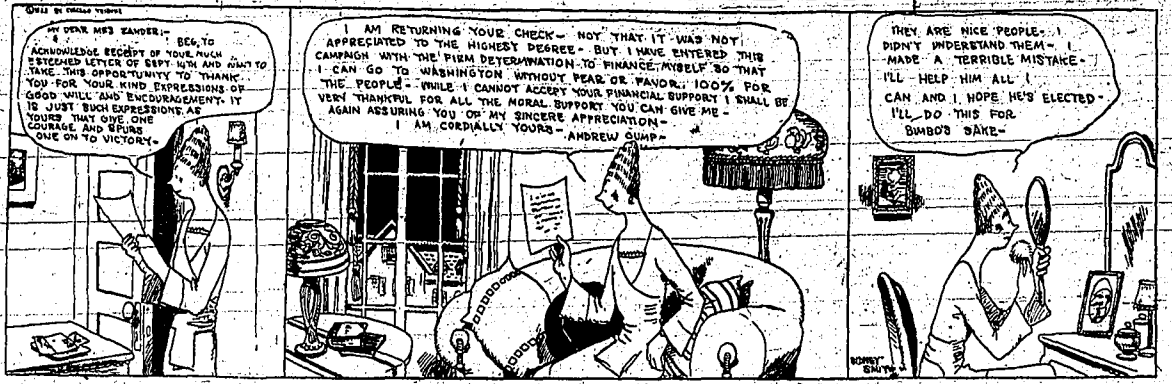

House Accepts Draft in Final Form from Conference Committee; Bill Made Special Order in Senate

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15 (AP)—The house by a vote of 210 to 90 today adopted the conference report on the administration tariff bill. Ten minutes later the measure had been reported back to the senate, where it was made the unfinished business for tomorrow.

Three attempts were made in the house to get the bill back into conference for a third time, but two were blocked on points of order, and the third was defeated by a direct vote, 193 to 108.

On the roll call on final passage of the bill, 144 republicans voted in opposition and five democrats in support.

Thirty-four republicans and one socialist voted for the Garner motion for a reduction in the duty on sugar, and nine democrats voted against it.

Immediately after the amended conference report was called up, Representative Cooper, republican, Wisconsin, made a point of order that in carrying out the "extraneous" directions of the house, to agree to the senate amendments eliminating the dye and sugar licensing provision and the duty on starch.
