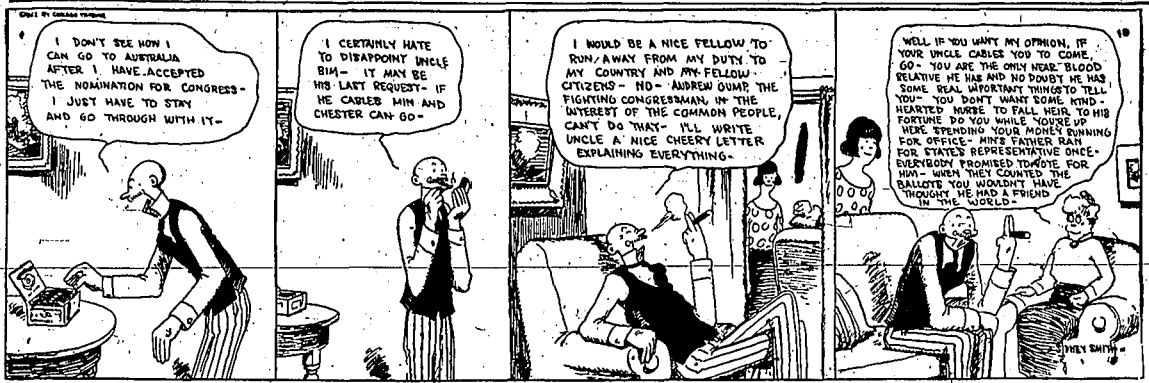

SLAYER HELD ON MURDER CHARGE

George Cline Formally Charged with Shooting of John Bergen, Screen Actor

EDGEMONT, N. J., Aug. 26 (AP)—George Cline, movie location rider, was held on a murder charge today after he had given the authorities two versions of the shooting in his home last night of John Bergen, screen actor, who, he said, admitted having assaulted Mrs. Cline several weeks ago while they were in the Philippines.

His first story, as reported by county police who quizzed him, was that he and Bergen were going upstairs to fight and when Bergen drew a pistol, the actor's hand only to see him take out a blackjack, Cline said. Then Cline fired.

The second version which Prosecutor Hart said Cline had told to him, was that the men had gone to an upstairs room, Cline had given Bergen a pistol, kept one himself, and told the actor they were to fight a duel in the dark. As he reached for the chamber to turn out the light, he saw Bergen point his pistol at him, and he knocked it from the actor's hand, whereupon Bergen crumpled his own gun and it was while they struggled over this weapon that the shot was fired, Cline said he was not sure who fired the shot.

George Cline, a taxi driver, and a policeman found Bergen dying a short distance from the Cline home. In his pocket was a bloodstained note, reading "George Cline killed me."

Fared for His Life

Another note found in Bergen's clothes, and held by the prosecutor, said "If by chance I am shot in the next few weeks it will be done by a George Cline, alias George Wait, of Edgemoat, N. J. The reasons are unknown to me. He is threatening me. No doubt a German Lueger, calibre 25, will be used, as it is a favorite of his many gangs. John Bergen, 214 East Eleventh street."

Cline told newspaper men that he met Bergen three years ago when the latter was a professional dancer in New York. "He was a coner loafer but I made a man out of him, making him a professional dancer and getting him out of jail in Atlantic City," he said.

A woman who called at the postoffice today said she called the flight instructor of Bergen, and declared that Bergen had deserted her and their five-year-old child five years ago, but she thought of their marriage. She said she had been in the hope of being assisted in Cline. She said she considered Bergen had gotten "his just desert."

HARD LABOR IS PROVIDED FOR

Honolulu Man Found Guilty of Embezzlement Sentenced to Five to Ten Years

HONOLULU, Aug. 26 (AP)—John Guild, prominent business man of Hawaii, former treasurer of Alexander and Baldwin, sugar factors and shippers, pleaded guilty today to two charges of embezzlement and was sentenced to not less than five years and not more than ten years at hard labor, on each of the sentences as to be run concurrently.

Although Guild was specifically charged with embezzling only two amounts, \$37,000 from Alexander and Baldwin and \$20,000 from the Protestant Episcopal church corporation of Hawaii, of which he also was treasurer, it was said by directors of the Alexander and Baldwin firm that his shortage there would amount to approximately \$1,000,000.

Accounts which were under Guild's control involving the bank of Honolulu and branches in Seattle, San Francisco and New York, now are being audited.

Directors of the firm said that Guild had confessed to juggling balances between the different offices and thus covering up his peculation, which is extended over a period of ten years or more.

Church Grows Suspicious

Following exposure of his irregularities in the banking world, the church corporation of whose funds and securities he was the custodian investigated his books and discovered that \$36,000 in bonds were missing. Subsequently \$20,000 worth of the missing securities were found in a brokerage office, where they were held as security for Guild's account. A demand was made on the brokers for their return, but this was refused. Guild is said to have dealt heavily in stocks during the past few years, mostly at a loss.

When confronted several days ago with evidence tending to show irregularities in his accounts, Guild collapsed and for several days his physician said his life was in danger. Subsequently the railroad and last night the two indictments were returned against him.

FRENCH BATTLESHIP SINKS

All But Three of 900 Members of Officers and Crew Are Safely Rescued

L'ORIENT, France, Aug. 26 (AP)—The battleship France, 23,000 tons, one of the prides of the French navy, struck a rock off Quilbourn bay in the darkness of early morning today and went to the bottom in 75 feet of water.

All but three of the 900 officers and men in the crew were rescued from wreckage of the first line returning from night maneuvers to anchor at Port Haliguen, when at 6 o'clock this morning she ran on a hidden rock 25 feet below the surface. A great gash was torn in the steel hull of the dreadnought.

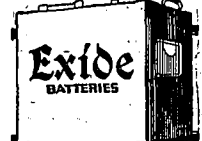

BROTHERHOODS TO STAND PAT

Efforts to be Made to Devise Plan for Control of Illegal Strikes

CLEVELAND, Aug. 26 (AP)—The conference of the leaders of the "big four" railroad transportation brotherhoods probably will be held here Monday, at which some plan for handling trouble among the membership resulting from the shipmen's strike will be worked out, it is believed in brotherhood circles here.

W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, the only one of the big chiefs in Cleveland, said tonight, however, he had heard of no such conference.

Warren S. Stone, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, and D. H. Robertson, president of the Firemen and Engine-men, are expected to return Monday from New York, where they attempted to mediate the shipmen's strike.

L. E. Sheppard, president of the Order of Railway Conductors, who was with the other brotherhood heads, is expected to stop here on his return to Cedar Rapids.

"I don't know what the attitude of other brotherhood leaders will be," Mr. Lee said in regard to handling sporadic refusal of the brotherhood members to remain at work, "but I will continue, as I have in the past, to insist that the constitution of my order be lived up to and that no men go on illegal strikes."

SOUTH AMERICANS LOSE

COMPLETE TIE-UP IMPENDS

Passage of Resolution Indicates Walkout of Trainmen at Jefferson City

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Aug. 26 (AP)—A complete tie-up of traffic on the St. Louis-Kansas City line of the Missouri Pacific was imminent tonight as a result of the resolution passed this afternoon by the 250 conductors, brakemen, engineers, firemen and switchmen employed by the road here to refrain from work until the agreed upon had been removed from the roundhouse, the shops and yards.

Up to a late hour tonight trains had been kept moving. Tension was brought to a head this afternoon after it had been reported that Mayor Paul Hunt was driving from the railroad right of way at the point of a revolver by a deputy United States marshal.

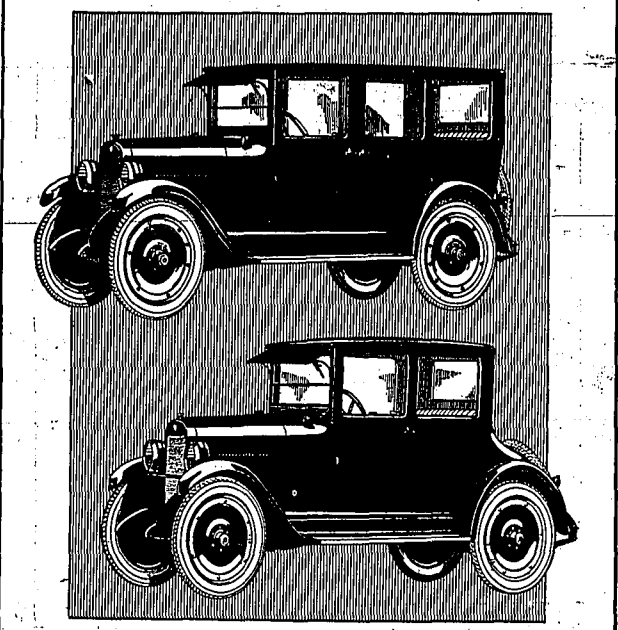

Twin Falls County Commissioners to Begin Inquiry Into Reservoir Project

Representatives of boards of commissioners of other counties in the Snake river valley affected by the proposed enterprise are expected to convene here Monday with the board of Twin Falls county commissioners at a public hearing on the petition for an election on the creation of the proposed irrigation project for the construction of the American Falls reservoir project.

Will Hear Objectors
At this hearing, which will be continued for several days, opportunity will be given for persons objecting to inclusion of their lands in the proposed district to apply for exclusion of such lands from the district boundaries as finally determined by the commissioners. In this connection the Twin Falls and North Side Canal companies have by resolution authorized their purpose to apply to the commissioners for the exclusion of lands on the request of any landholder desiring such exclusion.

Will Fix Election Date
The commissioners, after determining the boundaries of the proposed district, will set a date for submission of the question of its creation at an election at which landholders within the proposed district's boundaries will vote.

Premier Poincare Rejects Eleventh Hour Guarantees Offered by Germany
PARIS, Aug. 26, (AP)—Premier Poincare has rejected the eleventh hour guarantees offered by the German government; and independent measures by France against Germany seemed assured tonight after failure of the reparations mission to obtain in Berlin the basis of a compromise acceptable to France.

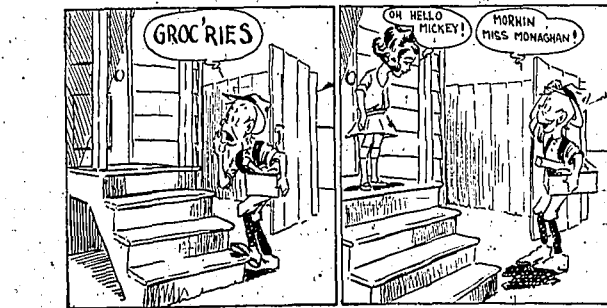

AMERICAN FALLS PROJECT GIVEN STATE APPROVAL

Reclamation Commissioner in Report Points Out Importance of Proposition to Snake River Valley

BOZEMAN, Aug. 26—After the investigation required by law, the state of Idaho, through its department of reclamation, has placed the seal of its approval upon the great American Falls reservoir project. The report on this project has been sent by Commissioner W. C. Swenden to the county commissioners of the Snake River valley.

In this report Commissioner Swenden points out that the proposition affords the last opportunity for those sections of the Snake River valley needing additional or protection water to bring their supply up to the requirements at all times. "Before the present surplus water is used to irrigate new areas which, he adds, "is a pity, for the water is the life of the state and its citizens."

Commissioner Swenden's report goes into the subjects of water supply, reservoir construction, etc., and states that the purpose of outlining the proposed super-district is solely to finance the project and not to operate or maintain the same. It also gives state construction to the limitation of an irrigation district. Attorney General Black had previously given the Idaho reclamation commission an opinion to the same effect.

Commissioner's Report
Commissioner Swenden's report follows:
August 16, 1922
Re: Proposed American Falls Reservoir District.

Honorable Board of County Commissioners, Twin Falls, Idaho, Gentlemen:
Under date of July 6, 1922, there was filed in this office the petition of Ivan G. Lincoln et al, praying for the organization of an irrigation district embracing the following areas:
2,400.30 acres of land, Madison county.
2,604.82 acres of land, Bonneville county.
11,782.18 acres of land, Blaine county.
10,294.44 acres of land, Power county.
10,294.44 acres of land, Jerome county.
97,967.2 acres of land, Gooding county.
6,927.16 acres of land, Elmore county.
221,981.37 acres of land, Twin Falls county.

The said petition was accompanied by a general map showing the boundary of the proposed district, the lands to be included therein, including the location of the canal and other structures now in existence and serving the lands in the proposed district, and the names of the persons who are to be included in the proposed district, and who wish to be constructed for the purpose of providing an additional water supply for the said lands.

All Lands Under Projects
Pursuant to the provisions of law, I have examined the petition and the accompanying data and other information relating thereto available to this department, consideration and it is my pleasure to offer the following report:
An examination of the data, including land descriptions, together with my knowledge of the lands included in the proposed district, discloses the fact that lands included in the said district are all situated in irrigation projects which have been constructed, and have been in operation for a number of years last past. The evident purpose of organizing this district is, therefore, to secure an additional supply of water supply.

Water Supply. The supplemental water supply for the proposed district is, according to the petition and accompanying data, to be derived from a reservoir to be constructed at American Falls, such water supply to be made available to the lands situated below the American Falls project. The reservoir to be constructed at American Falls, conveying it thence in the natural channel to the various points of diversion now in use and the lands situated above American Falls, are to receive supplemental water by exchanging rights to be acquired in American Falls by reservoir rights in the Snake Falls, which last mentioned reservoir is already completed.

A consideration of the stream flow data relating to the flow of Snake River, indicates that the water supply is ample and sufficient for the needs of the proposed district, together with other interests and lands which are under present plans to receive water from the said reservoir.

Practicable and Feasible Reservoir. Construction. Abundant data is available bearing upon the feasibility of impounding water in American Falls reservoir, including the results of foundation tests conducted by the United States Reclamation Service, and a careful study of the reservoir basin by expert geologists, all of which are favorable.

I am convinced, therefore, that the proposed reservoir is practicable and feasible.

Purpose of Organization. A consideration of the petition indicates clearly that this district is to be organized for the sole and only purpose of financing the purchase of water in the American Falls reservoir and that when this function is performed the obligations grow out of that same are discharged. The district will have no other functions to perform, it being the plan for the present canal companies and organizations now in existence to be in the proposed district, to function as
