# HEARING UPON INJUNCTION IS NOW CONCLUDED

### Temporary Order is Extended Until Saturday at Which Time Decision of Court in Case Will Be Announced

CHICAGO, Sept. 21. (AP)—Fate of the government's suit for a nationwide injunction against the striking railroad shop workers will be announced Saturday morning at 11 o'clock by Judge James H. Wilker.

In the meantime, the temporary restraining order which has been in effect since September 1 is continued in force by order of the court. The order would have expired tonight at midnight.

Attorney General Harry M. Daugherty, in the closing of the proposed injunction to the court and after brief statement in defense of the government's right to enjoin the strikers, brought the case to a close at 2 o'clock today.

The injunction bill differs but little from the restraining order. It forms, in some cases, a more complete and binding, and its phrasing clarifies in doubtful passages but with one exception, it is every bit as drastic as the order now in effect.

### Main Modification

The one outstanding modification is a paragraph specifically inserting the "nothing contained herein shall be construed to prohibit the use of the funds or moneys of any said labor organization for any purpose not prohibited and nothing contained in this order shall be construed to prohibit the expression of any opinion or argument in any public meeting, assembly, or doing of any of the acts heretofore enjoined or not calculated to maintain or prolong a conspiracy to resist the enforcement of the laws of the United States."

The paragraph forbidding picketing in the vicinity of or near the place of employment of any employee, where railroad employees are required to work, has been extended to include a ban against pickets "along the way" to and from their work.

The provisions against pickets attempting to prevent employees from going to or coming from their work has been extended to include "any person or persons."

### Will Extend Ban

The ban against threats of violence against families of workmen will be extended if the bill is granted to include threats of violence, intimidation, appropriation of rights, persuasion or other acts of like character.

To the original restraining order the government has added in the new bill, an additional provision that the application for a preliminary injunction shall be continued against all defendants who have not previously served with notice of the present hearing, the application to be heard at such time as the court shall select.

Explanation of the injunction bill, Attorney General Daugherty told the court that "this order does not question the right of a man or corporation to be struck by a union, it restrains them from unlawfully striking back." The enforcement of this decree will not deprive any man or corporation of the right to be struck, it will afford protection to every man and all men equally, who come within its operation, in exercise of every lawful right.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 21. (AP)—When "A Sinner Believed," a pageant presented under the auspices of the Protestant Episcopal church was repeated at the auditorium Wednesday night to a packed house, the dancing in a scene depicting the conversion of the girl Basil Asteroth was not in the cast.

Protest had been made by clergymen attending the general convention of the church here that the dancer who led a band of bare-legged maidens in a dance which was one of the features of the first production of the pageant was immoral and the dancer was ordered out of the performance by Dr. W. E. Gardner, head of the educational department of the church and which the drama commission operates.

It was announced later that "she" was a boy.

### BRITISH LIKELY TO TAKE ACTION

### Practice of Searching Foreign Ships Beyond 3 Mile Limit May Be Questioned

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21. (AP)—Unless the defendants take an appeal from the decision of the federal court in Boston yesterday and permit a higher tribunal to pass upon the claim of the American prohibitionists to search foreign ships over the seas beyond the three-mile limit, the British government is expected to take up the subject diplomatically with the state department.

Up to the present the British enforcement has centered its efforts upon the seizure of ships in the three-mile limit, and has made no attempt in the resulting legal proceedings. A complete lack of sympathy with the operations of the rum runners on the part of the British officials is said to have caused the assumption of this attitude, but now that cases have begun to emerge from the court dockets showing the weight of judicial decisions behind the claim of extended high seas jurisdiction, it is understood that it is to be a change in this course of the London government.

It is the British contention that the issue raised by the court decision yesterday in Boston in the case of the British schooner Green and Ruby, which was held for rum selling beyond the three-mile limit, are far more grave and important than any mere question of the punishment of a few smugglers, or the enforcement of domestic customs laws.

### WILL REDUCE PRODUCTION

### Salt Creek Oil Operators Name Committee to Arrange for Outrighted Drilling Program

CASPER, Wyo., Sept. 21. (AP)—Salt Creek oil field operators have decided at a meeting to leave in the hands of a special committee the question of working out an equitable plan for the elimination of unnecessary drilling in the Salt Creek field. Nearly 50 per cent of the acreage in the field was represented at the meeting.

It is estimated there will be a well for over 334 acres under the proposed plan. This means the curtailment of production in the future because of low prices.

### RUM SHIP CALLS FOR QUICK WORK

### Prohibition Officials Spend a Busy Day Checking Operations of Boozie Craft

NEW YORK, Sept. 21. (AP)—The United States coast guard cutter Berceus was sent to sea today to determine the exact location of the Onward, a vessel flying the British flag, which has defied prohibition officers aboard the Irish, flagship of the dry navy.

The Berceus, it was said, had orders to seize the Onward, if she was within the 12-mile limit. The vessel, prohibition officials said, is believed to be carrying a cargo of liquor and awaiting an opportunity to transfer it to a smaller boat for smuggling into the United States.

The revenue cutter Newberry, sent out early today in quest of the Onward, came across the sea going tug Justice L. M. Nelson, arrested its crew of 15 and seized whiskey valued at \$200,000. The cargo of the tug included 2118 cases of Scotch and rum.

The captain of the Onward, which was formerly Henry Ford's private yacht, was said to have threatened to shoot the first prohibition sailor who tried to board her vessel. He then attempted to enter the vessel.

### BACKERS WILL GO SLOW

Chairman of Reclamation Association Disgusts Columbia Basin Project

SPOKANE, Sept. 21. (AP)—E. F. Blaine of Spokane, chairman of the legislative educational committee of the Western States Reclamation association, speaking before the board of trustees of the Spokane Chamber of Commerce, expressed his disapproval of the Columbia basin irrigation project against making an immediate appeal to congress for funds with which to commence actual construction work on the reclamation scheme.

In my judgment it would be a mistake, said Mr. Blaine, to give congress the impression that an appeal is about to be made for a large appropriation to be used in building the project. It would frighten congress, however, I think it your duty to go to Washington and appeal for a special appropriation with which to make an investigation of the feasibility of the Columbia basin project.

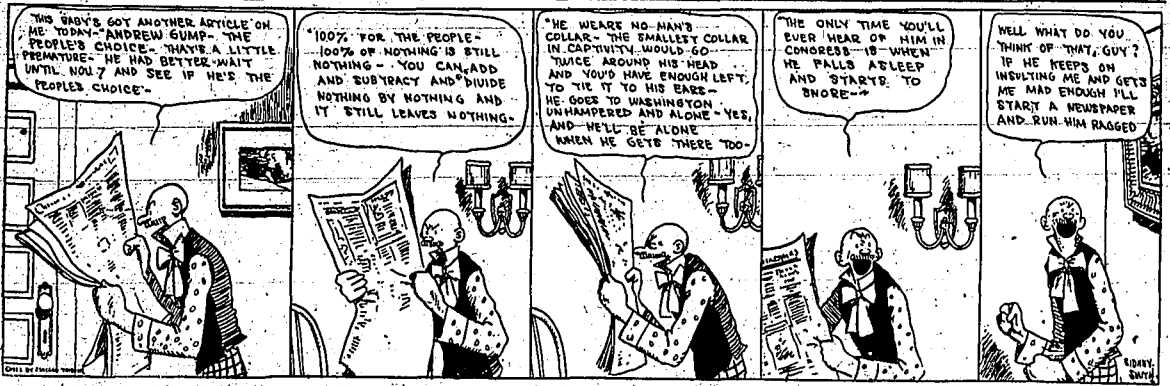

Many Inventors Watchmakers. Watchmaking was the first step to most of the principal inventions that make modern industry what it is today, Carl W. Sad Taste in Clatern Water. Generally the disagreeable odor and taste sometimes noticed in clatern water is due to the growth of an alga, a microscopic plant. Occasionally there is due to the growth of moss or other material that will add to the trouble. You can add chlorine of lime having about 35 per cent available chlorine in the proportion of one to three parts per 100,000 gallons of water, and it will kill the growth of bacteria and algae. It may be necessary, to thoroughly clean out the clatern and wash the walls, but try the chlorinated lime first. A pump that will stir the water in the clatern, such as the ordinary chain pump, will be beneficial.
