MERCURY'S DROP BOON TO GRAINS

Cooler Weather of Week Generally More Favorable to Crop Development

BOISE.—The weather of the week was generally more favorable for crop development than that of the two weeks preceding, says Clinton E. Norquist, meteorologist, in a summary of weather conditions in the section for the week ending Tuesday. The change to cooler weather was favorable for the cereals, which in the later districts are now filling. The rains in the section were highly beneficial to all dry farm crops and also refreshing to cultivation in the irrigated districts. The vegetable crop, corn, beans, potatoes and beets, are making satisfactory progress. Fruit in the commercial orchards is doing well. Cherry harvest, except in the southern part of the section, is well advanced and early apples has begun. Prunes are dropping rather freely, but it is not yet possible to determine to what extent the crop is affected.

Southeastern Idaho: Moderate to high temperatures obtained over the entire district. Heavy showers occurred in the southern and central part and scattered showers in the north part of the district. The range continues very good, but it is drying in the north. Crops are improving in the areas visited by rains but seedling rain badly in the dry areas. Grain filling slowly on unirrigated lands, but in some places grasshoppers and truck crops are looking good.

Post Falls, Bannock county: Temperatures were moderate and light showers fell on the 20th. Meadows are in good condition on irrigated land but unirrigated crops are seedling rain badly. Stock is in good condition but wheat is drying.

Boise, Ada county: Weather favorable for rapid growth of crops; good rain Thursday freshened vegetation; soil and fields being cut; winter wheat harvest begun; fruit doing well except prunes dropping too freely.

Fruitland, Payette county: Apples and prunes making splendid growth; also early potatoes; second crop alfalfa ready and being cut; apricots and early apples are beginning to ripen.

Shrubby, Twin Falls county: Thunder showers Friday and Saturday; heat and potatoes growing fine; barley turning and some wheat almost matured; alfalfa left for seed being cut for hay.

Twin Falls, Twin Falls county: Thunder showers Wednesday and Thursday; all crops made, exceptionally rapid growth, especially potatoes and beans; some wheat lodged badly by storm; silks clover being cut.

UNIVERSITY GRADUATE IS NAMED FACULTY MEMBER

Julius E. Nordby of Genesee Will Succeed R. E. Gongwer as Animal Husbandry Professor.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, MOSCOW, July 27.—Julius E. Nordby of Genesee, a graduate of the University of Idaho in 1915, has been appointed associate professor of animal husbandry at the university to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of R. E. Gongwer.

Professor Nordby was a specialist in animal husbandry and a member of the livestock judging team while a student at the university. Obtaining a scholarship at the University of Illinois, he studied there a year, receiving the degree of master of science in agriculture in 1916. He was employed as an instructor in the Idaho department of animal husbandry for two years and then resigned to enter the army.

After training in the aerial motor service he was one of the few who made a commission as an expert on airplane motors and was assigned as officer in charge at Orr field, Arcadia, Florida.

Returning to the University of Idaho of the close of the war, he became associate animal husbandman in charge of feeding investigations. He planned and supervised the construction of the experimental feeding plant at the Caldwell station and had charge of the feeding experiments there for a year.

He then resigned to devote his attention to the Genesee stock farms, of which, with his brother, he is proprietor. While engaged there in raising purebred Shorthorn cattle and Duroc hogs, he has been a contributor to a leading Idaho farm paper.

APPLE CROP IS LIGHTER

Orchardists of Buhl Now Appraising Their Spraying to Their Treating

BUHL, July 27.—Farmers of the Buhl country are appraising their prospects of lead spray to their apple orchards. The apple crop in this section will be light this year, as compared with the crop harvested last year. It will be from 20 to 60 per cent of a normal crop, according to the estimate of a number of the orchardists. The small crop is said to be due to the heavy yield that was produced last year.

R. P. Davis has 25 acres of apples and five acres of prunes, both of which will produce a fair yield this year. His Delicious apple trees are especially well loaded.

Expect Lighter Yield.
A. J. Miller, owner of the 40-acre apple orchard four miles southwest of Buhl, has a light crop this year after two consecutive years of good yields. He estimates 1500 boxes this year, as compared with 18,000 boxes last year.

George Watt, who lives on an 80-acre apple orchard on which he estimates a 30 per cent crop. The apples are fairly well distributed over the trees, so that good varieties may be expected.

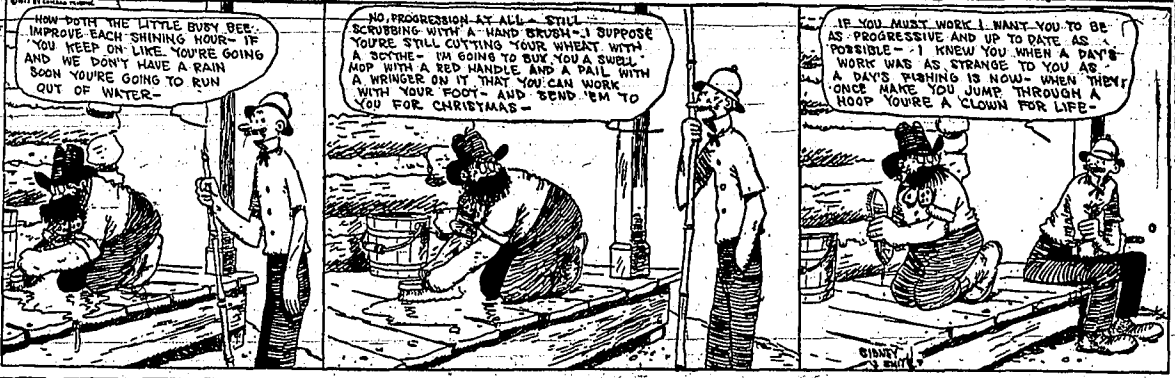

Happenings of a Day In Sports

BATTLE GOES TO TWELVE ROUNDS—ENDING IN DRAW

Champion Declared to Have a Shade the Better But Both Men Fighting Hard When the Bell Rings

RINGSIDE, JERSEY CITY, N. J., July 27. (AP)—Benny Leonard, world's lightweight boxing champion, successfully defended his title against Lew Tendler in a twelve-round, no-decision contest tonight, ending in the opinion of a majority of sport writers at the ringside, a narrow shade in a great struggle.

The challenger, a left hander, furnished the champion the most interesting combat Leonard has had since he turned back Willie Ritchie some years ago.

Tendler, starting with great confidence and skill, carried the fight to the champion. Ho pummeled Leonard with swift lefts to the body and sharp rights to the head and jaw, the strongest blow to the champion's nose early. It appeared in the first four rounds that Tendler was to have things all his own way.

Leonard Steadies Down.

Then Leonard steadied himself and began to find a measure in the fifth, sixth and seventh rounds in a burst of speed. In the seventh round his mouth bumped Tendler's shoulder and he lost a false tooth.

The eighth found Tendler on the aggressive again. After taking a hard right to the jaw and another under the heart, he fought Leonard at close quarters and swung a number of hard lefts to the jaw. Leonard's knees sagged and he clutched to save himself. Tendler, on the champion took few chances.

Southpaw Hard Games.

When it was over the champion, battered more perhaps than he has been in any bout since he won the title from Freddie Welch, 1917, said: "Those southpaws are hell on the ropes. Tendler during his training he had been hit. Tendler's pugilistic record predicted that he would finish the Philadelphia within five rounds. Tendler, on the other hand, had said that he would win by a knockout, but he had nothing to say of this tonight. It said he was engaged with Leonard in a decision match.

When the first preliminary fighters were called to the arena, drawing a seating capacity of more than 9,000, announced to be about three hours the referee said the gate receipts were about \$450,000 and the attendance about 69,000.

Understand the agreement between the principals in the contest they are to receive from 62.5 to 65.1 per cent of the gross receipts. Of this sum Leonard will receive 50 per cent, Tendler the other third going to the challenger.

It was 9:15 when Lew Tendler, the challenger, stepped by a window of the arena made his way down the aisle from his dressing quarters and entered the ring. He was clad in a grey suit and his hair was accompanied by white bands, Philip Glassman, Morris Tendler, his brother, and Jack Johnson, champion.

Leonard the winner, and Rocky Chagnon of Buffalo, recently defeated by Leonard, also appeared with his left arm in splints.

Both fighters appeared more or less drawn and nervous and Leonard appeared a trifle more drawn than Tendler.

Round One.

The bell rang at 9:28. Tendler was short with two rights and then landed a light left. They fell into a clinch and began dancing around.

Round Two.

Tendler missed two rights and missed the champion into a corner. Leonard cried a hard left to the head and Tendler missed a right and left.

Round Three.

Tendler again was warned for hitting in a clinch. Leonard complained of Tendler's low hitting. Tendler replied with a left swing to the jaw. Tendler missed another left and Tendler smiled.

Round Four.

Tendler tapped a right to the chin. They exchanged at close range. Tendler landed a left to the body. Leonard countered with hard right crosses to the body.

Round Five.

At this point newspapermen agreed that Tendler was far in the lead. Leonard was short with a right and then punched heavily into Tendler's body, drawing his left to the jaw and hooking his right.

Round Six.

Tendler's right went to the stomach. Leonard rocked Tendler with a left. He added a right and left to the jaw. Tendler missed with a left. Tendler began to run away and clinch.

Round Seven.

Leonard predicted before the fight that he would win in this round. Tendler hooked two lefts to the head. Leonard had the better of the exchange.

Round Eight.

Tendler jabbed with his right and crossed with his left. He landed two lefts to the jaw in a clinch. Both swung at long range. Leonard sent two hard rights to the body.

Round Nine.

Tendler hooked his left to the jaw and body. Leonard landed a hard right to the jaw. They kept up animated conversation.

Round Ten.

They clinched. Tendler missed a right. Leonard had two right hooks to the body.

Leonard kept landing—and landing with his right. Leonard sent two short uppercuts and reached Tendler to the ropes.
