GOAL INDUSTRY NOW IN HANDS OF GOVERNMENT

Henry B. Spencer, Former Vice-President of Southern Railway, Named as Federal Fuel Administrator

COAL STRIKE SUMMARY

SENATOR BORAH, chairman of the senate labor committee, conferred with a committee of the House on the bill proposing a federal commission to inquire into the coal industry.

President Harding, it was said at the White House, is sympathetic in favor of the bill, and is anxious to see it passed.

WASHINGTON, July 28 (AP)

Henry B. Spencer, former vice-president of the Southern railway, and general purchasing agent for the coal industry, was appointed administrator of the coal industry.

Mr. Spencer becomes administrative member of the coal distribution committee, which will control distribution of available coal supplies to all industries and utilities.

With the announcement of creation of the office of coal administrator, it was expected at the White House that production of coal, regardless of rail and mine strikes, eventually would be increased to the point where it would be sufficient to meet the country's needs.

President Harding, who has not yet said what he contemplates in the coal situation, is expected to name an advisory committee.

Secretary Hoover, who announced Mr. Spencer's selection by President Harding for the vacancy on the central committee, made public also names of operators from coal producing states.

The governors of 23 states, Mr. Hoover announced, have indicated to meet the necessary conditions for a control, production and distribution of coal within their borders.

Negro is Lynched Following Quarrel Over Drinking Cup

Dispute Between White Man and Black Culminates in Shooting by Mob

TEARKANA, Texas, July 28 (AP) A quarrel over a drinking cup between a white man from the Chicago man and a negro employe at Hope, Ark., about 30 miles northeast of Tearkana, was followed this afternoon by the lynching of the negro near Quercy, four miles southwest of Hope.

A mob of about 100 white men preceded the train to Quercy where West was taken off. He was carried a short distance from the train and shot to death, 8 or 9 bullets entering his body.

This is the second lynching at Hope within the last 18 months. Brownie Tucker having been hanged there on the night of March 16, 1921, because of an alleged attack on a white woman.

HUMAN CHAIN SAVES LIFE

Policeman, Motorist and Bridge Tender Play Principal Parts in Heroic Role

CHICAGO, July 28 (AP) A policeman, a street car motorist and a bridge tender today formed a human chain and, hanging from a bridge, rescued a young man, George Ryan, 18 years old, who had attempted to take his life by jumping into the water.

PASSENGER TRAINS STRIKE

Sidewalk on St. Louis and Ben Francisco Slightly Injured Several Trains

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., July 28 (AP) The St. Louis and Ben Francisco passenger train No. 11, westbound from St. Louis, sidwiped Frisco passenger train No. 101, eastbound to Memphis, at the intersection of the two main lines in the city limits here late tonight.

The cause of the accident was not officially ascertained tonight but it was known that the train from St. Louis was two hours late.

OHIO ADVANCE

Baltimore and Ohio Shoppers Will Go No Further Pending National Settlement

BALTIMORE, Md., July 28 (AP) Negotiations for a separate settlement of the Shoppers' strike on the Baltimore and Ohio railway here today ended this afternoon when Chairman W. J. McGee of the system shop federations conference here notified President Charles W. Whelan that he and his associates were unwilling to proceed while the possibility exists for a national agreement.

The chief reason for ending the negotiations, as set forth in a letter to C. W. Gallaway, vice president in charge of operations and mechanics, was William J. McGee, president of the Baltimore and Ohio shopmen's federation, was the unwillingness of the delegates to agree to a general agreement with a national basis.

EXPLOSION MAY RESULT IN LOSS OF MANY LIVES

Two Buildings Wrecked, One Known Killed and Several Reported Injured in Destruction of Restaurant

KANSAS CITY, Mo., (AP) Several persons were reported injured and two buildings damaged and set afire tonight by an explosion in the downtown district. Plate glass windows in store buildings for a block around were shattered.

The first reports were that the explosion took place in a restaurant. Many persons were said to have been eating in the restaurant at the time, but it is not known whether any of these were injured.

The first definite report of a fatality in connection with the explosion was that a fireman was killed by a live wire.

PLLOT TO MURDER FRENCH OFFICIAL

Government Takes Extraordinary Precautions to Protect Life of M. Poincare

PARIS, July 28 (AP) A brief note was issued this afternoon announcing that the government had learned from an Italian source that a plot to murder M. Poincare was being planned.

The plot was said to be organized by a group of Italian monarchists who were plotting to kill M. Poincare.

Many precautions were taken. When Premier Poincare left Paris this evening for Genoa, Saturday and Sunday at his country home in the department of Meuse, precautions for his safety were taken at the railway station.

Several of the alleged plotters were immediately flushed to the French foreign office by telephone. The prefect of police also was notified at once.

The story of the apparent disappearance of the four submarines was reported by the Honolulu Herald.

PENDING PROPOSALS FROM PRESIDENT ARE HAVING GOOD EFFECT

Peace Program to be Submitted on Tuesday is Expected to Go Far Towards Providing Working Ground Upon Which Settlement of Shopmen's Walkout May Be Based

CHICAGO, July 28 (AP) With President Harding prepared to submit detailed proposals to the workmen and B. M. Jewell, head of the shopmen and his international presidents hurrying back to Chicago after conferences with Mr. Harding, the fourth week of the walkout ended tonight with both executives and union heads viewing optimistically the possibility of an early settlement.

Strike headquarters here tonight received a message from Mr. Jewell at Washington calling a meeting of the shopmen's executive committee to be held here next Tuesday.

HARDING FEELS EARLY END OF STRIKE LIKELY

President's Proposals to be Submitted to Labor Group in Chicago and Executives in Washington

WASHINGTON, July 28 (AP) Proposals for settling the railroad strike, drawn up by President Harding and representing the conclusions reached by him after the extended conference of the last hours with labor leaders and railway executives, will be presented to separate meetings of representatives of the two groups next Tuesday.

Details of the plan, or plans, were withheld tonight, but President Harding was said to feel that prospects were bright for an early settlement of the controversy which has threatened to retard seriously the country's transportation system.

Another section would concede the right of the strikers to a rehearing but the national railroad labor union and another would bind the railroads to set up regional adjustment boards, while a fourth would require changes in the existing contract which would be "outside" for repair work.

President Harding was understood to have suggested compromise on the question of seniority rights by which all men hired since the strike would be given the same seniority as those who were former employees so as to rank just behind the men who did not work after July 1.

Mr. Jewell, president of the railway employees' department of the American Federation of Labor, said the striking shopmen at St. Paul, Minn., and similar action was obtained by the American Refriggerator Company at St. Louis, Mo., while the striking shopmen at Chicago and Northwestern, the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific and the Chicago and Milwaukee railroads.

DEFENDS HIS TITLE MINNEAPOLIS, July 28

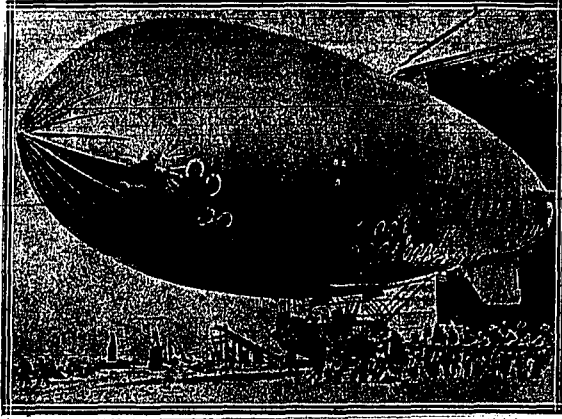

# PREDICTS NEXT WAR WILL MEAN UNTOLD HORROR

### British Premier Declares Germ of Battle Still Infects Europe and Appeals to Churches for Aid

LONDON, July 28, (AP)—"More terrible machines than in the late war are being constructed," said Prime Minister Lloyd George, at a luncheon given by 300 prominent Free Churchmen today.

"What for?" he asked, and continued, "to attack cities and main, destroy and burn helpless women and children. Keep your eyes on what is happening. If the churches of Europe and America allow that to fructify, they had better close their doors."

"We reduced our armaments and if other nations follow the example, there will be no serious menace to peace. But it is difficult for a nation to remain defenseless while others are preparing for war."

Mr. Lloyd George said that the next war, if it came, would be a war of civilization itself. Speaking of the suddenness in which wars came, he said:

#### Explosive Material Everywhere

"The war germ," like any other germ you do not know that you have it until it is upon you. It is not dangerous until it has an epithelium which fits it on him. There is that atmosphere in the world now and the explosive material is scattered over the face of the globe."

"When a match is dropped it is too late to wave the covenant of the league of nations." It is not dangerous until it is lit. Lock up the explosives and especially lock up those given to dropping matches. The churches must promote the new spirit which is necessary."

The prime minister said that he attached high hopes to the league of nations. He said that civilization would be lost if the league succeeded. If it failed, civilization was doomed, he thought.

# FOUR MEN ARE RESCUED FROM BURNING COAL MINE

### Fire Originating in Bottom of Shaft Cuts Off Party Sent to Investigate

MURPHYBORO, Ill., July 28, (AP)—The four men trapped by flames in a shaft of the Midway coal company's mine near Ward, 30 miles northeast of this city, when they went down to investigate the fire in the shaft, were rescued late tonight by a mine relief team directed by Frank Robertson, chief engineer of Murphyboro. The last one of the four was taken from the shaft shortly before midnight, about an hour after the other three had been liberated.

The fire originated in the bottom of the shaft, it was said. The four men were trapped in a shaft about 200 feet deep. The men were known to be Superintendent McGowan, William Taylor, inspector of the mine, Harry Laughlin, a mine foreman, and a laborer, whose name was given at Timbilly.

# WHERE GREAT EXPLORER LIES

South Georgia Island, Tomb of Shackleton, Lonely Spot in the Great Antarctic Region.

An interesting picture of life in South Georgia island, the "Gateway of the Antarctic," where Shackleton was buried, was given by an explorer who made a research expedition there a few years ago. At that time there were no other men on the island, and she was the domestic in the household of Capt. C. A. Larsen, a former Antarctic explorer who had settled down as a head of a Norwegian whaling station on the island. "Blow my solitary land," the correspondent writes, "the grassy bank sloped sharply to a milk-colored glacial stream entering an inlet of the sea only 60 yards away. A quarter of a mile across the inlet stood the perpendicular front of a beautiful valley glacier, coming down between penked hills from the lifeless, silent interior. Penguins bobbed out of the sea below the glacier and were my most interesting callers, for their curious antics and antics at home being. Sea elephants crawled concernedly up the stream below me and went to sleep among the hummocks on the beach. Above the tent, on the plateau of the little promontory, seven pairs of adobebrasses cackled on their courtship and nesting, along with giant petrels, skuas, kelp gulls and the pretty little antarctic titlarks, the only land bird of the Far South, whose cheerful song was almost the sole homelike sound."

# PLEASED THE "MONEY BAGS"

### European Capitalists Listened With Pleasure to Accounts of Rockefeller's Stupendous Wealth.

During my stay in London I accepted an invitation to have luncheon with Lord Rothschild at his office. John Hays Hammond writes in Scribner's it had been my custom, extending over a period of many years, to drop in informally and have luncheon with the Rothschilds once or twice during each of my frequent visits to London. On these occasions always the most interesting topic of conversation was my estimate of the wealth of Rockefeller and other rich Americans. Lord Rothschild invariably introduced the subject and forwarded me a ready-made list to give him the desired truth. He would usually start, with some "tipical" capitalists, whose wealth did not amount to more than the paltry sum of \$100,000,000, and then worked up by queries until he reached the American Croesus, John D. Rockefeller. It would be an unpatriotic American who would belittle the wealth of a compatriot at a time like this, and after having wadedly admitted, in reply to Lord Rothschild's question, that Rockefeller was certainly worth \$500,000,000, assuming an air of ultra-conservatism, I would allow him to extort what was to him a delectable fact that Rockefeller was worth at least \$700,000,000, and when the money bags around the table started at me with an expression of pleased surprise, but not of doubt, I would in subdued tones convey to them the fact that I informed himself directly of America's Rockefeller wealth was estimated at over \$1,000,000,000. The internationalism of the Rothschild family, and the utter lack of envy, is evidenced in the unmistakable pleasure which characterized the reception of this titbit of high finance.

# FAMOUS BRIDGE IS THREATENED

### Stretching of Cable Subject of Keen Interest on Part of Engineers

NEW YORK, July 28, (AP)—Structural engineers tonight rushed to the defense of the sturdy span of Brooklyn's bridge, declaring the famous structure to be good "for centuries" when they learned that Grover Whalon, commissioner of plans and structures, today had told Mayor Hylan he planned the early calling of an engineers' conference to discuss its replacement.

A giant cable, almost 10 inches in diameter, which helps support the roadway, the promenade and the electric railway, a total of hundreds of thousands of tons has stretched slightly, reported Commissioner Whalon. Engineers of his department take this as the forerunner of the disintegration of the entire structure.

Quintus Lindenthal, engineer of Hell Gate bridge and a bridge commissioner of New York 27 years ago, declared that it would be a mistake to rebuild the structure.

#### His Recovery Complete.

The Elimination Contest: On Tuesday next what might be known as the elimination contest in politics comes off.

The names of all the men who appear in the primary election are pretty well known to the voters.

Primary selection of candidates should be made on the basis of fitness for office in the event of election.

But there are other considerations which are just as important as party affiliation, they are the matter of the individual record of the men who are running.

A primary election partakes of the element of personality of candidates to so great an extent that public selection can very well be left to the machinery of election.

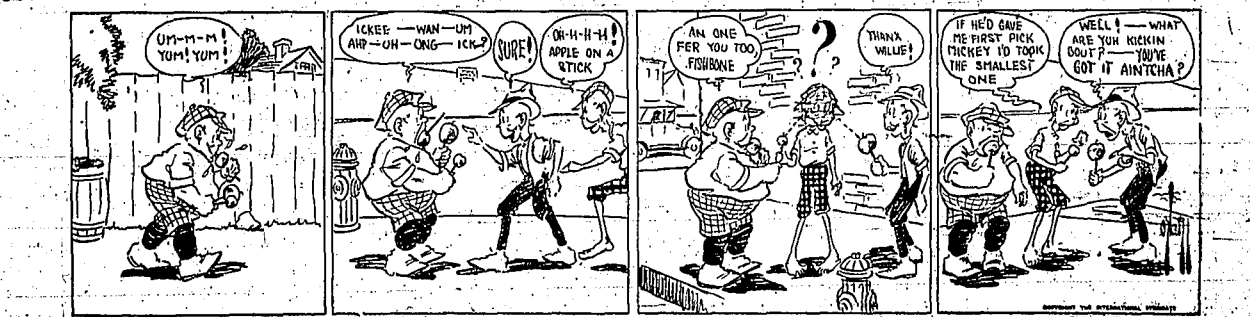
