A. Harrison of Lincoln, Neb., for "falsifying the records of the commission" was adopted unanimously by members of the American commission to the Brazilian centennial exhibition at a meeting Saturday. Later members of the commission called upon President Harding at the White House, submitted the resolution and requested that he remove Mr. Harrison as a member of the commission.

No announcement was made from the White House as to what action the president might take and members of the commission, beyond issuing a brief formal statement declined to discuss the case or the character of the charges. Members present when the vote was taken were said to be D. Collier of Santa Fe, N. M., Commissioner General and Mr. Arthur Livermore, New York City; W. G. Stevens, Rio de Janeiro; John H. Kirby, Houston, Texas, and George F. Mills, secretary of the commission.

Kept No Copies of Letters.

It is understood that the records referred to in the resolution of censure included minutes of the commission and that the charge of falsifying was at least in part based upon the alleged action of Mr. Harrison in writing some letters in the name of the commission and keeping no copies.

The charges also were said to involve the recent deferring of the date of the opening of the exposition which it is understood Mr. Harrison has charged Mr. Collier with bringing about during a trip to South America, but which it was said had been filed on the initiative of Brazil before Mr. Collier had arrived there.

For some time also, it was said, there had been growing friction between Mr. Collier and Mr. Harrison.

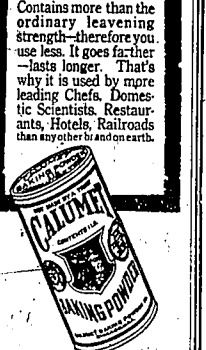

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HONEST BROKERS, TOO

Joah H. Banton is district attorney of New York, and he has recently been on the trail of bucketshop crooks with more or less success.

But what shall be thought of Mr. Banton when he classifies all brokers as crooks? In a recent speech he said: "Wall street must be cleaned up or New York will lose its financial prestige. We can apprehend and convict the gunman, the robber and the burglar, as recent experiences have proved, but the reformed crook, living under the badge of respectability, known as a broker, may steal and never be apprehended unless, by having licensed him in advance, his books will be open to the district attorney to prosecute him for his thievery."

The generalization implied is the offensive feature of the remark quoted. Mr. Banton groups everybody in the brokerage business as crooks, which is as unjust as it would be to affirm that all lawyers are criminals because a few have been proven scoundrels.

But there is no warrant for accusing every broker in the land of being a crook. Unless the great majority of stockbrokers were honorable there would not be a chance for scamps to make a profit out of the nefarious

TREATY SUPPORTERS LEAD IN THE IRISH ELECTIONS

Fragmentary Returns Indicate Heavy Vote for Independents—Republicans Still Confident

DUBLIN, (AP)—Only fragmentary election returns were available at a late hour Monday night, but the results thus far known show unexpectedly heavy voting for the independent candidates, and as between the treatyites and the anti-treatyites on the panel, a predominant support for the former.

Generally the results confirm the Cork conclusion that the laborites' favored preferences overwhelmingly favored the treaty and that the anti-treaty vote was less than one-fourth that given for the treaty. Nevertheless, at the headquarters of the republicans it was declared that the republicans did not count on a slim margin but were backed by more than 15 members of parliament.

Edmond de Valera evidently is awaiting full results before venturing a statement on the elections. It now is considered doubtful whether a coalition can be formed. The difficulties of any unification have not been overcome, and all prospects for peace are said to depend on an arrangement with the regular forces.
